### TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF CROFT RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL

Gentlemen,

I have much pleasure in presenting the annual report on the health of the district for the year ended 31.st December, 1969.

The population, as estimated mid-year by the Registrar General, was two thousand and sixty, and increase of twenty on 1968. There were forty three live births, giving a live birth rate of 21.10 and twenty four deaths with a death rate of 12.9. Thirteen were due to heart disease, two to vascular lesions of the nervous system, six cancer and one respiratory disease, not Tuberculosis. There were no maternal or infantile deaths.

The vital statistics can be regarded as satisfactory.

Two infection disease cases were notified during the year, one Measles, one Hepatitis. No tuberculosis cases were notified during 1969.

I would like to express my appreciation of the help and co-operation I have received from all the staff in the department.

### Section 27 - AMBULANCE SERVICE

This service is provided by the County Council from the Ambulance Service at Richmond which has a staff of one driver/foreman, one shift leader and six driver/attendants, and covers the districts of Richmond Borough, Rural Districts of Richmond, Croft, Reeth and Startforth.

### Section 28 - PREVENTION OF ILLNESS, CARE AND AFTER-CARE

The work of vaccination and immunisation, together with the advice spread by thos working in the Public Health Service, doctors, nurses, inspectors, etc., must have a beneficial affect on the general health of the community.

1969 - 1595 meals were served, an average no. of recipients per week was 16.

The remainder of this report has been compiled by the Public Health Inspector and his staff and I now thank him and them for their kind co-operation and their great assistance in the preparation of this report.

### SECTION B

## Water Supply, Sewerage and Sewage Disposal and General Sanitary Circumstances

### Distribution of Water

The parishes included within the area of the various statutory undertakers are as follows:

Cleasby, Cliffe, part of Croft, Dalton, Stapleton, Manfield and Newton Morrell (part) - Tees Valley and Cleveland Water Board

Barton and part of Newton Morell - Northallerton and Dales Water Board

Some of the parishes included within the statutory water areas are:

### (a) Eryholme

This parish has a mains supply from a deep bore provided by the Estate Company which in 1961 was extended to supply houses in the hamlet, including three Council Houses. The water is very hard (530 parts per million) and water softeners have been fixed in many of the houses on the supply.

### (b) Girsby

This parish has only a very small hamlet and consists primarily of isolated farms and hinds houses. Part of it is supplied by the Northallerton and Dales Water Board and the rest by boreholes and wells.

The parish is adjacent to High Worsall which is in Northallerton and Dales Water Board statutory area of supply and can be supplied from that source.

### (c) Part of Newton Morrell

This parish has no hamlet and comprises isolated farms and houses. The part referred to can be supplied by the Tees Valley and Cleveland Water Board from their mains at Cleasby.

### Quantity and Purity of Water

516 samples were taken by the Tees Valley and Cleveland Water Board of which eight were found unsatisfactory.

48 samples were taken by the Northallerton and Dales Water Board of which four were found unsatisfactory.

5 samples were taken by the Public Health Department, all of which were reported satsifactory.

### Sewerage and Sewage Disposal

All villages in the rural district have satisfactory sewerage and sewage disposal arrangements, apart from the villages of Stapleton and Cleasby. At Cleasby there is a combined sewer which discharges without proper treatment to a ditch and at Stapleton there is a combined sewerage and sewage disposal system which is unsatisfactory. The remaining parishes of Newton Morrell, Cliffe and Over Dinsdale contain only a few scattered dwellinghouses and most of these have their own tank and filter arrangements, about which no complaints have been received.

During 1961 the question of annual cleansing of cesspools without charge was considered by the Council, but was declined on account of the cost. The Council periodically flush and clean sewers and tanks at Cleasby and Stapleton.

The village of Croft was completely sewered and provided a modern sewage disposal works in 1954 and sewers were laid to deal with the village of Dalton in 1963. Due to this and housing development in both places it may be necessary to consider works extension. At Barton a modern sewage disposal works was put in in 1961, and in the future some consideration will have to be given to relaying some of the sewers. The small village of Eryholme had existing sewerage facilities connected to a tank and land irrigation filter in 1961. During 1967 the irrigation filter was renewed. New sewers and sewage disposal works were provided at Manfield in 1962/3.

### Cleasby and Stapleton Sewage Disposal Scheme

This scheme which included the laying of sewers in both villages, a pumping station at Cleasby with rising main to Stapleton, and from there to the Darlington Corporation sewer in Blackwell. The cost of the scheme was estimated to be £40,550 and was approved in 1968, when works commenced.

Towards the end of this year all main sewers had been laid, and the rising main and pumping station were complete and tested. All domestic connections had been made at Stapleton (48) and eleven out of a total of 32 at Cleasby. Minor works including reinstatement were also complete.

### Charges for Treatment of Farm Waste

In connection with farm effluent, the following charges are in force although there are, at present, no farms discharging to the Council's sewers.

For each beast standing in a byre which is daily cleansed and washed down 30s. Od. (£1.50) per head per annum.

For each beast standing in a fold yard or loose box 7s. 6d.  $(£0.37\frac{1}{2})$  per head per annum.

For each pig (breeding sow or boar) 10s. Od. (£0.50) per head per annum.

### Scavenging

Public scavenging is carried out through the whole of the Council's area by contract. The occupiers of houses are instructed to bring their bins to the roadside and a fortnightly collection is made, the cost being £2,202 per annum. There are no public refuse tips belonging to the Council in the area.

During the year 1967, the Council rejected an application for a weekly collection of refuse to be made in the Rural District on the grounds that the present services meets the need of the community.

The Council have made arrangements for the collection of abandoned vehicles by a firm of car breakers and collection of bulky articles by the Council's Refuse Collectors and felt that this would satisfy the requirements of the Civic Amenities Act 1967, although to date no such action has been necessary.

### Litter Baskets

Litter baskets are situated at Barton (3), Cleasby (1), Croft (2), Manfield (2), Dalton(1), and Stapleton (2) and are emptied by the Contractor every fortnight.

Litter baskets are emptied in laybys adjacent to trunk roads by the County Council on behalf of the Ministry of Transport.

### Bus Shelters

There are six bus shelters in the area, one at Cleasby, one at Manfield, two at Barton, one at Dalton and one provided by the local residents at Stapleton.

### Maintenance of Council Sewage Works

The Council employs one man who visits wach Sewage Works for maintenance purposes; rodding of sewers and other minor cleansing duties and rodent control work on sewers. Since Manfield Sewage Works were brought into commission he has had less time to deal with choked sewers and some of the work had to be carried out on a rechargeable basis by Darlington Rural District Council.

### Rivers and Streams, River Pollution Prevention

During the year, the Northumbrian River Board who are responsible for the prevention of pollution of the rivers and streams in the area have continued to work in close co-operation with the Department.

Copies of analysis of effluents from the Council's works where they are likely to affect the rivers and streams are sent to us periodically. The Pollution Officer of the Board is kept advised as to the position regarding our new schemes for sewerage and sewage disposal and of any improvements carried out to our existing works.
