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

### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH

for the year

1959

Mr. Chairman, Lady and Gentlemen,



The year has been, from the public health point of view, uneventful though it began with a fairly widespread epidemic of "Asian Flu." Those who had suffered an attack in 1957 enjoyed a very considerable degree of immunity. The attack was short and sharp if treated with respect from the onset by rest in bed for three or four days, followed by convalescence of a week or ten days; but those who felt compelled to resume duties too early suffered a more prolonged debility. One death has been assigned to Influenza.

The other feature was the phenominally fine summer we enjoyed, during which, contrary to expectation, we suffered no cases of Poliomyelitis. It is yet too early to assume that this freedom from attack has been due to the immunisation campaign against this disease which has recently begun, but it is hoped that all concerned will continue to avail themselves of the protection which this vaccine promises.

Diphtheria has also been unknown to us during the year, but I make no apology for stressing again the great importance of continuing to protect the rising generations against this scourge which most of the younger parents have never seen. During the year there has been a small, but very disturbing, epidemic in London and odd cases continue to crop up throughout the country.

Though the number of cases of Scarlet Fever may seem considerable, the disease has usually been so mild as to be almost unrecognisable and no complications have followed from it. Measles and Whooping Cough have, however, been more troublesome and debilitating, but there have been no fatalities from these diseases.

The local Hospital, with its ancillary services, continues to fulfil a very valuable function; the Maternity Home receives all local cases who require admission; the Ambulance Brigade is on call day and night; the District Nurses render skilled help to the sick in their homes, where the Home Helps attend to cooking, chores and shopping.

Thanks to the initiative of the W.V.S. and other local helpers a "meals on wheels" service has now been started and is much appreciated, and we look forward to the erection of a further twenty houses for elderly couples to make their lot easier and to retain them in their home region.

It gives me pleasure to acknowledge the help I always receive from your Staff, from the County Council Health Department and from the Bristol City Health Department.

#### Sanitary Services

Total

Under the direction of your Public Health Inspector, all these services have been satisfactorily discharged. The water supply is of proven purity and in ample quantity; streets are regularly swept and cleansed; the drainage system works smoothly and a comprehensive new sewer to meet the needs of increasing housing development is about to be laid down; cesspits, where they still exist, are emptied free of charge twice a year and house and trade refuse are collected at weekly intervals.

#### Public Swimming Baths

There is little to add to the comment made in my Annual Report for 1957 on the bacteriological condition of the water in the Marine Lake. It is hoped that the further cementing of the floor of the Lake will lead to a speedier cleaning of the sedimentation which accumulates between high tides.

#### Housing

There has been considerable housing development by private enterprise during the year and this activity still continues. Private philanthropy has already provided four very desirable bungalows for old couples which are already in happy occupation, while four more are ready for allocation. The Local Authority hopes to start erection of twenty dwellings for old people at an early date. These will greatly help in relieving a sore need.
