# CLACTON URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL

## THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE CLACTON URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my eighteenth Annual Report on the health and sanitary circumstances of the District during 1937.

The estimated mid-year population for 1937 supplied by the Registrar-General is 23,420 and this figure is used in the calculation of the various statistics.

The Crude Death-rate is 11.2 per 1,000 of the population, which on correction for age and sex distribution is reduced to 9.5. The infant Death-Rate is 38.8 per 1,000 live births which is a considerable drop on the figure for last year.

The general health of the district has been on the whole very satisfactory, infectious disease was very light and there were no circumstances specially prejudicial to health.

The chief alteration during the year was the closure of the Isolation Hospital which had been in use for thirty five years, and the arrangement with the Borough of Colchester to receive into their Isolation Hospital cases of infectious disease arising in Clacton.

One reason for the change is financial. A small hospital with most of the beds usually unoccupied cannot be run on economical lines. Taking the average number of admissions over a period of ten years, the new arrangement should result in an annual saving of £300. For the financial year ending March 31st, 1938, the actual saving is about £600, the incidence of infectious disease for the period being considerably below the average.

Port Sanitation.—The shipping during the year consisted of pleasure steamers in the summer months ; 4 being coastwise steamers and 1 sailing to the Continent. These carried 161,201 inward passengers and 162,800 outward.

There was no infectious disease and no action under the Port Sanitary Regulations was required.

The foreign going steamer was inspected once and a sample of the water examined.

### II—NURSING AND OTHER SERVICES.

There has been no change during the year under the headings of Laboratory and Ambulance Services which are adequate for the area, or in Home Nursing, Clinics and Hospitals. The Midwifery, Maternity, Infant Life Protection and Orthopaedic services also remained as in previous years. Details of the work done in these services will be found in the section of the Report which deals with Maternity and Child Welfare.

The provision of domiciliary midwifery, which previously had been assisted by the Clacton Council, became the liability of the County Council under the Midwives Act 1936. The Clacton Council therefore no longer provides a grant for domiciliary midwifery to the Clacton District Nursing Association which now receives £210 from the County Council.

There are no municipal midwives in the Urban District.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

(1) **Water Supply.**—The total quantity of water supplied during the year was 261,586,000 gallons, an increase of 7.25 per cent. over the previous year. The water was obtained from the following sources of supply :

During the year 2,027 yards of new distributing mains have been laid and 805 yards of old main renewed ; 313 new services have been connected to the mains. The water supply was maintained constantly at full pressure to every part of the district throughout the whole year and no restriction of any kind was enforced on the use of water. The supply from all sources was found on analysis to be pure and wholesome and of a very high degree of bacterial purity. The only complaint one receives is with reference to the hardness, which is in the neighbourhood of 30 degrees, of which 7 represent permanent hardness.

(2) **Drainage and Sewerage.**—I am indebted to the Surveyor for the following report as regards the drainage and sewerage of the district during 1937 :

“ During the year 1937, 300 lineal yards of foul and combined sewers and 6,100 lineal yards of surface water sewers were laid in private streets under the provisions of the Private Street Works Act 1892, the roads being Hill Road, First Avenue, Second Avenue, and, at Holland-on-Sea, York Road, The Grove, Madeira Road, Dulwich Road, Salisbury Road, Bedford Road, Preston Road, Princes Road, Kenilworth Road and Cliff Road. Tenders have been obtained which include foul and surface water sewerage roads in the eastern portion of Holland-on-Sea.

“ Private estate developers were responsible, during the same period, for laying 1,050 lineal yards of foul and combined sewers and 80 yards surface water sewer in the following roads : Manor Way, Holland Park, Clarendon Park, Deanhill Avenue, Boley Drive, Lake Avenue and Holland Beach Estate. In addition 180 yards of sewer has been laid on the West Clacton Estate.

“ Considerable progress has been made with the Cambridge Road Flood Relief Sewer and its complementary scheme, the storm overflow sewer from Holland



Road to near Seafields with outlets to sea. It is expected that this sewer will be available by the summer of 1938 and prevent the recurrence of the floodings that have taken place in Cambridge Road and other places. Approximately 1,580 lineal yards of pipes varying from 21" to 39" diameter have been laid between Olivers Road and Valley Road, and of the 51" overflow sewer between Holland Road and the sea, 900 yards are complete. Work is proceeding on the sea outfall.

"Towards the end of 1937 the Ministry of Health held public Inquiries into three large sewerage schemes totalling over £220,000 and the Minister's decision is awaited. These schemes are (a) the provision of main drainage for the Burrs-ville, Thorpe Road and London Road areas; (b) the West Drainage Scheme to replace the present inadequate outfall sewers and sea outfall in the western part of the town and provide additional main drainage—treatment works are included in the scheme so that only a settled and screened effluent is discharged to sea and (c) the installation of settlement tanks at Holland Haven Pumping Station so that a clarified effluent is obtained there also. At the Inquiries the Inspector expressed concern at the high cost per house of providing main drainage in certain parts of the area. Uncontrolled development often makes it necessary to lay long lengths of sewers to reach the unsewered areas and the restrictions which the Council have placed upon building development in these areas are fully justified. Should the schemes be approved as submitted to the Ministry the Council will be in a position on completion of the work, to close all but a few of the cesspools in the Urban District."

## RATS AND MICE (DESTRUCTION) ACT.

37 visits to premises.

Upon complaint, premises are visited, baits laid and other necessary work carried out to assist in exterminating the vermin.

A certain amount of good is done, but to be effective, the work of rat destruction should not be treated with the peacemeal methods at present existing.

The menace from rats will be very serious in a few years, unless the work of destruction is organised on a more intensive scale.

County and other Councils should have squads of properly trained men engaged year in and year out on the work. A charge being made for services and material where warranted.

13 samples of Tuberculin Tested, 1 sample of Tuberculin Tested (Certified), 1 sample of Pasteurised, and 21 samples of Accredited Milk were submitted to the Bacteriologist for examination.

Of these, 4 samples of Tuberculin Tested, 1 sample of Tuberculin Tested (Certified), and 8 samples of Accredited Milk failed to comply with the prescribed conditions.

19 samples of Ordinary Milk were submitted to the Bacteriologist for examination as to general cleanliness and the presence, or otherwise, of B.Coli.

Of these, 14 samples were unsatisfactory inasmuch as they gave positive B.Coli results.

In spite of all the time, trouble and money provided, by way of bonus, to produce clean milk, it is disappointing to see the large quantities of visible dirt left on straining cloths when churns of milk at dairies are being prepared for bottling and delivery.

I feel from observation, that at many farms sufficient labour is not provided to allow of the cows being groomed and washed properly. Many producers also are reluctant to provide really suitable washable clothing for the milkers.

On the other hand some of the producers in this area are to be complimented on their enthusiasm to produce clean milk and the constant good results obtained.

With the present staff, it is impossible to give this work the desired attention. At the premises visited, many improvements in connection with lighting, ventilation and sanitary accommodation have been obtained. (See list of improvements).

### Hairdressers' and Barbers (Byelaws).

During inspection of these premises, it has been found that in several cases sufficient attention is not given to the cleanliness of the hair brushes, or the quality, as many old and worn out brushes were found in service.

To prevent occupiers pleading ignorance of the Byelaws and their requirements, a copy has been forwarded to all hairdressers.

### Ice Cream Registration.

A great improvement is maintained in the storage and retailing of Ice Cream.

Very few retailers make their own product as the multiple firms, in addition to supplying the ice cream in various wrapped sizes, provide well covered containers for the storage of same.

There has been no cause for complaint during the past season in respect of retailers, premises or utensils.

### Smoke Abatement.

Although there are no large factories or works at Clacton, frequent nuisance is caused from the chimneys of laundries, restaurants and small bakehouses. Smoke from railway locomotives in the vicinity of the station is also a source of complaint.

Observations are taken when time permits, and all possible done to abate nuisances by the introduction of improved stoking, appliances and the use of smokeless fuel.

During the year 23 new cases were placed on the register of which 8 were transfers from other districts. Of these 23 cases, 4 left the district and 3 died during the year. Six cases had treatment in Sanatorium and three are awaiting admission. No action was required under the Tuberculosis Regulations 1925 or under Sec. 62 of the Public Health Act 1925.

## INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

The incidence of Infectious Disease during the year was very low. Scarlet Fever was responsible for only 16 cases as against 38 in 1936, and 7 cases of Diphtheria as against 8 in the previous year. No case of Enteric Fever was notified. Other notifications included 2 each of Erysipelas, Pneumonia and Puerperal Pyrexia and 26 of Chicken-pox.

All the cases of Diphtheria were sent to Hospital and 14 of the Scarlet Fever. As frequently happens, visitors are responsible for a considerable proportion of the cases, this year 7 Scarlet Fever and 3 of the Diphtheris cases were visitors to the district.

The Clacton Isolation Hospital was closed on March 31st and cases arising after that date were sent to the Colchester Isolation Hospital.

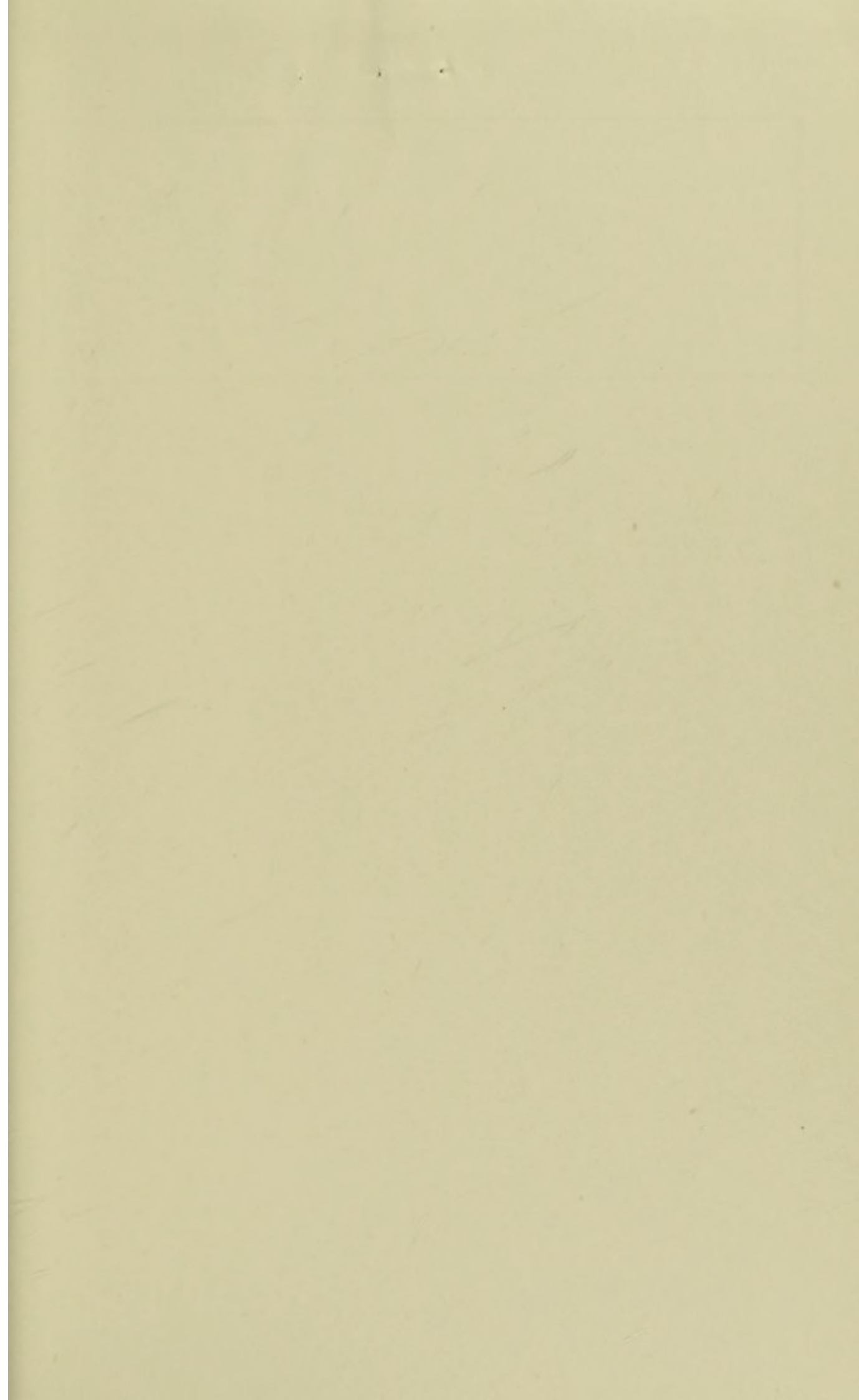
