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

I have the honour to present to you my report on the health of the Borough of Crewe for the year 1969.

#### VITAL STATISTICS

During 1969, 19 infants died before reaching the age of 1 year and the infantile mortality rate of 23.34 per 1,000 live births is again high compared with the England & Wales figure of 18.0. 9 of these babies died during the first month of life. The total number of births shown (814) shows a further fall, and is the lowest total in the decade. The number of illegitimate births (93) shows an increase of 8 on the 1968 figure and this, together with the lower number of births gives a record high illegitimate live birth rate of 11.4%. Last year's figure was 9.8%. The corrected live birth rate (15.9) remains lower than the national figure for England & Wales (16.3).

The total number of deaths, 681, is again higher than the ten years average figure, (approximately 600) which is comparable as our population remains static, and the corrected death rate 15.2 is high compared with the England & Wales figure (11.9). The table on pages 9 to 13 shows the causes and ages.

#### INFECTIOUS DISEASES

The table on page 15 gives details of these and shows that 1969 was a relatively good year having a very low incidence of these diseases.

Details of immunisations and vaccinations and brief information on other work carried out is included in the Report.

#### Diphtheria Immunisation

During the year notifications received from Medical Practitioners showed that 385 children were immunised against diphtheria. In addition 377 children received a boosting dose to improve their immunity.

During the year the Ministry introduced changes in the immunisation and vaccination schedules. The tables included are thus not comparable with the previous years figures.

The corresponding figures for 1968 were 955 and 690.

No case of diphtheria was notified during 1969, and it is now 19 years since a case of diphtheria has been notified in the Borough.

#### MEDICAL EXAMINATIONS

During the year 466 persons were referred to me for medical assessment. Of these 75 were examined in conjunction with the Corporation's Superannuation and Sickness Pay Scheme. 167 were County Staff or persons seeking entry into a Training College, 12 were of persons applying for a Taxi Driver's Licence, and 212 completed statements of medical history.

#### MORTUARY FACILITIES

The Corporation Mortuary was closed on 1st January, 1962, and the arrangements made with the South Cheshire Hospital Management Committee have continued entirely satisfactorily. During the year the Corporation paid fees in respect of 102 bodies received at the Crewe Memorial Hospital Mortuary.

#### CREWE AND DISTRICT COMMITTEE FOR MORAL WELFARE WORK

The Reverend O.J. Horrocks has supplied the following information on the work of the Committee during 1969.

"There were 105 applications for help during the year and 15 carried over from 1968. Of the 105, 80 were maternity cases, 33 mothers kept their baby, 25 babies were adopted, 1 was taken into care, 1 was still born, 10 have not yet arrived and 10 mothers are still deciding. Of the 15 from 1968, 10 mothers kept their baby and 5 gave them for adoption. There were 25 enquiries about adoption and social problems."

It must be borne in mind that the Committee's activities cover a larger area than the Borough of Crewe.

#### FOOD POISONING

103 cases of suspected food poisoning were reported during the year. However, after investigation, only 4 were confirmed.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I submit herewith my report of the work of the Public Health Inspector's Department for the year 1969.

The work of the Department, concerned as it is with environmental health and hygiene, is not spectacular but rather that of constant vigilance and inspection to maintain satisfactory standards in good living and working conditions, pure food and clean air. Steady progress was again made during 1969 and is shown in the statistics contained in the following report.

With the Council's fourth Smoke Control Order becoming operative on the 1st July, 1969, approximately one-third of the properties in the Borough were covered by such orders. Due to financial restrictions no further progress has been made with the Smoke Control programme while towards the end of the year, it was disappointing to find the first signs of the current shortage of solid smokeless fuel becoming apparent.

The department continued to co-operate with the Ministry of Technology in recording smoke and sulphur dioxide concentrations, and in this respect was fortunate in receiving the continued assistance of the staff of British Railways (Midland Region) Laboratory at Crewe.

In conclusion, I wish to take the opportunity of thanking the elected representatives, the staff of the department and other officers and their staffs for their help and support.

#### SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

#### PUBLIC CLEANSING

The removal of household and trade refuse is based on a weekly collection service and with the exception of holiday periods, this frequency of collection was maintained generally throughout the Borough.

The Cleansing Department operates a Refuse Disposal Plant and has a separate Garage and Workshop.

ll vehicles (including l spare vehicle) are employed on the collection of household and trade refuse and nightsoil, in addition to l vehicle used in connection with refuse disposal.

3,531 tons of shop and factory refuse were also brought to the Refuse Disposal Works for disposal, making a total of 17,784 tons of refuse dealt with during the year. 63.5% of the total refuse passed through the works while the remainder was disposed of by controlled tipping.

The estimated amount of nightsoil collected during the year was 156 tons.

A separate Annual Report is issued for the Public Cleansing service in the Borough.

#### SANITARY ACCOMMODATION

There are still a number of privy pails in the Borough, situated in the present unsewered northern area of the town.

#### WATER SUPPLY

The water supply to the district is provided by the Mid and South East Cheshire Water Board. The water is not plumbo-solvent and all dwelling houses are supplied direct from the mains.

### RODENT CONTROL, Cont.

Following the treatments carried out, 836 rats and 294 mice were picked up, whilst the estimated kill was 3,542 rats and 824 mice.

During the year the rodent operators paid 6,344 visits in connection with the inspection and treatment of premises.

Two maintenance treatments of the sewers were also carried out. 917 manholes were baited and 637 takes of poison bait were recorded, showing an estimated kill of 1,450 rats.

### PET ANIMALS ACT 1951

There are seven premises in the Borough licensed for the sale of pet animals. All these premises comply with the recommended conditions of the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, which were adopted by the Council.

Food hygiene has continued to receive the attention of the public health inspectorate and 898 visits have been made for this purpose.

This system has worked very well indeed and architects and others have co-operated fully with the Department.

### ATMOSPHERIC POLLUTION

The implementation of the provision of the Clean Air Act, 1956 once again occupied a proportion of the time of the public health inspectorate and 2,412 inspections were made under the Act.

8 notifications were received of 'intention to install' furnaces under Section 3 of the Act.

The Borough of Crewe No. 1 (Marshfield Bank and Wistaston Green) Smoke Control Order, 1960 covering some 270 acres on the westerly side of the borough, and affecting some 1,085 properties came into operation on the 1st October, 1962.

A second order, known as the Borough of Crewe No. 2 (Wistaston Green and The Valley) Smoke Control Order, 1964, which covers 208 acres and 1,028 properties in an area adjacent to and to the east of the first area, became operative on the 1st July, 1966.

The Borough of Crewe No. 3 (Ruskin Park) Smoke Control Order, 1966 became operative on the 1st July, 1967. This Order covers 224 acres and 1,670 properties in an area adjacent to and to the south east of No. 2 area.

The Borough of Crewe No. 4 (Nantwich Road South) Smoke Control Order, 1967, which covers 235 acres and 1,793 properties, became operative on the 1st July, 1969.

The department has, since 1949, in co-operation with the Ministry of Technology, made regular monthly recordings of the degree of air pollution throughout the borough. The analyses of the readings of the various stations are shown in the appended tables and graphs.

In 1961, Crewe was selected as one of 120 towns to take part in a National Survey of Atmospheric Pollution and five additional sets of instruments were installed at particular sites in the district, but one site at the College annexe, Railton Avenue, has now been discontinued.
