To the Chairman and Members
of the Clevedon Urban District Council.

I have the honour to present the Annual Report for 1966.

The births and deaths are nearly the same as in 1965. The proportion of deaths over the age of 75 is 63% of the total.

More cases of measles occurred than in the past 4 years, and this is probably the highest number recorded for Clevedon. The previous two years shewed low numbers of notifications.

The survey of basement and garden flats was completed in 1966 and the Health and Housing Committee agreed that all those unfit for human habitation and incapable of repair at reasonable cost should be closed, unless the owners were prepared to do the necessary work to make them fit for human habitation. 110 basement flats have been inspected, 76 were considered fit for human habitation and 34 unfit. Of the unfit premises, 8 had closing orders on them, and in 1966, a further 15 were made the subject of closing orders. The remaining unfit basement flats are being dealt with.

I am very pleased that the Council is to recommence building houses, so that many persons, at present in unfit or unsuitable accommodation, will have the chance of much better housing conditions.

#### WATER SUPPLY

All houses in Clevedon are supplied by mains water from the Bristol Waterworks Company. The water has been satisfactory in quality and quantity and no form of contamination has been detected.

One sample of water, treated after going into supply, was found to be satisfactory.

## SEWAGE DISPOSAL

Work has been continued throughout the year on the Yeo Valley Main Drainage Scheme. Agreement has been reached with Long Ashton Rural District Council over the proposed treatment works at Kingston Seymour, and apportionment of capital and running costs. Kingston Seymour Parish Council objected to the site of the works and a Public Inquiry was held in March 1967, the result of which is still awaited.

#### PUBLIC CLEANSING

House refuse is removed weekly, in two vehicles and tipped at Clapton Wick. Trade refuse from shops is collected weekly at a charge of 24/- per annum. A large proportion of business premises use this service.

#### CESSPOOL EMPTYING

Cesspools are emptied free of charge twice a year. If additional visits are necessary, then the owner is charged in accordance with the time involved.
