Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health
for the year 1942

The Chairman and Members of the
Clacton Urban District Council.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour of presenting my twenty-second Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary conditions of the District during 1942.

As in the case of previous reports during the War, it contains only a few essential statistics and, by the request of the Ministry of Health, figures for local population are excluded, as are those supplied by the Registrar General which would enable local populations to be reconstructed.

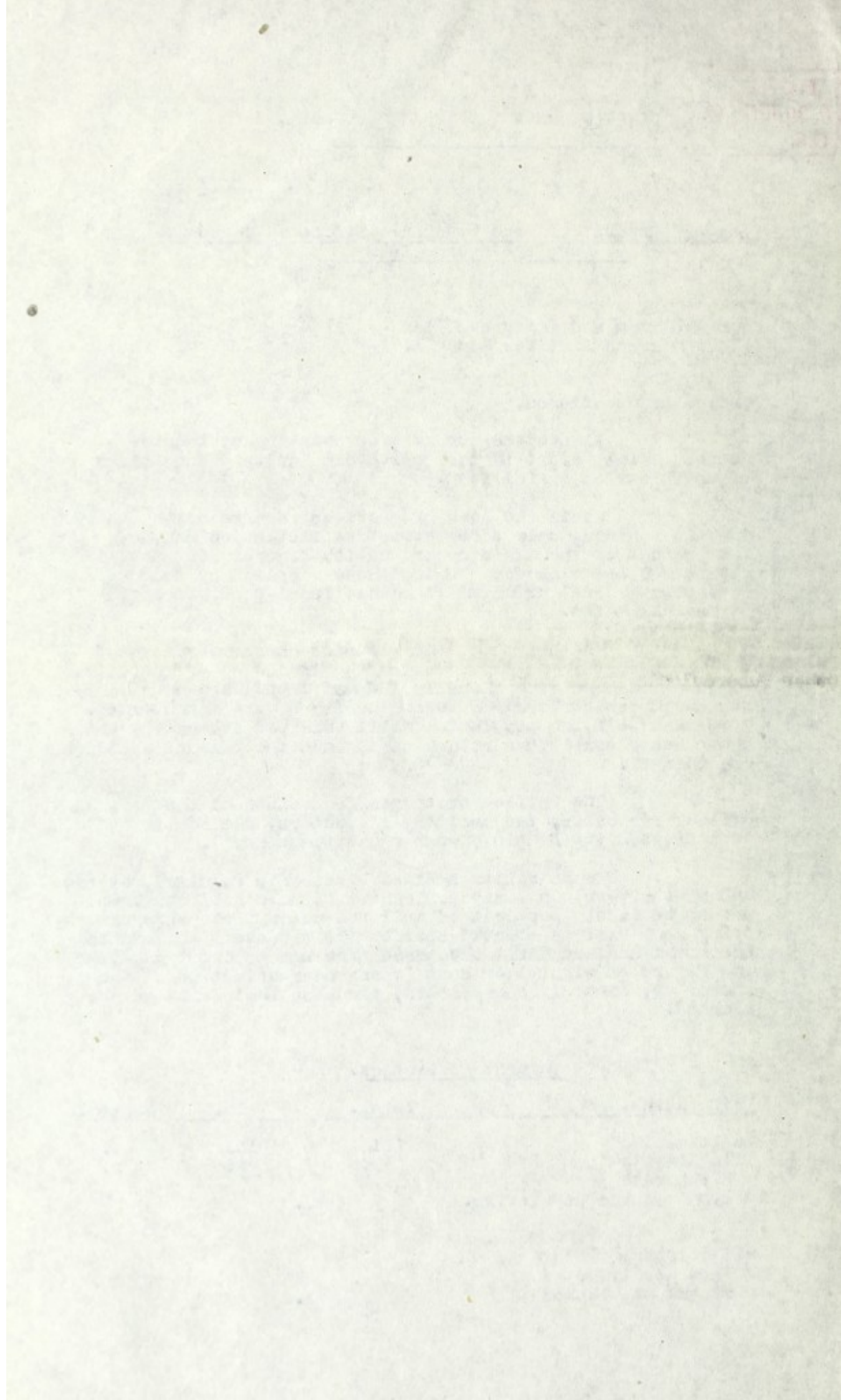
The health of the District has remained good; for the second year in succession the incidence of infectious disease has been exceptionally low and there were no circumstances which seriously affected health of the inhabitants. More than half the population still remained evacuated, but there was a continuous return throughout the year of children and infants.

The Public Health Staff consists of the Medical Officer of Health, two Sanitary Inspectors, One Health Visitor, and two female Clerks (one temporary).

Immunisation against Diphtheria resulted, by the end of the year, in sixty per cent. of the school children, and about eighty per cent of children under five years of age, being completely protected against the disease. As infants are not immunised until they reach the age of about one year, the figure of eighty per cent is an underestimation of the number of, what might be called, immunisable infants actually treated.

Isolation Hospital.

It was stated in the last year's Report that the admissions to the Isolation Hospital at Colchester during 1941, viz: 1 Scarlet Fever in a Soldier and two cases of Paratyphoid in two sisters, was by far the lowest for 50 years.

The year 1942 has easily beaten that remarkable record. Only one case, that of Erysipelas, was sent in; the Pneumonias and Puerperal Fever were admitted to General Hospitals.

Infectious Disease.

The Incidence was again extremely low as regards the major infections, but a fair number of the minor, viz: Measles and Whooping Cough, occurred.

The number of these notified by general practitioners does not, by any means, represent all that took place. In the section of Maternity and Child Welfare will be found the number discovered and visited by the Health Visitor; which will indicate that only in certain cases of these, so called, minor infectious diseases is a Doctor called in.

At the end of 1942 about 80% of children under 5 years, and 60% of children from 5 to 15 years had been immunised in Clacton.

Housing.

No new houses have been erected during the year.

Sewerage and Drainage.

The greater part of the new sewerage scheme has been in abeyance during the year, and the only work undertaken has been in respect of the sea outfalls in the Western drainage Scheme, and some lengths of Sewer in West Road and Butlins Camp.

Water Supply.

During the year, 198,839,000 gallons of water have been supplied by the Clacton Water Department. The water was obtained from the following sources :-

The quantity represents a decrease of 7.02% on the output of the previous year and having regard to the increase in civilian population is a gratifying result of the campaign to economise in the use of water.

In peace time there is everything to be said for encouraging the ample use of domestic water but in a time of war part of the available supplies may be required for emergency uses.

Water is one war material about which we are apt to be careless. We use so much of it that we are inclined to think very little of it but in the National interest careless usage and waste must be stopped. The difficulty is to get the individual householders to feel that their small contributions to economy are as vital as those of larger consumers. Actually the domestic consumer is cumulative and measureable over the country in millions of tons per annum, both of water and fuel.

The water supplied in Clacton under normal conditions comes from sources some miles outside the Town - Lawford, St. Bentley and in case of damage to one or other of these sources or in other emergency, from the Council's well at St. Osyth.

At the end of 1942 about 50% of children under 5 years, and 60% of children from 5 to 12 years had been vaccinated in cases.

Housing

No new houses have been erected during the year.

Sewerage and Drainage

The greater part of the new sewerage scheme has been in operation during the year, and the only work undertaken has been in respect of the new works in the Western Drainage Scheme, and some repairs of sewer in West Road and Spring Lane.

Water Supply

During the year, 120,000,000 gallons of water have been supplied by the London Water Department. The water was obtained from the following sources:-

The quantity represents a decrease of 7.5% on the output of the previous year and having regard to the increase in civilian population is a gratifying result of the campaign to conserve the use of water.

In periods when there is everything to be said for economy and the supply of domestic water has in a time of war part of the water supply may be reduced for emergency use.

There is one serious matter about which we are all concerned. We are all aware of it that we are inclined to think very little of it. But in the national interest serious waste and waste must be avoided. The difficulty is to get the individual householders to feel that small contributions to economy are as vital as those of the nation. Actually the domestic economy is a cumulative and a serious one. The country is millions of tons per annum, but of which the total is not so much as it seems.

The water supplied in London water supply is not only from the new works outside the town - London, but also from the old works in the town of London. In case of danger to one or other of these sources or in other circumstances the Council's well at St. James.

Water Supply - continued.

Saving regard to the possibility of enemy invasion the Ministry of Health caused the preparations of an emergency scheme for water supply inside the Town under invasion conditions. This scheme will only be put into operation in case of serious emergency when supplies from outside the District are unobtainable. In such circumstances water will be taken from the wells of the Ruxton Garden Co., East Essex Laundry and Middlesex Hospital, and emergency rations of water will be carted in tanks to various parts of the Town for distribution to the inhabitants.

Use will also be made of the water stored at the water works old road, and Butlins Swimming Pool.

Water supplies under these conditions will generally be chemically treated and made safe for use, and the consumers fetching water from official sources will be warned by notice at such source if it is necessary for the water to be boiled or sterilised.

Under emergency conditions all water taken from sources not under direct control of Council Officers must be boiled or sterilised before being used for drinking or culinary purposes.

Throughout the whole of the past year the water supply in Clacton was maintained at adequate pressure.

These supplies, from all sources were pure and wholesome, and of a high degree of bacterial purity.

Public Cleansing.

Owing to the Evacuation of the Civil Population the amount of Refuse collected and disposed of was considerably reduced. Refuse from Military Establishments and other billets is received at the Disposal Depot. Salvage work has been intensified with satisfactory results.

A total of 1,576 tons of refuse was collected at a net cost of approximately £1,569 including depreciation and loan charges.

Income from Trade Refuse was approximately £39.

Collection is by rear loading and mechanical vehicles. Disposal is by incineration and controlled tipping.

1,834 tons were dealt with at a net cost of £484.

Income from the sale of Clinker and Salvaged materials was £708. Waste Paper - £808.

Port Sanitary Regulations.

No action was required during the year.

Maternity and Child Welfare.

The total number of births notified during the year was 112 of which 52 were notified by Medical Practitioners and 60 by Midwives.

There are four Midwives on the Register, of whom two are employed by the Essex County Nursing Association, and they attended altogether 83 of the cases during the year.

Four still births were notified, the causes being given as prematurity and difficult labour.

Health Visiting.

The number of Visits paid by the Health Visitor to children under 5 years was 1,533. She also paid 15 visits as Infant Life Protection Visitor, to five homes.

Orthopaedics.

30 children received treatment for various Orthopaedic conditions during the year, and they made 111 attendances.

Eye Clinics.

14 Children attended. Of 7 new cases 3 were provided with glasses.

Ante-Natal Clinics.

There were 174 Expectant Mothers on the Register during the year, and they made 491 attendances at the Doctor's Clinics, and 206 attendances at the Ante-Natal Classes.

Infant Clinics.

These were held as usual on Thursdays throughout the year; the attendances of children under 5 years being - 4,668.
