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WATER SUPPLY

The whole of the Rural District is served by a public water supply operated by the West Suffolk Water Board, Linden House, 147 Kings Road, Bury St. Edmunds. (Tel No: Bury St. Edmunds 2261).

The supply serving most of the Cosford Rural District is derived from boreholes 400 ft. deep in the chalk substrata at Semer. All water is chlorinated at the pumping station to give a chlorine residual of 0.15 parts per million after which it is pumped to the Nedging Tye water tower from whence it is piped into the distribution mains. An iron removal plant is now under construction at the Semer pumping station.

A sample of water taken from the supply from Semer Pumping Station prior to chlorination and submitted for chemical analysis was reported as follows:-

Nitrate 0.2 parts per million. Nitrite 0.1 parts per million. 106 parts per million. Chlorine Hardness 265 parts per million. Temperary 75 parts per million. Permanent 340 parts per million. Total 580 parts per million. Dissolved solids 0.36 parts per million. Iron Lead, Copper, zinc Nil parts per million. Fluoride 0.8 parts per million.

Analyst's romarks:- "This water is of very good organic quality and there is no evidence of any chemical pollution. After the iron has been removed, this water should be well adapted to the purposes of a public supply".

A detailed report of the activities of the West Suffolk Water Board is made annually by that Authority.

SEWERAGE AND DRAINAGE

I have appended hereto various schedules which give a comprehensive picture of the sewerage details of the District.

Routine maintenance of all the works, both main works and small works, and ancilliary pumphouses, has been carried out by 4 men under the supervision of the Sewage Works Superintendant. The works are maintained at a highly satisfactory level and produce effluents acceptable to the River Authorities. In addition to normal maintenance the men are prepared, willingly and without complaint, to carry out various structural works to improve the efficiency of the sewage works and I am glad to have such men working with me.

An incentive bonus scheme was introduced in 1973 and is operating satisfactorily.

It is of interest to note that the proposals for the enlargement of Bildeston Sewage Works incorporate provisions for dealing with cesspool contents and sludge pressing. This will alleviate the present difficulties encountered in the disposal of cesspool contents and the handling of partially dried sludge from the drying beds at present in use at all the main sewage disposal works.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

Refuse Collection and Disposal

The vehicle employed on refuse collection is a Dennis Faxit 70.

This is a 70 cu.yd. vehicle equipped with hydraulic compression mechanism, and came into use on 1st December, 1971. It is manned by a crew of three.

A kerbside system of collection is worked whereby householders are required to put dustbins at the kerb for collection. In the case of persons who are aged or infirm arrangements are made for the dustbin to be collected from the rear of the premises. A weekly collection now operates in all parishes with the help of Sanford Rural District Council, who have extended their own service to cover Elmsett, Polstead, Layhan, Nedging and Whatfield. An Incentive Bonus Scheme was put into operation in February, 1973.

All normal household refuse collected is taken to a pulverisor plant at Great Whelnetham, owned and operated by Thingoe Rural District Council, and, after pulverisation, is disposed of by controlled tipping methods in an old railway cutting adjacent to the plant.

Bulky items of refuse are taken to a refuse tip at Red Hill, Aldhan, by arrangement with Hadleigh Urban District Council.

Cesspool Emptying

The Council operates a cesspool emptying service. A 1,500 gallon "Yorkshire" emptier on a Leyland "Laird" Chassis is used for this purpose.

One "free" emptying per annum is allowed to all houses not served by a public sewer, thereafter the service is charged for.

The cesspool emptier is also used for sludge removal from sewage works.

The number of cesspools emptied during the year was:-

Disposal of cesspool contents was formerly by spreading on agricultural land, but sites suitable for all-the-year round use are scarce, and the number of farmers who are prepared to accept this material on their land gets fewer. In consequence, the Council has given instruction that the new sewage disposal works at Bildeston shall have provision for the reception and treatment of cesspool contents. In the meantime, disposal of sludge is carried out at the Long Melford sewage disposal works by arrangement with Melford Rural District Council who operate a sludge press plant at these works.

TOWN AND COUNTRY FLANNING ACT, 1968

The Cosford Rural District Council has limited delegated powers only, and the West Suffolk County Council, Shire Hall, Bury St. Edmunds, (Tel No: Bury St. Edmunds, 63141) is the Local Planning Authority under the Act. All applications for development within the Rural District are submitted to the Cosford Rural District Council and are considered by the Council's Planning Committee whose recommendation is taken into account by the County Planning Department. Controversial applications are referred to the Southern Area Planning Committee which meets monthly. During 1973, 456 applications were made for Flanning consent, of these 307 were approved, 127 refused and 22 were either withdrawn or no decision had been issued at 31st December, 1973.

In January, 1968 a report entitled "Rural Planning in West Suffolk" was issued by the County Planning Officer, Mr. James M. Gorst. This report lays down the principles of Rural Planning as seen by the County Planning Authority and gives details of the likely growth of this, and other Rural Districts in West Suffolk up to 1981. The report is also concerned with the desirability of the preservation and conservation of the character of the countryside of West Suffolk and its historic villages and lays down the Planning principles which must be adopted to achieve this aim. A subsequent report, "West Suffolk Rural Planning Part 2" has been issued classifying villages and endeavouring to forecast future growth and development.

BUILDING REGULATIONS 1965

The routine inspection of plans under the Building Regulations is a very time consuming part of the work of the department and I have set out below a table showing the number of applications received and dealt with during the year.

Figures do not give a true picture of the work involved as one application may include several different types of houses on a particular site. The issue of a decision in many cases involved lengthy discussions or letters to applicants in order to obtain a satisfactory solution to various problems.

In addition to the checking of plans, the Regulations also require repeated visits to the sites whilst work is in progress to check various stages of construction, often at comparatively short notice.

Milk Supply

HIH has brooked to sustain north SWIMMING BATHS

No public swimming bath is provided within Cosford Rural District, but a new heated in-door pool has been constructed in the Hadleigh Urban District.

An open-air heated pool is available at Sudbury and there are heated in-door pools at Ipswich.

Monks Eleigh Primary School is provided with an open-air "Purley"

pool and Boxford Primary School has a larger heated covered pool, both of which

are used solely for educational purposes. In both cases the water is circulated,

filtered and chlorinated.

SCHOOLS

There are now 9 village schools in the District, and all are supplied with water from public mains. The schools at Bildeston, Boxford, Lavenham, Kersey and Monks Eleigh, Whatfield and Elmsett have water-closets connected to public sewers. The schools at Cockfield and Polstead have water-closets connected to cosspools.

All schools are, therefore, now provided with water-closet systems.

FOOD AND DRUGS INSPECTION

Milk Supply

All milk sold in the District is "Sterilised" "Pasteurised" or "Tuberculin-Tested (Pasteurised)". Two milk Distributors operate from premises at Boxford and Hitcham, but no loose milk is handled.

Ice Crean

No premises are registered for the manufacture of ice-cream.

43 premises are registered for the sale only of pre-packed ice cream.

Mobile vans operate in the District but are based outside it. These are inspected from time to time but, in general, give little cause for complaint.

Slaughterhouses and Meat Inspection

No slaughtering is now carried out at any premises in the District and local butchers obtain their supplies from meat wholesalers.

From May, 1973 the additional Public Health Inspector has been on loan to Hadleigh Urban District Council carrying out Meat Inspection at a private Slaughterhouse in High Street, Hadleigh.

Regular routine visits are carried out to food premises and various minor contraventions of the Food Hygiene Regulations have been remedied after discussion with the occupiers. No legal proceedings were instituted.

One full-time Rodent Operator is employed to carry out all treatment at private, business and agricultural premises, and at sewage works, and other Council-owned properties, as directed. Treatment at domestic premises is carried out free of charge; business and agricultural treatments are carried out on a "time and materials" charge. No treatments are carried out under Contract.

The poisons generally used for rats are "Warfarin" and "Racumin", and for mice "Racumin", "Alphakil", tracking dust and traps. These particular poisons are used in order to ensure maximum safeguard against accidents caused by ingestion by animals other than rats or mice. All properties at which infestations were found were treated, each treatment involving several visits.

The work carried out by the Rodent Operator during the year is indicated in the following table.
