6 deaths of infants under 1 year occurred, (2 male and 4 females, all legitimate). No deaths from maternal causes, 19 deaths from Cancer and no deaths from Measles, Whooping Cough or Diarrhoea (under 2 years) were recorded.

On the following page is a table giving the causes and the number of deaths occurring at the various age groups. The totals correspond with the Registrar General's figures. The deaths are classified under the Headings given in the Manual of the International List of Causes of Deaths - 1938.

The Birth Rate of 1942 is higher than those for the previous five years.

The Death Rate is the lowest recorded in my seven annual reports. Of the 126 deaths 85 = 67% occurred at age 65 years or over and of these, 32 = 25% of the total occurred at age 80 years or over.

The Ermergency Public Health Laboratory Service at Cambridge, under the Directorship of Dr. A.W. Downie, carried out, in addition to the usual public health bacteriological examinations, the examination of water samples, milk samples and provided diphtheria immunisation materials and measles perum.

## SECTION C.

## SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

## 1. (1) WATER.

All public supplies were satisfactorily maintained throughout the year. A pump house, a new bore and pump and approximately three miles of pumping main were constructed from Nedging to Wattisham. Sixteen new consumers were connected to the Districts public mains. 63 water samples were taken during the year - 42 from the public mains (of which none were unsatisfactory) and 21 from other sources (18 of which were unsatisfactory. Warning notices were posted where required.

# (ii) DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

8 new drains were inspected and 26 cesspools emptied during the year.

## 2. RIVERS AND STREAMS.

During 1942 Drainage Boards whose jurisdiction covers rivers and streams in the area continued the clearing and deepening of water courses in the District as part of their agricultural policy.

# 3. (1) CLOSET ACCOMMODATION.

Night Soil Collection is carried out at Lavenham, Bildeston and Boxford. 4 water closets and 3 pail closets were constructed during the year.

# (11) PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Although the salvage drive for paper, bottles, jam jars, rags and metals reduces the amount of household refuse for disposal, accumulations are forming and the need for a refuse collection scheme is increasing.

41 cases remained on the Tuberculosis Register at the end of the year, Respiratory Male 16, Female 14 and Non-Respiratory Male 3, Female 8.

The number of notifiable diseases (other than Tuberculosis) in 1942 was 35 - a considerable improvement on the 436 of 1941.

By the end of 1942 65% of children under 5 years of age and 98% of children between 5 and 15 years of age had completed the Diphtheria Immunisation course.

During 1942 62 cases of Scabies were treated - 45 under the old arrangements and 17 at the Centre equipped and staffed by this Authority and opened in September.
