

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Crewe

I have the honour to present to you my report on the health of the Borough of Crewe for the year 1971.

The 1971 census population figure (51,302) gives a considerable reduction on the census population for 1961 (53,394).

The total number of live births is identical with the figure for 1970 (804) itself the lowest figure in the decade. The number of illegitimate births, 68, is a reduction of 3 on the 1970 figure and the illegitimate live birth rate is 8.4%. 18 infants died before reaching the age of 1 year and the infantile mortality rate is 22.38 per 1,000 live births. The England and Wales figure for 1971 is 18.0. The table on page 14 gives details of the age and causes of death.

The total number of deaths, 667 is again higher than the 10 years average figure (approximately 600). The 1971 figure gives a death rate of 13.01 per 1,000 population, and when this is corrected by the comparability factor, the rate is 15.1 compared with a national rate of 11.6 per 1,000 population. The tables on pages 9 - 13 give details of the causes of death and ages.

The table on page 15 gives details of notified infectious diseases. The high prevalence of measles is repeated from 1970 and the incidence of whooping cough also shows an increase. Notifications of food poisoning and dysentery showed a reduced incidence.

Details of immunisation and vaccination and information on other work carried out is included in the report.

MEDICAL EXAMINATIONS

During the year 429 persons were referred to me for medical assessment. Of these 98 were assessed in conjunction with the Corporation's Superannuation and Sickness Pay Scheme. 309 were County Staff or persons seeking entry into a Training College, 22 were of persons applying for a Taxi Driver's Licence.

MORTUARY FACILITIES

The Corporation Mortuary was closed on 1st January, 1962, and the arrangements made with the South Cheshire Hospital Management Committee have continued entirely satisfactorily. During the year the Corporation paid fees in respect of 90 bodies received at the Crewe Memorial Hospital Mortuary or Leighton Hospital Mortuary.

CREWE AND DISTRICT COMMITTEE FOR MORAL WELFARE WORK

The Reverend O.J. Horrocks has supplied the following information on the work of the Committee during 1971.

"There were 105 applications for help in 1971. Of these 105 applications 63 were maternity, and of the 63, 40 mothers kept their babies and 23 gave them for adoption."

It must be borne in mind that the Committee's activities cover a larger area than the Borough of Crewe.

FOOD POISONING

58 cases of suspected food poisoning were reported during the year. However, after investigation 4 were confirmed.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Crewe.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I submit my report on the work of the Public Health Inspector's Department for the year 1971.

The maintenance of a satisfactory stock of dwellings within the Borough in both the public and private sectors is one of the most important functions of the local authority. The maintenance of private sector housing is achieved by (1) the demolition of the unfit properties included in the clearance programme and (2) the repair and improvement of those houses outside that programme.

Over the past two or three years greater emphasis has been placed on the improvement and retention of the current housing stock in order to reduce the number of houses which need to be demolished. This work is aided by improvement grants and has now been supplemented by grants to local authorities to improve the environment, in addition to improving the dwellings, within suitable specified areas - general improvement areas. Early in the year, the Council decided to implement such a policy and defined the first area for survey.

One pleasing feature of this year was the improvement in the supplies of solid smokeless fuels, so much so, that the Council were able to consider the resumption of their smoke control programme. A programme of a further ten orders was approved providing for the whole of the Borough to be covered by 1982.

In connection with the measurement of atmospheric pollution, the department again acknowledges the assistance of the staff of British Railways Scientific Services Laboratory at Crewe.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the elected representatives, the staff of the department and other officers and their staffs for their help and support during the year.

3,708 tons of shop and factory refuse were also brought to the Refuse Disposal Works for disposal, making a total of 17,174 tons of refuse dealt with during the year. 55.25% of the total refuse passed through the works while the remainder was disposed of by controlled tipping.

The estimated amount of nightsoil collected during the year was 104 tons.

A separate Annual Report is issued for the Public Cleansing service in the Borough.

Sanitary Accommodation

There are still a number of privy pails in the Borough, situated in the present unsewered northern area of the town, but the extension of sewerage facilities to the Coppenhall area should considerably reduce the number in the near future.

WATER SUPPLY

The water supply to the district is provided by the Mid and South East Cheshire Water Board. The water is not plumbo-solvent and all dwelling houses are supplied direct from the mains.

RODENT CONTROL, Continued

Following the treatments carried out, 774 rats and 524 mice were picked up, whilst the estimated kill was 3,010 rats and 1,711 mice.

During the year the rodent operators paid 6,415 visits in connection with the inspection and treatment of premises.

Two maintenance treatments of the sewers were also carried out. 731 manholes were baited and 546 takes of poison bait were recorded, showing an estimated kill of 1,645 rats.

PET ANIMALS ACT 1951

There are nine premises in the Borough licensed for the sale of pet animals. All these premises comply with the recommended conditions of the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, which were adopted by the Council.




VOLUMETRIC CONCENTRATION OF SMOKE IN THE ATMOSPHERE - YEAR 1971
