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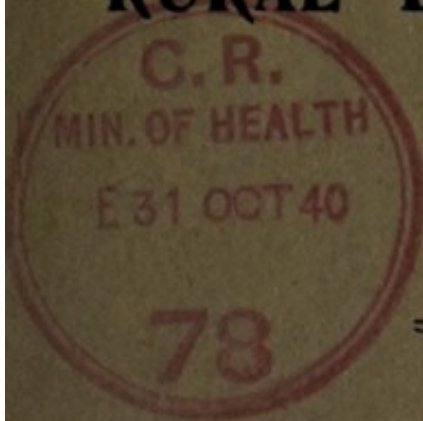
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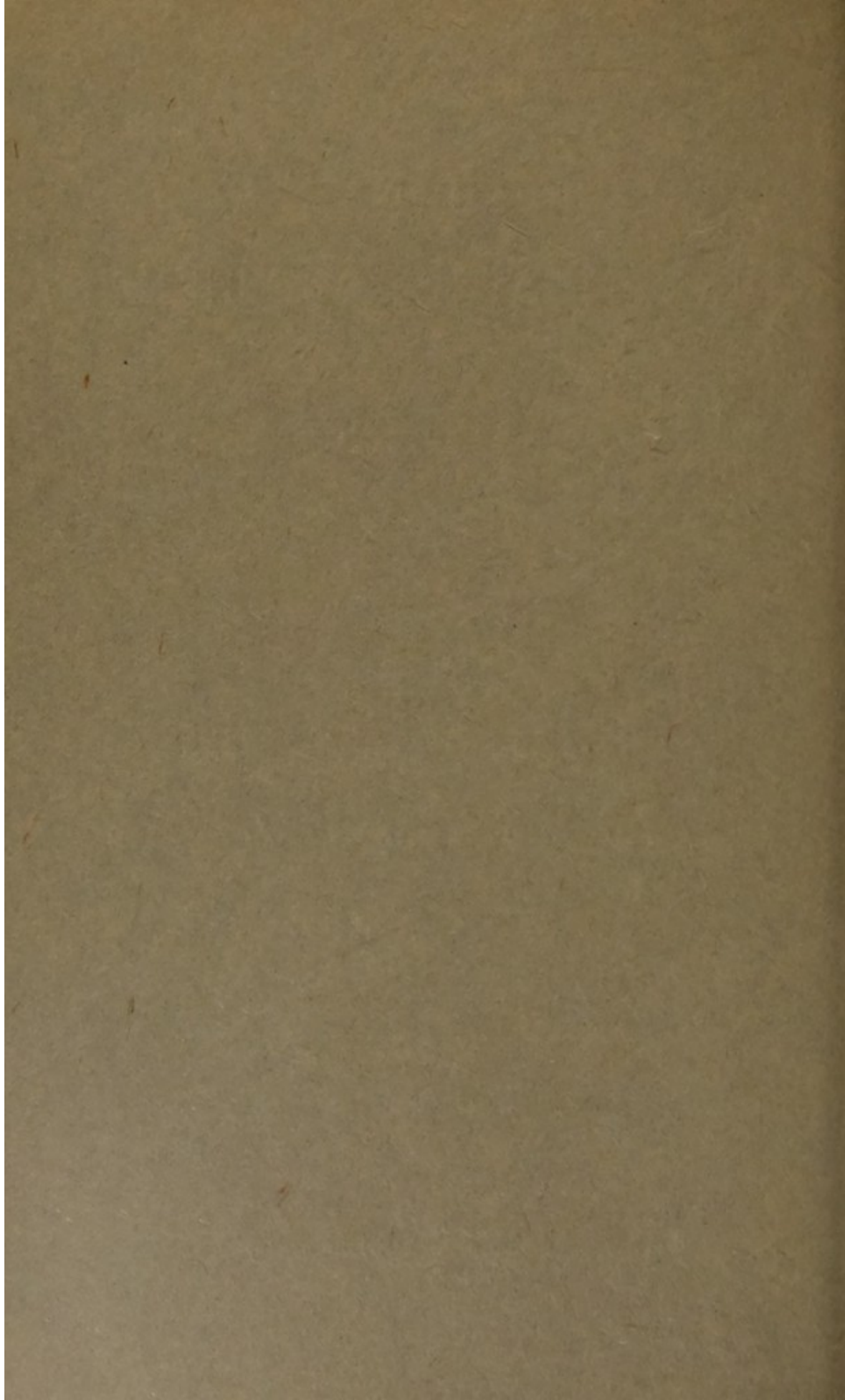

PREFACE.

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE
CLOWN RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL.

I beg to present my 10th Annual Report, which has been arranged in accordance with Article 14 (3) of the Sanitary Officers Order, 1926, on the Public Health of the District.

The outbreak of War in September seriously dislocated the Public Health Services and work in connection with A.R.P., and Evacuation had to take precedence. Fortunately the Slum Clearance plans had been practically completed and also the modernization of the main Sewage Works, but it is regrettable that the conversion schemes had to be stopped.

I take this opportunity of thanking the Members of the Council for their support, and also Mr. Gallagher and Mr. Turner for their energetic work during a period of exceptional stress.

The health of the district during 1939 has been remarkably good. The Infantile death-rate of 27.9 is the lowest ever recorded in Clowne. In 1933 this was as low as 29, but of recent years it has been usually in the vicinity of 40.

From the table it will be noted that the Infantile death-rate for England and Wales is 50.

The Crude death-rate of 10.3 has remained fairly constant during the last ten years, but the Birth-rate has been gradually falling in this district. In 1930 it was 19.06, and this year it is 16.2.

Ambulance Facilities.

The ambulance services provided are adequate for the needs of the district and the following are available :—

(a) For Infectious Cases :—

Ambulances are provided by the North-east Derbyshire Isolation Hospitals.

(b) For Non-infectious cases :—

For non-infectious and accident cases the Bolsover Colliery Co. have an Ambulance at Creswell, which can be used for any of the villages in the Clown Rural District by the payment of a small fee. The Shire-oaks Colliery Co. have also an ambulance at Whitwell which can be used if necessary without cost ; and there is also a Red Cross Ambulance available at Gilbert's Garage, Creswell. (Telephone, Creswell 214.)

(c) For Maternity Cases :—

The above ambulances for non-infectious cases are also used for maternity patients.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

No action has been taken by the County Council in pursuance of Section 57 of the Local Government Act, 1929, or Section 307 or 320 of the Public Health Act, 1936.

Water.

The Manton Colliery water which supplies this area continues to give satisfaction, the supply is abundant and the quality is good.

Samples for bacteriological examination have been taken regularly, with satisfactory results.

The total hardness of the water is 18.2 degrees of which 8.4 is temporary and 9.8 permanent.

The following main has been extended :—

100 yards 2in. cast iron main at Boughton Lane, Clowne.

Drainage and Sewerage.

The Whitwell Sewage Works have been modernised, the work being completed during August.

Public Cleansing.

During the year the freighters have covered a distance of 22,898 miles in the execution of their duties in connection with the scavenging of the District and removed 2,105 loads of refuse.

Shops and Offices.

312 visits were paid to shops and offices by the Sanitary Inspector and his staff. No action was taken under the provisions of the Shops Act, 1934, and the Public Health Act, 1936.

Camping Sites.

No licences have been issued by this Council under Sec. 269 of the Public Health Act, 1936, and no sites have been used for camping purposes during 1939.

Smoke Abatement.

No action has been taken under this heading and there has been no need for any co-operative action with industry.

The slum clearance plans of the Council have been practically completed, although there are still some houses in the parish of Clown which need extensive repairs to bring them up to a proper standard, notably in the vicinity of John Street, and also West Lea Cottages off Boughton Lane.

Owing to the war and the difficulty of getting material, it is not easy to have repairs carried out as no landlord is allowed to spend more than £5 in material.

Milk Supply.

There have been no complaints with regard to the wholesomeness of the milk produced within or brought into the district.

There are 74 cowsheds, dairies and milkshops, and 137 visits were paid by the Sanitary Inspector and his staff.

Meat Supply.

There are 33 Slaughterhouses in the area, and 1,881 visits were paid to Slaughter-houses and Butcher's shops.

PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

Scarlet Fever.

24 notifications were received.

From the table it will be noted that the disease was most prevalent at Creswell. There were no deaths. 19 cases were removed to hospital.

Diphtheria.

All the 20 cases notified were removed to hospital.

No Clinics for Schick testing and immunization have been started in the district.

Antitoxin is supplied free to the Medical Practitioners, and in all cases it is given promptly.

Encephalitis Lethargica.

In May one notification of this disease was received from Creswell.

Typhoid Fever.

One case of para-typhoid B. was received from the Sheffield Royal Hospital. The man, who lived at Whitwell, made a good recovery.

Cerebral Spinal Fever.

One notification was received from Spink Hill, and the patient admitted into the Sheffield Royal Hospital. No further cases developed.

Pneumonia.

19 cases were notified. Facilities for the typing of pneumococci and for provision of appropriate type sera are available at the County Laboratory, Derby.

Measles.

Only one notification was received as this disease was not made notifiable until towards the end of the year. No action has been taken in regard to the use of measles serum for prophylaxis or attenuation.

Whooping Cough.

This disease also was only made notifiable towards the end of the year. Only one notification was received

Tuberculosis.
