STAFF.

Your School Medical Officer is still without any Medical Assistants, they having left for service on the dates mentioned in the Report for 1915.

Dr. Mark S. Fraser returned to the Department from Military Service in May, 1916, and again rejoined the Army for further service in February, 1917.

During the time he was in the County the whole of his time was devoted to School Medical Service.

No routine Medical Inspection was undertaken, but he examined all known defectives, as well as those to whom his attention was specially drawn by several Head Teachers, Attendance Officers or Nurses. The Nurses have regularly visited the Schools, particularly with the object of maintaining cleanliness, seeing that minor defects were treated, and seeing that those children requiring medical attention from Private Practitioners were receiving it.

TREATMENT.

As mentioned in my last Report, the suggested scheme of treatment which has already been fully dealt with in an earlier report, has not yet been started, owing to the depletion of the Medical and Nursing Staffs, and it has been difficult to secure the treatment of our cases by Private Practitioners, owing to so many having joined the army.

The preliminary steps which were taken to start School Clinics had also to be abandoned, owing to the war.

During the year the Nurses paid 1,232 visits in efforts to secure treatment for 1,086 cases.

435 cases were referred to various Medical Practitioners for treatment. In 21 cases the parents objected to, and for other reasons 279 did not get treatment.

86 were treated, 37 are in suspense, and 23 were for one reason or another refused treatment.

Of the minor ailments treated by the Nurses under the direction of the School Medical Officer were :—

63 cases of Blepharitis.

28 ,, Slightly enlarged tonsils.

451 other minor ailments, and

109 cases although not notified, were treated by private practitioners.

EXAMINATION OF PROSPECTIVE PUPIL TEACHERS.

During the year under review, I have medically examined 88 cases, 70 girls and 18 boys, for the teaching profession. All the boys were passed, and of the 70 girls examined, it was found necessary to reject 4 upon medical grounds.

NUMBERS EXAMINED.

During the year under review, the number of children examined under the heading "Code" Group has been 2,037, and the number examined as "Special" cases has been 4,077.

Of the former number (2,037) 266 or 13.05% were referred for treatment, and 1,215, of 59.6% were required to be kept under observation.

Similarly with regard to the "Specials" (4,077), 804, or 19,7%, were referred for treatment, and 2,278, or 55.8%, were for further observation

At each School, after the known or suspected defectives were examined, an inspection of the remainder of the children was made to pick out any delicate looking or obviously defective children. In addition to these, the parents of any children who had been absent for some considerable time were written to, and requested to bring their children to School for re-examination. In this way all the more urgent cases have been dealt with. The number of children so inspected at the various Schools amount to 8,189.
