### OBSERVATIONS.

HEALTH SERVICE.

I have pleasure in submitting my Seventh Annual Report as Medical Officer of Health. This is also the year of cessation of hostilities in the German and Japanese theatres of war, so that it is still a war-time edition.

It is good to be able to report that throughout the strenuous years of war, the health of the Borough has remained at a high level, that births have continued to increase (although a slight drop on the last Report, 668 to 616) and that infection, infestation and malnutrition are at their lowest.

Diphtheria is unknown thanks to the persistent efforts of all concerned in pressing the Diphtheria Immunisation Campaign at the clinics and in the schools. The response has been good but there are still defaulters and misinformed parents who prefer to run grave risks rather than accept this most sound and excellent preventive measure. During the year the responsibility for the immunisation of the 0-5 year olds was handed over to the Maternity and Child Welfare Committee.

The Clinics have risen yet again in attendances which reflects considerably on the altering views of the public.

When I first came to Chelmsford attendances were low and the element of "places for the poor" still the thought uppermost in the public mind. To-day it is different, for the benefits which are to be obtained and the advice offered by our Officers in each department is gradually making itself evident by the continued increases and requests for information in many unknown directions. Not the least of these is the increasing advice now sought and offered to parents who have no children. The "Fertility Clinic" as I like to call it. The results have proved encouraging combining as they do the advice of Specialists, Hospital and Pathologist.

The Dental Sessions per week for infants to five years of age and ante-natal mothers has been increased to two sessions per week, which take place the same time as the Infant Welfare Sessions, thus proving a better service for the mothers and children. Many babies are able to profit by this early dental attention. This increase in dental sessions was envisaged in my last Report.

There were no maternal deaths during the year under review.

An additional Infant Welfare Clinic was opened at the St. John's Hospital with the co-operation of the County Medical Officer of Health, who kindly placed one of the huts at our disposal. This was intended as a temporary measure, and it is hoped to make more permanent arrangements by the next Report.

In December, 1944, a Domestic Help Scheme was introduced by the Ministry of Health in Circular 179/44, but although every endeavour has been made to get this working, by contacting the Ministry of Labour, advertisements in the local press, etc., it has been found quite impossible to find suitable people to operate the Scheme, in fact it has been found quite impossible to get anybody to offer their services at all.

A draft Scheme for Epidemics was drawn up in the Autumn with the help of the various public bodies and voluntary organisations, but I am glad to report that it was found unnecessary to put it into operation.

The Ambulance Service was re-organised in the latter part of the year due to the cessation of the A.R.P. ambulances which had hitherto undertaken work for the Town Ambulance. The ambulance was transferred to the Chelmsford Hospital, where it was garaged at "Bellefields," and the six whole-time drivers and attendants housed in a room in the basement of the hospital. A new Town Ambulance was purchased.

It is possible that the Scheme will have to be reviewed and some further re-organisation made before the final arrangements are completed.

The War-time Nurseries have continued throughout the year working satisfactorily and filling a great need. The staffs have given loyal service and done much to promote the smooth and easy control of administration.

Before closing I must again give sincere thanks to our ever growing band of voluntary workers—Mrs. Gozzett, Mrs. Whitcomb, Mrs. Andrews, Mrs. Capers, Mrs. Green, Mrs. Devonish, Mrs. Snell, Mrs. Stubbings, Mrs. Thompson, Mrs. Stonard, Mrs. Slade—who have given most excellent service in the clinics, nurseries and other branches of public health work. And finally to the Health Visitors, the Midwives, the Dental Officer and his Attendant, and the brief office staff under its able Mr. Bunter, all of whom play such an important part in the complete summation of our public health effort.

### MATERNITY.

Our arrangement for the institutional treatment at St. John's Hospital, Wood Street, of cases of complications arising during pregnancy or confinement, and for cases where the home environment is unsatisfactory, remains as before. The full charge for maintenance and treatment is 11/8 per day. This charge is subject to reduction if the person's income is below the Council's Income Scale Assessment.

One hundred and ninety-one Borough cases were admitted to St. John's Hospital for confinement during the year, compared with 214 in 1944.

### ANTE-NATAL SERVICES.

The Ante-Natal and Post-Natal Clinics are held on the first and third Wednesdays in each month. Mothers are encouraged to attend six weeks or so after confinement for post-natal examination.

In addition, married women, where pregnancy would endanger health, are on their request given instructions in birth control.

### INSTITUTIONAL PROVISION FOR-

- (a) Unmarried Mothers. The only arrangement is that supplied by the Borough and the Essex County Council Public Assistance Committee. After the lying-in period, however, they may be helped by the Girls' Aid Society, who have a Hostel just outside the Borough. There is also a Home at Ardmore, Buckhurst Hill, for unmarried mothers and their children.
- (b) For Illegitimate Infants and Homeless Children. The Public Assistance Institution is available.

### PREMATURE INFANTS.

Arrangements have been made between the hospitals and this Authority to insure the follow-up of premature infants on discharge. Notification, with complete record of child's progress while in hospital, is received from the Medical Officer in Charge of the Maternity Section. Health Visitors follow-up soon after receiving above information.

Rats and Mice (Destruction) Act, 1919. Infestation Order, 1943.

During the year 1,374 visits have been made to infested premises and 2,284 treatments applied.

The sewers of the Borough have been test baited and revealed that 3 sections were infested. The Council have approved expenditure in order that the 900 manholes in the infested areas may be treated, but, in spite of continued efforts, it has been impossible to obtain any labour to carry out the work.

The campaign as a whole is proving fairly successful, but the fact that occupiers are charged for the service no doubt deters the private householder from reporting to the Local Authority the presence of rats or mice on his premises.
