Report for the Year 1910.

VITAL STATISTICS.

POPULATION.

As the results of the 1911 Census have not yet been published, we are unable to state the correct population of the County, and have, therefore, been obliged still to use that given in the Committee's Annual Reports for the last 6 years as the basis on which to prepare the Statistical Tables, viz.:

For the Rural Districts	186,376

For the County as a whole	322,705

Only in a few instances have the Medical Officers of Health ventured on an estimated population of their respective districts—the majority deeming it the wiser plan to wait for the Registrar General's authoritative figures.

BIRTHS.

In common with the rest of the country the condition of Cornwall's birth-rate is less favourable than in 1909. But the decline is not so pronounced as it is in the National rate. Compared with the average in the ten years 1900-1909, the birth-rate in 1910, showed a decrease of 1·7 per thousand,—the National decrease was 2·7 per thousand.

During 1910 6,753 births were registered, of which 3,449 were males and 3,304 females, giving a birth-rate of 20·92 per thousand, against 6,919 and 21·44 respectively for the previous year. The average rate for the last five years is 21·58. The previous five years' average was 21·79. It will thus be seen that the “down grade” has not been arrested, and the condition of the birth-rate remains unsatisfactory. Table I shows that in the Rural Districts 3,805 births were registered, of which 1,930 were males and 1,875 females, equal to a Rural birth-rate of 20·41 per thousand, and in the Urban 2,948, of which 1,519 were males and 1,429 females, equal to an Urban birth-rate of 21·62 per thousand.

The birth-rate in England and Wales in 1910 was 24·8 per thousand of the population, which the Registrar General says is 0·8 per thousand below the rate in 1909, and lower than the rate in any other year on record.

The rate for 77 Great Towns was 25, being 0·7 below last year's rate.

DEATHS.

Deaths registered from all causes during the year numbered 4,621, of which 2,301 were males and 2,321 females, giving a general death-rate of 14·31 per 1,000, against 4,763 and 14·75 respectively for the previous year—a fractional decline of 0·44. Compared with the average rate in the ten years 1900-1909, the death-rate in 1910 showed a decrease of 1·00 per thousand. The average death-rate for the last five years is 14·69. The previous five years' average was 14·98. The rate is thus 0·29 within the five years' average, and 1·00 below the ten years' average.

The Rural Districts contributed 2,452 to the total deaths—1,216 males and 1,236 females, giving a Rural death-rate of 13·15 per 1,000; and the Urban Districts 2,169—1,085 males and 1,084 females, giving an Urban death-rate of 15·91 per thousand. Table 7 shows that, with the exception of the birth-rate, all the various rates were in favour of the Rural districts. Similar conditions have obtained for the last five years.

The death-rate in England and Wales in 1910 was 13·4 per thousand, which the Registrar General says was 1·1 per thousand below the rate in 1909 and lower than the rate in any other year on record. The rate in 77 Great Towns was 14·3 per thousand. Cornwall's rate of 14·31 this year is nearly a point higher than the National rate—a rather exceptional circumstance, but one which singularly enough happened in 1905 and to a lesser degree, the County rate being ·7 in excess of the rate for England and Wales.

AGE AND RELATION TO DEATHS.

Table 2 shows that of the 4,621 deaths, 577 occurred under one year of age (against 669 last year); 199 between one and five years (34 less than last year); 156 between five and fifteen years (23 more than last year); 197 between fifteen and twenty-five years (31 less than last year); 1,443 between twenty-five and sixty-five years (56 less than last year); and 2,049 amongst persons of sixty-five and upwards (13 more than last year). The Table also shows how these deaths were distributed among the Rural and Urban districts.

By eliminating the deaths under five and sixty-five years and over, the mortality among the active portion of the County's population is arrived at. It will be seen that these were 1,796 (61 less than last year), giving as it were, a death-rate of 5·56 per thousand. Similarly, the mortality rate of the 776 deaths under five years (126 less than last year), would be 2·40 per thousand, and in like manner that of the 2,049 deaths of aged persons (13 more than last year) would be 6·34.

ZYMOTIC DEATHS.

It is very gratifying to have to record another great improvement in the condition of the zymotic death-rate. For the last four years the rate has been declining. This year's decrease is very marked and is no less than 0·148 below last

year, *i.e.*, 27 per cent. better. Diseases taken as zymotics for statistical purposes are the following:—Small-pox, Measles, Scarlet Fever, Whooping Cough, Diphtheria and Membranous Croup, Typhus Fever, Enteric or Typhoid Fever, Continued Fever, Cholera, and Diarrhœa and Dysentery, and the zymotic death-rate is calculated upon the number of deaths occurring from these diseases. Table 3 shows that there were 127 deaths during 1910, giving a zymotic death-rate of 0·393 per thousand, against 175 and 0·541 respectively for 1909, 187 and 0·579 respectively for 1908, and 223 and 0·691 respectively for 1907. The zymotic deaths included Measles, 18 (against 32 in 1909); Scarlet Fever, 8 (against 9 in 1909); Whooping Cough, 23 (against 44 in 1909); Diphtheria and Membranous Croup, 39 (against 26 in 1909); Enteric or Typhoid Fever, 8 (against 13 in 1909); Continued Fever, 1; and Diarrhœa, 30 (against 51 in 1909). There were no deaths from Small-pox, Typhus Fever nor Cholera.

Once more we would revert to the striking fact borne out by this Table (3) that compulsory notification tends to the lowering of the mortality rate of Infectious diseases, for it shows that out of the 127 zymotic deaths, 71, that is 55·90 per cent. were due to the three zymotic diseases, *viz.*:—Measles, Whooping Cough and Diarrhœa, which are not notifiable. The percentages for the last three years were 74·88, 71 and 72·57 respectively.

The zymotic death-rate for England and Wales in 1910 was 0·99 per thousand, and for 77 Great Towns 1·23. Cornwall's rate of 0·393 is again very much lower than the rest of the Country.

INFANTILE MORTALITY.

The condition of the Infantile death-rate still improves,—a very pleasing thing to record. There were 577 deaths under 1 year (inclusive of 133 premature births) against 669 in 1909, and 748 in 1908, giving a percentage of 12·46 of the total deaths, a death-rate of 1·78 per thousand of the County's population, and the proportion of 85·44 per thousand births. This proportion is 11·25 lower than last year. The death-rate and percentage are again each lower.

The relative proportions of the Rural and Urban Districts are as follows: *Rural*—303 deaths (inclusive of 74 premature deaths), giving a death-rate of 1·62 per thousand of its population, 12·35 per cent. of its deaths, and 79·63 per thousand births. *Urban*—274 deaths (inclusive of 59 premature deaths), giving a death-rate of 1·78 per thousand of its population, 12·63 per cent. of its population, and 92·94 per thousand births.

The last five years' average proportion per thousand births is 96·18. This year's Infant Mortality figure shews therefore a decided improvement, especially seeing that the previous five years' average was 102·67. As we remarked in our last Annual Report, undoubtedly the various educational and beneficent agencies now in operation, including Nursing Associations, the Midwives Act, and the issuing of pamphlets to poorer mothers on the proper rearing of children are bearing fruit.

The Infantile death-rate in England and Wales in 1910 was 106 per thousand births (three below the previous year), and for 77 Great Towns, 115.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

There is a break this year in the decline in the notifiable Infectious disease rate of the last three years. The prevalence of Diphtheria is entirely responsible for this. During 1910, 1,157 cases were notified or ascertained—an increase of 170 cases. Table 6 shows the number of new cases of Infectious sickness coming to the knowledge of the Medical Officers of Health during the year. There were again no cases of Cholera, Typhus Fever, and Relapsing Fever reported for the year. In the Rural districts there were notified or ascertained one case of Small-pox (imported from Italy); 218 cases of Diphtheria (89 more than last year); 81 cases of Erysipelas; 286 cases of Scarlet Fever (90 less than last year); 23 cases of Enteric or Typhoid Fever (18 less than last year); 2 cases of Continued Fever; and 8 cases of Puerperal Fever (same number as last year); making a total of 619 cases, against 624 in 1909, giving a disease rate of 3·28 per 1,000 against 3·34 last year. In the Urban districts 538 cases were reported, equal to a disease rate of 3·94 per thousand, against 363 and 2·44 respectively for last year, and included 172 cases of Diphtheria (107 more than last year); 143 cases of Erysipelas (71 more than last year); 269 cases of Scarlet Fever (90 more than last year); 29 cases of Enteric or Typhoid Fever (19 less than last year); 1 case of Continued Fever; and 8 cases of Puerperal Fever. The number of cases for the whole County was therefore as above stated, 1,157, giving a disease rate of 3·58 per 1,000, against 987 and 3·05 respectively for the previous year. 135 of the cases were under five years and 1,022 above. The five years' average of the disease rate is 4·16. The previous five years' average was 4·26.

MEASLES AND WHOOPING COUGH.

The fatalities from Measles during the year numbered 18, against 32 in 1909, and 3 in 1908; and from Whooping Cough, 23, against 44 in 1909, and 88 in 1908. 4 of the 18 deaths from Measles occurred in the Rural districts, as did also 16 of the 23 deaths from Whooping Cough. The advantage in regard to Measles this year is with the Rural districts, a reversal of the conditions obtaining last year; but in regard to Whooping Cough the Urban districts had the advantage. As these diseases are not notifiable, the number of the cases cannot be stated, and for the same reason the ratio of percentage of deaths cannot be given.

The mortality rates for the whole country are:—Measles, 0·05 per thousand against 0·09 last year; Whooping Cough, 0·07 against 0·13 last year.

For England and Wales the death-rates from Measles and Whooping Cough are respectively 0·23 and 0·24 per thousand; and for 77 Great Towns, 0·31 and 0·29. As usual Cornwall's rates are greatly lower than the National rates in regard to these infantile diseases.

DIARRHŒA.

Diarrhœal diseases were responsible for 30 deaths, giving a death-rate of 0·09 per thousand, against 51 and 0·15 respectively for last year. Two-thirds of the deaths occurred in the Urban districts. Table 5 shows that 8 of the deaths, or 93·3 per cent. of the total number, were under 5 years of age. This percentage is five higher than last year, and 20 higher than in 1908. The hope we expressed in our last Annual Report that through the operation of the educational and other causes,

referred to under the head of Infantile mortality, a reduction of this excessively high percentage would soon be brought about, has not as yet been realised.

In England and Wales in 1910 the Diarrhœal death-rate was 0·29 per thousand, practically the same as in the previous year; and for 77 Great Towns, 0·38, same as last year. It will thus be seen that whilst the National has been stationary, Cornwall's rate has declined 70 per cent.

SCARLET FEVER.

Scarlet Fever was responsible for 8 deaths, against 9 the previous year and 15 in 1908, giving a death-rate of 0·02 per thousand. The number of cases notified, singularly enough, was the same as last year, viz. :—555. The percentage of deaths to attacks was 1·44, against 1·62 in 1909. In the Rural districts there were 3 deaths and 286 cases, which give a death-rate of 0·01 per thousand of the Rural population, and a ratio of 1·04 per cent. of the cases notified; and in the Urban districts there were 5 deaths and 269 cases, which give a death-rate of 0·03 per thousand of the Urban population, and a ratio of 1·84 per cent. of deaths to attacks. It will thus be seen that Scarlet Fever was more fatal and more virulent in the Urban districts than in the Rural—a reversal of the conditions obtaining last year.

For England and Wales the death-rate from Scarlet Fever in 1910 was 0·06 per thousand; and for 77 Great Towns, 0·08. Cornwall's rate of 0·02 again compares very favourably with that of the Country generally.

DIPHTHERIA AND MEMBRANOUS CROUP.

There were 39 deaths from these combined diseases during the year, against 26 in 1909, and 28 in 1908, giving a death-rate of 0·12 per thousand, and a ratio of 10 per cent. of the cases notified. The death-rate is 0·04 higher than last year, but the ratio is better by 3·40 per cent., which is indicative of the milder type of the diseases. The Rural districts contributed 218 cases and 22 deaths, giving a Rural death-rate of 0·11 per thousand, and a Rural ratio of 10·09 per cent.; and the Urban district's contribution was 172 cases and 17 deaths, giving an Urban death-rate of 0·12 per thousand, and an Urban ratio of 9·88 per cent. It will be noticed by these figures that practically these diseases were equally divided between the two divisions of the county. Last year the advantage was in favour of the Urban portion.

The Diphtheritic death rate for England and Wales last year was 0·12 per thousand; and a similar rate for 77 Great Towns. Cornwall's rate (0·12), which is generally below the National one, this year, is identical with it.

ENTERIC OR TYPHOID FEVER.

Only 8 deaths were caused by Enteric Fever during the year, giving a death rate of 0·02 per thousand of the County's population, against 13 and 0·04 respectively last year. The percentage of deaths to cases was 15·38. The death rate, it will be seen, is considerably better than 1909; but the ratio has not varied much—it was then 15·11. There was one death under 5 years of age. 4 deaths occurred in the Rural districts and 23 cases notified, giving a Rural death rate of 0·02 per thousand and a percentage of 17·39 deaths to attacks. The Urban districts contribution was 4 deaths, and 29 cases, giving an Urban death rate of also 0·02 per

thousand, and a ratio of 13.79 per cent. of deaths to attacks. This year the death-rate is the same in the two divisions of the County; but the ratio is in favour of the Urban portion.

For England and Wales the death rate for Enteric Fever last year was 0.05 per thousand, and the same rate for 77 Great Towns. Cornwall's rate of 0.02 is therefore 60 per cent. better than for the rest of the country.

SMALL-POX.

It is a matter for congratulation that the County still keeps free from this terrible and loathsome disease. But as in 1909 so last year one case was reported. It occurred in the last week in December in Liskeard Rural district. The M.O.H., in his Annual Report says:—"The patient had come back straight from Italy, landing at Plymouth and sleeping the night there. The next day he came by train to Liskeard, and proceeded in a hired conveyance to his home, some seven or eight miles distant. The next day he felt very ill, and the day following the characteristic symptoms appeared. The case was a severe one, but the patient has happily recovered and is able to resume his work. All the inmates of the house were at once vaccinated, and a considerable number of those residing in the immediate neighbourhood sought protection in like manner. Fortunately the house in which the patient was located was more or less isolated, and it is a matter for great congratulation that the disease did not spread."

With respect to Small-pox and its natural corollaries, vaccination and isolation provision, we cannot do better than to repeat what we said in our last Annual Report:—"In regard to precautions against this terrible disease the Sanitary Authorities, with but few exceptions, appear to be waiting for epidemics to break out before taking action in the matter of Isolation provision. Adherence to the principles of a false economy sometimes leads to costly expenditure, and in this matter of want of Isolation provision, subsequent events may prove it to be wrong, both economically and to the general health. The Medical Officers of Health, in their Annual Reports, lay great stress on the fact that the Vaccination Act, by recent legislation, is really permissive in its character, and is virtually a dead letter. Consequently a large proportion of the population is now rising up without vaccination; and, in their opinion, vaccination is the best safeguard against Small-pox."

INFLUENZA.

The deaths assignable to Influenza during the year numbered 53, giving a death-rate of 0.16 per thousand, against 38 and 0.11 respectively for the previous year, and 49 and 0.15 respectively for 1908. Although there is an increase of 15 deaths, the disease does not appear to have assumed epidemic form in any particular district. And the deaths were spread over the whole year. The returns again show that Influenza was more fatal in the Rural districts than in the Urban—an inexplicable condition that has existed for the last five years. The Rural districts contributed 38 deaths, equal to a death rate of 0.20 per thousand of the Rural population, against 26 and 0.13 respectively last year; and the Urban districts contribution was 15 deaths, equal to death-rate of 0.11 per thousand of the Urban population, against 12 and 0.08 respectively last year.

CANCER.

It is with much gratification that we are able to report a decided improvement under the head of Cancer. Since 1903 this baffling disease has been increasing, with the exception of 1907, when there was a welcome break in the upward tendency. But this year the deaths have considerably lessened in number.

During the year 353 deaths occurred, being 27 less than in the previous year. The highest number of deaths occurred in the Rural districts as it generally does, but its death-rate is lower than the Urban's, by reason of the former's greater population. Tables 3 and 4 show that the distribution and rates were:—

Rural ...	191 deaths; death-rate 1·02 per thousand.
Urban ...	162 deaths; death-rate 1·18 per thousand.
County ...	353 deaths; death-rate 1·09 per thousand.

PHTHISIS.

There were 405 deaths due to Pulmonary Tuberculosis, giving a death-rate of 1·23 per thousand of the County's population, and a percentage of 8·76 of the total deaths, against 404, 1·23 and 8·42 respectively in 1909. The death-rate is, therefore, practically the same as last year; but the percentage is 0·34 higher. Deaths from other forms of the disease also have not varied much from last year—the number being 118 against 114. The sexes and age periods of these deaths cannot be given, as only in a few instances is this information supplied. The average death-rate from Phthisis for the last five years is 1·29 per thousand, and from other forms of Tuberculosis, 0·33. The previous five years' averages were respectively 1·32 and 0·34. In the Rural districts 191 deaths were registered, equal to a death-rate of 1·02 per thousand of the Rural population, and 7·79 per cent. of its total deaths; and in the Urban districts 214 deaths occurred, equal to a death-rate of 1·56 per thousand of the Urban population, and 9·91 per cent. of its total deaths. The figures again demonstrate the advantage of Rural life over Urban life in regard to Tuberculosis diseases. In support of the National crusade against the "White Scourge," two Tuberculosis Exhibitions, inaugurated by the County Sanitary Committee, and under the auspices of the County Council, were held in October, one at Truro and the other at Bodmin. Lectures on the subject of the Prevention of Consumption were given by various District M.O.H.'s. The attendance at each place was very gratifying, and the lectures were of great educational value. It is hoped and believed that much good will result therefrom.

ACCIDENTS AND SUICIDES.

During the year the number of deaths reported as due to violence was 144—123 from Accidents and 21 from Suicides, against 130 and 32 respectively for the previous year. 67 of the Accidents and 11 Suicides occurred in the Rural districts, and 56 Accidents and 10 Suicides in the Urban districts. The death-rate equals 0·44 per thousand, and the percentage to the total deaths is—for the whole County 3·11; for the Rural districts 3·58; and for the Urban 3·04.

METEOROLOGY.

RAINFALL.—1910 was a very wet year—the mean total rainfall being 46·48 inches, 11·83 inches more than fell in the previous year. The average of the 5 years ending December 31st was 38·49 inches. The previous 5 years' average was 35·98 inches. The total rainfall at Greenwich was 28·06 inches. The highest rainfall was at Liskeard (59·44), and the lowest at Tintagel (35·96 inches). The wettest month was December (7·58 inches), and the driest was March (0·98 inch).

TEMPERATURE.—The mean temperature for the whole County was 51·17 degrees, against 50·27 degrees for 1909. The mean temperature at Greenwich was 49·7 degrees, against 48·6 degrees in 1909. By Table 13 it will be seen that Cornwall's mean temperature for the Winter months was 45·35 degrees, against 43·63 degrees for 1909, and 45·23 degrees for 1908; and for the Summer months 56·98 degrees, against 56·92 for 1909, and 57·90 for 1908. The highest mean temperature occurred in August (60·75 degrees), and the lowest in January (43·59 degrees). The mean daily range of temperature was 10·70 degrees, and ranged from 13·08 degrees in May to 7·59 degrees in December. The highest mean temperature for the year was at the Lizard Lights Station (53·74 degrees), and the lowest at Launceston (49·12 degrees).

HUMIDITY.—The relative humidity of the air was 82 per cent., against 81 for 1909, and also for 1908 and 1907, and ranged from 87 in February to 76 in May.

SUNSHINE.—The total hours of bright sunshine recorded at six stations numbered 10,055, giving an average of 1,676 hours to each station. The previous year's total (from seven stations) was 13,588, and average 1,941. The highest recorded was at Bosahan (1,747), and the lowest at Falmouth (1,486). Fowey's total of 943 hours is only for 7 months (June to December).

This is the last Annual Report the County Sanitary Committee will be directly responsible for. Under the new era just now begun this work will devolve on the County Medical Officer (Dr. Robert Burnet). We confidently hope and believe that the new *régime* will be resultive of a vastly improved sanitary condition, and consequent reduction in the general death-rate, the zymotic death-rate, and the Infectious disease-rate.

REMARKS.—Whooping Cough, Influenza, Gastritis, and Diseases and Accidents of Parturition were more fatal in the Rural districts than in the Urban; but the former had the advantage over the latter as regards Measles, Scarlet Fever, Diphtheria, Diarrhoea, Enteritis, Puerperal Fever, Phthisis, Premature Births, Accidents and Suicides.

The Table also shows that 21 per cent. of the total deaths were caused by Phthisis (Consumption) and its allied diseases, Bronchitis and Pleurisy—the same percentage as in the last two years.
