

#### ANNUAL REPORT, 1953.

Ir. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I am presenting this Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the ear 1953 on behalf of the late Dr. J. Mervyn Thomas, who died on the 23rd February, 954.

As, however, I took no part in the work for the year under review I only propose o make a few brief comments on some of the more salient aspects arising out of the ear's statistics.

The year was particularly noteworthy for an outbreak of Poliomyelitis which courred in the Borough. The total number of confirmed cases was 19, and there rere three deaths.

These nineteen cases were part of a general increase in the incidence of Poliomyelitis hich was occurring in other parts of England and Wales during 1953. The comarative figures for this Borough for 1952 were 5 with one death, and for 1951 were with one death.

There were 50 notified cases of Infective Hepatitis during the year, the comarative figures for 1952 and 1951 being 3 and 2 respectively.

This disease, although of a minor character, is troublesome owing to its tendency opersist in a locality for several months, with two seasonal peaks of incidence in utumn and Spring. It is usually spread by close person to person contact, and onsequently preventive measures are mainly based on the application of strict ersonal hygiene among all the members of the household where a case of this disease peurs.

Measles and Whooping Cough were very prevalent during 1953, there being 1,005 ptified cases of Measles and 294 notified cases of Whooping Cough. Comparative gures for 1952 were Measles 120, and Whooping Cough 39.

There were 22 cases of Puerperal Pyrexia notified during the year in contrast ith only 2 in 1952. Most of these cases occurred in St. John's Hospital, and were othing more than a slight temporary rise of temperature during the lying-in period hich, owing to the strictness of the Regulations, must nevertheless be notified. There however a beneficial aspect arising from this in that it inevitably focuses attention i the condition, and causes enquiries to be made with consequently a tightening of all necessary precautionary measures.

As indicated in last year's Report, the Essex Association for the Welfare of the hysically Handicapped has been established at 54, New Street, Chelmsford, where oplication can be made by physically handicapped persons requiring assistance.

#### Old People's Welfare.

The Rest Room in Legg Street, Chelmsford, continues to be available for all the over sixties " and light refreshments are provided. It is used by old people from e country while waiting for buses, friends arrange to meet there, and there are rds and dominoes. Daily papers and periodicals are provided, also facilities for iting. A sing-song among themselves is often enjoyed there.

The room is staffed entirely by voluntary help and is open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., onday to Friday inclusive.

A Chiropody Service is functioning every Wednesday, and the old people conbute 2/6d., the rest being paid by the Old People's Welfare Council.

There are thirteen clubs in Chelmsford and District and there is also a Visiting b-Committee for visiting those unable to attend clubs.

PREVALENCE OF AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

The following are again noted :--

- (a) Diphtheria. An absence of notifications or clinical cases during the year.
- (b) Measles. The total number of cases notified was 1,005 during the year.
- (c) Scarlet Fever. There were 49 cases notified during the year.
- (d) Whooping Cough. The total number of cases of whooping cough notified during the year was 294.
- (e) Acute Poliomyelitis. During the year there were 19 cases of confirmed poliomyelitis. There were 3 deaths.
- (f) Puerperal Pyrexia. There were 22 notified cases during the year.
- (g) Infective Hepatitis. There were 50 notified cases of this disease during the year.

#### SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

#### WATER.

\*\*

The quality of the water has at all times been of a satisfactory nature for public supply purposes.

During the year the quantity of water available has been sufficient to meet the needs of the Borough.

Bacteriological examinations are made daily of the treated water as it leaves the Sandford Mill Pumping Station and frequent analyses are made of the raw water. Frequent samples are also taken from the Service Reservoir and at certain points on the distribution system. These have in all cases proved satisfactory. Independent analyses are made monthly by the Counties Public Health Laboratories.

The water has no plumbo-solvent action.

No contamination has occurred after treatment.

All properties within the area of supply have mains supply direct to the house with the exception of the following :---
