

CAUSES AND SEX DISTRIBUTION OF DEATHS

It will be seen from the Table below that there was a considerable reduction in the deaths from Heart Disease, 62 as against 122 in the previous year, and from all forms of Cancer, 29 as against 50 in 1957. There was a slight increase in the deaths from Vascular Lesions of the Nervous System. Some 74% of the 188 deaths registered were attributable to the above three groups of disease.

During the year, 69 deaths occurred in Clitheroe Hospital (chronic sick females). As such deaths are not transferable and are assigned to the Borough area, they have quite a marked effect on the Death Rate figures.

B. GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES

I. A comprehensive range of services is maintained by the LOCAL HEALTH AUTHORITY, the LANCASHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL. They include Antenatal Clinic (with classes for exercises and relaxation); Child Welfare Clinic; Eye and Aural Clinic; Speech Therapy Clinic and other School Medical Services. Provision is also made for Child Guidance.

These Clinics are carried on at Eastham House, Eshton Terrace, Clitheroe.

The AMBULANCE SERVICE for the Town is provided by the Lancashire County Council and vehicles are housed at the Depot in Princess Avenue, Clitheroe.

(i) GENERAL HOSPITAL SERVICES. These are provided by the Manchester Regional Hospital Board in Blackburn Accrington, Preston, Burnley and Nelson. There is also access where required to Manchester, Liverpool and other hospitals.

CHEST SURGERY is based on Blackpool Victoria Hospital. This Thoracic Unit is under the direction of Mr. P. Jewsbury, F.R.C.S. who also visits the hospitals of the Blackburn and Burnley Group.

BRAIN SURGERY, ETC. is based on Preston Royal Infirmary under the Neuro-Surgical Unit conducted by Mr. G. K. Tutton, F.R.C.S., who also visits the hospitals in the Blackburn and Burnley Group.

MATERNITY CASES are provided for at Bramley Meade, Whalley; Queen's Park Hospital, Blackburn, and Preston Royal Infirmary.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES are accommodated as required at Park Lee Hospital, Blackburn, and the Marsden Hospital, Burnley.

CHEST CLINIC. This is now held at Blackburn Royal Infirmary under the direction of the Chest Physician, Dr. R. Ward.

(ii) PATHOLOGICAL AND BACTERIOLOGICAL SERVICES

The Pathological and Bacteriological Departments of the Blackburn and East Lancashire Royal Infirmary, and the Preston Royal Infirmary, do the Public Health Laboratory work in accordance with the Government Scheme officially carried out by the Manchester Regional Hospital Board.

A Sub-Laboratory, under the direction of Dr. Spink,
Pathologist to the Blackburn Group of Hospitals, functions in
a suite of rooms at the Clitheroe Hospital, and is open between
9-0 a.m. and 9-30 a.m. each Wednesday. The local Practitioners
can refer Clitheroe patients for any necessary tests, and if the
patients are unfit to attend at the Laboratory, the Pathologist
visits them in their own homes on request from their doctor.

(iii) X-RAY FACILITIES

Blackburn Royal Infirmary, Victoria Hospital, Accrington, Victoria Hospital, Burnley, and Reedyford Hospital, Nelson, all have "Open Access Departments" to which any general medical practitioner can send cases for x-ray examination direct, without the patient having to be sent first to a hospital clinic, thus saving the time of the patient and the consultant when it is appropriate to deal with the case in this manner.

This facility also enables the general medical practitioners to maintain their medical interest because they do not necessarily have to lose the oversight of their cases when direct reference to the x-ray department is appropriate.

III. HEALTH SERVICES PROVIDED BY VOLUNTARY AGENCIES

(i) A PHYSIOTHERAPY CENTRE is conducted in rooms in New Market Street, Clitheroe. This is a voluntary organisation supported by public subscription and small payments made by patients, and also from monies derived from the funds of the former District Nursing Association. It continues to render useful service. A wide variety of treatments are available and appropriate physiotherapy is given to an increasing number of patients when recommended by their medical attendant.

The Centre relieves the pressure on the physiotherapy departments of local hospitals; these departments are grossly under-staffed because of the great shortage of trained personnel.

The Centre also saves patients in time and trouble. It has no connection with the National Health Service.

(ii) THE OLD PEOPLE'S WELFARE CENTRE is housed in commodious premises in Lowergate and continues to be a beneficial and popular social centre much appreciated by the older generation of townspeople. It is supported by voluntary subscriptions and "efforts" and has encouragement from the Borough Council and the County Council.

A CHIROPODY SERVICE for old people came into operation during 1958.

C. PREVALENCE AND CONTROL OF INFECTIOUS DISEASE

The incidence of Infectious Diseases during 1958 is shown in the following Table, which includes particulars of cases notified to the Authority, cases removed to hospital, and deaths from these diseases. Cases of the non-notifiable minor infectious diseases are not included:-

There were increases during 1958 in the number of cases of Measles and Scarlet Fever, but the incidence of Whopping Cough was lower than in the previous year.

The outbreak of Measles (233 cases) proved to be of a fairly mild type and no deaths resulted.

It is pleasing to report that Clitheroe was again free from Diphtheria during 1958. Only one case of this disease has occurred in the town since 1946.

It must again be stressed that if this record is to be maintained a high level of immunisation is essential.

The Lancashire County Council have given the opportunity to every Medical Practitioner in the area to provide immunisation against Whooping Cough, generally at the same time as immunisation against Diphtheria. Commonly immunisation is given against Tetanus ("lock-jaw") at the same time. These facilities are available at the Clinics or at the doctors' surgeries, for all children. Children may now be protected against five serious infectious diseases, namely, Smallpox, Diphtheria Whooping Cough, Tetanus and Poliomyelitis. The County Council's Scheme for B.C.G. Vaccination against Tuberculosis has also operated since 1957.

POLIOMYELITIS - IMMUNISATION

As mentioned previously, the response in the Borough of Clitheroe has been extremely good and as more and more vaccine becomes available it is hoped that, gradually, we shall work up to a 100% cover of all our children. The immunisation, in the vast majority of cases, is being done at the Lancashire County Council Child Welfare Service at the Clinic Eshton Terrace, Clitheroe.

INCIDENCE AND MORTALITY OF TUBERCULOSIS

During 1958 cases of Tuberculosis were admitted to various Sanatoria under the Regional Hospital Board which administers the general scheme. Close liaison is still maintained between the Board and the local Public Health Department.

All the necessary disinfections following these cases are carried out by our own Department.

1. SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

WATER SUPPLY

The main source of supply is a series of springs the flow from which is collected into meeting wells before being piped to the reservoir at Lowcocks.

The spring supply is supplemented by two artesian wells and can be further augmented by pumping from two boreholes, the second of these being completed during 1958.

Although the supply from the springs is of a very high quality, the Council have thought it advisable to have a second line of defence, and during the year a chlorination scheme was completed and put into operation.

WATER SAMPLING

During the year, 120 Bacteriological examinations were made. The great majority of these were satisfactory and it is interesting to note that all samples taken in the town after the chlorination equipment came into operation have been highly satisfactory.

DRAINAGE AND SEWAGE

Further extension of sewers have taken place to accommodate building development.

SANITARY ACCOMMODATION

There are in the Borough some 15 Pail Closets, 1,065 Waste Water or "Tipper" Closets, and 3,533 Freshwater Closets.

During the year 1957, a Scheme for the abolition of the remaining pail and waste-water closets was inaugurated, the Council undertaking to make a Grant of £10 for each conversion to the freshwater system. At the end of the year, 74 conversions under the scheme had been completed satisfactorily. A further 18 such closets were abolished under Improvement Schemes, making a total of 92 for the year.

A considerable number of these obsolete closets are in properties scheduled for demolition in the Slum Clearance Programme, so that they will be still further reduced in this way.

RIVERS AND STREAMS

No special action was called for in respect of pollution during the year.

REFUSE REMOVAL AND DISPOSAL

The following is a summary of the work done in the removal of House and Shop Refuse, etc., (excluding salvage loads) during the year ended 31st December, 1958.

- 2. Offal removed from Public Abattoir 197 loads
- 3. Fish and Vegetable Offal removed ... 262 loads
- 4. Nightsoil from Pail Closets 56 loads

TOTAL... 4576

There are some 4909 dustbins in use in the Borough area at the end of 1958. The control of replacement bins is in the hands of the Local Authority under a Scheme which has been operated for many years past.

SALVAGE

The collection of salvage material continued satisfactorily during 1958.

MOVEABLE DWELLINGS AND CAMP SITES

Permission was given under Section 269 of the Public Health Act, 1936, for the siting of a Caravan for a limited period only, as the owner was experiencing housing difficulty at the time.

There are no official Camping Sites in the Borough.

SHOP PREMISES

Routine inspection, and special inspection as occasion required, continued during the year. In several cases, occupiers of shops were given warning as to minor contraventions of the Shops Acts.

FACTORIES

There are at present 18 Non-Power and 117 Power Factories, a total of 135 premises, on the register and coming within the purview of the Factories Act. Inspection during the year proved that the standard generally was satisfactory.

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SCHOOLS

All Schools in the Borough now have modern sanitary amenities, including washing facilities.

PUBLIC CONVENIENCES

A considerable amount of wilful damage was again done in the Public Conveniences, despite the posting of Police Notices. There is far too much vandalism in such public places in these days, and the cost of repairing damage is quite considerable and an unnecessary charge on the ratepayer.

The close pebble-dash on walls has been effective in preventing the offensive writings and drawings in conveniences used by males, but the despoiling of painted surfaces of walls in the centrally situated convenience for females still continues. Here "lipstick" drawings and writings are the order of the day, and much time is spent by the cleaner in endeavouring to obliterate these.

ATMOSPHERIC POLLUTION

It was found necessary to make 7 Smoke Observations of factory chimneys during the year 1958. In one case the black smoke emissions were considered to be excessive and notice was issued to the Firm concerned.

The cupola furnace of a local Foundry again proved troublesome from time to time and following representations from the Department the owners took steps to improve the grit-arresting equipment and instal a water-spray apparatus which helped to confine grit emission.

No action was called for during 1958 in respect of other industrial premises from which emissions of dust and fumes gave rise to nuisance over a period of years. The owners of these premises have gone to considerable trouble and expense in their effort to improve atmospheric conditions in our area and have been most co-operative at all times.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949

The Health Department employs a full-time Operator on Rodent Control, etc. The town is divided into eight sections and regular tours of inspection of premises and land are made within these sections, and treatments carried out where necessary.

One test baiting and two maintenance treatments of the town's sewers are carried out each year in accordance with Ministry instructions.

During 1958, treatments were also carried out on behalf of the Bowland Rural District Council as follows:-

Refuse Tips - 4;

Farms - 6;

Private

Dwellings - 4.

Householders and occupiers of industrial premises in the Borough area co-operated well with the department by giving prompt notice of infestation by rats or mice.

Two sets of premises are registered in accordance with this Act.

PET ANIMALS ACT, 1951

Under this Act, two Licences were issued during the year. Conditions on the premises of the Firms concerned were quite satisfactory during the period under review.

DEALERS IN OLD METAL, ETC.

In accordance with Section 86 of the Public Health Acts (Amendment) Act, 1907, six dealers are registered with the Local Authority. In this matter the Department's Officials co-operate with the Police Authority when necessary.

CHIEF SANITARY REQUIREMENTS OF THE DISTRICT

- a. The abolition of sub-standard housing accommodation considered unfit for human habitation, and the provision of new housing for displaced persons.
- b. The re-conditioning and improvement of other properties in the town.
- c. The conversion to the freshwater system of the remaining pail closets and waste-water closets. (Grant Scheme now operating.)
- d. The provision of a Public Convenience which is centrally situated, and equipped with facilities for washing, etc. (Under consideration at the end of the year).

2. HOUSING CONDITIONS

The general standard of housing accommodation in the Borough is good, but there are several areas of out-worn and out-dated property which call for clearance.

In the Local Authority's 1st Five Year Programme which was approved by the Minister of Housing and Local Government, 151 sub-standard houses are to be dealt with, and a further 128 houses are included in the 5-10 Year Group.

The Official Representation of the Medical Officer of Health setting out the condition of the properties in the first area for clearance, comprising Marlborough Street, Harrop Street, Grimshaw Street, Giles Street and part Whalley Road, was submitted to the Council on Tuesday, 18th June 1957, when it was decided that with a view to securing the clearance of this area the Corporation purchase the land and themselves undertake the demolition of the properties thereon.

The Order in respect of this area was designated "The Clitheroe (Whalley Road No.1 Clearance Area) Compulsory Purchase Order, 1958". A Public Local Inquiry into the Order was held in the Town Hall on the 24th September, 1958.

During 1958 seven houses - Nos. 4 and 8 Waddington Road, 8 Whalley Road, 1 and 3 Park Street, 20 Church Brow and 20 Castle Gate were found to be unfit for human habitation and not capable at reasonable expense of being rendered fit. The houses were closed after Undertakings not to relet had been given by the owners.

In considering the problem of rehousing following slum clearance, attention must be given to the provision of various types of housing accommodation if persons displaced are to be rehoused satisfactorily. The provision of small dwellings suitable for single persons, bungalows for old people and small families, in addition to the standard two and three bedroomed houses must be discussed when new building programmes are before the Authority.

The Council have decided on the erection of 42 Bungalows (16 one-bedroomed and 26 two bedroomed) on the Manor Road Site, and again, these will be used to rehouse people from clearance properties.

IMPROVEMENT SCHEMES

Under the Housing Acts 1949 and 1954, 13 Improvement Schemes were brought forward from the previous year. Twelve were completed satisfactorily and "Certificates of Completion" were issued; the one remaining Scheme was not proceeded with.

During 1958, 18 new Schemes were submitted to the Council and in 16 cases Grants were made. Nine of these Schemes were completed and Certificates issued during the year. In the remaining 7 Schemes the works were in hand but not completed at the end of the year.

Since 1955, some 113 Improvement Schemes have been submitted and in 90 cases Grants made by the Council.

It is pleasing to know that many of the older properties which are structurally sound are being brought up to modern standards at a fraction of the cost of new building, and will thus provide excellent housing accommodation for many years to come.

3. INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD

MILK SUPPLY

The Local Authority is responsible for milk distribution and the supervision of dairymen only, the inspection of farms, cowsheds, etc. being the responsibility of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food.

Four sets of premises in the Borough are registered as Dairies. Routine inspection of these premises proved them to be satisfactorily maintained.

Five Dealers' Licences for the sale of Tuberculin Tested Milk and two for the sale of Pasteurised Milk were issued during the year.

MEAT AND OTHER FOODS

There are no Private Slaughterhouses in the Borough and all slaughtering is carried out at the Authority's Abattoir. A 100% inspection service of meat carcases is maintained by the Council's Inspectors.

The disposal of condemned meat and offals is under the control of the Local Authority. All such meat is dyed and is sold to a reputable firm of processors who have given an undertaking as to appropriate ultimate disposal.

MEAT AND OTHER FOODS (continued....)

Under Section 14 of the Food and Drugs Act, 16 premises are registered for the preparation and manufacture of sausages, or potted, pressed, pickled or preserved meat foods intended for sale. Fifty-five premises are also registered for the sale of Ice Cream.

Seven hawkers of food and their premises are registered under Section 14 of the Lancashire County Council (General Powers) Act, 1951.

Byelaws made under Section 15 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938, in respect of the Handling, Wrapping and Delivery of Food for Sale, and the Sale of Food in the Open Air, are in force in the Borough, and copies are supplied to the occupiers of food shops and stalls.

Notices requesting customers not to bring dogs into food shops are still displayed in a large majority of these premises, and are generally appreciated by the traders and customers alike.

Routine inspections, and special inspections as called for, are carried out in respect of food shops and stalls, and food preparing premises generally.
