

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH

FOR THE YEAR 1967.

To the Chairman and Members of the Cheltenham Rural District Council.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to submit the Annual Report for 1967 on the health and sanitary circumstances of the District.

I am indebted to many officers of the Council for much of the material from which the report is compiled and especially to Mr. L. Grogan, the Surveyor and Chief Public Health Inspector for sections dealing with the work of his department.

The trend in the growth of the population continued, there being 1,330 more persons than in the previous year raising the mid year total to 40,360.

The number of births fell by 31 to 721 and the Birth Rate from 19.3 to 17.9. This fall is in keeping with that noted at National and County levels.

Generally the health statistics are favourable to the Rural District and are those to be expected of a thriving healthy community.

Except for measles there were only a few cases of infectious disease. Freedom from outbreaks of infections is due in no small measure to the success in the Rural District of the various immunisation campaigns.

Rushy House, Prestbury was opened during the year and comprised 36 two bedroom flats. Work was in progress on the erection of 6 dwellings to replace the substandard accommodation adapted from a war time hostel building at Alderton.

The Council were able to acquire a row of deteriorating cottages at Winchcombe and prepare a scheme for improvement and moderisation of the dwellings. The scheme is being carried out with the aid of an improvement grant. The dwellings will be used to rehouse the original tenants who are elderly people and the facilities being provided are equivalent to those of new dwellings for the elderly.

I am glad to have this opportunity of thanking members of the Council for their support and my colleagues for their help during the year.

POPULATION.

The population estimated by the Registrar General for mid 1967 is 40,360 as compared with 39,030 for the previous year, the annual increase in population is 1330.

The order of increase in the population continues to be more than 1,000 persons per year.

BIRTH RATE.

Live births numbered 721, the Birth Rate being 17.9 per 1,000 population, which is somewhat higher than the national average of 17.2.

DEATH RATE.

340 people died during the year, the Death Rate being 8.4 per 1,000 population, considerably below that of 11.2 for England and Wales.

INFANT MORTALITY.

Twelve infants died under one year of age as compared with six during the previous year. Even so the infantile mortality rate at 17 per 1,000 Births is below that for the country as a whole of 18.3. Many of the deaths occur in the meanatal period in most instances the causes of death being given as prematurity and congenital deformities.

Scarlet Fever.

Nine cases of scarlet fever were notified. The disease continued to be light in incidence and mild in character.

Diphtheria.

The District continued to be free from diphtheria. No case has occurred since 1949.

Whooping Cough.

One case was notified, vaccination against this disease is proving most successful.

Measles.

256 cases were notified. The Rural District is extensive and has widely scattered centres of population so that an epidemic of measles occurs in one part or another each year.

Poliomyelitis.

The District was free from the incidence of Poliomyelitis.

Food Poisoning. Notifications(corrected)as Returned to Registrar General - NIL.

As in the previous year no case of food poisoning occurred, freedom from such outbreaks reflects on 'the high standard of cleanliness in all branches of the food trade.

Dysentery.

No cases were notified.

One person died of respiratory tuberculosis and four new cases were notified. Nowadays treatment of the disease is effective and patients are not ill for long periods. Every effort is made to find the source of the infection and to trace all the contacts of new cases. By such means together with full support of the Mass Radiography Service and B.C.G. Vaccination, tuberculosis could be eradicated.

PUBLIC HEALTH.

Food & Drugs Act 1955 - Clean Food and Food Hygiene.

Byelaws made under Section 15 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1955, are in force for securing hygienic methods in the handling, wrapping and delivery of food for sale in the open air. The Food Hygiene Regulations require that clean food should be dealt with only by clean persons in clean premises, using clean equipment.

Food shops and similar establishments are inspected regularly to ensure that food is wholesome and that the premises comply with requirements.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948.

Section 47 - Removal to Suitable Premises of Persons in need of care and attention.

National Assistance (Amendment) Act, 1951 - Section 1.

These Acts give local authorities power to apply to the Courts for the compulsory removal of aged or sick persons who are living in insanitary conditions and are unable to provide for themselves and are not receiving from other people, proper care and attention. It was not necessary to make any application to the Court during the year.

The Home Help Service and Old People's Welfare Committee are of great assistance to many elderly people, enabling them to carry on in their own homes even though they have been left on their own.

Old People's Welfare Committee.

An Old People's Welfare Committee operates in the area. The Committee helps to co-ordinate local Services, both voluntary and statutory, for the elderly. This Committee has proved most useful and members act as visitors in their own area. Mr. W. A. G. Acocks is the Hon. Secretary of the Cheltenham Rural Districts Old People's Welfare Committee.

Meals on Wheels:

A meals on wheels scheme operates in the Rural District. The service is developing and it is expected to extend to supply all those in need of the meals.

The W.R.V.S. act as agents of County Welfare in promoting the Scheme through the local organiser, Mrs. S. Dagley-Morris. The deficit on the service is met by equal contribution.

Families at Risk.

The scheme agreed between the County Council and District Council for the rehabilitation of Families at Risk continued to operate during the year. Under the scheme the County Council guarantee 75% of the rent if the case is accepted. When arrears of rent are such as to render a family liable to eviction from a Council house, the circumstances are reported to the County Social Welfare Officer.

40 families were referred to this officer and investigated under the scheme.

In order to co-ordinate the efforts of the various social agencies working for the welfare of families the Divisional Medical Officer of Health calls a meeting of representatives to discuss the problems of a family whose circumstances are a matter for concern.

GENERAL PROVISIONS FOR HEALTH SERVICES.

Laboratory Facilities.

Samples of water, milk and ice-cream and pathological specimens are sent for bacteriological analysis to the Public Health Laboratory, Gloucester. The laboratory is part of the Public Health Laboratory Service of the Ministry of Health and no charge is made for making use of its services.

Specimens for chemical examinations are submitted to the City Analyst, Bristol, or to the County and City Analyst, Worcester.

HOME HELP SERVICE.

This service is organised by the County Council and a charge is made according to a scale of assessment.

The Home Help takes over the running of the home where the housewife is temporarily incapacitated through illness. As noted elsewhere, the Service is very useful to old people who can no longer manage because of infirmity.

Appeals for assistance from the Home Help Service should be made to The Divisional Health Office, Council Offices, Copt Elm Road, Charlton Kings, Cheltenham.

Nursing in the Home.

These centres are under the adminstration of the County Council. Nearly all mothers and babies attend. The bulk of the work falls upon the ladies of the local Voluntary Committees and the thanks of the community are due to them for their devotion to this work.

PUBLIC SWIMMING BATHS.

Stanton Open Air Pool.

This concrete lined pool has a capacity of 70,000 gallons and is situated a few hundred yards to the east of the village. During the summer months it is in constant use, not only by bathers from Stanton and the surrounding villages, but also by visitors to the Gloucestershire Education Authority's Summer Youth Camp, close by.

While the pool is maintained and adminstered by the Parish Council, the water is supplied by the Water Undertaking. Chlorination is carried out by means of sulphate of ammonia and chloros and the pool is emptied, thoroughly cleansed and re-filled at approximately fortnightly intervals. Samples for bacteriological examination are taken periodically.

WATER SUPPLY.

The supply in the district was satisfactory in quantity and quality throughout the year. All the supplies are chlorinated.

Samples were taken for bacteriological analysis from public and private supplies.

None of the waters are liable to have plumbo-solvent action.

CHELTENHAM RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Report by the Chief Public Health Inspector and Surveyor on the Work of his Department for the year 1967.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen:

I have the honour to present the Annual Report of the work of my department, and would like to take this opportunity of thanking the Chairman and Members of the Council for the kindness and consideration which they have extended to me when dealing with the work of the Department.

I would also thank all members of the Council's staff for the friendly and close co-operation which has prevailed throughout the year.

The activities of the department have continued to increase due to the growth of the district, the need for increased services and new legislation.

The following report deals with the principal sections, but during the year there were other fields of activity such as dangerous structures, Milk and Dairies Regulations, Street Numbering, inspection of housing sites, Licensing, Betting, Gaming and Lotteries, Pet Animals, Animal Boarding Acts, etc. and these add to the work of the Department.

HOUSING.

The number of new dwellings completed in the district during the year totalled 432, of these 368 were erected by private enterprise. The Council completed 36 flats at Prestbury.

Taking a figure of slightly over 3 persons per dwelling, it is estimated that accommodation was provided for a population of approximately 1,400, with consequent increase in the demand for services, such as sewerage and refuse collection.

The Council has continued its activities regarding improvement grants and owners of property are encouraged to make applications and every assistance is given to applicants. There are still many properties in need of improvement and it is hoped that in course of time, the majority, if not all, will take advantage of the benefits of the scheme.

Repairs to Council Houses.

Repairs to Council houses are generally carried out by direct labour, and at the end of the year, we employed a total of thirteen men upon this work(not including the Foreman). The following figures show the work carried out:-

Improvement Grants.

During the year 17 applications for Discretionary Grants affecting 18 properties and 15 applications for Standard Grants affecting 17 properties were approved. The total number of Discretionary Grants approved since the Council became the authority for dealing with these cases has risen to 571 cases affecting 656 properties and the amount of grants approved totals \$209,056 up to the end of 1967. The total number of Standard Grants so far approved affected 189 properties and the estimated amount of grants involved was \$29,537.

The results have in all instances been very satisfactory and there is no doubt that this scheme has enabled accommodation to be retained and thus avoided the Council having to provide more houses.

Each plan when received is checked and if there is any discrepancy and time permits, the owner's or architect's attention is drawn to this with a view to the necessary alterations being made prior to consideration by the Committee.

Every endeavour is made to inspect work at the following stages - excavation of foundations; completion of concrete foundations; dampcourse; roofing; testing of drains; or installation of fittings; and completion.

In a number of cases, the owners of houses have obtained loans through the Council under the Housing (Financial Provisions) Act, 1958 (as amended), and in such cases more frequent inspections are made and the work is closely checked before certificates are issued for payments.
