To the Chairman and Members of the Clevedon Urban District Council.

I have the honour to present the Annual Report for 1965.

There have been no epidemics and the number of measles cases was unexpectedly low.

A survey of basement and garden flats commenced late in 1964, and by the end of 1965, two thirds had been inspected. Visits revealed that about one third of these flats are unfit for human habitation and incapable of repair at reasonable cost.

The number of improvement grants, both standard and discretionary, continue to be approved at a fairly high level.

The adjusted birth rate for Clevedon is just above the national average. The number of deaths rose considerably in 1965, but the area comparability factor for deaths is lower than ever, 0.51, so that although the crude death rate is 19.2, when adjusted to allow for the high number of elderly people in Clevedon, the adjusted rate is 9.8, below the national average of 11.9.

My thanks are given to members and officers for the cooperation given, and in particular, the Public Health Inspectors.

WATER SUPPLY

All houses in Clevedon are supplied by mains water from the Bristol Waterworks Company. The water has been satisfactory in quality and quantity and no form of contamination has been detected.

SEWAGE DISPOSAL

Whilst sewage from Clevedon is still discharged, untreated, into the Bristol Channel, much work has been done in forwarding the Yeo Valley Main Drainage Scheme, in which it is hoped to have a full treatment disposal works. The works will be sited at Kin ston Seymour and detailed plans of the Clevedon sewers have been made. Difficulties have arisen over the size of the works, because of lack of agreement on population growth between Clevedon and the Planning Authority.

Provided no delays are encountered in obtaining ministerial approval and loan sanction, and no further delays by a credit squeeze or public inquiries, it seems probable that a fully integrated sewerage and sewage disposal system could be in operation in two to three years time.

Work was carried out during the year in the West End. 780 feet of defective trunk sewer was replaced from the rear of Westbourne Crescent to the new southern ring road; a new 12 inch public sewer was constructed from Tennyson Avenue to connect with the above, allowing for the abandonment of 1,000 feet of defective public sewer.

Provision was made for a new public sewer for the north western side of the urban district to connect with the new trunk sewer first mentioned, to replace the existing outfalls between Ladye Bay and Pier beach.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

House refuse is removed weekly, in two vehicles and tipped at Clapton Wick. Trade refuse from shops is collected weekly at a charge of 24/- per annum. A large proportion of business premises use this service.

CESSPOOL EMPTYING

Cesspools are emptied free of charge twice per year. If additional visits are necessary, then the owner is charged in accordance with the time involved.

No legal proceedings were taken.

No "Block Survey Schemes" have been carried out.

In addition to figures given above, surveys and treatments as required are carried out at the forceshore, public open spaces, and river banks.

Since the Council employed the services of a contractor to carry out redent control, the number of complaints received by the department is slowly falling. It should, however, be noted that a good proportion of business premises in the district have entered into private agreements with the contractor. This accounts for the very few premises treated by the Contractor on behalf of the Council.
