

To the Members of the Cowes Urban District Council:

MR. CHAIRMAN AND COUNCILLORS

I have the honour to submit the Annual Report on the health of the District for 1968.

The Birth Rate fell from 13.8 to 12.8. Out of 229 live births, 14 were illegitimate.

The Death Rate rose from 12.6 to 17.5

The Infant Mortality Rate rose slightly from 8.1 to 8.7

No cases of food poisoning, diphtheria or poliomyelitis were notified. Single deaths only from nonpulmonary tuberculosis and suicide were recorded during the year.

Water Supplies

The water supplies have been satisfactory in quality and quantity. No contamination occurred.

The water is hard and not liable to be plumbo-solvent.

Removal of persons in need of care and attention

No action was required this year under Section 47 of the National Assistance Act. 1948.

Noise

This is not a new problem as many would have us believe. In town centres at any rate it is probable that noise today is less than it was a century ago - both in volume and duration. When streets were cobbled and the horse was the main motive power there must have been an endless clatter from the horses' hooves, the rattle of coach and cart wheels and the sound of work-peoples' clogs. Not only was there more noise but as working hours were much longer it would have started earlier and finished later.

I am sure the cries of street vendors were probably as aggravating as (and certainly more prolonged than) the chimes of ice-cream vans. What is different today is that it is almost impossible to get completely away from noise. Even in the heart of the countryside one can be assailed by the scream of jets or the roar of hovercraft.

Social Conditions

This heading has been omitted from the main body of this year's Report. I found that the description "These are unchanged since the last Report" had appeared in every Annual Report - unchanged and apparently unchallenged since 1932. In that year in Cowes it was stated that the main industries of the town were ship, yacht and aircraft building and repairing. Today the main industries are hovercraft manufacturing and electronics, both of which would probably have been considered as something more in the realms of science fiction in the year 1932. Other changes over the years I need hardly comment on.

Sewage

It does at the moment of writing look as if at long last this thorny question might be resolved as the consultant engineers will be looking in 1969 into the whole question of the sewerage of Cowes. Let us hope that the present uncertainties about the future of local government do not cause this problem once again to be shelved.

Acknowledgements

During the greater part of the year under review Dr. D.W. Quantrill acted as your Medical Officer of Health and I am sure you would wish me to thank him on your behalf for so willingly carrying out this extra duty. I should also like to thank the Staff of the Public Health Department for their help and co-operation.

BIRTHS

The total number of live births was 229 of which 215 were legitimate and 14 illegitimate. The live birth rate was 12.8 per 1,000 living: the birth rate for England and Wales being 16.9.

INFANTILE MORTALITY

The Infantile Mortality rate was 8.7 per 1,000 registered live births, the rate for England and Wales being 18.3.

DEATHS

The number of deaths was 313 giving a death rate of 17.5 per 1,000 of the estimated resident population. The corresponding rate for England and Wales was 11.9.

Under the Eighth Revision of the International Classification of Diseases deaths are now classified under a total of 65 headings. Certain causes of death attributed to Cowes residents only are given below. The nomenclature of certain categories has been amended from previous years to agree with the revised Classification.

VERMIN AND INSECT CONTROL

No charge is made by this Authority for general disinfestation services.

Four complaints of the presence of fleas in private houses were dealt with during the year and extermination of cockroaches and other beetles, woodlice, silverfish, ants, etc., totalled 57 cases.

Twenty-seven wasps nests were destroyed by the staff of the Department and a proprietary form of Sodium-Cyanide powder was used for the purpose.

DRAINAGE

(a) General

431 inspections were made in connection with examination, testing and supervision of repairs and renewals of existing drainage.

(b) Public Sewers vested in the Local Authority

Section 24 of the Public Health Act, 1936 governs the procedure in connection with these combined drains and clearance of 14 stoppages in public sewers - draining 60 hourses - was carried out at the expense of the Local Authority.

COUNCIL HOUSING

The practice of dividing the administration of this work between the Clerk's Department and the Public Health Department continues as in previous years.

Six hundred and thirty-three visits and inspections were carried out in connection with all housing management matters delegated to the department. This figure included 243 inspections of houses to determine their condition of repair, overcrowding, decoration, observance of Conditions of Tenancy and whether the premises were maintained in a cleanly condition.

The Council's second block of flats for pensioners at Gordon Lodge, Victoria Grove, East Cowes, which it was hoped would be ready for occupation in the latter part of the year, were not in fact completed in 1968 owing to various delays.

POULTRY INSPECTION

There is only one processing establishment in this area, which produces approximately 600 turkeys for the Christmas trade.

The birds are bought as "poults" in late August or early September.

Although the birds are killed - by neck-wringing - on the farm, all evisceration and dressing is done at one of the producer's local shops at which all facilities required by the Food Hygiene Regulations are available.

Twenty visits were made to the farm during the development of the stock and to the shop during the time of being prepared for sale.

No birds were rejected as being unfit for human consumption at or after the time of slaughter.

Apart from the usual number of electrical faults in refrigeration plants there was considerable damage due to flooding in a multiple store during a very severe rainstorm.

FOOD AND DRUGS ACT, 1955

(a) MILK

There are 60 registered milk dealers and 5 Dairies in the District.

Samples of milk were taken during the year from herds whose milk is retailed raw without heat treatment. These samples were examined at the Public Health Laboratory, Portsmouth, for the presence of live Tubercle Bacilli.

ICE CREAM

The number of premises registerd in this district for the manufacture, storate and sale of ice-cream is 112 although there are now no actual manufacturers.

Five new registrations were made during 1968.

Forty samples of ice-cream were taken for bacteriological examination, the results of which were as follows:-

Grade I 31 samples

Grade II 6 samples

Grade III 2 samples

Grade IV 1 sample

Samples falling within Grades I and II are accepted as satisfactory. The one Grade IV and the two Grade III results were from soft ice machines from two different vendors. In one case suspicion fell upon an old tube of edible grease, and the use of a new tube produced satisfactory results. The other case was traced back to faulty supplies from the manufacturer, and subsequent samples were of a good standard.

FOOD COMPLAINTS

Five complaints of food alleged to be unfit for human consumption were received during the year.

Two complaints were found to be unjustified and no action was taken.

The other complaints were as follows:-

1) Black substance in cake baked at a local bakery:

The black substance referred to was found to be burnt grease from a baking tin, and a verbal warning was given to the baker.

2) Mould Growth on Pork Pie

Slight mould growth was found on a pork pie bought at a multiple store. The whole of the stock was examined and only one other pie was found with the same identification mark. This other pie was sound, as was all the stock in the premises.

It was probable that these two pies had not been exchanged for fresh ones by the supplier, who is responsible for the stock rotation by arrangement with the retailer.

A warning letter was sent to the suppliers and their representatives made a thorough investigation of the matter and expressed their concern and regret.

3) Wrapped Loaf found to be fermenting

A wrapped loaf bought locally but supplied by a large mainland concern was found to be still fermenting in the centre. All the remaining loaves in the consignment were found to be sound, but apparently some other loaves delivered elsewhere were similarly affected. The suppliers were at a loss to explain the condition, but concluded that a small portion of the yeast used in the baking had acted in an abnormal manner.

FOOD POISONING

No case of Food Poisoning was notified during the year.

SHOPS ACT, 1950

There are now 323 registered shops in this district.

Twenty inspections were made under the Act which included evening and Sunday observations in connection with "Closing Hours." In this particular connection the Local Authority exercises delegated powers from the Isle of Wight County Council.

On no occasion was it found necessary to serve a notice for any contravention of the Act.

All the ten informal notices served during the year were promptly complied with.

Two minor accidents were reported, not necessitating formal action.

WATER SUPPLY

The mains water supply to the Cowes area is derived from the Isle of Wight River and Water Authority an authority upon which all local authorities on the Island are represented.

The sources of this supply remain unchanged, from the wells and boreholes in the chalk and green sand at Carisbrooke and the Bowcombe Valley, supplemented by approximately 20% per day from the local deep well at Broadfields Pumping Station. The Broadfields Reservoir, previously fed entirely from this deep well, is supplemented by a piped supply of water from Newport.

Analyses of local water supplies show no evidence of plumbosolvent action and no special precautions are therefore necessary. There is a natural fluoride content of rather less than .1 part per million.

There are 6,325 dwelling houses in the area with an estimated population of 18,000 all of which are supplied from the mains.

Samples for bacteriological examination are taken regularly by the staff of the Water Authority and results sent to the Public Health Department. Where considered necessary check samples are arranged or taken by the Public Health Inspectors. The source of the supplied to the sub-areas included in the following table is subject to variation. Of 112 samples taken from consumers' taps, five were classified as unsatisfactory but subsequent check samples all produced satisfactory results.

SWIMMING AND PADDLING POOLS

There are no swimming pools in the district open to the general public. An open air pool in the grounds of a holiday camp is in continuous use by camp visitors during the holiday season, and for swimming instruction by two schools by special arrangement. A children's paddling pool adjoins the swimming pool. Samples taken during the summer, totalling 13 in all, reflected the efficiency of the plant maintenance. Two samples taken in windy conditions giving not completely satisfactory results demonstrated the difficulty of coping with dust contamination.

The paddling pool at a caravan camp produced 4 good samples and one slightly contaminated, the latter being taken on the same windy day mentioned above.

The indoor swimming pool at a local school functioned satisfactorily from May to October, and the five samples taken were all satisfactory.

The Council's paddling pool on East Cowes Esplanade, in which the sea water is hand chlorinated daily with hypochlorite solution, had three satisfactory reports and one slight contamination on the windy day mentioned above.

CARAVAN SITES

There are five licensed Caravan Sites in the area, three at West Cowes and two at East Cowes. The permitted number of caravans on these sites is 175.

FACTORIES ACT, 1937

Local Authorities or "District Councils" as they are termed under the Factories Act, 1937, are responsible for administering the provisions relating to :-

Sanitary conveniences in all types of factories;
Cleanliness, overcrowding, temperature and
ventilation in non-mechanical power factories; and
