

Nursing in the Home

The Webb Nursing Institute maintains two Nurses to assist in nursing the sick poor.

Midwives

The number of midwives practising in the area is 22; they are supervised by the County Council. Of this number 6 are on the County Council Staff of salaried midwives under Section I of the Midwives Act, 1936, and six are on the staff of the Maternity Home.

The County Council which is responsible for the administration of the tuberculosis scheme has also made provision for the examination of sputum, and during the year the number of specimens examined was 119, of which 14 were positive and 105 negative.

Legislation in Force

The adoptive Acts and Byelaws in force in the Borough are as detailed in the report for 1930.

Institutional Provision for Unmarried Mothers, Illegitimate Infants and Homeless Children.

The Crewe and District Association for Prevention and Rescue Work maintains the St. Hilda's Home, 71, West Street, Crewe. During the year outside attention was given to 61 women and girls and 57 girls and 9 babies passed through the home.

Ambulance Facilities

The ambulance facilities provided by the Corporation consist of five Motor Ambulances. Two are stationed at the Fire Station in the centre of the Town, two at the Isolation Hospital, and one at the New Garage and Workshop in the West portion of the Borough. The two at the Isolation Hospital are used mainly for conveyance of notifiable infectious diseases and the other three for non-infectious cases and street accidents.

The total number of patients carried by the Ambulances during the year was 1,057; the total number of journeys made was 1,169; and the total distance in miles covered was 23,482.

Clinics and Treatment Centres

The new Clinic at Ludford Street for Maternity and Child Welfare and School Medical Service has now taken the place of the premises previously used for these purposes at the Old Railway Hospital, Lyon Street. In other respects the Clinics and Treatment Centres are as stated in the Report for 1930.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

Ante-Natal Clinic

The Ante-Natal Clinic is held each Wednesday afternoon in the Clinic Rooms, Ludford Street. It is freely open to any midwife or expectant mother in the Borough who desires to make use of it.

During the year 32 expectant mothers attended, paying in all 73 visits. All the expectant mothers attended on their own account.

Maternity Home

During the year 228 cases were admitted to the Home of which number 82 came from addresses outside the Borough. In 153 instances (67.1 per cent.) the case was attended by a medical man, 73 were attended by the midwives at the Home, and 2 were not delivered.

The average duration of stay in the Home was 13.1 days. Of the babies born in the Home, 6 were still-born.

Two expectant mothers were found at the ante-natal examinations to have albuminuria.

On the Ante-natal afternoons, 201 expectant mothers made 911 visits.

Home Helps

The scheme for providing Home Helps for service in the midwifery cases was continued during the year, and a Home Help was supplied in 22 cases.

Maternal Mortality

Inquiry into the case of maternal deaths is made by the Medical Officer of Health, and in view of the interest taken in this subject it may be said that the cases so far investigated have not given any reason to suppose that they could have been prevented.

No official enquiry is made into cases of puerperal pyrexia since such enquiries can be better made by the County Council as supervisors of Midwives.

Milk Scheme

During the year, 144 families were supplied with milk free or at half cost under the Council's scheme: 112 families were supplied with 2,503 gallons, 1 quart, 1 pint, free and 32 families with 315 gallons, 1 quart, 1 pint, at half cost.

The total quantity of milk supplied was 2,818 gallons, 3 quarts.

During the year 586 births were notified, and each was visited.

The number of living babies found, after deducting still-births, deaths, and those who had left town, was 525.

The number of babies found to be sleeping alone was 458 (87.2 per cent.).

The number of babies found to breast fed entirely at the time of the first visit was 333 (63.4 per cent.); 37 were partly fed on the breast and partly artifically, and 193 were fed on artificial foods.

Cows' milk is the artificial food most commonly used and was given in 123 cases, the remaining 32 being fed on other artificial foods.

The number of babies entirely breast fed at the age of three months was 101 (19.2 per cent.) and at the age of six months was 54 (10.2 per cent.).

Boarded out Children

From the 1st April, 1930, the functioning of Part I of the Children Act, 1908, formerly discharged by the Board of Guardians, devolved upon the Local Authority under the Local Government Act, 1929, and the Children's and Young Persons Act, 1932.

The main object is to secure that any child under 9 years of age who is maintained for "reward" shall be notified to the Local Authority in order that it may be kept under observation and supervision.

The number of boarded-out children on the register at the end of the year was 22.

During the year 1 was adopted, 2 left the district, 4 returned to parents, and 1 was admitted to Dr. Barnado's Home.

The homes of these boarded-out children are visited periodically by the Health Visitors and all children found to be well cared for and the home in a clean condition.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water

During the year 319,442,630 gallons were supplied to the Corporation for the use of the town.

The quantity supplied by the Corporation is approximately 18.9 gallons per person per day.

This figure is not absolutely correct since certain of the houses belonging to the Railway Company are supplied with water directly by the Company and not by the Corporation.

During the year 1,767 yards of water mains were laid.

Drainage and Sewerage

580 yards were laid during the year,

Closet Accommodation

At the end of the year the number of closets of each type was:—Water Closets 12,603; Waste Water Closets 987; Pail Closets 1,029; Privy Middens 12; these Privy Middens are all in the Area added to the Borough under the County of Chester Review Order, 1936.

During the year 447 Pail Closets and 7 Waste Water Closets were converted to the Water Carriage System.

Refuse Collection and Disposal

The Collection of Household Refuse is made weekly and for this purpose a fleet of eight motor vehicles is employed.

For the Collection of Nightsoil two motors are used.

The estimated amount of Household Refuse collected during the year, including tonnage from the Added Area, was 8,607 tons, averaging 13.1 cwts. per house per annum.

The estimated amount of Nightsoil collected during the year, including the tonnage from the Added Area was 1,035 tons.

The cost of collecting these quantities was:—Day Refuse (including Added Area) £6,526; Nightsoil (including Added Area) £738.

The refuse in general is disposed of at the Refuse Disposal Works but 4,032 tons were disposed of by controlled tipping.

ERADICATION OF BED BUGS.

The first mentioned method proved very effective and satisfactory. In 30 cases the houses treated were furnished and occupied but were vacated for 10 -12 hours. In 6 cases it was necessary to repeat treatment and in the case of one Council House hydrogen cyanide fumigation had to be resorted to and this proved satisfactory. The work of disinfestation was in all cases carried out by employees of the Corporation under the supervision of the sanitary inspectors, except in the case of the use of hydrogen cyanide. In each case the architraves, skirting boards and other woodwork, together with one or two floorboards in each bedroom were eased prior to fumigation.

3. Hydrogen Cyanide Fumigation

During the year 15 families were removed to new Council Houses from Clearance Areas. Their furniture and effects were treated with hydrogen cyanide in the removal van by a firm specialising in this type of fumigation and their bedding and clothing was steam disinfested at the Isolation Hospital while all the members of the families had a bath prior to taking possession of the new houses allocated to them. Also hydrogen cyanide fumigation was carried out prior to the demolition of dwelling houses in Clearance Areas. During the year 43 houses were so treated.

4. Prevention of the Spread of Vermin in Corporation Houses

The Borough Treasurer during the year notified the Department as to the addresses of prospective tenants of Council Houses and the sanitary inspectors inspected these premises before any tenancies were granted. 205 houses were inspected for this purpose and 4 of these houses were found to be verminous and one house was found to be in an unsatisfactory condition.
