

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

To the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee of the Borough of Chesterfield.

Madam Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit my twelfth Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary Conditions of the Borough for the year 1940, which in accordance with the wishes of the Ministry of Health, takes the form of an interim report.

I am afraid that under existing conditions I have not been able to give a detailed review of the work of the Health Department, but I have endeavoured in the Report, to insert all the necessary relevant statistics.

Generally speaking, and allowing for war time conditions, the general health of the Borough has been satisfactory during the year. The death rate has risen slightly, but this can be mainly accounted for by an increase in deaths from respiratory diseases probably due to the severity of the winter.

I have again to thank you sincerely, Madam Chairman and Members of the Health Committee, for your continued interest and support, and also my colleagues in other departments.

In conclusion, I wish to express my grateful thanks to Mr. Carter, Chief Sanitary Inspector, and Mr. Brown, Chief Clerk, for their valued help in the compilation and writing of this report, and also to express my sincere thanks to all the members of the Staff of the Health Department for the loyal support they have given me during the year.

Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the Year 1940.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

The incidence of Infectious Disease in the Borough again remained low, except for an epidemic of Measles comprising 2,236 notified cases. This was fortunately of a mild character and there were no deaths. Apart from Measles there were 289 notifications as against 425 in 1939.

It is gratifying to note that at the end of 1940 nearly 50% of all children in the Borough between the ages of 5 and 15 years had been immunised against Diphtheria, and I am certain that this fact is responsible for the low incidence of Diphtheria which occurred in the Borough during the year.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

The work of the Maternity and Child Welfare Centres, the Ante-Natal Clinics, the Maternity Home and the Domiciliary Midwifery Service have all been able to carry on as usual, and have all done extremely good work, as will be seen by a perusal of the appendices at the back of this report.

There is still much difficulty in obtaining sufficient Staff at the Maternity Home. The changes instituted by the Central Midwives' Board following the 1936 Act, whereby the training period of midwives has been increased, has at the present time, together with other factors, led to a definite shortage of midwives, and whether this will rectify itself, time alone will show. I would like to pay tribute to the existing Staff at the Maternity Home, who, though overworked at times, have never complained and have always given of their best.

SANITARY INSPECTION OF THE AREA.

This important Service, dislocated by the outbreak of war, has now been able to resume more normal conditions, and the Sanitary Inspector put on to whole-time A.R.P. work has now been released for normal duties. The taking over of the Corporation Abattoir by the Ministry of Food has resulted in a great increase in the work of Meat Inspection. The great amount of work done by the Chief Sanitary Inspector and his Staff will be realised by a perusal of the appropriate appendices given at the back of this report.

THE FACTORIES ACT, 1937.

There are 48 factories to which Section 34 refers and all these factories have now received a detailed inspection for the issue of the appropriate certificate. There are on the register 193 factories where mechanical power is used and 84 factories where mechanical power is not used.

Milk and Dairies Order, 1926, and Improvements to Cowshed and Dairy Premises.—The number of farms in the Borough where milk is produced is 59, and the total number of cowsheds is 89. During the year works of improvement were carried out as follows Existing buildings were re-constructed to form cowsheds on three farms and one new dairy was provided.

Milk (Special Designations) Order, 1936.—There are 13 producers of accredited milk resident in the Borough who are licensed by the County Council as the Licensing Authority. Supplementary licences are issued to outside producers in respect of Tuberculin Tested, Pasteurised and Accredited milks.

Meat and Other Foods.—As from the 17th January, 1940, the Ministry of Food took over the Corporation Abattoir as a central slaughtering establishment for Chesterfield and the surrounding area. These were then the only premises where slaughtering was carried out, the three private slaughterhouses being closed temporarily.

The total number of animals slaughtered was 72,705, and the number inspected 71,349, or 98.1 per cent.

Reference to Appendix 29, Tables 1 and 2, will show the particulars of meat inspection which entails the whole time services of two Meat Inspectors.

Food and Drugs Act, 1938.—During the year 248 samples of food were submitted to the Public Analyst, of which 164 were of milk. Of the total number purchased 160 were obtained formally and 88 informally. Sixteen samples of milk were found to be not genuine or below the standard of the Sale of Milk Regulations.

Legal proceedings were taken against one producer of milk in respect of certain samples containing added water. A fine of £6 with £8 18s. 6d. costs was imposed.

The percentage of milks below standard was 9.7 and including all other foods analysed the percentage found not complying with regulations was 8.8.

The average composition of all milks was Milk Fat 3.62 per cent, Solids-not-fat 8.75 per cent.

HOUSING.

During the year 73 houses were erected, these being wholly by Private Enterprise.

Owing to the War, the Slum Clearance Programme was at a standstill, the only action in this respect being that owing to changes of tenancy the Corporation provided 12 houses for the re-housing of 37 persons in certain Clearance Areas, one family of 4 persons found their own alternative accommodation. Six houses were demolished.

Appendix 33 shows the position of the Programme at the year end.

Owing to the difficulty in obtaining material and the shortage of labour in the building trades, very little repair work has been possible.

STAFF.

There have been no changes under this heading during the period under review.

AIR RAID PRECAUTIONS.

As Officer in Charge of the Casualty Service, I would like to pay a warm tribute to the members of the Staff of the Health Department and to the whole of the effective personnel of the A.R.P. Casualty Service, because it is solely due to their whole-hearted efforts and devotion to duty that the Casualty Service has welded itself into an organised and highly efficient Service.

CASUALTY BUREAU.

The Casualty Bureau established in the Health Department, still continues to function in an efficient manner.

ARMY BILLETING.

Close co-operation continues to exist between the Military Authorities, the Police, the Billeting Officer and the Healh Department.




