Professional Nursing in the Home.

(a) GENERAL. The Crompton Sick Nursing Association, which is supported by voluntary contributions, employ two nurses. These nurses visit non-infectious cases upon the written request of the medical man in attendance. For attendance at operations a fee is charged (usually $\pounds 1$ 1s. 0d.)

(b) INFECTIOUS CASES. The majority of Scarlet Fever and Diphtheria cases are sent to hospital at the expense of the Local Authority. If efficient isolation can be obtained in the home, the case is nursed there, either by the mother, relative or paid help. At the request of the doctor any infectious case is sent to Hospital, provided there is accommodation.

Clinics and Treatment Centres.

There is a Maternity and Child Welfare Clinic (consultation) open every Tuesday, from 2-0 p.m. to 4-0 p.m., at the East Crompton Church Institute, St. James' Street, Shaw. A Clinic and Treatment Centre is also held there.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA. WATER.

The water supply of this District is very good, and is derived from the Oldham Corporation Reservoirs.

A few farms and houses in the outlying districts are supplied from wells and springs.

RIVERS AND STREAMS.

There is no serious pollution of these from trade effluents. As a result of extensive sewering and draining of house property during the past few years, very little pollution takes place from this source.

SCHOOLS.

The Sanitary condition and water supply of Schools is quite satisfactory.

CLOSET ACCOMMODATION.

Except in remote parts of the District, the whole of the pail closets in Crompton have been converted to the fresh water closet type.

The closet accommodation is therefore highly satisfactory.

SCAVENGING.

All household refuse is collected once weekly by two motors owned by the Council and is disposed of by incineration at the Destructor.

157 barrels of nightsoil were tipped into the sewer at Jubilee.

REFUSE DESTRUCTOR.

The plant comprises three cells made by Dawson & Mansfield.

3,959 loads of household refuse were received and burned.

A bailing press for reducing the bulk of tins, scrap iron, etc., is in use.

DISINFESTATION AND DISINFECTION.

The furniture of 88 housing tenants was subjected to treatment before entry into the new Council Houses. This was effected by spraying with insecticide before leaving the house, and then to fumigation whilst in the removal van at the Town Hall Yard.

4 houses were treated for vermin at the request of the owner or occupier; a charge being made in each case.

After Infectious Disease infected rooms are sprayed with formaldehyde and afterwards fumigated with formalin lamps.

44 houses were disinfected during the year.

All bedding and infected articles were subjected to steam at the Disinfecting Station or immersed in liquid disinfectant.

MILK. SUMMARY OF MILK EXAMINATIONS DURING 1938.

*Out District Supply. Action is taken to improve the milk where necessary.

Milk containing extraneous matter, etc., over 6 parts per 100,000 is treated as unclean milk.

All Farmers are supplied with a copy of the Examination Certificate with suggestions typed at the foot.

Four samples showed the presence of Tubercle Bacilli. Action was taken by the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries.

Regarding 293, a second sample (308) taken a few weeks later, showed considerable improvement.

MEAT AND OTHER FOODS INSPECTION.

During the year visits were paid to the Market Ground, Slaughterhouses, Meat Shops, Bakehouses and places where food is prepared for sale.

The notification of Tuberculosis in this District is very satisfactory.

REPORT OF THE TUBERCULOSIS OFFICER FOR THE YEAR 1938.

During the year 1938, 15 notifications of patients suffering from tuberculosis were received. Of these, 9 were notified as suffering from tuberculosis of the lungs, 6 from nonpulmonary tuberculosis.

Of the 9 pulmonary cases, 6 were found to have tubercle bacilli in the sputum, and 3 had no sputum.

The 6 non-pulmonary cases are classified as follows :--

Glands, 3; Abdomen, 1; Spine, 1; Testicle, 1.

2 of the notified cases died during the year (2 pulmonary).

14 of the cases applied for treatment. In the remaining 1 case no application was made for the following reason:—

Died immediately after notification.

Of the patients who applied for treatment 3 were sent to Sanatoria, 3 to Pulmonary Hospital, 1 to General Hospital, and 1 to Orthopædic Hospital. The remaining 6 cases were under dispensary supervision only.

In addition to the notified cases, a number of patients are sent to the Dispensary for diagnosis. During the year, 30 new cases were sent for diagnosis by the doctors, School Medical Officers, etc.

The number of re-attendances of old patients at the Dispensary for supervision and arrangements for treatment was 182.

Special enquiries are made as to the health of other inmates of the house where there are patients suffering from definite tuberculosis, and 2 of these contacts were examined during the year.

In supervision and visiting, special attention is paid to open cases, i.e., cases were tubercle bacilli are present or have been found in the sputum. On the 1st January ,1938, there were 27 such cases known to be living in the district. On the 31st December, 1938, there were 26 positive cases living. These figures include quiescent and arrested cases.

6 of the positive cases died during the year.

1 positive case removed from the district during the year.

The condition as to isolation of the positive cases was as follows :---

13 of the positive cases were in Institution for treatment and isolation at some time during the year.

The number of positive cases living at 31st December, 1938, who had tubercle bacilli in the sputum during 1938 was 17. The other 9 had either negative or no sputum.

Of the 17 cases who had tubercle bacilli in the sputum during 1938, 8 had separate room, 2 had separate bed, 3 were unable to have separate bed, and 4 were in Institution at the end of the year.

One housing defect was reported during the year. It had not been remedied by the end of the year.

36 specimens of sputum were examined at the Ashton Laboratory during the year. Of these, 13 were positive, and 23 were negative.
