General remarks. The cleanliness of vessels entering the port has reached a satisfactory level even though some of the older vessels leave much to be desired in standards for sanitary and washing accommodation particularly in barge traffic. Most of the defects consist of minor faults in sanitary accommodation and in cooking facilities. No evidence of heavy rat infestation was encountered during the year. A small number of foreign vessels entered the port with recently expired Rat Certificates or ones which expire during their stay in the port. These ships were inspected for evidence of rat infestation and then directed to an authorised port for the issue of a formal exemption certificate.

A number of water samples were submitted for examination in connection with the fitting out of an Admiralty vessel.
