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Introduction

To the Chairman and Members of the County Health Committee.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report on the Health Services in the Administrative County of Cheshire for the year 1953.

The birth rate for the year was very slightly above that for 1952 and the death rate slightly lower. The number of deaths from cancer of all forms was the highest on record, as also was the number of deaths from cancer of the respiratory organs.

It is pleasing, however, to draw attention, firstly to the exceedingly low infantile mortality rate of 24.1 deaths of infants under the age of one year per 1,000 live births, secondly the deaths from pregnancy, childbirth and abortion which totalled 7 out of 12,397 live and still-births, and thirdly the number of deaths from tuberculosis which fell to 104 representing a considerable drop even from the notably low figure of the previous year.

Notifications of non-pulmonary tuberculosis have dropped to a new low level; this rapidly decreasing incidence has not been followed by notifications of the pulmonary type, which are altering very little from year to year, except in their age distribution, as the proportion of notifications of childhood pulmonary tuberculosis is still increasing. The County Council has now decided to extend the scheme for B.C.G. vaccination of child contacts to cover school leavers throughout the country. Through the co-operation of the Education Committee and the teachers this work is being done in the schools, and the high proportion of parents who have consented to the testing and vaccination of their children shows that there is a strong public consciousness of the need for this service. It will be noted that, for the first time, the incidence of pulmonary tubercular disease had been greater amongst children than that of non-pulmonary disease.

The new clinic centres at Cheadle, Weaverham, Stalybridge and Little Sutton are already in use, the Hoylake centre will shortly be occupied for clinical work, and the new hostel for the rehabilitation of tuberculous men at Wrenbury Hall will be opened in the very near future. It is hoped that the co-operation of the Ministry of Labour in the work being done at Wrenbury Hall will result in further development of the means of restoring these men to full earning capacity.

It has been found necessary to close the day nurseries at Cheadle and Northwich because of insufficient attendances.

The process of establishing occupation centres for mentally defectives has continued with the opening of a centre at Altrincham. This is a large building which will accommodate defectives not only from Altrincham, Sale and neighbouring towns, but also from the Mid-Cheshire area. Adaptations are proceeding at Macclesfield and suitable premises have been secured at Hyde and Crewe. When these last two centres are in use it is considered that the needs of those mentally defective children living at home and suitable for occupation centre training will be met. Particulars of the admissions of defectives to hospitals are given in the section of this Report dealing with Mental Health. It is desired once again to acknowledge with thanks the ready assistance invariably given by the Regional Hospital Boards, particularly in the admission of defectives for short periods, to assist parents at times of family crisis. Attention is drawn to the increased proportion of mentally ill patients seeking treatment voluntarily at mental hospitals.

To meet certain anomalies in the assessment of charges for domestic help services, a new county scale has been issued, designed to secure equitable payments from all classes of the community.

The work of the Ambulance and Transport Service is still expanding. It is hoped that the building of the new Ellesmere Port depot will soon begin. The Runcorn ambulance service, which had previously been in the hands of a contractor, has now been taken over by the County Council as a direct service; this contractor had provided ambulance transport at reasonable cost for many years in this division and I must express appreciation of his work over so long a period.

Through the help of the Executive Council, arrangements are in force for medical practitioners to use health visitors to assist them in the care and treatment of their patients.

The transfer of the work of distributing what are known as Welfare Foods to the priority classes entitled to them from the Ministry of Food to the County Health Department was carried through last July without causing inconvenience to the public. The principle was adopted of providing a service as efficient and accessible as had been provided by the Ministry of Food, and despite the short time available in which to organise the change-over, a full complement of staff, voluntary and paid, was available on the appointed day to operate the 170 distribution points required to cover the whole county. My grateful thanks are due to the voluntary workers who give their time to this useful work.

The work of the National Institute for the Blind in placing blind persons in employment in open industry has been recognised by the payment of a greatly increased grant for this purpose.

The death of Mr. Melling, for so many years County Analyst, has taken away from the Health Services a man who by his untiring and careful work and his cheerful and energetic personality had established an immense reputation. His passing is keenly regretted.

My grateful thanks are due to the Chairman and Members of the County Health Committee and to the other members of the County Council for their unfailing help and support to me on all occasions.

I also record my sincere thanks to the Clerk of the County Council, to the various Heads of Departments and to their staffs for their willing and helpful co-operation throughout the year.

I acknowledge with gratitude and thanks the conscientious and hard work done by all the staff of the Health Department and the loyalty and good feeling invariably shown by them towards me.

County Medical Officer of Health

For the Year ended December 31st, 1953

Section I.-Area and Population

Area

The acreage of the County at the end of 1953 was 622,345 acres.

Population

The population of the Administrative County, as enumerated at the Census of 1951, was 824,599. The estimate of the Registrar-General for mid-1953 was 831,700.

Rateable Value

The rateable value of the Administrative County of Cheshire for General County Rate purposes at 1/4/53 was £5,646,398. A penny rate over the whole County for 1953-54 represented the sum of £22,416 (estimated).

Health Service Premises.



Section III.-Vaccination and Immunisation

Under Section 26 of the National Health Service Act, 1946, the County Council has the duty of making available a full service of vaccination against smallpox and of immunisation against diphtheria.

It is hoped that the attention now devoted to Health Services in general, and to this aspect in particular, will result in a considerable increase in vaccination, just as it has served to secure a wide response to the offer of immunisation wherever this was available. Immunisation is, in practice, meant for children, with particular attention to those under 5, but vaccination may on occasion be sought by persons of any age, and a recent amendment of the County Scheme has provided for this.

Arrangements made under the Council's scheme include participation by general practitioners and sessions at clinics.

Agreement has been given to immunisation against whooping cough in areas where this is considered desirable by Divisional Health Committees, to which the organisation and management of the scheme has been devolved.

Section IV.-Ambulance Service

The County Council is charged with the duty, under Section 27 of the National Health Service Act, 1946, to provide a comprehensive ambulance service throughout the County, free of charge to persons carried; the duty includes transport by car of persons who are unfit for public transport but do not need to be recumbent. The service is one which has been devolved for organisation and management within the approved estimates to Divisional Health Committees throughout the County.

Arrangements are made to pay for the agency use of some Red Cross and St. John vehicles. In addition, there is a supplementary arrangement with the Voluntary Car Service which, originally organised during the war, had been continued and paid for by hospital authorities. Taxis and hired cars are also used as a supplementary service.

During 1953, delivery was taken of one Bedford Lomas Ambulance and two Austin Sitting Case Cars which were ordered in 1952, and a further three Bedford Lomas Ambulances which were ordered in 1953.

Orders were placed for two Bedford Lomas Ambulances and three Bedford Lomas Sitting case ambulances for delivery in 1954. These have already been delivered.

The arrangements by which the County Boroughs of Chester, Stockport, Manchester, and Warrington, and the Counties of Shropshire and Derbyshire, provided an Ambulance Service in particular areas, or for special purposes, were continued, as was the arrangement whereby the County Borough of Liverpool and the County of Lancashire convey smallpox patients or others needing special disinfection.

For long distance journeys, use is made of the service provided by the Railway Executive for invalids, which comprises, for a small fee, a reserved compartment without payment of fares other than for the persons actually travelling. There are special arrangements for casual use, at an agreed fee, of other Authorities' ambulances, either at the far end of such a railway journey, or to meet special emergencies, and help is similarly given to other ambulance authorities.

Section V.-Prevention of Illness, Care and After-care

General

Section 28 of the National Health Service Act, 1946, gives permissive powers to the County Council to make a scheme for prevention of illness, and for the care and after-care of persons suffering from illness. The County Council has a duty to make detailed arrangements for any disease the Ministry may specify. In this connexion, tuberculosis has been so specified, and much of the work, other than clinic and institutional provision, which was carried out for many years under the County Tuberculosis Scheme, is being continued under the new powers.

The arrangements under this section of the Act are among those which for organisation and management, within the approved estimates, have been devolved to Divisional Health Committees.

Tuberculosis

Specialist Chest Physicians, the main part of whose work at chest clinics passed to the Regional Hospital Boards on the appointed day, are part-time officers of the County Council, and give Divisional Medical Officers all necessary advice in the sphere of care and after-care, and Health Visitors pay home visits to tuberculosis patients and help to secure the attendance of contacts at the clinics. The loan of large items such as garden shelters, and the supply of smaller items such as sputum flasks, now form part of the general scheme for the provision of nursing equipment, of which details are given later.

Wrenbury Hall Industrial Training Colony has continued under the full ownership and control of the County Council, and arrangements are being made for considerably extending the scope of the training given.

During the year 1953, some 51 Cheshire trainees were admitted for industrial rehabilitation, and 39 from other local authorities. There are at present 19 colonists living in the hostel, of whom 5 are married, and 7 married colonists living with their families in cottages on the estate.

The following tables will enable a comparison to be made between 1953 and previous years in respect of the incidence of, and mortality due to, tuberculosis.

B.C.G.

The County Council's proposals under Section 28 of the National Health Service Act, 1946, for B.C.G. vaccination against tuberculosis were approved by the Minister on 24th October, 1949. They provided for B.C.G. vaccination, by and at the instance of a physician with specialist knowledge and experience of tuberculosis, of contacts of patients suffering from tuberculosis, such contacts being found by medical tests to be capable of receiving protection from tuberculosis as a result of B.C.G. vaccination. In May, 1954 approval was given by the Ministry of Health to the Scheme being extended to provide for the B.C.G. Vaccination of children between 13 and 14 years of age.

Such physicians with specialist knowledge and experience of tuberculosis were the chest physicians employed by the Regional Hospital Board, towards whose salary the County Council pay a specified proportion.

Fourteen of the Divisional Medical Officers and four Assistant County Medical Officers have received instruction in the technique and methods of B.C.G. vaccination and have been approved for this purpose.

One of the biggest problems in providing B.C.G. vaccination has been the segregation for six weeks before and six weeks after vaccination, but this has been overcome usually by making arrangements with friends or relations of the child to be vaccinated, and in exceptional cases the Children's Committee has provided accommodation in the County Children's Homes. On the principle that the absence of facilities for segregation should not preclude a mantoux negative contact from being vaccinated by B.C.G., the policy is adopted of vaccinating forthwith if after a fortnight's effort segregation is not found to be practicable.

During 1953, the chest physicians vaccinated 353 cases, and the Divisional Medical Officers vaccinated 97 cases, under the scheme. In addition to these, certain new-born infants were vaccinated at St. Mary's Hospital, Manchester, through special arrangements made by the Professor of Child Health at Manchester University, and during the year, some 107 babies born to Cheshire mothers were thus vaccinated. Special arrangements have been made at Clatterbridge Hospital whereby newly born children of tuberculous parents can be transferred for post-vaccination segregation to a convalescent home maintained in connection with the Hospital.

Mental Illness

The care and supervision of patients at home suffering from mental illness or defect is carried out by Health Visitors and Authorised Officers, and arrangements are made, in suitable cases, for help to be given by other County services, such as Home Nursing and Domestic Help.

Other Illnesses

Liaison has been secured with the Almoners and other appropriate officials of hospitals so that discharged patients requiring help from any of the County Health Services may secure it without delay.

Another aspect of "care" is the investigation of "problem families" with a view to effecting any possible improvement and granting any appropriate help, e.g., the loan of bedding.

An important aspect of "prevention of illness" is health education, and appropriate publicity under this heading is carried out locally.

Nursing Equipment

Stocks of nursing equipment are held by District Nurses and by Divisional Medical Officers for loan to patients needing them, subject to a small deposit charge, and a weekly hire payment in the case of the more expensive items. Examples of the small items normally kept by District Nurses are urinals, hot water bottles, bed pans, feeding cups, sputum flasks, steam kettles, air rings and back rests; the larger items stored by the Divisional Medical Officers include crutches, bath chairs, spinal carriages and water beds.

Shelters for the use of tuberculosis patients are issued by the County Medical Officer and transferred by the County Surveyor's Department, in accordance with recommendations made by the Chest Physicians, and confirmed, after investigation of the site, by the Divisional Medical Officer. Bedding is also kept for issue in special cases, e.g., when a patient's small stock has to be taken away for disinfection or disinfestation, or to provide for house isolation of patients.

Infectious Disease

In order that Divisional Health Committees may have a continuous picture of the incidence of infectious disease in their areas, Divisional Offices receive full particulars of notified cases, and the County Council repays to District Councils, in accordance with the National Health Service Act, the notification fees paid to doctors. The following table gives the number of cases notified under the various headings during the year 1953.

Premature Infants

Particular attention is devoted to babies weighing $5\frac{1}{2}$ lbs. or less at birth, and special cots with bedding, hot water bottles, etc., are kept in readiness. 816 premature live babies were born in the year under review, whose mothers normally live in the Authority's area, 205 at home and 611 in hospitals or nursing homes.

Puerperal Pyrexia

83 cases of Puerperal Pyrexia were notified during the year, 15 being domiciliary and 68 institutional confinements.

Maternal Mortality

The maternal mortality for 1953, i.e., number of deaths due to pregnancy, childbirth or abortion, per 1,000 live and still births, was 0.5.

Ante-Natal and Post-Natal Clinics

All ante-natal and post-natal clinics conducted by the County Council before 5/7/48 have been continued, together with those established by the previously independent Authorities. The Regional Hospital Boards have agreed to pay for a proportion of the sessions attended by specialist obstetricians. In some areas there are other doctors' clinics, and in some districts midwives' clinics have been established.

Care of Unmarried Mothers

Arrangements have continued whereby unmarried expectant mothers are admitted to voluntary institutions some time before the confinement, and return there with the baby for varying periods afterwards. The County Council's own Home at 7, Trinity Road, Hoylake, provides 12 beds and 8 cots, and 49 women were admitted during the year, staying approximately eight weeks before the birth and eight weeks afterwards. Of these, five were the responsibility of other local authorities. Responsibility was accepted at other homes and hostels for 36 such mothers during the year.

Section VIII.-Food and Drugs Acts

Milk (Special Designations) (Pasteurised and Sterilised Milk) Regulations, 1949.

Under Order by the Ministry of Food specified areas are being created in various parts of the country. In such areas the sale of milk is restricted to "specially designated" milk, i.e. pasteurised, sterilised or tuberculin tested milk or, until 30th September, 1954, accredited milk from a single herd.

The Borough of Congleton became a specified area on the 1st November, 1953. Other parts of Cheshire were included in the Manchester and District specified area on the 1st January, 1954, i.e. the Boroughs of Altrincham, Dukinfield, Hyde, Sale and Stalybridge, and the Urban Districts of Alderley Edge, Bowdon, Bredbury and Romiley, Cheadle and Gatley, Hale, Hazel Grove and Bramhall and Wilmslow.

Ultimately, as circumstances allow, these specified areas will be extended to cover the whole of the country. One aspect of the creation of specified areas is that a number of small dairymen will probably contract with large processing dairies for the pasteurisation of milk as an alternative to installing pasteurising plant in their own dairies. This will increase the transport of bottled milk between the processing dairies and the local centres of distribution. At the present time milk processed and bottled at several large dairies in Cheshire is transported thirty or forty miles by road before it reaches the consumer. For the greater part of the year this does not appear to affect the keeping quality of the milk but during periods of hot weather there is a risk of the temperature of milk in transit rising to sixty degrees Farenheit which must affect its keeping quality. Where no cold storage is provided for keeping milk overnight there is a greater risk of the milk turning sour. During hot weather the transport of milk between processing dairies and local centres of distribution should be carried out in the early morning, if practicable.

Complaints are occasionally received from other local authorities during the summer months of the poor keeping quality of milk retailed in their districts, for which the processing dairy is usually blamed.

Sometimes this has been due to unsold milk returned to the dairy by roundsmen and re-distributed on the following day when it is three days old. Most of the large processing depots supplying milk to smaller dairies have adopted a system of coded marking of bottle caps indicating which particular day the milk is processed and bottled. This enables the age of the milk to be verified in the event of complaints.

In previous reports attention has been called to the advantage of the Aschaffenburg-Mullen test for pasteurised milk which has been used in the County Public Health Laboratory for the past three years. Since the publication of these reports enquiries have been received from several County Councils and also from South Africa, United States and Germany, asking for details of this test. Several large dairies in Cheshire have adopted this test largely as a result of information given by our laboratory staff. At one large dairy this test is carried out on each consignment of milk before it is dispatched from the premises.

The retailing of orange drinks by dairymen appears to be increasing. Some dairymen are reluctantly compelled to do this owing to the public demand or as a result of competition by other dairymen. Two applications were refused for processing fruit juice compound from oranges on dairy premises which were structurally unsuitable. It has become necessary to impose certain restrictions to prevent the risk of milk being contaminated, and to comply with the Milk and Dairies Regulations.

The owners of three dairies which are rather over-crowded with plant have been requested to move into larger premises as soon as practicable.

Generally a satisfactory standard of milk processing has been maintained. Samples of processed milk from each of the twenty-nine dairies are examined weekly. Frequent tests are also made on washed bottles to test the efficiency of bottle washing operations. Helpful information and advice has been given to dairy managers.

During the current year two additional premises at Hyde and Congleton were licensed for the processing of milk.

Tuberculous Milk

In connection with the ascertainment of tuberculous milk, 2929 samples were taken at farms by the County Sampling Officers during 1953, of which 148 proved to be positive.

Co-operation with the Ministry of Agriculture and with local Sanitary Authorities has continued, so as to ensure that the high standard of milk production in Cheshire shall be maintained and improved.

County Public Health Laboratory

Samples for Analysis.

The Chief Inspector of Weights and Measures, Food and Drugs, etc. (Mr. Stacey Hallard) reports as follows on the work of his Department in relation to the administration of the adulteration provisions of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938.

In my report for 1952 I made reference to the fact that under the Food and Drugs Act, 1938 the right of any non-county borough or urban district council to be a "Food and Drugs Authority" was based on the population of the area according to the "last published census". At that time I expected that the final figures of the census held in 1951 would be published during 1953, but this did not materialize, and therefore at the end of the year under review the County Council remained the "Food and Drugs Authority" for the whole of Cheshire with the exception of the four County Boroughs and the Municipal Borough of Crewe.

The administrative work of the County Council, as the Food and Drugs Authority, involved the taking of samples of all types of food and drugs in each Borough, Urban District, or Rural District on the basis roughly of three samples per thousand of population in Urban areas and 2.5 per thousand in rural areas. This rate of sampling is not laid down by Act or Regulation but is a figure accepted by the Ministry of Food as a reasonable number to secure adequate protection of the public in respect of purity of food. Naturally where suspicion attached to the sale of any particular commodity e.g. watering of milk, there was no limit to the number of samples taken in order to bring an offender before the Magistrates.

All samples obtained were submitted for analysis to the County Analyst (the late S. E. Melling, Esq., M.Sc., F.R.I.C.) or to the Deputy County Analyst (J. G. Sherratt, Esq., B.Sc., F.R.I.C.) and appropriate action was taken in cases where the article proved to be a dulterated or other-wise not conforming with legal requirements.

During the year 1953, 2,075 samples were submitted for analysis and of these 108 were certified against. The following list gives details of the types and numbers of the various foods and drugs analysed.

Out of the total of 89 milks found to be below Standard 24 contained extraneous water, 42 were deficient in fat and 23 deficient in non-fatty solids. The latter were certified to be of abnormal quality, there being no question of the deficiencies being due to the presence of extraneous water.

Regarding the fat deficiencies it is very disturbing to find that over half (23) were in respect of Channel Islands milk, a type of milk which under a Ministry of Food Order must contain 4 per cent of fat against the Standard of 3 per cent for ordinary milk. One Channel Islands sample actually contained only 2 per cent of fat and thus was milk of exceedingly poor quality, in fact one half of its most valuable constituent was missing. Bearing in mind that the public pays a higher price for Channel Islands milk, and naturally expects to receive an article much richer than ordinary milk, it is high time that certain producers took steps to improve their product. Little can be done by the County Council towards this end as the Standard is fixed under an order of the Ministry of Food and in accordance with an

instruction by the Minister full particulars are sent to him and the subsequent investigations are dealt with by his officers.

On the other hand, in the extremely rare cases where a Channel Islands milk is found to contain added water, legal proceedings are taken by the County Council as a "Food and Drugs Authority." One such case came to light following a complaint by a householder who was dissatisfied with the quality of the Channel Islands milk he was receiving. As a result his retailer was stopped one morning and samples taken of each of the several types of milk he had on his vehicle. All were later certified as genuine with the exception of the Channel Islands sample and this contained 10 per cent of extraneous water. Immediately this fact was known 'follow up' samples were taken as the retailer picked up his next consignment at the producer's farm. The two samples taken at this point were both even more heavily watered, i.e. 15.6 and 11.5 per cent. Corresponding "appeal to cow" samples were found genuine. Accordingly summonses were issued against the farmer and he was fined a total of £10 and £4 4s. 0d. costs.

Apart from this instance 23 samples of ordinary milk were found to contain added water in amounts varying from 1.7 to as high as 33.3 per cent.

The most glaring examples concerned a complaint by a Dairy Company to the effect that milk supplied by a certain farmer was adulterated with water. Samples were subsequently taken from each of three churns as the collecting lorry arrived at the Dairy and two of these were found to contain extraneous water to the extent of 12.7 and 23.8 per cent respectively. The third, although below standard, did not contain extraneous water. Corresponding "appeal to cow" samples taken later at the farm were found to be genuine even though below standard. The remarkable thing about this case is that about a week after these official samples had been taken the Dairy Company still complained of the supply from this particular farmer. Accordingly further samples were taken and two of the three churns were found to contain 15 per cent and 15.5 per cent of extraneous water, respectively, whilst practically a third (33.1%) of the remaining churn was added water. Six summonses were issued in respect of this series and the farmer was fined a total of £28 and ordered to pay £17 17s. 0d. costs.

Another case concerned a milk seller who was challenged when retailing and from whom two pint bottles were purchased for analysis. One was found genuine but the other contained 18.4 per cent of added water. A corresponding 'appeal to cow' sample taken later was certified as genuine. Legal proceedings were instituted against the seller and, as he had had a previous conviction for a similar offence, the Magistrates imposed a fine of £50 and £2 2s. 0d. costs.

A complaint by a Dairy Company resulted in an Inspector waiting at a convenient distance from a farm after seeing three churns of milk outside the gate. He kept out of sight and later saw four more churns added to the other three. It subsequently transpired that the first three churns were evening milk and the other four were morning milk. As soon as the carrier arrived to collect this milk the Inspector intercepted him and in the presence of the farmer's son took a sample out of each churn. In due course the County Analyst certified that each churn of evening milk and two churns of morning milk contained extraneous water. The amounts of excess water ranged from 7 to 17.6 per cent. In view of this, the next day, the Inspector took a morning and evening "appeal to cow" sample and both these proved to be genuine milk. Five summonses were issued in respect of these samples and the farmer was subsequently fined £10 on each summons and ordered to pay a total of £7 7s. 0d. costs.


Regarding non-standard samples other than milk the following is a brief summary of the 19 samples reported against, the analysis is shown in parenthesis:—

- 1. Camphorated Oil. (3.7% deficient in Camphor.) The B.P. prescribes 20 per cent. w/w of camphor (Limits, 19 to 21). As the sample contained only 18.3 per cent. the Chemist was Cautioned.
- 2. Pineapple Juice. (Deficient in Ascorbic Acid (Vitamin C) to the extent of 75 per cent of the amount declared.) Label stated 'Fortified with Vitamin 'C' containing not less than 2 mg. Vitamin 'C' per fl. oz." Sample was found to contain only 0.5 mgm. On investigation it was found that the article had deteriorated through long storage. Manufacturers were cautioned and advised to leave statement off future labels.
- 3. Lemonade Powder (Not conforming to the Labelling of Food Order, 1950.) Mineral matter content not disclosed as required by Article 2 of the Labelling of Food Order, 1950. Manufacturer Cautioned.
- 4. Beef Sausage. (Genuine beef sausage containing 204 parts per million of undeclared sulphur dioxide preservative.) Seller was cautioned for not declaring presence of preservative.
- 5. Tincture of Iodine. (Contained 42% excess of iodine and 56% excess of potassium iodide.) Retail sale of bottle. Capacity of bottle was 15 millilitres whereas volume of contents was only 10 millilitres. It was obvious that evaporation of alcohol had taken place through the stopper of the container. Seller was cautioned.
- 6. Sweets (Butter). ("Butter" confectionery containing 4.75% of fat consisting of from 25 to 33 per cent of butter fat.) Failed to conform with the Ministry of Food "Code of Practice" on the agreed use of the word "Butter" in sugar confectionery. Sample contained less than 4 per cent butter fat. Manufacturers Cautioned.

- 7. Fish Paste. (20% deficient in fish.) Retail sale. Manufacturer Cautioned.
- 8. Choc-biscuit. (The piece of cane attached to the confectionery contained extraneous dirt and moulds.) This was a conventional toffee apple type of article comprising a sweet impaled on the end of a short cane. The sample was actually submitted for analysis of the edible portion but a visual examination proved that the stick was dirty. Remaining stock was withdrawn from sale.
- 9. Zinc Ointment. (7% deficient in zinc oxide). Retailer sold bottle as supplied by manufacturer. The latter was cautioned.
- 10. Corn and Wart Ointment. (Deficient in salicylic acid and containing an excess of boric acid.) The analysis proved that the statement of ingredients printed on the label of the container was incorrect. Manufacturer Cautioned.
- 11. Dripping. (Dripping containing an excess of free fatty acid.)
 The dripping was, in fact, rancid. Seller Cautioned.
- 12. Cream Cake. (Cream cake the fat of which is rancid and contains an excess of free fatty acid.) Sample analysed at the request of a householder. Seller Cautioned.
- 13. Ice Cream Lollipop. (30% deficient in fat.) Sample as sold comprised a blob of ice cream on an ice lollipop. As the whole sample had melted when received by the Analyst he had not option but to treat it simply as a sample of ice cream. The inclusion of the water from the lollipop caused the sample to be certified as deficient in fat. Seller Cautioned and advised not to use the words "ice cream" in describing this particular lollipop.
- 14. Lemon Curd. (Deficient in fat to the extent of 62.5%). Contained 1.5% of fat instead of 4%. On investigation at works of manufacturer it was found the deficiency was due to faulty mixing. Manufacturer Cautioned.
- 15. Glycerine, Lemon and Honey. (43% deficient in Citric Acid.) 1.6% of Citric Acid declared on label,—0.9% found. Old label had been put on bottle in error,—the declaration on new labels read '0.6% Citric Acid' and this complied with the formula in current use. Manufacturer Cautioned.
- 16. Sausage, Pork. (Genuine pork sausages containing 256 parts per million of undeclared sulphur dioxide preservative.) Seller was cautioned for not declaring presence of preservative.
- 17. Bismuth and Soda Mixture. (Ingredients incorrectly stated on the label of the bottle.) Offence due to printing error. Seller was cautioned and agreed to amend all labels on bottles remaining in stock.

- 18. Hog Lard. (Hog grease and not hog lard). Sample was consistent with hog grease as defined in the Oils and Fats (No. 2) Order, 1953. Sample analysed as a result of complaint by a householder who had purchased article as lard. See No. 19.
- 19. Hog Lard. (Hog grease and not hog lard.) This was a sample purchased officially from the same shop as sample No. 18. It transpired that article was invoiced to shop as "Hog Grease" but was being supplied by an assistant when the purchaser asked for "Lard." Seller Cautioned.

To sum up the year's sampling it is pleasing to record, as a glance at the graph below will show, that the percentage of samples reported as adulterated or non-standard is still well within the very low average of the last six years. This is highly satisfactory when compared with the position obtaining during the ten years preceding this period.



In concluding this report it will be of interest to members of the Council to point out that during the year 1953, two Milk (Special Designation) (Specified Areas) Orders affecting parts of Cheshire came into operation and as a result the undermentioned places are now Specified Areas:—

Boroughs of Altrincham, Congleton, Dukinfield, Hyde, Sale, Stalybridge.

Urban Districts of Alderley Edge, Bowdon, Bredbury and Romiley, Cheadle and Gatley, Hale, Hazel Grove and Bramhall and Wilmslow.

The effect of this is that dairy-men retailing milk in these areas must sell the milk under special designation, i.e., "Pasteurised," "Sterilised," "Tuberculin Tested" and until 30th September, 1954,

"Accredited," irrespective of whether the premises from which it is retailed are inside or outside the area. Any other milk which is retailed outside the specified area from these same premises must also be sold under special designation.

It is also obligatory to use a special designation in relation to milk sold to a caterer unless the caterer intends to pasteurise or sterilise the milk and is licensed to do so.

Offences against the foregoing provisions are offences under the Food and Drugs Act, 1938-1950 and heavy penalties are provided to deal with offenders.

These new obligations devolved upon the County Council as a "Food and Drugs Authority" and the responsibility of enforcing the provisions has been assigned to the Weights and Measures Department.

General

In both Regional Hospital Boards' areas an increase in admissions occurred during the year under review, i.e. 36 cases in the Liverpool Region, and 21 in the Manchester Region. It is a very noticeable feature that treatment is now sought, and afforded under the *voluntary* provisions of the Mental Treatment Act, 1930, and this undoubtedly contributes to shorter periods of hospitalization, and the arrest of mental ill-health in the early stages.

Admissions

The undermentioned information, extracted from the Deva Hospital returns, conveys in retrospect (a) the nature of mental illness prevalent during the year, (b) the period of hospitalization, and the prospect of a resumption of the patient's former normal life.

Supervision

Male defectives in their own homes have continued to be supervised by Authorised Officers and female defectives by Health Visitors.

Places of Safety

Occupation Centres

During 1953 the New Ferry Occupation Centre (opened in 1952) had a further year's successful working, and it has been the subject of another favourable report by the Ministry of Health. In May, 1954 a second County Council Occupation Centre was opened in Navigation Road, Altrincham, and this also will provide much needed relief to local parents of children capable of benefiting by the care and training given there. It is hoped before long to open a third centre at Macclesfield, and consideration is being given to several other populous centres.

Use is also made by Cheshire of the Warrington and Wythenshawe Occupation Centre for defectives living within a reasonable distance.

Discharges from Order

Nine cases who had been on licence from Institutions were discharged from Order during the year under review.

Temporary Care

In 1953 the provision was continued of temporary care by admission to hospital for periods of two or three weeks during family emergencies, especially during the summer months when permanent patients are on holiday, thus providing a temporary respite for parents of children who could not at the time be permanently accommodated. During 1953, such temporary care was provided in fourteen cases. Another method of securing the same benefit has been the introduction of short-stay accommodation at the Orchard Dene Hostel at Rainhill of the National Association for Mental Health, where similar temporary accommodation is available, subject to contribution by the parents under the provision of the Care and After-care convalescence provisions of the National Health Service Act. Seven children were so accommodated in 1953.

General

As in previous years, reports on defectives and on their home conditions have been supplied to Hospital Management Committees on a variety of occasions, e.g. for holiday leave, licensing, and at intervals for the Statutory Visitors. Health Visitors and Authorised Officers have attended Juvenile and other Courts to give evidence in regard to alleged offences by defectives, and when necessary Medical Officers of the Department have attended to give medical evidence.

Co-operation with the Children's Department and with the Welfare Department has continued as in previous years, and help was given to other Authorities on a reciprocal basis in regard to their cases, by way of ascertainment and application for Justices' Orders.

I should like to take the opportunity of acknowledging the ready help given at all times by the Regional Hospital Boards, which have again on various occasions found prompt places for cases whose admission was an imperative urgency.

Section X.-Domestic Help

Under Section 29 of the National Health Service Act, 1946, the County Council is empowered to provide a Domestic Help Service for households where such help is required owing to the presence of any person who is ill, lying in, an expectant mother, mentally defective, aged, or a child not over compulsory school age.

The service is one of those which have been devolved to Divisional Health Committees for organisation, administration, and management within the approved estimates. It is not one of the services provided free under the Act, and the Local Health Authority has adopted an appropriate payment scale.

Section XI.-Home Nursing

Under Section 25 of the National Health Service Act, the County Council has the duty to provide a full service for nursing sick persons at home free of charge to the patient.

Details of the nurses and nurse-midwives employed by the County Council are given earlier in this report, together with their districts.

District Nurses have been accustomed to provide their patients with items of nursing equipment, often small or consumable, such as paper handkerchiefs, urinals, and hot water bottles, but often larger or transferable, such as air beds and crutches; in some cases there have been more expensive items to lend, such as bath chairs. Arrangements have been made for continuing the supply of all such items on a greatly increased scale, and this service now forms part of the County Council's arrangements under Section 28 of the Act (see Section V).

Section XII.-Handicapped Persons

General

Under Section 29 of the National Assistance Act, 1948, the County Council provides Welfare Services for handicapped persons, and the scheme under this heading has been made the responsibility of the County Health Committee.

The classes of handicapped persons to which the section applies are the blind, the partially sighted, the deaf or dumb, and others substantially and permanently handicapped by illness, injury, congenital deformity, or such other disability as may be prescribed. Enquiry and discussion have proceeded with the various associations concerned regarding all these categories, and help has in some cases been given by the supply of materials for work at home.

Blind Persons

The Council's approved scheme so made continues, with necessary amplification, the scheme carried out in previous years in accordance with the Blind Persons Acts. Its details are executed by the Blind Welfare Societies at Chester, Ashton-under-Lyne, and Macclesfield, with which appropriate financial arrangements have been made. The Welfare Services of these Societies have, in accordance with the new scheme, been extended, so far as they are applicable, to partially sighted persons.

Certification

To ensure that no person's name is placed on the register without the certificate of a medical practitioner with special experience in ophthalmology, all applicants were examined by one of the County Oculists. Those who so wished were examined a second time under the Medical Referee Service—conducted jointly with the North Regional Association—by independent Medical Referees.

Workshop Employees

Annual grants were continued on the usual principles to recognised Workshops for Cheshire employees. A "minimum wage" principle has been adopted for certain workers, their income being made up to a fixed amount. On this principle there were 7 male and 3 female employees at Chester, 3 male employees at Macclesfield, 1 male employee at Warrington, 1 male employee at Stockport and 1 male employee at Liverpool at the end of 1953, while on the fixed rate system there were 2 males and 1 female at Henshaw's.

Home Workers

The three voluntary societies arranged for the employment at home of those capable of it. Augmentation of 42/weekly was given by the Council to all County approved Workers, who numbered 19 at the end of 1953.

National Library for the Blind

Grant and augmentation were made in 1953 to the National Library for the Blind on behalf of 2 Cheshire Home Workers who are Blind Copyists for its northern branch, apart from the usual annual grant for general services, which are used by over 100 Cheshire residents.

Other Services

The usual annual grants were continued in 1953 to the National Institute for the Blind and the North Regional Association for their respective national and regional services.

Wireless Certificates

178 Certificates entitling the recipients to a free wireless licence were issued in 1953 to applicants on the register.

Deaf Persons

The county is fully covered by voluntary societies for the welfare of the deaf, and financial grants are made by the County Council to these societies, which act as authorised agents for the provision of advice and help, when desired, for the establishment of social centres, and for outings and other recreational activities. A grant is also paid to the North Regional Association for the Deaf in respect of its statistical, co-ordinating, and educational work. Other Handicapped Persons

General.

The registers of handicapped persons other than the blind, deaf, and dumb are kept by Divisional Medical Officers. They are limited to persons who wish to receive benefits under the approved scheme. General advice is given on overcoming their handicaps, and on how to obtain such help as is available, either under this scheme or under the hospital, local authority, or other aspects of the National Health Service. One example of help under this scheme is adaptation of premises, inside or outside, to facilitate use of an invalid chair or carriage. Assistance in handicrafts is given when possible, with the co-operation of voluntary bodies. The most prominent example of the Council's help to handicapped persons is, of course, Wrenbury Hall Colony (see Section V).

Care is taken to ensure that, so far as possible, epileptic and spastic persons receive necessary treatment, education and accommodation and co-ordination is effected when necessary with the residential welfare and the hospital services.

Section XIII. Water Supplies, Sewerage and Sewage Disposal

The period of economic stringency continues to retard the schemes of local authorities.

In the area of the Mid and South-East Cheshire Water Board four unsatisfactory sources of supply are proposed to be abandoned. Powers have been obtained to extract water from the river Dee at Llangollen and convey it to Hurleston, near Nantwich, for treatment. An outline scheme has been submitted to the Ministry.

The original proposal to enlarge the sewage disposal works of Bollington Urban District has now been abandoned. An agreement has been reached for the sewage to be treated at Macclesfield Corporation Sewage Works.

In spite of the efforts of the County Council, Crewe Corporation and Nantwich Rural Council failed to reach agreement on joint works of sewage disposal. Separate schemes for sewage disposal works for the parishes of Haslington and Wistaston have been submitted to the Ministry by the Rural Council. Ministerial decision has not yet been given.

Since the Rural Water Supplies and Sewerage Act, 1944, came into operation a number of water and sewerage schemes have been submitted by Rural Councils to the County Council.

The following schemes were submitted during the current year:-

Macclesfield Rural District. 9,997 yards of water main extensions in the parish of Over Alderley adjoining the north-western boundary of Macclesfield Borough at a cost of £13,336.

Macclesfield Rural District. Works of water supply in the parishes of Adlington, Pott Shrigley, Prestbury and Rainow at a cost of £39,212. These include a pumping station, a reservoir of 136,000 gallons capacity and a chlorination plant at Pott Shrigley Borewell site and 13,440 yards of distribution mains.

Congleton Rural District. Works of sewerage and sewage disposal to serve some thirty houses at Lawton Heath End, Betchton at a cost of £2,520

Tarvin Rural District. Works of sewerage and sewage disposal for the village of Tarvin with a population of 960 at a cost of £50,000.
