

INTRODUCTION

To the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee of the Cheshire County Council.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you my report on the health and sanitary circumstances of the County for the year 1941.

As previously stated in the Introductions to the Annual Reports for 1939 and 1940, the Ministry of Health eliminated a number of the more complex forms of statistical returns. In addition, this year the Ministry has issued instructions that no details of populations of individual County Districts shall be printed, nor any statistics which would enable such figures of populations to be constructed, and this explains the omission of some of the usual information from Table C. Information on matters of Public Health or medical interest due to the war will be found on pp. 54, 62 and 73.

The infantile mortality for 1941 was 54.8 per 1,000 live births, i.e., much the same as last year, and distinctly less than the average for the country as a whole, which was 59. The maternal mortality continues to be low, viz., 2.46 per 1,000 births live and still.



Thirty-six of above cases occurred in first births. Five of the mothers had been working in a factory during pregnancy, four others had followed other occupations. Five of the children were of illegitimate birth. Among the above there was only one twin pregnancy; one of the infants survived. Malformations included 3 cases of spina bifida.

Seven of the above cases were treated in hospital and five attended by Health Visitors. Twin infants are still in hospital. The other cases notified made good recoveries.

Illegitimate Children

Special enquiries have been made into the circumstances of 117 illegitimate children born during 1941. In 72 cases the mother was employed. One hundred and ten of the cases were found to be quite satisfactorily cared for (9 were only fairly satisfactorily and three unsatisfactorily attended—5 died).

The father was known to be contributing in 43 cases, in 69 cases no such contribution was being received.

Forty-two of the cases were brought up by the mother, 52 principally by the grandmother, 8 by other relatives, one by a neighbour, 3 went into institutions, 4 were adopted, and two were foster children.

Maternal Mortality (per 1,000 Live and Stillbirths)

The maternal mortality rate for 1941 was 2.46, being .62 for puerperal sepsis and 1.84 from other causes.

Section VII. Milk (Special Designations) Order, 1936

At the time of this report there were 3,081 Accredited Milk Licences and 71 Tuberculin Tested Licences in force in

the County.

In spite of war-time difficulties I am pleased to be able to report that the reconstruction and re-conditioning of farm buildings has gone steadily forward, and that in some few cases major works have been undertaken, consisting of the erection of new double rank shippons and modern dairies.

A considerable amount of time has been given to aiding the smaller type of farmer, who has not previously been Accredited but whose premises, by careful planning and redesigning of existing buildings, could be rendered suitable at comparatively little cost.

The following record of experiments carried out with a view to tracing possible causes of B.coli infection in bottled milk is interesting inasmuch as they show that it is not only the producer who may be at fault when milk samples show B. coli present.

After a number of samples of bottled milk from a milk bottling depôt had been examined for coliform bacilli and repeated failure to find them free from the bacilli had resulted, a suggestion was made that the infection may have been from the operative who capped the bottles that had missed being capped by the machine. It was noticed that the operative kept a certain number of caps in her pocket before putting them in the bottles by hand. Two samples of new caps, in addition to one from the pocket of the operative, were therefore taken, and the following experiment was carried out.

The two samples of new caps, and that from the pocket of the operative, were placed in large clean sterile glass beakers, and 50 ml. of sterile distilled water were added to each. The caps were then thoroughly washed in the distilled water by rotating the beakers. They were then allowed to stand for one hour, each beaker being rotated from time to time. Then using two tubes of MacConkey's Bile Salt Lactose Neutral Red Fluid Media for each sample, inoculations were made, taking 1ml. of the washings from each beaker, using a sterile 1 ml. graduated pipette. The tubes were then incubated at 37°C for 48 hours.

The tubes inoculated from the washings of the new caps remained sterile, whilst the tubes inoculated with the washings from the caps used by the operative were found to contain coliform bacilli.

In view of these results, further experiments were carried out using caps from other milk depôts and below is a table setting out the results obtained:—

The conclusion drawn is that in many cases coliform bacilli may be infected into the bottled milk by the operative during the capping process at the bottling dairy.

Section VIII.-Food and Drugs Act, 1938.

The Chief Inspector of Weights and Measures (Mr. Stacey Hallard) reports on the work of his Department, so far as it relates to the sampling of foods and drugs, as follows.

During the year under review, 1,922 samples of foods and drugs including 968 milks were submitted to the Public Analyst for analysis—221 or 11.5 per cent. of these were certified as adulterated or not up to standard. No less than 173 referred to milk, and although on the face of it this number appears to be exceptionally high, it should be noted that many of these samples were of abnormal character and therefore really genuine, as the deficiency was due to some peculiarity of the cows. On the other hand a considerable number were definitely watered; no doubt in many cases this was deliberate. In one instance a sample of milk was found to be adulterated with 58.3 per cent. of added water, this being the highest percentage ever found in a sample taken by officers of this Department. The vendor was prosecuted and heavily fined. In all, some 50 cases of serious milk adulteration were discovered and proceedings taken resulted in fines and costs totalling £232 14s. 0d. being imposed by the magistrates.

Lack of space does not allow for any detailed account of the action taken in regard to many of the adulterated foods and drugs other than milks. It is sufficient to say that 31 of them related to samples of sausage, vinegar, lard, iodine, grey powders, etc., all of which failed to reach the recognised standard of quality, and a further 17 articles such as sweetening agents, self-raising flour, custard powder, etc., which were all certified as containing varying amounts of undeclared saccharin. In connection with these latter articles the manufacturers were approached, and in practically every case they agreed to declare the presence of saccharin on future packages. It should be noted here that in May, 1941, the Cheshire County Council made representations to the Ministry of Health suggesting that it should be made obligatory on manufacturers to disclose the presence of saccharin in their products. The Ministry were not at that time prepared to agree but later in the year an Order was made prohibiting the manufacture for sale of any mixture containing flour or starch and saccharin except under a licence granted by the Ministry of Food.

An outstanding feature of the year was the number of food substitutes which appeared on the market—many of these were of little value although the labels on the packets led

the purchaser to believe that the product was the ideal substitute for the particular commodity in short supply. Exorbitant prices were charged, and, in spite of repeated prosecutions, the business became such a ramp that the Ministry of Food took action. A substitute cannot now be made unless the formula is disclosed to the Ministry and the manufacturer licensed. Naturally this has caused many products to disappear from the market altogether; to mention only one example, an article was being passed off on an unsuspecting public as "milk powder" which, when analysed was found to afford no evidence of the presence of milk solids and consisted essentially of Flour and Salt.

In concluding this short summary it is regrettable to have to state that the figure of 11.5 per cent. of adulterated or non-standard articles creates an all time high record for our County, the figures for the last three years being, 1938—5.4 per cent.; 1939—6.5 per cent.; 1940—9.0 per cent. Previous to this the highest figure appeared during the last war (in 1915), when 8.5 per cent. of samples taken were certified as below standard.

Health Visitors, District Nurses, Relieving Officers, Head Teachers, parents and various officials report cases, and all persons whose work makes defectives known to them are well aware of the Authority to which information should be supplied.

Guardianship

At the 31st December, 1941, there were 3 cases under Guardianship, as compared with 3 at the end of 1940. All necessary care is exercised in the approval of Guardians, and in suitable cases the provisions of Section 30 (e) of the 1913 Act have been utilised.

Supervision

Statutory supervision is carried out by the County Health Visitors, who visit each case several times during the year and report quarterly on their visits. There were 875 cases so supervised at 31.12.41, compared with 870 at 31.12.40.

Occupation Centres and Home Training

There are no occupation centres in the County, which is mainly rural in character.

No provision has been made for Home Training.

Licence, Discharge and After-Care

At the end of 1941 there were 21 cases on licence from Institutions and none on licence from guardianship as compared with 21 and none at 31.12.40. The care exercised in the selection of cases and regularity of visitation has resulted in the success of the Council's policy under this heading.

Four cases who had been on licence from an Institution were discharged during the year under review.

They remained under the care of the persons to whom they had been licensed.

Section X.-Welfare of the Blind

General

The requirements of the Blind Persons Acts, 1920-38, are met by the Council in its revised Scheme for the Welfare of Blind Persons, dated May, 1931. The provisions of this Scheme are executed, subject to the general administrative supervision of the Blind Persons Inter-Sub-Committee of the Council, by the Blind Welfare Societies at Chester, Ashton-under-Lyne and Macclesfield, which receive annual grants in acordance with the Scheme of the Minister of Health under the Local Government Act, 1929. The closest co-operation is maintained with these Societies, and the various services rendered by them continue to be entirely satisfactory.

Certification

To ensure that no person's name is placed on the register without the certificate of a medical practitioner with special experience in ophthalmology, all applicants are examined by the County Oculists. Those who wish may be examined a second time under the Medical Referee Service—conducted jointly with the Northern Counties Association—by independent Medical Referees.

Workshop Employees

Annual grants were continued at fixed rates of £40 or £52 a year, to recognised Workshops for Cheshire employees. A "minimum wage" principle—41/9d. weekly for female and 56/9d. weekly for male employees—has been adopted for certain workers at Henshaw's, their income being made up to that amount. There were 2 Workshop employees, 1 female and 1 male, at the end of 1941, on this principle, and 2 females on the fixed rate system, at Henshaw's, and 1 male on the fixed rate system at the Liverpool Workshop.

Home Workers

The three voluntary societies arranged for the employment at home of those capable of it, and for augmentation of their earnings by up to 5/0d. weekly. Further augmentation of 12/6d. weekly was given by the Council to all County approved Workers, who numbered 35 at the end of 1941.

Homes Residents

Annual grants in accordance with the Local Government Act Scheme are paid to several organisations, subject to the same services continuing to be rendered on behalf of Cheshire residents in Homes for the Blind; additional capitation grants of £13 a year are made for new entrants, whose maintenance charges are also paid by the Committee if necessary. At the end of 1941, there were 7 Cheshire residents being so maintained in the Homes of the Manchester and Salford Society and 5 in the Homes of Henshaw's Institution.

National Library for the Blind

Grant at the rate of £50 a year was made in 1941 to the National Library for the Blind on behalf of each of 4 Cheshire Home Workers who were Blind Copyists for its northern branch, apart from the usual annual grant for general services, which are used by over 100 Cheshire residents.

Other Services

The usual annual grants were continued in 1941 to the National Institute for the Blind and the Northern Counties Association for their respective national and regional services

Wireless Certificates

46 Certificates entitling the recipients to a free wireless licence were issued in 1941 to applicants on the register.

Necessitous Blind

In its Scheme under the Local Government Act, 1929, the Council made a declaration that all domiciliary assistance to necessitous blind persons should be henceforth provided by virtue of the Blind Persons Act and not as Poor Relief. The Council's revised Scheme for Domiciliary Assistance, dated April, 1938, provided that the weekly income of every adult registered blind person be increased where necessary to 25/-, and that of a married blind couple to between 30/0d. and 45/0d., according to circumstances, and that such persons might be eligible for extra grant on account of dependants. The scale became subject to a war bonus of 2/6d. from 16.5.1940.

In 1941 grants were made by the Blind Persons Inter-Sub-Committee in 108 cases, and withheld in 3. Grants reported as ceased, owing to death of recipient, or otherwise, numbered 95.

At the end of the calendar year 1941, there were 708 weekly grants so made to blind persons in the County.

Section XI.-County Institutions

REPORT OF THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT OF CLATTERBRIDGE COUNTY HOSPITAL

General

During the year 1941, steady if rather slow progress has been made in the extensions of the hospital, and further developments in the Emergency Hospital Scheme of the Ministry of Health have occurred in addition to some further expansions of the normal County work. The nature of the medical work done can be derived from the statistical Appendix which is arranged as follows:—

1. In-patient admissions, discharges, etc.

Comparison with previous year (the comparison excludes Air-raid casualties and service cases).

3. Statistics of Out-patients.

4. Medical Classification of Discharges in 1941.

- 5. Classification of Operations performed under anaesthetics.
- 6. Classification of X-Rays taken.
- Statistics of Midwifery Department.
 Classification of Pathological Work.

Attention is directed to the marked increase in Maternity work especially (Table 7). Much of this work was done in considerable difficulties, for the ward was undergoing extensive alterations which are not yet complete (February, 1942).

There appears to be an increasing tendency to take advantage of the facilities for diagnosis and treatment of Gastric conditions. This entails a considerable amount of strain on the X-ray Department as all gastric conditions have a screen examination by the Radiologist, a proceeding in each case lasting for 20 minutes, or even half an hour. It has therefore not been possible to have patients X-rayed as soon as requested, inasmuch as the Radiologist visits only twice a week. A waiting list has gradually appeared here. Apart from this the work of the department has continued to grow rapidly. On the other hand a very small proportion of Cancer cases is treated in the hospital only about 3 per cent. of those occurring in the County, judging by the 1940 figures; there are of course no facilities for X-ray or radium treatment at the Hospital. Cancer cases in need of radiation treatment are sent to the Cancer and Skin Hospital and Radium Institute, Liverpool; the facilities at Chester Royal Infirmary are much

too restricted for our use. The number of cases transferred during the year to the Cancer Hospital, Liverpool, was 11. Owing to the War radium treatment may no longer be hired, but most of these cases had X-ray treatment.

Many requests for private ward facilities have been received throughout the year, and have had to be refused.

The increasingly acute character of the work on the whole can be gathered from item 10 of Table 1. The number of patients discharged after a stay of 13 weeks or more is 149, as compared with 206 in 1939. The number of deaths has again slightly increased although its ratio to admissions shows a decided fall. No less than 59 patients died within 24 hours of admission.

The Buildings

The total number of buildings continues to increase rapidly. There are forty in use at present and another 10 are in construction. Of these fifty, thirty are to the east of the stream and twenty to the west of it, the only practical communication between the two groups being the main road. The Ministry of Health have been pressed to improve this, but while they have not given a clear refusal, are plainly unwilling to sanction an internal roadway.

The Hospital is favourably situated with a view to the recovery of patients once they have reached here, but is difficult to reach even from places at no great distance "as the crow flies." This has become much worse during war-time both for non-resident staff and for patients and their visitors; it limits greatly the possibilities of out-patient follow-up work, and quite a proportion of this work has to be done elsewhere.

During the year the new operating theatres became available for use. The Chapel was finally vacated by patients during November. The second row of huts erected by the Ministry is still under construction, as is the new decontamination block. In August the Mayor of Bebington handed over a recreation hut in close proximity to the first row of huts.

It should be mentioned that in addition to the equipment provided by the Ministry of Health for the huts, several valuable pieces of apparatus have been received on loan from the American Red Cross including a particularly fine lighting set for the hut theatre.

Seventeen whole-time members of the Staff are on Active Service.

On the medical side, a Consultant Physician has now been appointed in the person of Dr. E. T. Baker-Bates.

The Eye Specialist, Mr. Hamilton, has gone on Active Service and Mr. Allan is doing his work at present.

The Emergency Medical Services of the Ministry of Health have added another resident medical officer to the establishment, and in May their Chest Surgery Unit was transferred from Broadgreen Hospital. This latter Unit consists of five surgical specialists, two anaesthetists and a medical specialist; its Director is Mr. H. Morriston Davies.

A Dietitian has been appointed to the Hospital, in the person of Miss J. Keay. Her duties include the preparation of all the special diets required for patients suffering from Diabetes, Gastric and Duodenal Ulcers, Nephritis, etc. During December, the daily average of such diets had reached 41.5.

On the Nursing side there has been a further expansion of the establishment of student nurses, to 69. No great difficulty has so far been met with in completing this establishment. One minor one concerns the affiliated schools, as until the results of the Preliminary Examination are received we do not know how many nurses to expect from these sources. The shortage of trained staff continues to cause anxiety.

Nurses Training School

It was decided by the Committee to separate the two appointments held by Sister Osborne. Sister Osborne continues as Assistant Matron and has been succeeded as Sister Tutor by Miss Richards. Dr. Yeoman continues to act as Lecturer in Medicine, Anatomy and Physicology.

The medals for the best nurse in each year were presented by the Chairman of the Committee on 31st December, 1941. The successful nurses were:—

3rd Year—Mary Agnes Wright.

2nd Year—Nancy Davies (won 1st Year Medal last year).

1st Year—Margaret Miller Mercer.

The Civil Nursing Reserve provides the Hospital with 29 trained nurses, 15 assistant nurses and 82 nursing auxiliaries. The Ministry introduced new regulations for the training of nursing auxiliaries during the year, substituting 14 days intensive resident course for the previous 50 hours. This Hospital has given this training to 35 nursing auxiliaries in the latter half of the year.

A War Savings Group from the Staff was formed in August, 1940. Since then until December, 1941, a total of £455 6s. 0d. has been collected. This Group has been administered very largely by Miss Tilston with the assistance of a voluntary worker, Mr. Palmer.

The Staff Sports Club has had a busy and successful year. Besides arranging games, a stage entertainment was given in the Out-patient Department, during Christmas time. The lack of facilities for tennis continues to be felt very keenly.

The Chaplain, Rev. H. E. Boultbee, died on 26/11/1941, after a connection with Clatterbridge of many years. We all lament his death. His duties for the time being are being performed by the Rev. J. Northridge.

The Library continues to be in the charge of Mrs. W. T. Threlfall and her able Assistants; all are voluntary, and to all our best thanks are due. During the year 1941, no fewer than 12,160 books were lent to patients. By the kindness of Mrs. Wall, a new book-trolley is on order. There is, I understand, a shortage of well-bound books; novels and technical books are those chiefly desired.

The Convalescent Annexe at Thornton Manor has continued its usefulness throughout the year, though on a decidedly reduced scale in the latter half. This was due to the small number of Service admissions at this time. At the time of the Air-raids in March very extensive use had to be made of it; it was indeed invaluable. Some changes in the Staff have occurred and the Matron is now Miss Hann.

Chest Unit

Mr. H. Morriston Davies, the Director of the Unit, has kindly supplied me with the following report on its work.

Unit was transferred to Clatterbridge County General Hospital in May, 1941, after the bombing of Liverpool. The Unit is glad to have been accorded this opportunity of expressing to the Authorities, and especially to Dr. Mackay and Dr. Wilkie, their most appreciative thanks for the facilities which have so generously and freely been placed at their disposal. The members of the Unit are, moreover, fully conscious that such success as they have had has been largely due to the very friendly co-operation of Dr. Wilkie and to the loyal assistance of his Staff.

During the period of May to December, 1941, 91 cases have been treated. These include 14 cases of perforating or non-perforating chest wounds due to enemy action; 10 cases of lung abscess, 13 of empyema, 8 of bronchiectasis. There were also 5 cases of carcinoma of the lung, one of which was treated successfully by pneumonectomy, and 2 cases of mediastinal tumour treated by removal.

The Unit holds clinical meetings every Saturday at 10 a.m. to which visitors are cordially welcomed.

Service Cases and Air Raid Casualties

The number of Service Case admissions during the year was 670, and discharges 613. Deaths occurring in Service Cases were 8.

Air Raid Casualties admitted during the year numbered 385, discharged 364, and the number of deaths occurring in Air Raid Casualties was 17.

REPORT OF THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT OF WEST PARK COUNTY HOSPITAL, MACCLESFIELD

General

The principal development of the year 1941 has been the provision of beds for County patients. As from July 1st, 1940, the Hospital was entirely devoted to the work of the Emergency Medical Service, and consequently no local patients were admitted. It soon became evident that some hospital accommodation was necessary for these cases; the Maternity Ward was re-opened on January 1st, and beds for medical and surgical cases, including children, opened on the 23rd April.

Maternity

In the first place six beds were provided in the Maternity Ward and it was decided that this number should be increased to sixteen as soon as practicable. In the first quarter of the year nineteen cases were admitted; there followed a progressive increase and the total of admissions for the year was 178, of which number 134 attended the Ante-Natal Clinic at the hospital. In previous years the work of the department had been restricted to normal cases; since the new unit opened there has been a steady increase in the number of abnormal cases treated, including emergencies. It appeared that the accommodation would be fully utilised during the next year and might prove insufficient.

The Borough of Macclesfield pays the full cost of maintenance of mothers referred from the Ante-Natal Clinic by the Medical Officer of Health. 87 cases were admitted in this way, and the arrangement has worked smoothly and proved to be satisfactory.

Medical and Surgical

In April wards were opened for medical and surgical cases and for children. Patients are admitted, as a rule, at the request of their own doctors; the demand for accommodation has increased slowly but surely, as the work of the hospital became known in the district. The emergency X-ray apparatus proved to be inadequate, and an order was placed for a modern X-ray plant capable of dealing with the work in a manner appropriate to a County General Hospital; at the same time sanction was given to the appointment of a Radiologist and Radiographer. The construction of a new operating theatre was contemplated, but found to be impracticable at the present time.

Radium Cases

Towards the end of the year a request was received from St. Mary's Hospital, Manchester, for the use of beds for patients requiring treatment with radium. Six beds were provided for this purpose and a scheme drawn up to increase the number to twelve if necessary. The radium used is the property of St. Mary's Hospital and the work is carried out by members of the Honorary Staff. The full cost of maintaining the patients is met by St. Mary's.

E.M.S.

The E.M.S. patients during the year were almost all chronic or infirm patients, numbering approximately 100, who had been admitted during the autumn of 1940, from hospitals and institutions in London.

HOSPITAL BUILDINGS

It has not been possible to embark on any major scheme of development owing to the war, nevertheless a number of alterations have been made to improve existing accommodation. Some of the wards are unsuitable for the treatment of acute cases because of their size, small windows, etc., but the chief difficulty is that of access as there are no lifts and it is no easy matter to use the upper wards for stretcher cases; moreover, the various wards and departments are disposed in five separate blocks not connected by corridors, and this has the disadvantage that all patients sent to the X-ray department must be transferred through the open, an arrangement which also applies to female patients passing to and from the Operating Theatre. The scattered nature of the buildings also increases the difficulty of administration.

Nurses' Home

The present Nurses' Home is not big enough and the accommodation is inadequate. Some members of the staff have quarters elsewhere in the hospital; the majority of the Civil Nursing Reserve live in billets, taking their meals at West Park. These arrangements are far from satisfactory and it is evident that some improvement must be effected at an early date.

The following is a list of the schemes sanctioned during the year some of which have been carried out:—

- 1. Alterations to provide a Maternity Unit of 16 beds, new instruments and equipment.
- Improvements to the Engineering services, new water and gas mains.

- 3. Provision of an Ante-Natal Clinic by alterations to the old Receiving Wards in the administrative block.
- 4. New X-ray equipment and alterations to the Department.
- 5. Provision of a Massage Department by adaptation of a former dayroom and equipment with couches, lamps, etc.
- 6. Provision of new equipment for Theatre and wards, including Shadowless Light, Operating Table, etc.

A plan has been drawn up for the improvement of the existing accommodation throughout the hospital in view of the experience gained during the year.

Farm

The farmlands were cultivated by Parkside Mental Hospital during the year but it was decided that a dairy farm should be established to provide a direct source of milk to the hospital. It was agreed that a Farm Bailiff should be appointed and that he should live in Park Farm, an alternative residence for the Medical Superintendent being provided in Rock House, Prestbury Road, which had originally been taken to provide quarters for medical staff.

STAFF

The number of nurses employed at the hospital on December 31st, 1941, was as follows:—

Cheshire County Council—Trained — 10

Student Nurses - 22

Civil Nursing Reserve—Trained — 10

Assistant Nurses - -

Nursing Auxiliaries - 25

Difficulty was felt during the year in obtaining a sufficient number of student nurses, but the position was relieved after the introduction of the Government scheme during the summer. The hospital is an affiliated training school and the training extends for four years, the first two being spent at West Park and the remainder at Clatterbridge Hospital. The disadvantage of this arrangement is that the nurses leave West Park at a time when their services are of most use to the hospital, as they are then of sufficient experience to undertake more difficult work. Again many candidates will prefer to join a hospital where the training can be finished in three years. It is hoped that it will be possible before long to establish a complete training school at West Park.

In common with other institutions the hospital has at times been unable to secure a sufficient number of midwives, and for this reason the work of the Maternity Ward has been carried out under many difficulties, which have been overcome through the help and co-operation of the senior members of the nursing staff.

C.N.R.

The members of the Civil Nursing Reserve are allocated to the hospital by the Sector Matron. They include trained nurses, assistant nurses and nursing auxiliaries; the latter now receive 14 days intensive training at the hospital during which period they are resident. Afterwards they are retained or drafted to other hospitals.

Medical Staff.

The Medical Superintendent has had the assistance during the year of Dr. Clegg, as Visiting Medical Officer and Deputy Medical Superintendent, and 3 medical officers of the E.M.S., one of whom was called up for military service in February, 1941.

It remains to record the excellent service and co-operation rendered by all members of the staff throughout the year.

REPORT OF THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT OF THE MARY DENDY HOMES, ALDERLEY EDGE

Admissions and Discharges

On the 1st January, 1942, there were 279 male and 146 female patients, a total of 425 patients, resident in the Homes.

Nineteen male and ten female patients were admitted during the year, and twelve male and four female patients were admitted in pursuance of Orders under the Mental Deficiency Act. As these latter cases were previously resident in the Institution, they were automatically discharged and re-admitted.

Thirteen male and four female patients left the Homes during the year.

Of these male patients three were transferred to other Institutions, seven were discharged to the care of their parents, and one—after a trial on licence extending over two years, his conduct being satisfactory—was also discharged to the custody of his parents.

One youth was discharged by operation of law, his Order having lapsed whilst he was out on licence, and one schoolboy who was a persistent absconder was refused permission to return to the Homes.

Of the female patients, three were transferred to other Institutions and one was discharged to the care of her parents.

One female and two male patients who absconded some time ago remain on the books of the Institution, their Orders not having lapsed.

Deaths

During the year three deaths have occurred—all being school children. The causes of death are as follows:—

Male. Female.

Landry's Paralysis.

Tympanites. Tuberculosis.

This gives, on the resident figure, a death rate of 0.7%.

General Health

Taken over the twelve months, the health of the Institution has been good. A slight epidemic of Chicken-pox occurred, limited to the school children, and a more severe outbreak of diarrhœa—involving children, adults and staff—took place in the autumn. The cause of this epidemic could not be ascertained, but by the distribution of the cases was probably caused by a fly-borne infection, later spread by contacts.

One patient—when playing football—fractured a collarbone but this has set well.

Throughout the year there have been a considerable number of skin cases, many of which have healed satisfactorily, and others—more chronic and resistent—still receive treatment.

A few cases of epilepsy have appeared among children and adults. None of these cases, however, are severe, and to date have been easily controlled by barbiturates.

As the winter months appeared there was a considerable increase in respiratory complaints among the adult patients. This, however, is not surprising as many of the older patients are now in the latter decades of life, and have—as is common

with mental defectives—a low resistance, and little reserve against ill-health in any form.

The Staff

The staffing position has become increasingly acute during the last twelve months. Less than 50% of the necessary resident staff are available for the care of the patients. Of these, several members have suffered, for varying periods, from ill-health, during the year. Many of the staff are getting on in years and I think it is a great tribute to their industry and loving care of the patients that such a high standard of efficiency has been maintained. Their difficulties have also been added to by the stringencies of war, black-out, etc.

As their first resident Medical Superintendent I should like to record the cordial welcome and splendid assistance—in every way possible—they have given to me.

Entertainments

'Due to the lack of staff, their seniority, and war-time restrictions, the patients have suffered in a measure in their entertainments. This is regrettable, as I firmly believe that to keep an Institution population happy and contented, a certain amount of variety must be introduced into their leisure hours. Mentally deficient patients if left alone are only too prone to sit huddled in their dayrooms and to become increasingly apathetic and dull, or if they are of the restless type, to brood over fancied wrongs, become discontented, and develop into persistent escapers. A successful dance was held on the 23rd December in Marion Brooks House and it was enjoyed to the full by all who attended. It is hoped to make dances a more regular feature of the Institution life.

Both male and female adult patients were taken on shopping expeditions by their House-masters and Matrons, while parties of the younger children have been taken to the Cinema. It is felt that much can be done to provide both adults and children with organised entertainments and games. From previous experience these have been found to be highly beneficial to patients in that it not only gives them something to brighten their lives, but also stimulates thought, improves physique and poise, and encourages the "team spirit."

Throughout the year a regular Sunday service under the charge of Mr. Gent, has been held in the Recreation Hall. These services have been fully attended and are greatly looked forward to by both adults and children.

The Farm

This continues to be a source of profit to the Institution, not only from a financial, but also from a therapeutic, point of view. Fourteen male patients are employed on the farm. These men take a keen interest in their work, and are kind to the animals in their charge. It is encouraging to learn that several of the boys in the Special School have expressed a desire to learn farming, and indeed the farm is a source of interest to all patients whatever their ages, occupation or sex.

The work on the farm during the nine months from April to December was very satisfactory.

The hay and oat crops were moderately heavy, the wheat crop was very good, and the crop of mangolds particularly good. The yield of potatoes was very heavy but unfortunately they are not keeping well.

The Gardens

As an occupational factor the gardens take a prominent place in the structure of the Institution. Twenty male patients are employed as gardeners. Several of them are quite highly skilled in their tasks.

Apart from the beneficial and high food value of the vegetables and fruit supplied to the patients, the splendid show of plants and flowers of great value in helping the minds of the patients to appreciate beauty. A most adequate supply of garden produce was delivered to the Homes throughout the year and the surplus was sold.

The Workshops

Good work continues to be done in the workshops where 49 male patients are employed, and despite the difficulties in obtaining material all branches are active, save rug-making. The shortage of wool has temporarily suspended this activity. The boot-making shop is now taking in outside repairs from other Cheshire Institutions.

The Laundry

Twenty-six female patients are employed in the laundry where much good work is done. It is regrettable, however, that due to the present lack of Calender, some delay is caused in the finishing of the articles.

Sandlebridge Special School

During the year the School has had an average daily attendance of 130 pupils. It has been a difficult year for the School.

Equipment has been hard to obtain, changes have taken place in the staff and re-grouping of the children has been necessitated.

I have to record, with regret, the retirement—for health reasons—of Mrs. Daybell, headmistress of the School. She has put in many years good work with the children, and the absence of her kindly sympathetic presence is felt alike by the staff and patients. We have been fortunate, however in, obtaining the services of Mrs. Jennings as a temporary headmistress who handles the affairs of the School in an understanding and capable manner.

A new certificated teacher—Miss A. Waddington—has also joined the staff.

Conclusion

Some difficulty has been experienced in drawing up this report in that the year 1941-42 has been a transitional one for the Mary Dendy Homes. After 42 years as a private Institu-

tion run by the Lancashire and Cheshire Society for the Permanent Care of the Feeble-minded, it was taken over in April by the Cheshire County Council, and as a necessary result a measure of re-organisation and adaptation has occurred. Again my appointment as the first Medical Superintendent in September, 1941, has to date only allowed me to take a general, rather than a detailed, view of the Institution.

It can be said, I think, however, that the change-over has taken place with surprising smoothness especially considering the many added difficulties of war-time.

For myself I should like to thank the various members of the Cheshire County Council and the officials of the different departments for their cordial welcome to me and the great help which has been afforded to me by all, even in the short time I have been resident here.

My thanks must also go to Miss A. Olive (Clerk and Steward) and the other officials of the Institution for the splendid support they continue to give me.

REPORTS OF THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT OF WRENBURY HALL, NANTWICH.

PUBLIC ASSISTANCE INSTITUTIONS

Owing to war-time difficulties and the general curtailment of heavy expenditure, no works of major importance have been carried out during 1941.

Dutton

To meet the demand for accommodation for resident Nursing Staff one hospital ward was converted into cubicles. Additional essential lavatory accommodation has been provided.

Nantwich

Improvements have been carried out in respect of the heating of hospital wards and additional sterilisers have been installed:

Tarvin

Old slop sinks have been replaced by modern sluicing accommodation.

Stretcher-case gas cleansing facilities have been established at the Casualty Receiving Hospitals Arclid, Nantwich and Dutton. Arrangements have been made to increase and modernise mortuary accommodation at Arclid, Nantwich and Tarvin.
