Ambulance Facilities.

(a) INFECTIOUS CASES. Motor Ambulance from Westhulme Hospital, Oldham.

(b) OTHER CASES. This authority is a constituent member of the Oldham & District Joint Ambulance Scheme. The service is efficient.

Clinics and Treatment Centres.

There is a Maternity and Child Welfare Clinic (consultation) open every Tuesday, from 2-0 p.m. to 4-0 p.m., at the East Crompton Church Institute, St. James' Street, Shaw. A Clinic and Treatment Centre is also held there.

These services are under the jurisdiction of the Lancashire County Council.

Prevalence of, and Control over Infectious Disease.

The year was noteworthy for the marked reduction not only in the overall total of notified cases of infectious diseases but for a similar reduction in the numbers of each of the commoner infectious diseases. The highest notified in any one disease was 30 cases of Whooping Cough as opposed to 71 in 1945. Measles fell from 219 to 29 notified cases, Scarlet Fever from 31 to 14, and Diphtheria from 5 to 1. There was no fatality. Diphtheria Immunisation has been practised vigorously, and Table E shows the total number of cases immunised since the inception of the scheme, arranged according to age and year of innoculation.

New Cases and Mortality during 1946.

Tuberculosis.

Non-notified Tuberculosis Deaths, Nil.

The number of cases of infectious disease occurring in Crompton in 1946, classified according to age and disease is shown in Table B, and the number of deaths classified according to cause and age is shown in Table C at the end of the report.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA. WATER.

The water supply of this District is very good, and is derived from the Oldham Corporation Reservoirs.

A few farms and houses in the outlying districts are supplied from wells and springs.

RIVERS AND STREAMS.

There is no serious pollution of these from trade effluents. As a result of extensive sewering and draining of house property during 1921 — 1939, very little pollution takes place from this source.

SCHOOLS.

The Sanitary condition and water supply of Schools is quite satisfactory.

CLOSET ACCOMMODATION.

Except in remote parts of the District, the whole of the pail closets in Crompton have been converted to the fresh water closet type.

SCAVENGING.

All household refuse is collected by two motors owned by the Council, and is disposed of by incineration and tipping at the Destructor.

157 barrels of nightsoil were tipped into the sewer at Jubilee.

REFUSE DESTRUCTOR.

The plant comprises three cells made by Dawson & Mansfield.

2,286 loads of household refuse were burned or tipped.

Baling Presses for reducing the bulk of tins, scrap iron, paper, etc., are in use.

RODENT CONTROL

In December, 1946, a survey of all premises was completed and preparation was made to treat infested premises during the first three months of 1947, in accordance with N.S. 12 Order of the Ministry of Food.

A maintenance treatment of all sewers in the District, involving the baiting and poisoning of about 450 manholes, was carried out during the month of June, 1946 with very satisfactory results.

Action was also taken to deal with infested premises in various parts of the District.

DISINFESTATION AND DISINFECTION.

After Infectious Disease infected rooms are sprayed with formaldehyde and afterwards fumigated with formalin lamps.

27 houses were disinfected during the year.

All bedding and infected articles were subjected to steam at the Disinfecting Station or immersed in liquid disinfectant.

3 houses were treated for vermin.

There are 2 houses of this type, 1 is used as Weekly Lodgings, 1 as a Common Lodging House.

They have been frequently inspected and found to be in a fairly clean condition.

SLAUGHTER HOUSES.

There are 8 private slaughter houses licensed.

Slaughtering has been centralised for a number of years, and now takes place at Oldham. Only an occasional animal is slaughtered in Crompton now.
