To the Chairman and Councillors of the Crewkerne Urban District Council

The Registrar General has estimated the population of Crewkerne to be 5,000 which gives a mortality of 7.9 per 1,000. I must emphasize that this is an estimate. The actual figure was 2,100 and the product of a heavy fall was 17.5.

The corrected birth rate was 19.2 per 1,000 compared with a figure of 16.4 for England and Wales. There are no illustrations.

Mr. Chairman and Councillors,

I beg to submit my Annual Report for 1970.

Although there was little infectious disease, the influenza epidemic in the early part of the year caused five deaths and a good deal of sickness.

Over the years I have been amazed at the lack of public interest in Council work. Occasionally some item, usually affecting the financial interest of a small section of the community, prompts a few people to attend monthly meetings, but generally no one bothers to attend and see the enormous amount of work carried out by the Council. My Report records some part of that work. For years one resident used to enquire when my Annual Report would be available in the Library for public reading. Unfortunately he has died and has not been replaced.

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SECTION A

Statistics and Social Conditions of the Area

Population The Registrar General has estimated the population of Cromford to be 5,040 which gives a density of 3.9 per acre. I must emphasise that this is an estimate. The rateable value was £188,888 and the product of a penny rate was £752.

Birth Rate The corrected Birth Rate was 19.2 per thousand compared with a figure of 16 for England and Wales. There were two illegitimate births.

Death Rate The corrected Death Rate was 15.1 per thousand compared with the national figure of 11.7. Out of a total of 76 deaths, 17 were due to heart disease, 14 deaths were caused by stroke. There were 19 deaths to various forms of respiratory disease and 5 deaths due to influenza which was prevalent in the early part of the year. At the age of 65 men can expect to live another 12 years and women 15.9 years and 70% of males and 82% of females can be expected to live to 65 years. These cheering statistics, supplied by the Registrar General, also show that the expectation of life at birth has risen to 68.7 years for a boy and 74.9 years for a girl. Perhaps Women's Lib. will have a moderating effect on this disparity.

Appendix A, Table 3 shows full details of the causes of deaths.

Maternal Mortality There were no maternal deaths in 1970.

Stillbirths There was one stillbirth during the year.

Infant Mortality Two infants died, one of bronchitis and one of congenital abnormality.

Social Habits There was little change in the social pattern compared with the previous year. The cost of living continued to rise.

General Provision of Health Services in the Area

The local health services provided by the County Council continued.

The Child Welfare Clinic was held twice a month but the additional clinic which was previously held once a month for immunisation was discontinued. Local private practitioners are now carrying out immunisations themselves with the aid of the computer at County Hall.

I carried out an annual medical inspection at each of the four schools in the town. Details of these inspections are shown in Appendix B, Table 2.

The Speech Therapy and Orthopaedic Clinics continued unchanged.

The School Dentist, who had been transferred to another part of the County in October, 1969, was not replaced until June.

The British Red Cross Society Centenary occurred on 4th August. The sufferings of the wounded at the Battle of Solferino in 1859 inspired five Swiss citizens to form the International Committee of the Red Cross and to call an International meeting at Geneva in 1863. After the outbreak of the Franco-Prussian War Col. Lloyd-Lindsay, V.C. made a public appeal to raise funds to help the wounded in France. The public response was immediate and he became the Society's first Chairman. Since then the Red Cross Society has expanded its activities in many spheres all over England. The small branch in Crewkerne carries on the good work. At the request of the Council they undertook the distribution of Meals on Wheels and had 44 names on their list at the end of the year. Last year I mentioned the Medical Loan centre they had established at the Clinic. In addition they run a club for the Physically Disabled which meets twice a month and in many other ways, particularly in transport, they assist our less fortunate members of the community.

Ramus House, a welfare home for the aged and financed by the County Council, continued to retain its full complement of 29 and there is a fairly long waiting list. Matron and her staff look after the residents extremely well and, although nursing is not strictly within their terms of service, they do devote great care and attention to those who fall seriously ill as it is almost impossible for a hospital bed to be found for these elderly people. At the beginning of the year the average age of the residents was 85 years, the highest in any County home.

The Crewkerne Old Peoples Welfare Association, with a membership of approximately 350, held weekly meetings in the Community Centre throughout the year and the average attendance was 75. In addition, a holiday in Torquay was arranged for 35 members and approximately 115 members took advantage of the chiropody service which is mainly financed by the Somerset County Council. This active Association is anxious to build a centre of their own and has already bought a suitable plot of land and also raised some £800. Their energetic Committee are to be congratulated.

SECTION C

Prevention and Control over Infectious Diseases and Other Diseases

The only infectious diseases notified during the period under review were a few cases of measles, one of scarlet fever and one of Tuberculosis.

One non-resident member of the teaching staff of a school was discovered to have a recurrence of infection at the end of 1969 and I skin tested 163 children. Seven were found to have positive re-actions but I am pleased to say that all of them had been given B.C.G. vaccination previously which had provoked the reaction. In January I arranged a visit of the Mass Radiography Unit to X-Ray all the school staff and the public were invited to attend. Fortunately all the staff were clear. Full details of the visit and a follow-up visit in April are given in the Appendix.

I carried out my routine B.C.G. programme against tuberculosis in the autumn. Children born in 1959 were those offered vaccination. I vaccinated 52 at the Secondary Modern School and 16 at the Grammar School.

The epidemic of influenza which commenced at the end of 1969 carried on into the early part of 1970 and there were five deaths in Crewkerne.

Environmental Health Services

A. Sanitary Circumstances

Climatic Conditions In 1970 the weather was generally mild with a good summer.

Water Supply Despite the power cuts due to the strike of electricity supply workers, the Wessex Water Board were able to give a satisfactory supply throughout the year both in quality and quantity. Of the 1,800 houses in Crewkerne only two do not receive a mains supply of water. Sampling was carried out by both the Wessex Water Board (21 samples) and our health department (20 samples). All were satisfactory.

Drainage and Sewage Disposal The capacity of our eastern outfall works is not sufficient to deal satisfactorily with the demands made on it and consultant engineers were engaged to carry out an investigation to see what extension is necessary. The strain at present on the northern outfall works is less but the Council continued to pursue the possibility of combining with the Chard Rural District Council who are actively enlarging their Merriott sewage works.

Refuse Collection The Council continued their regular weekly collection of refuse. Partial incineration is carried out at the tip which is well maintained. The roads of the town are regularly swept and even after the annual fair in September the debris was quickly removed and Crewkerne soon returned to its normal well-kept appearance.

Public Conveniences The conveniences in Church Street and West Street were well maintained and suffered less damage from inconsiderate users.

Rodent Control Our part-time rodent control operator carried out the usual test baiting of Council property and sewers and dealt with private complaints promptly. There were no heavy infestations during the year.

Swimming Baths Three schools in the town have swimming baths. All use mains water and chlorinate in a satisfactory manner.

Nuisances The few complaints of nuisance reported to the Public Health Department were promptly dealt with by the Inspector and generally satisfactory results ensued.

B. Factories Act

Details of the inspections carried out by the Public Health Inspector are shown in Appendix D, Table 1.

C. Offices, Shops and Railway Premises Act

Routine inspections were carried out at a number of the 86 registered premises and only informal action was necessary to achieve a satisfactory standard.

D. Housing

At the end of the year the Council had 13 houses in the course of erection and private builders were erecting another seven. There were 190 applicants on the housing list at the end of the year which included 80 for old peoples' dwellings and seven urgent cases. Many of the applicants are at present resident outside the town, living in villages where little or no house building is taking place.

The Council continued to encourage applications for both standard and discretionary grants and gave approval to 22 applicants for standard grants and one discretionary grant.

E. Inspection and Supervision of Food

Milk Milk sampling was carried out regularly by the County Health Department and all unsatisfactory samples were followed up by the County Dairy Husbandry Adviser. No complaints about milk were received in my department during the year.

Ice Cream Thirteen premises are registered for the retail of pre-packed ice cream. Samples taken from ten of them during the summer months were all placed in provisional Grade One indicating that all the retailers are storing the ice cream in a satisfactory manner.

Meat There is no licensed slaughterhouse in the town and no routine meat inspection is carried out.

Food Hygiene Regulations There are 55 premises registered under these Regulations and all comply. Informal action was necessary occasionally but no statutory action resulted.

Many of the applications are at present pending outside the town, either in villages where little or no house building is taking place.

The Council continued to receive applications for both standard and discretionary grants and was approved by 25 applicants for standard grants and 42 discretionary grants.
