To the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee of the Borough of Chesterfield.

I have the honour to submit my Fourteenth Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary Conditions of the Borough for the year 1942.

The Report has been drawn up in accordance with the requirements of the Ministry of Health.

It is gratifying to note that, in spite of war-time conditions, the general health of the people of Chesterfield has been satisfactory during the year, as is evidenced by the fact that the Death Rate and Infantile Mortality Rate are the lowest ever recorded in the Borough.

I would like to take this opportunity, in all sincerity, of once again thanking you, Madam Chairman, and the members of the Health Committee, for your continued support and interest, and also my colleagues in other departments.

In conclusion, I wish to thank Mr. Carter, Chief Sanitary Inspector, and Mr. Brown, Chief Clerk, for their valuable help in the compilation and writing of this Report, and also to express my grateful thanks to all members of the Staff of the Health Department, who have shown a very high sense of devotion to duty during a very exacting and trying year.

Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the Year 1942.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

The incidence of Infectious Disease was exceptionally low during the year, there being 804 notifications as compared with 1,163 in 1941, and 2,525 in 1940. There were only 11 notified cases of Whooping Cough as against 612 notifications in 1941, but the incidence of Measles was higher, there being 508 notifications of this disease.

Almost 70% of the children in the Borough between the ages of 5 and 15 have now been immunised against Diphtheria. Our efforts to persuade the parents of children below the age of 5 to have them immunised are meeting with some measure of success. Until the end of 1941 only about 14% of these children were immunised, but during the current year local propaganda has resulted in this figure being raised to 31%, and it is hoped that by a further education of the parents this figure will be materially increased in future.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

As will be seen from appendices 18—22 at the end of the Report, all the Maternity and Child Welfare Services have been well maintained during the year.

Of the total babies born, 80% were in regular attendance at the Infant Welfare Centres.

The number of expectant mothers attending the Ante-Natal Clinic has grown to such an extent that it can be said that practically all the Borough expectant mothers visit the Ante-Natal Clinic. The Muncipal Midwifery Service showed a further increase in the number of cases attended, namely, 556 as compared with 476 in 1941.

That the Corporation Maternity Home still continues its valuable work in an efficient manner will be evidenced by a perusal of Appendix 18.

SANITARY INSPECTION OF THE AREA.

The time of two Sanitary Inspectors is still fully occupied at the Abattoir, and the great amount of work done by the Chief Sanitary Inspector and his Staff will be realised by a perusal of the appropriate appendices given at the back of this Report.

With regard to Housing, I can only say that for the general health and happiness of the population, a resumption of house building as early as possible is of the utmost urgency.

THE FACTORIES ACT, 1937.

There are 56 factories to which Section 34 refers, and all these factories have received a detailed inspection for the issue of the appropriate certificate. There are on the register 201 factories where mechanical power is used, and 78 factories where mechanical power is not used.

Milk (Special Designations) Order, 1936.—There are 14 producers of accredited milk resident in the Borough who are licensed by the County Council as the Licensing Authority. Supplementary licences are issued to outside producers in respect of Tuberculin Tested, Pasturised and Accredited Milks.

Meat and Other Foods.—Throughout the year the Corporation Abattoir continued to be used by the Ministry of Food as a central slaughtering establishment for both the Borough and the surrounding districts. Except for 23 pigs killed for home consumption on farm premises, etc., all slaughtering of animals for home consumption was confined to the Abattoir. Reference to Appendix 29, Tables 1 and 2, shows the numbers and types of animals slaughtered. The inspection of these animal carcases occupied the whole time of two Meat Inspectors.

The total number of animals slaughtered was 33,994, of which 33,686, or 99.09 per cent., were inspected. As a result of this inspection, over 122 tons of meat and offals were condemned as unfit for human consumption. In addition, more than 11½ tons of various foods were surrendered by traders. The total of all foods condemned as unfit for human consumption was 133 tons 12 cwt. 0 qrs. 20 lbs.

Food and Drugs Act, 1938.—During the year 239 samples of food were submitted to the Public Analyst, of which 195 were of milk. Of the total number of samples purchased, 179 were formal purchases and 60 were obtained informally.

Appendix 30 shows the nature and number of the separate foods purchased.

Legal proceedings were taken against one vendor of milk in respect of a sample showing 7.5 parts of added water, defendant being fined £6 including costs.

The percentage of milks below standard was 7.6, and including all foods analysed, the percentage was 6.2.

The average composition of all milks was: Milk Fat, 3.61 per cent; Solids-not-fat, 8.68 per cent.

Milks tested for Sediment numbered 245, and were classified Good, 211; Fair, 23; Bad, 11.

The mixed milks of 306 cows from 26 separate producers were submitted for Biological Test for the presence of Tubercle Bacilli. One herd of 20 cows gave a positive result, and the infected animal was subsequently slaughtered.

HOUSING.

No houses were erected during the year either by the Corporation or by private enterprise.

The only action under the Slum Clearance programme was where a change of tenancy of existing Corporation houses enabled the Local Authority to provide one house for the re-housing of four persons from a Clearance Area. Seven houses were demolished.

Appendix 32 shows the position of the Slum Clearance programme at the year end.

Owing to the shortage of both labour and material, very little repair work has been possible.


