

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### Cockermouth Urban District Council

To the Chairman and Members of the Cockermouth Urban District Council.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit my tenth Annual Report as Medical Officer of Health to the Cockermouth Urban District Council.

The number of births and deaths remain at average levels for the past few years.

It is gratifying that once again there have been no deaths amongst infants under 1 year of age, no maternal deaths due to pregnancy and childbirth, and only one still-birth.

Four of the deaths were of people under the age of 45 years, one due to cancer of the breast, one to cancer of the intestine and two (both under 35 years of age) resulting from accidents whilst riding motor cycles.

Although only ten cases of bacilliary dysentery were notified it is felt that this is only a fraction of the actual number of cases occurring in the district. Strict adherence to the rules of personal hygiene, especially amongst food handlers is essential if this and other allied illnesses are to be kept under control.

The second part of this report has been prepared by Mr. Pattison, and shows the work undertaken and efficiently carried out by his department during the year.

I would record my appreciation of the co-operation and help which I have received from him at all times and would express my thanks for the help given me by the Clerk and his staff and the continued kindness and helpfulness of the members of the Council.

### POPULATION.

The population figure of 5,950 is given for the year 1963 by the Registrar General and called by him the "Home Population". On this figure the birth and death rates and the incidence of notifiable diseases are based.

The population figure for 1962 was 5,900.

### CHIEF OCCUPATIONS OF THE INHABITANTS.

Cockermouth is an old market town (its Royal Charter having been granted in the year 1221). For many years Saw-Mills, Building Contractors, a Brewery and the Railway have employed a considerable number of persons (mainly male) and since 1939 five new works of employment were commenced; one of these, a Blood Manure factory, has ceased; the other four are made up of a Shoe and Slipper factory, a Clothing factory, a light Engineerings works and a Precast Concrete works, employing altogether over 1,100 persons including a large number of female labour, particularly at the two first-named which also have workers from outside the Urban area. There are as well, of course, those individuals absorbed by the usual businesses and trades of a small country town. A few find employment about the large cattle Mart, whilst a few are engaged in agriculture, and in coal mines, quarries and steelworks outside the district.

### STATISTICS.

The Tables of vital statistics are set out below showing birth rates, and rates for maternal and infantile mortality.

Crude birth and death rates are corrected by means of an Area Comparability Factor supplied each year by the Registrar General. They allow for varying age and sex distribution of the population in different areas and enable comparisons to be made with figures for other areas.

This year the factor for births is 1.0 and for deaths 1.09.

The total live births was 92. This gives a birth rate of 15.5 per thousand of the population (15.5 corrected), compared with 115 (19.5 per thousand of the population, 19.3 corrected) in 1962.

There was one still birth during the year, but no deaths amongst infants under one year of age.

The number of deaths at all ages was 70, giving a death rate of 11.7 (12.7 corrected) per thousand of population compared with 12.6 (13.2 corrected) for 1962.

There were no maternal deaths during the year, nor any deaths from tuberculosis.

Cancer deaths at 9 remained at much the same level, only one being due to cancer of the lung, and none due to leukaemia.

Approximately one death in eight was due to Cancer.

### INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

The total number of cases of Infectious Disease notified in 1963 was 203. Excluding Measles and Whooping Cough the number was 16.

There were no notifications of deaths from Diphtheria, Poliomyelitis, Typhoid or Puerperal Pyrexia.

There were 10 notifications of Dysentery. This is a welcome decrease in the number of cases of Dysentery compared with previous years.

There were no deaths from Tuberculosis, but 3 new Pulmonary cases were notified.

Statistics relating to smallpox vaccination complications have shown that the safest age at which to perform this process is around two years. Consequently there will be a time lag when figures are small, until the relevant age groups involved reach 18 months to 2 years.

### DIPHTHERIA.

The figures in the table show the number of diphtheria immunisations performed during the year, both primary courses and booster doses.

In all, 138 children completed a primary course and 115 had booster

doses.

The number of children adequately protected against this disease (i.e. have had a primary course or been boosted in the last 5 years) is now 1,991.

The majority of these primary injections also include immunisation against whooping cough in the pre-five year olds, and against tetanus at all ages.

### POLIOMYELITIS.

The figures show those having had two injections of Salk vaccine, those having completed a course of three, and a selected age group of all children thought to be at special risk between the ages of 6 and 12 years.

### B.C.G. TUBERCULOSIS.

Mantoux skin testing and B.C.G. vaccination was continued in 1963, the age group being those born in 1949.

The table gives detailed figures.

Of 169 children attending schools in Cockermouth who were tested, 61 proved to be positive reactors. Nineteen of these children had previously had B.C.G. vaccination at the Chest Clinic which explains their reaction to the test.

This percentage of positive reactors, approximately 30 per cent., is, however, higher than the average for the county as a whole, and higher than the figure for 1962.

To the Chairman and Members of the COCKERMOUTH URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in submitting my sixth Annual Report to the Council, for the year 1963.

Time does not permit a lengthy or greatly detailed account of the activities of the year but much important work has been done in the spheres of housing, street lighting and road works, apart from normal day to day matters.

Finally I express my appreciation of the ready co-operation and encouragement given to me at all times by Dr. Patterson, the Clerk and his Staff, and the valuable assistance rendered by my part-time clerical assistant, Mrs. K. Nairn, and the Works Foreman, Mr. C. Wilson.

### WATER SUPPLY

The method of obtaining water by bulk supply from the trunk main from Crummock continued as before, the water undertaking being the property of the West Cumberland Water Board. The total amount abstracted during the year into the Moor reservoir was 108,650,000 gallons, equivalent to an average daily consumption per head of 50 gallons. This figure includes trade supplies which account for approximately 10% of the consumption. Treatment of the lake water continued as set out in the 1955 report. The Water Board continued sampling for bacteriological analysis and received consistently good reports from the Cumberland Pathological Laboratory. The amount supplied to the high level areas of the town via the Sunscales reservoir averaged 112,000 gallons per day, which was 38% of the total consumption.

Only 3 properties in the area have private water supplies.

### DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

The sewage disposal works continued to function satisfactorily Rebuilding and redraining of the sludge drying beds is being carried out.

With the exception of 41 houses, which have private sewage disposal works, all properties in the district are connected to public sewers.

### REFUSE REMOVAL

There is a weekly collection of refuse in all parts of the town. Trade refuse is also collected. Refuse is disposed of by controlled tipping at the Lorton Road refuse tip where, despite a shortage of covering materials at times, the refuse has been mostly kept covered.

OFFENSIVE TRADES.

The firm of fellmongers continued to trade in the Urban area. The premises were found to be clean and well maintained during each of the 12 inspections made.

### SLAUGHTERHOUSES.

There was only one licensed slaughterhouse in the district, used solely for pigs, until the 1st November when a public abattoir was completed and put into operation by Mitchell's Auction Company Limited.

The abattoir was constructed in an existing building and the Architect, J. A. Large, Esq., A.R.I.B.A., worked in close cooperation with me during the whole of the planning and construction phases. The accommodation machinery and equipment is all of modern design.

The New Abattoir is situated on Lorton Street conveniently placed in close proximity to the existing Auction Mart Premises of

the Company.

The general accommodation comprises two large off loading bays for the delivery of animals, Lairage, Slaughterhall, Cooling and Hanging Hall, Suspect Holding Bay, Hide and Skin Room, Gut Room, Mess Room, Wash Room with W.C., shower and changing facilities, Office, and two separate out loading bays, one for fresh meat and one for hides, skins and waste products.

The present Hanging and Cooling Hall will at this stage accommodate thirty three cattle units but the building has been planned so that a further twenty seven units could be accommodated at a later date. Provision has also been made at this stage for the future installation of a pig dehairing machine and a refrigerated

Cold Room of approximately 1500 cu. feet capacity.

121 Visits were made to the Slaughterhouses for meat inspection purposes.

### HOUSING.

No house was completed during the year by the Council and 39 were erected by private owners. The building of 24 flats at Croft-side and 11 houses and 12 flats at St. Helen's Street, was almost completed by the Council at the end of the year.

During the past 19 years 415 Council and 267 private houses have been built in the district.

A great deal of work was done to increase slum clearance and further to the representations of unfitness which were made in regard to 25 houses in Sullart Street, resulting in 3 Clearance Areas being declared in respect of which 3 Clearance Orders were made, after a Public Enquiry the Orders were confirmed by the Minister.

In addition, a further 6 representations were made in respect of individual unfit houses, resulting in the Council deciding to make 6 Closing Orders.

Two buildings were converted into two flats and one dwelling-house during the year.
