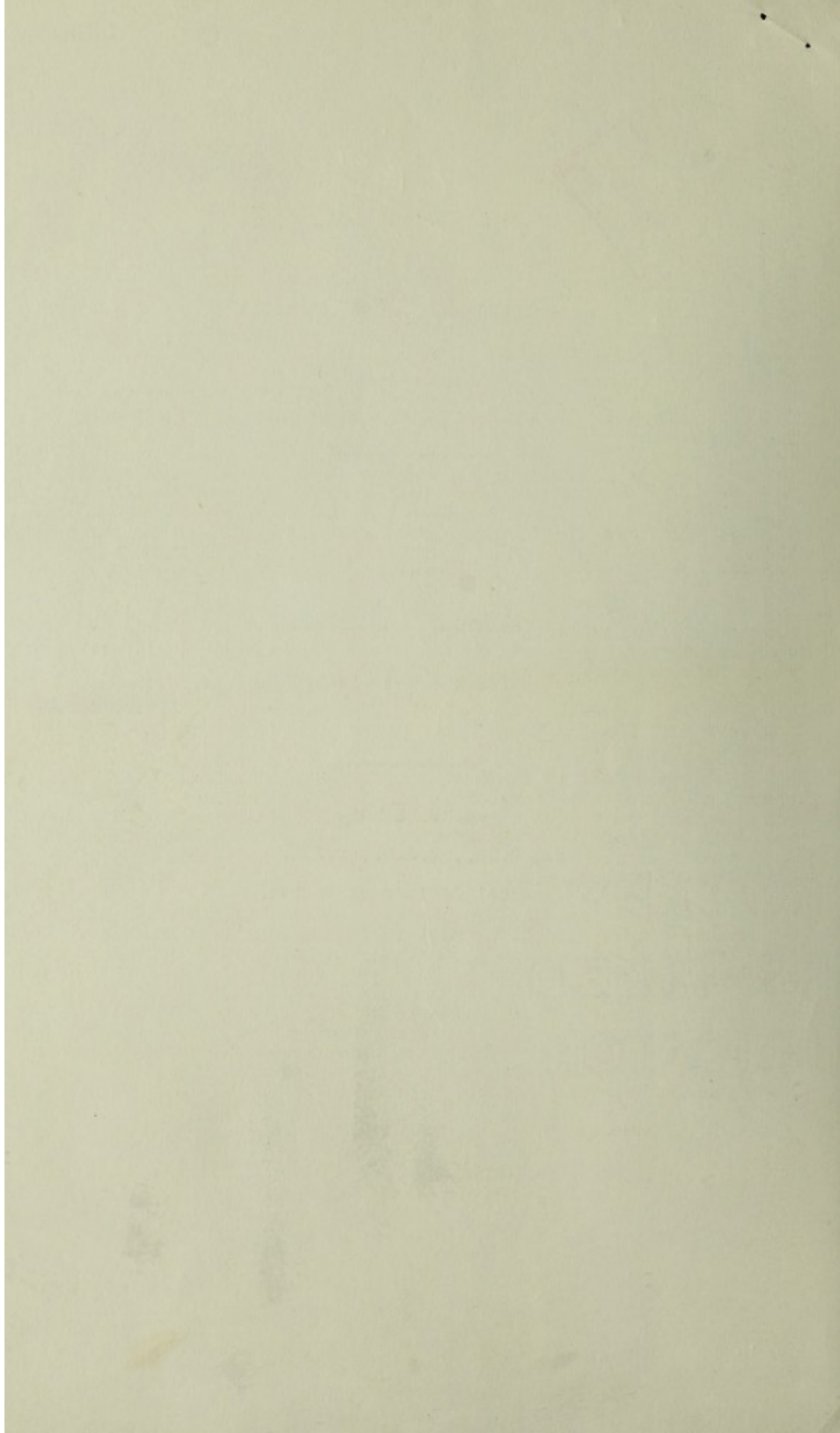

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary Conditions of the Borough of Cleethorpes for the year 1943.

The Birth Rate was 19.8 per thousand of the population, being 1.8 higher than in 1942. The rate for towns of similar size was 19.4 while that of the country as a whole was 16.5. The Death Rate was somewhat higher than in 1942 being 13.9 per thousand of the population. The corresponding rate for England and Wales and the smaller towns was 12.1 and 12.7 respectively.

The Infant Mortality Rate was 51.2 per thousand live births and is considerably higher than the rate for 1942 (40.7). In over half of the cases, death was due to congenital causes. There were no maternal deaths during the year.

Infectious Disease notifications showed an increase during the year due to the increased incidence of Measles and Whooping Cough.

There were 17 cases of Diphtheria in children under 15 years and almost all occurred in non-immunised subjects. Three cases with a history of previous immunisation were undoubtedly modified as a result. The influenza epidemic which began in the latter part of the year was mild in character and contrary to expectations was not seriously prejudicial to the public health.

Housing in the Borough remains a problem for attention as soon as opportunity permits, though generally speaking and in the prevailing circumstances, the position at the end of the year was reasonably satisfactory.

I have to thank the Chairman Ald. E. Houghton, J.P., and the members of the Health Committee for their interest and support throughout the year. I am also indebted to my Chief Sanitary Inspector and other members of the Staff for their assistance in compiling this report.

REPORT ON THE PROGRESS OF THE WORK DURING THE YEAR 1900

By the Secretary of the Board of Education

1901

The Board of Education has the honor to acknowledge the receipt of the report of the Superintendent of Schools for the year ending June 30, 1900. The report is a most interesting and valuable one, and it is a pleasure to find that the progress of the schools during the year has been so satisfactory. The following are the principal features of the report:

The total enrollment for the year was 10,000, an increase of 500 over the year 1899. The average number of pupils in each school was 100. The total number of teachers employed was 500, and the average number of pupils per teacher was 20. The total amount of money expended for the year was \$1,000,000, and the average amount per pupil was \$100. The following table shows the distribution of the total enrollment by grade and sex:

SECTION B.- GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES OF THE AREA.

(a) Laboratory facilities.

These are available for the examination of throat and nose swabs, sputum, etc., at the Public Health Department, Council Offices, Cleethorpes, to which address specimens should be sent.

(b) Ambulance facilities.

For infectious cases removal by ambulance is an inclusive charge of the Infectious Disease Hospital receiving the case. Non-infectious or accident cases may be removed by the Borough Council's Ambulance, when a charge is made according to milage.

(c) Nursing at Home.

Three District Nurses are stationed in Cleethorpes and are members of the Lindsey Nursing Association. The Lindsey County Council also provide the services of a nurse for cases of Ophthalmia Neonatorum to be nursed at home, when requested by General Medical Practitioners.

(d) Clinics.

The Lindsey County Council from the Clinic, St. Hugh's Avenue, Cleethorpes, provide the following specialist and consultant services :-

(e) Hospitals.

Facilities are available for the hospital treatment of infectious disease, including smallpox, at the Isolation Hospital Osgodby. This hospital is administered by a Joint Board on which the Cleethorpes Corporation is represented. Cases requiring urgent or specialised treatment are admitted to the Grimsby Isolation Hospital at Scartho.

Maternity Home Cleethorpes. This Home is administered by the Lindsey County Council.

General Hospital facilities are available at the Grimsby and District (Voluntary) Hospital and at the Lindsey County Council Infirmary

SECTION 2 - GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE COUNTY

(a) Laboratory facilities

Tests are available for the examination of blood and urine, sputum, etc., at the Public Health Department, Council Office, Clontarf, to which specimens should be sent.

(b) A midwife facilities

The midwife service is provided by a midwife in an inclusive charge of the maternity hospital receiving the cases. The midwife service may be removed by the Borough Council's resolution, which should be made according to the bye-laws.

(c) Nursing at home

Two District Nurses are stationed in Clontarf and are members of the Irish Nurses Association. The District Council also provide the services of a nurse for cases of diphtheria, scarlet fever, etc., when requested by the General Public Health Officer.

(d) Clinics

(e) Hospital

Facilities are available for the hospital treatment of infectious disease, including venereal, at the Infection Hospital, Clontarf. This hospital is administered by a Joint Board of which the Clontarf Corporation is represented. Cases requiring urgent or special treatment are referred to the Infection Hospital as a special hospital.

Maternity Home Clontarf. This Home is administered by the District Council.

General Hospital facilities are available at the Grange and District General Hospital and at the District Council Infirmary.

SECTION C. - SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

1. (1) Water Supply.

This has been satisfactory both as regards quality and quantity. The supply is by pipe from the Grimsby, Cleethorpes and District Joint Water Board's undertaking and is constant.

Bacteriological and chemical examination of samples from the source of supply are carried out monthly and results of these examinations are supplied to the Medical Officer of Health.

Samples are also taken periodically by the Health Department from the supply as delivered to the public and submitted for bacteriological examination.

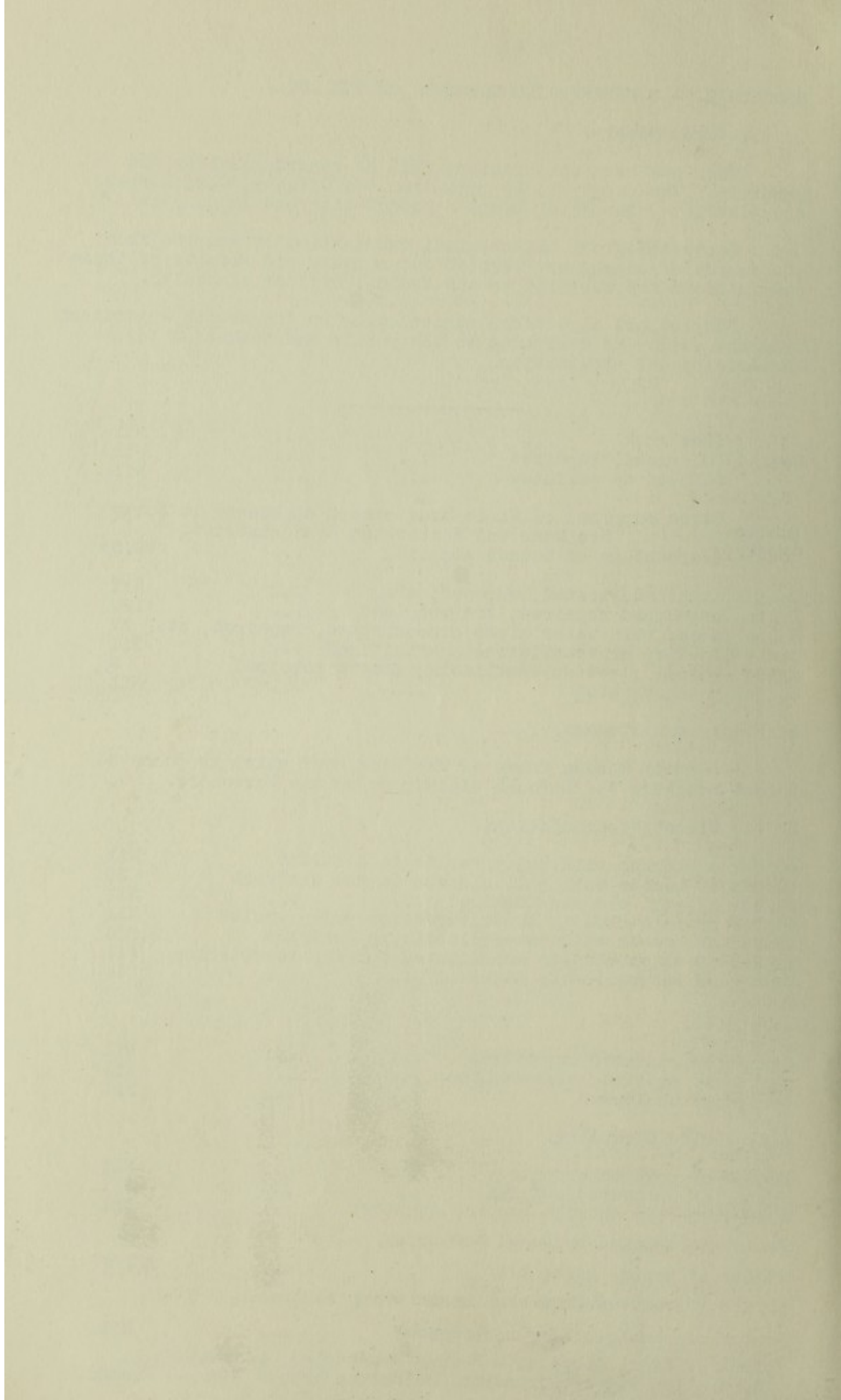

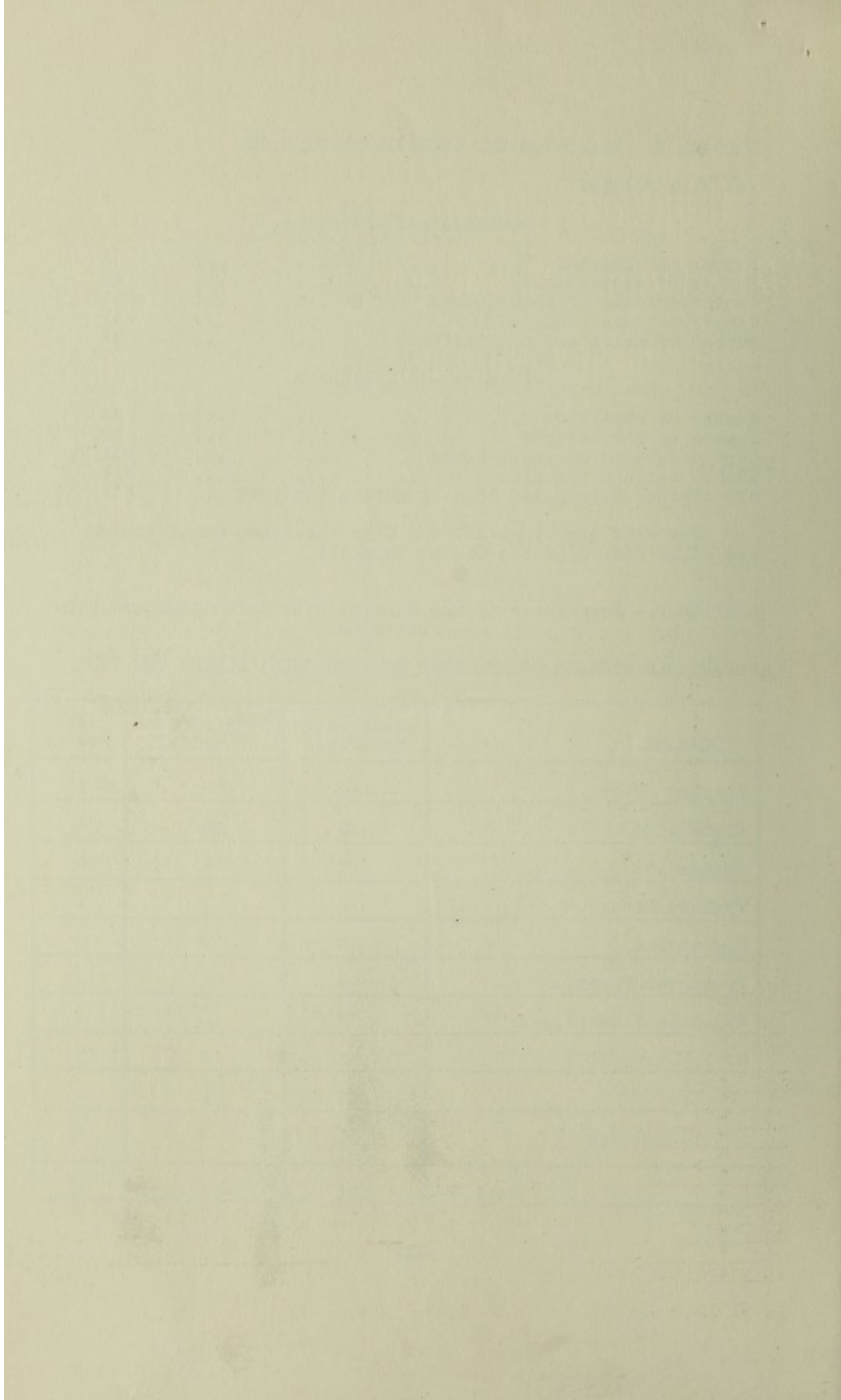

SCABIES

Facilities for the treatment of Scabies continued throughout the year at the A.R.P. Cleansing Station, Poplar Road. The work was carried out by part-time Civil Defence personnel who were remunerated on a sessional basis. No action has been required under the Public Health (Prevention of Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1925, (relating to persons employed in the milk trade) nor under Section 172 of the Public Health Act, 1936. Ratio of non-notified Tuberculosis Deaths to the total is 3-13. The facilities available at the Tuberculosis Dispensary are being increasingly utilised by private medical practitioners for diagnosis in cases of suspected tuberculosis.

CLEETHORPES TUBERCULOSIS DISPENSARY.

During the year 1943, 43 new cases including 8 transfers from other areas attended the Dispensary. Three cases were written off as recovered, 24 cases were removed as having transferred to other areas or having been lost sight of, or died, leaving 217 cases on the Dispensary register at the end of the year.

The total individual attendances numbered 156.

The total attendances were 368.

TUBERCULOSIS AFTER CARE COMMITTEE.

This Committee renders valuable service in the aftercare of cases of Tuberculosis. Special attention is paid to necessitous cases and their families, assistance being given in obtaining extra nourishment, clothing, etc.

An Occupational Centre with a workshop in St. Hugh's Avenue, is maintained by the Committee and provides a means to utilise the lessened working capabilities of selected cases.

Since the war however the workshop activity has become increasingly restricted in its scope due to lack of materials. The value of its normal peacetime activities may be readily appreciated by the fact that many patients after a period of suitable employment in the workshop have been restored to full economic independence in the outside world.

An annual grant is made by the Lindsey County Council to augment the funds of the Committee whose work is voluntary.
