

To the Chairman and Members of the Clacton Urban District Council.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

It is again my pleasure to present the Annual Report on the state of public health in the Urban District of Clacton. Last year we produced the Annual Report in duplicated form, rather as an experiment. In view of the success of this innovation it is intended to continue with this type of production both in the interest of economy and early presentation.

#### INFECTIOUS DISEASES

The number of cases of infectious disease notified during 1958 was one more than during the previous year. The incidence of whooping cough was increased. No cases of food poisoning occurred, but eight people were notified as suffering from dysentery.

#### IMMUNISATION

A large number of the public have taken advantage of the facilities offered for poliomyelitis vaccination by the County Health Service.

Many people are now protected against the disease and it would seem that this must cause a change in the pattern of future outbreaks. Epidemiologists will watch with considerable interest any change of this nature.

We must however continue to call the attention of parents to the importance of whooping cough and diphtheria immunisation and to vaccination against smallpox, all of which are most important.

#### VITAL STATISTICS

The Registrar General's estimate of the population for 1958 is 210 greater than for 1957.

The birth rate is higher than last year. 54 more births being recorded in 1958. The birth rate of 14.4 is 2.0 below the National rate.

The still birth rate is 4.9 lower than the National rate.

The death rate is .5 higher than 1957, but is .2 lower than the National rate for 1958.

The infant mortality rate for England and Wales in 1958 was 22.5 which is the lowest ever recorded, 1.3 lower than the infant mortality rate for this district.

#### HOUSING

During the year the Council purchased the Barnado Homes in Old Road, Clacton. It is expected that after alteration approximately fifty units of accommodation in form of flats and flatlets will be available.

#### HEALTH EDUCATION

In November a National "Guard that Fire" Campaign was launched by the Ministry of Health with support from Local Authorities.

In my Districts the campaign was well patronised. Fire Officers gave lectures in the schools, ironmongers staged displays of Fire Guards, leaflets were distributed and in the cinemas short films were projected as part of the programme. Our thanks must be recorded to all those who co-operated in making the campaign a success. It is sincerely hoped that as a result of this propaganda the number of burning accidents in the home will be considerably reduced.

#### FOOD HYGIENE

The classes in Food Hygiene continue to be held and are very well patronised. In 1959 we shall hold another course in the early spring. There is no doubt that in any seaside town clean food handling is most important, as catering is our main industry.

GENERAL

It is pleasing to be able to express my gratitude to the Public Health Committee and to the Council as a whole for their co-operation during the year. To the Staff of the Public Health Department I express my thanks for their work during the year.

A slice of bread, approximately 2" thick and containing a greyish brown foreign object about 2" long was submitted to the Public Analyst who reported that the object

consisted of a mass of oily dough and cotton fibres. No evidence of the presence of rodent excreta or B. Coli was obtained. A warning letter was sent to the bakery firm.

## Christmas Pudding.

In my report for 1957, I mentioned that a Christmas Pudding was found to be infested with the larvae of Carpophilus ligneus, a species closely related to Carpophilus hemipterus known as the "Dried Fruit Beetle".

The vendors of the Christmas Pudding were prosecuted on two charges and were fined £1 on each charge and were ordered to pay twenty guineas costs.

## CLEAN AIR ACT, 1956.

Adopted Building Byelaw for Smoke Prevention. In force 1.11.58.

The conversion of the steam raising plant from coal firing to oil firing at one factory led to complaints about the depositing of "oil smut".

The oil smut was caused by the rapid cooling of the flue gases upon entering the base of the steel chimney.

It is pleasing to report that with the co-operation of the owner the trouble was overcome by insulating by means of a metal sheath, the lower portion of the chimney.

#### DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

The only work carried out by the Council in 1958 involved the construction of 212 lin. yds. of 12 inch dia. foul sewer running southwards from the junction of Coopers Lane and Lake Walk to by-pass a similar length of old sewer.

All the samples were found to be genuine with the exception of the following:-

Bread and Butter - This was submitted by a purchaser who complained that it was bread and margarine. On analysis the fat was found to be a mixture of margarine and butter. A formal sample of bread and butter was taken as soon as possible from the same source of supply which was found to be genuine. From enquiries made it appeared that a genuine mistake had occurred in respect of the first mentioned sample.

<u>Plaice Fillets</u> - A purchaser submitted part of a packet of frozen fish with a complaint that it was not the kind of fish described on the container in which it had been purchased. Examination showed that the fish was cod and not plaice. The matter was taken up with the packers and it was established that a genuine mistake had occurred.

#### Food Colour

Lettered Rock Confectionery - A sample of food colour used in the manufacture of lettered rock confectionery was found to be other than a permitted colour. Further, a sample of rock was taken which also contained this unsatisfactory colour. Enquiries revealed that only a small quantity of this colour remained in stock and that the manufacturers had obtained and were now using a permitted colour. No further action was taken in view of this, particularly in view of the fact that the Regulations controlling this matter had recently been altered causing some confusion.

Milk - One sample of Channel Island milk was found to be 3% deficient in milk fat. A letter of caution was sent to the farmer concerned who stated that the herd had been sold since the sample was taken and restocking with Channel Island Attested cattle was being undertaken.

#### PUBLIC CLEANSING

#### COLLECTION

The second of the two pre-war refuse collection vehicles was replaced in May by another Dennis Paxit II vehicle.

#### DISPOSAL

Since the last Report, controlled tipping has been carried out at Smith's Pit, St. Osyth Road, and it is pleasing to report that this has been done without complaint from residents in the adjoining properties. This disused pit is now completely filled, resulting in the removal of one more eyesore.

#### GULLY CLEANSING

The Gully Cleansing and Cesspool Emptying Machine has given satisfactory service and has been hired for gully and cesspool emptying by neighbouring authorities.

#### STREET CLEANSING

This is done with the aid of two pedestrian controlled electric vehicles each with a team of three men. Three other sweepers are also employed. During the year some roads without footpaths were provided with them and several unmade roads were surfaced. This has resulted in additional work for the sweepers and serious consideration must be given to the purchase of a mechanical sweeper.

Litter still presents difficulty in certain parts of the town. During the year the Essex County Council introduced two byelaws dealing with litter, orange peel, bottles, broken glass etc. and on 7th August 1958 the Litter

Act 1958 came into force. It is hoped that this legislation, together with a local anti-litter campaign and the provision of additional litter baskets will bring about a substantial reduction in the litter nuisance.

#### PUBLIC CONVENIENCES

There are 23 public conveniences in the district and in October work commenced on a new ladies convenience at Garden Road, Jaywick. It is expected that this building will be completed early in 1959. The scheme provides for the existing building being converted into a convenience for males and for the inclusion of washing facilities at both conveniences.

The enlargement of certain of the existing conveniences needs to be considered, and of those, the case of the ladies convenience at West Avenue is the most urgent.
