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

To the Chairman and Members of the Cornwall County Council.

My Lord, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report on the Health of the County of Cornwall during the year 1940.

The Report has, of necessity, to be very condensed and on some matters uninformative; it is, in fact, largely a continuation of statistical tables which by maintaining continuity of information will be useful in the future in showing the trends and tendencies of health matters in the County during the war.

The middle of the year 1940 saw the arrival in the County of very large numbers of persons evacuated owing to the commencement of heavy air raids. Mass movements of population always carry with them a risk of epidemic diseases for which there was inadequate provision in this County. The Truro Public Assistance Institution was therefore quickly converted into an improvised Isolation Hospital providing, in the first instance, accommodation for 50 patients, but later for more than double that number of patients in main wards and side wards. The advantages of centralisation of Isolation Hospital accommodation immediately became apparent and steps were taken to carry forward into the future the centralised provision of Isolation accommodation created originally to meet a temporary emergency.

The Emergency Maternity Homes at Hayle and Bodmin converted on the outbreak of war began to come into full occupation during the year 1940 and it was found necessary to establish in connection with each, an ante-natal hostel to which patients could go a week beforehand in anticipation of their confinement. The problem of looking after the infants of evacuees admitted to the Emergency Maternity Homes also proved difficult and was solved by the conversion of one of the Convalescent Homes at Perranporth associated with the Royal Cornwall Infirmary into a Short-Stay Residential Nursery.

During the year the Livestock (Restriction of Slaughtering) Order 1940, came into operation, thus limiting the number of slaughter houses at which slaughtering was performed. The arrangements made under the Order at the commencement were the subject of severe criticism; the difficulties of a sudden change of system were immense but were gradually overcome. The improved facilities for inspecting all the meat slaughtered in the County, which had in the past been an impossibility, was a great advantage.

I repeat my acknowledgement of the help and consideration I have received from the Chairman and members of my Committee, both collectively and individually, and the loyal assistance I have received from my Staff.

Birth Rate.

The birth rate in Cornwall for 1940 was 12.97 as compared with 14.6 for England and Wales.

Infant Mortality.

The infant mortality rate was 48.26 per 1,000 live births as compared with 55.0 for England and Wales. With one exception (46 in 1935), this is the lowest infant mortality rate for Cornwall on record. Of the 206 infant deaths, 141 were due to congenital debility, premature birth, malformations, etc.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

Laboratory Facilities.

The Royal Cornwall Infirmary, Truro, Pathological Department, under the charge of Dr. F. D. M. Hocking.

The Redruth Clinical Laboratory under the charge of Dr. C. Rivers.

The Laboratory of the Public Analyst (Dr. H. E. Cox), 11, Billiter Square, London, E.C.3. Specimens of water and food, etc., are sent to this Laboratory by the County Council.

District Councils make their own arrangements with various Laboratories.

Ambulance Facilities.

Motor ambulances are provided and maintained by voluntary organisations, and there is a Joint Committee of representative members of the British Red Cross Society and The Order of St. John, the Cornwall Voluntary Aid Organisation.

In addition to the above, there are also ambulances at Bude, Newquay and Torpoint.

These ambulances are not available for ordinary infectious disease, but are used in connection with the Council's Public Health Services. Ambulances for ordinary infectious disease are provided by the District Councils in connection with the Isolation Hospitals. The County Council make a grant of fro per ambulance to the Cornwall Voluntary Aid Organisation, to be devoted solely to expenses in connection with road accidents.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

County Councils are not Sanitary Authorities for such purposes as water supply, sewerage, and the arrangements for dealing with infectious disease, but under the Local Government Act, 1929, County Councils may make grants to District Councils in aid of schemes for water supply and sewerage. Grants have been made by the County Council in aid of water supplies for rural areas.

Rivers and Streams. Action to check pollution of rivers or streams may be taken by District Councils or by the County Council.

Schools. The sanitary condition and water supply of the Schools is constantly receiving the attention of the Education Committee, and as opportunity offers Schools are connected with water and drainage schemes.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

Milk (Special Designations) Orders, 1936 and 1938. These Orders provide that no person may use a "special designation" for any milk unless there is in force a milk licence authorising the use of that designation in connection with that milk, nor may any description be used in regard to the sale of milk which is calculated falsely to suggest that the cows are free from tuberculosis or that the milk has been graded or tested by any competent person.

The County Council is responsible for the granting of licences for the production of Tuberculin Tested milk and Accredited milk.

Milk Supplied to Schools. The Milk in Schools Scheme continued to be popular and arrangements were made with the various Evacuating Authorities for free milk to be made available for such of their children as needed it. There was a certain amount of difficulty in obtaining supplies of approved milk to meet the greatly increased demand, but every effort was made to overcome these difficulties and to make suitable provision for all schools, both Cornish and evacuated. At the end of the year 22,670 Elementary and 902 Secondary School pupils were receiving milk. The corresponding figures for 1939 were 17,120 and 1,067.

Meat and other Foods.

The County of Cornwall Act 1929, S.68, when adopted by a District Council provides for the registration of manufacturers, vendors, merchants, dealers, and premises for the manufacture or storage or sale of ice-cream. The majority of the District Councils have adopted this Section of the Act.

S.69 is in operation without adoption and provides for the notification of infectious disease and for dealing with infected ice-cream. It also provides for the inspection of materials, commodities or articles of food on such premises.

PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER, INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

In anticipation of increased epidemic illness due to the reception of refugees and evacuees, the Truro Public Assistance Institution was converted into an improvised Isolation Hospital and opened as such in June, 1940. This hospital fulfilled a very useful function in providing accommodation for the very large number of cases of epidemic diseases which occurred, particularly towards the end of the year 1940.

The following figures show the incidence of infectious diseases during the year, as compared with the previous year.

Diphtheria. 392 cases with 26 deaths occurred during the year 1940 as compared with 86 cases with 15 deaths during the year 1939.

The great increase in incidence of Diphtheria emphasizes the urgent need for active schemes for immunisation against Diphtheria throughout the County. Generally speaking schemes were in operation and were actively pressed with great success by all Medical Officers of Health.

Scarlet Fever. 617 cases with 3 deaths occurred during the year 1940 as compared with 403 cases with no deaths during the previous year.

Enteric Fever. 18 cases with 2 deaths occurred during the year 1940 as compared with 6 cases with 1 death during the previous year.

Cerebro-Spinal Fever. 67 cases occurred during the year 1940 as compared with 2 cases during the year 1939.

Measles and Whooping Cough. 4,492 cases of Measles and 287 cases of Whooping Cough with 6 and 5 deaths respectively as compared with 41 cases of Measles and 106 of Whooping Cough with 1 and 12 deaths respectively during the period October—December 1939. The provision of isolation hospital accommodation for these diseases has long been recognised as necessary.

Measles and Whooping Cough were made notifiable as from the 1st October, 1939.

Cancer. 577 deaths during the year 1940 as compared with 623 during the year 1939 and 635 during the year 1938.

TUBERCULOSIS.

The Council's Sanatorium at Tehidy has 108 beds, and there are tuberculosis treatment centres at Penzance, Tuckingmill, Truro, St. Austell and Liskeard. A table showing work at the treatment centres is given at the end of the Report (Table II).

The Tuberculosis Officer, on receipt of a notification, informs the notifying practitioner that he proposes to follow up the notification unless the practitioner reports that there are special reasons why this should not be done.

No action has been taken under the Public Health (Prevention of Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1925 (relating to persons suffering from Pulmonary Tuberculosis employed in the milk trade), or under Section 172 of the Public Health Act, 1936 (relating to the compulsory removal to hospital of persons suffering from Tuberculosis).

A new Treatment Centre was opened at the Royal Cornwall Infirmary, Truro, in 1939, and three beds are reserved for cases requiring in-patient treatment. Arrangements are made for new cases to be seen at any time and irrigations and other treatment carried out daily.

The Pathological Department of The Royal Cornwall Infirmary, Truro, under the direction of Dr. F. D. M. Hocking, has been approved by the Minister of Health for the examination of specimens from persons suffering, or suspected to be suffering, from Venereal Disease. The necessary outfits and directions may be obtained from Dr. Hocking.

BLIND PERSONS.

Blind children 5—16 years of age are educated at the Exeter Blind Institution. After the age of 16 years suitable blind persons are trained for various occupations at the South Devon and Cornwall Institution for the Blind, Plymouth.

After training, a blind person may become a home worker under the supervision of the Institution, or in exceptional circumstances may work in the Institution.

There are 5 Home Teachers, four sighted and one blind. These work under the County Blind Association and visit the homes of blind persons and teach Moon and Braille reading, and otherwise keep under observation all blind persons who wish to be visited. 7,660 visits were made by these Home Teachers to blind persons, and 404 lessons given. There are 62 Library members.

Prevention of Blindness. The Council have adopted a system of voluntary notification by medical practitioners of persons threatened with blindness.

There were 800 registered blind persons on 31st March, 1941, 313 males and 487 females, and in addition 245 "watching" cases. 52 new cases were registered during the year 1940.

254 wireless sets are on loan to blind persons from the British Wireless Fund. 639 certificates under the Wireless Telegraphy (Blind Persons Facilities) Act 1926, are in operation at present.

VACCINATION.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

Area. The County Council is the Supervising Authority under the Midwives Acts for the whole County, but for other Maternity and Child Welfare work the 2 Boroughs of Penzance and Falmouth are separate Authorities. These Boroughs are also separate Education Authorities.

Maternity Ward. A maternity ward with 19 beds is maintained by the Council at the West Cornwall Miners' and Women's Hospital, Redruth, under an agreement with the governing body of that Institution. 221 cases were admitted during the year, as compared with 109 in the previous year. There were 6 Infant deaths, certified as premature, and 9 still births.

29 Caesarian sections were performed, i.e. 13.12% of total admissions, as compared with 13% for the previous year.

Of the 221 cases admitted 91 were delivered by midwives and 93 by Doctors. In the other cases confinement did not take place while in the Hospital. There were also 57 cases admitted to other hospitals in Cornwall.

Difficult cases from the Eastern part of the County may be admitted to the Prince of Wales's Hospital, Plymouth, The City Hospital, Plymouth, The Alexandra Homes, Devonport, and the Royal Devon and Exeter Hospital, Exeter. Twenty-two cases were admitted to these Hospitals during the year.

Maternity Cases. In the Institutions transferred to the County Council under the Local Government Act. 1929, there are 17 maternity beds, to which 70 women were admitted during the year, 45 being delivered by midwives and 3 by Doctors, the remainder being delivered before admission.

Rosemundy Home, 19 beds, for unmarried girls, is maintained by the Cornwall Preventive and Rescue Association. The girls are usually retained for one year.

Ante-natal Examinations. The Council have a scheme under which a midwife may arrange with a medical practitioner for an ante-natal exmination of her patients, and 1,080 such primary examinations were made during 1940. In 1939 there were 1,023 examinations, and the previous year 1,155. Arrangements are now made for two ante-natal and one post-natal examinations.

*Consultants. A second opinion was obtained by medical practitioners for 37 patients under the Council's scheme.

Emergency Nurses. Five emergency nurses are provided by the County Nursing Association for the use of the County Council when required for the nursing of cases of Puerperal Pyrexia, Puerperal Fever, and Ophthalmia Neonatorum. When not employed by the Council they are employed by the County Nursing Association and the District Nursing Associations.

Nursing in the Home. This is undertaken by the 131 District Nursing Associations, 130 of which are affiliated to the County Nursing Association and employ 169 nurses. North Tamerton is included in the Devon County Nursing Association.

Child Life Protection. 72 persons receiving children for reward were on the Register at the end of the year, and 135 such children were registered.

Squint. Arrangements are made for the examination of children under school age with Squint, and for the provision of glasses in necessitous cases. 12 children under school age were so examined during the year, and glasses provided free in 4 cases.

Nursing Homes Registration. There are 27 registered Nursing Homes.

Exemption from registration has been granted to 15 Hospitals. No powers have been delegated.




