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# REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH, CLEVEDON UFBAN DISTRICT, FOR THE YEAR 1937.

Mr. Chairman, Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit my report for the year 1937, including a summary of parts of your Sanitary Inspector's Report for the same period.

During the first quarter of the year there was a fair amount of moderately severe influenca, continued from the last quarter of the previous year, and as may be seen from the returns, nine deaths have been attributed to this cause. Apart from this there has been no serious epidemic.

I am glad to report that arrangements have now been completed for the reception of infectious cases into the Bristol Isolation Hospital at Ham Green, and that there is a modern ambulance for the conveyance of such cases.

The local ambulance, the local Cottage Hospital, the District Mursing Association and the various clinics in the district continue to contribute to the wellbeing and health of the community, and it is satisfactory to record that under recent arrangements by the County Council, we in this northern part of the county are permitted to submit swabs from urgent diphtheritic cases to the Health Department at Bristol for examination and report. I feel sure that this will be much appreciated by the medical practitioners in the area.

Two infant deaths under one year were due to prematurity, and the third to pre-natal malnutrition. Among the chief causes of death heart disease, circulatory diseases and "stroke" account for 44, cancer for 16, and influence for 9.

### Sanitary Circumstances of the Area.

We are fortunate in having an abundant and pure water supply which is the constant care of the local company, whose regular examinations are supplemented by frequent bacteriological examination by the local authority. At no time has there been any hint of contamination in the reports from the analyst.

There has been less trouble from contamination of the river this year; and the sewerage accommodation is now under review, having regard to the considerable building operations in progress in the lower parts of the town. This is a matter which must command the constant attention of the Sanitary Committee.

#### Housing.

Definite progress has been made with the re-conditioning of houses and basements and with the provision of new houses, but there is still public demand for more, and the Council have wisely decided on completion of the existing programme to review this demand and formulate a further scheme to meet this need. It must be borne in mind that we have a considerable and increasing proportion of elderly people and young couples, with small or no families, for whom small houses only are required; indeed at the present time houses which could accommodate a larger family are found to be occupied by such couples.

#### Prevalence of and Control over Infectious Diseases.

We have been singularly free from infectious diseases during the year. Two cases of Diphtheria, remnants of the previous year's epidemic, were treated at the local hospital, and two other cases cropped up in August as a result of infection contracted outside the town. These were satisfactorily dealt with at home, and since then we have had no fresh cases. In August a boy was found to be suffering from enteric fever, and investigation of all the circumstances definitely pointed to an infection contracted in the Midlands. All the contacts were carefully watched and examined, and no further cases occurred. The boy made a satisfactory recovery at Ham Green Hospital, Bristol.
