

PHYSICAL FEATURES AND GENERAL CHARACTER OF THE DISTRICT.

The Borough of Dartford is situate in the lower portion of the Darenth Valley, and the rising ground to the East and West of the river. The area of the district is 4,240 statute acres.

The district is chiefly an industrial one, but there is a residential area at the west end of the town, in the neighbourhood of The Heath, with a growing number of residents whose business is outside the Borough.

There is, in addition to the ordinary population, a large institutional population as the following institutions are situate in the District:—

London County Council Hospitals, Joyce Green, Orchard and Long Reach. London County Mental Hospital. Kent County Council, King Edward Avenue Hospital. St. Vincent's Industrial School.

There are no industries in the district which have a prejudicial effect on health.

NURSING ARRANGEMENTS, HOSPITALS AND OTHER INSTITUTIONS AVAILABLE FOR THE DISTRICT.

(A) HOME NURSING.

The Dartford District Nursing Association, supported by voluntary contributions, maintains three District Nurses.

The Council make a grant to this Association and in return the services of the Nurses are available for the home nursing of cases of Measles, Whooping Cough and cases referred by the Child Welfare Clinic.

(B) MIDWIVES.

There are six midwives practising in the Borough. The controlling authority for midwives is the Kent County Council.

(C) CLINICS AND TREATMENT CENTRES.

The following are the Clinics and treatment centres in the town :-

Maternity and Child Welfare Centre, Market Street Maintained by the Council

School Clinic, Kent Road Tuberculosis Clinic, Overy Street Venereal Clinic, King Edward Avenue Hospital

Maintained by the Kent County Council.

(D) HOSPITAL SERVICES.

- 1. King Edward Avenue Hospital, West Hill, for General Purposes, under the management of Kent County Council (Public Assistance Committee), available for persons resident in the area under the control of the Public Assistance Committee and by private patients from the same area.
- 2. Livingstone Hospital, East Hill, for General Purposes, supported by Voluntary Contributions under the management of a voluntary committee, available for persons resident in the Dartford Borough and Dartford Rural Districts.
- 3. Bow Arrow Isolation Hospital, Bow Arrow Lane (for Infectious Diseases) under the management of the Joint Hospital Committee, available for persons resident in Dartford Borough, Dartford Rural District, Bexley Urban District, Crayford Urban District, Swanscombe Urban District. Cases of Small Pox are admitted into the London County Council Small Pox Hospital, Joyce Green. The Joint Hospital Committee have under consideration an extension scheme which will provide a new administration block and new wards, making the available accommodation up to 133 beds.

(E) AMBULANCE FACILITIES.

- (i). Infectious Cases.—The Dartford Joint Hospital Committee maintain two ambulances for the removal of cases of infectious disease from their homes to the hospital.
- (ii). General Cases.—The local division of the St. John Ambulance Brigade continues to do very useful work. They maintain a motor ambulance which is available for accidents and the removal of sick persons to local or London hospitals.

During the year 1934, the following cases were dealt with by this ambulance:—

The charges made for the use of the ambulance are as follows:—

To London hospitals and other removals outside the District 9d. per mile (both journeys) with special terms for distances over 100 miles.

There is also a scheme whereby subscribers of a minimum of 1/- per year are entitled to the free use of the ambulance for removals to local hospitals, etc. and at 6d. per mile for longer journeys.

First aid duties are also carried out by members of the division at the local Cinemas, Football Grounds, etc., and road service during the summer months. 193 first aid cases have been attended during the year.

The Ambulance of the Kent County Council Public Assistance Committee is also available, on payment of the scale of charges fixed by the Council, for the removal of patients within and outside the District.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE DISTRICT.

WATER SUPPLY.

The District is supplied with water by the Metropolitan Water Board.

With the exception of a few isolated houses in the rural portions of the district, the whole of the houses are connected to the Metropolitan Water Board's mains.

RIVERS AND STREAMS.

No cases of pollution have been noticed or dealt with during the year.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

The district is, and has been for many years, main sewered, and the water carriage system is general. The sewage is dealt with by the West Kent Main Sewage Board (of which the Dartford Corporation is a constituent Authority) at their works at Long Reach, Dartford.

There are only 81 houses, situated in the more rural areas, which are not connected to the sewers. 98.9% of the houses in the district are connected to the sewers.

During the year three houses previously cesspool drained have been connected to the public sewer.

CLCSET ACCOMMODATION.

The system is a water carriage one. In the more rural portions of the area, where main sewers are not available, there are the following houses with conveniences of the type mentioned:—

The cleansing of cesspools and pail closets is not carried out by the Local Authority but by the owners or occupiers of the premises.

SCAVENGING.

A collection of house refuse is made in the district weekly and in the central portion of the district, twice weekly.

The substitution of motors for horse drawn vehicles for refuse collection has been decided upon and is being carried out.

The refuse is destroyed at the Corporation's destructor, with the exception of that produced at the Bexley Mental Hospital which is dealt with at a small destructor maintained by the Corporation at the Institution.

During the year 40 ash-bins have been provided in lieu of open brick ash-pits.

SANITARY INSPECTION OF DISTRICT.

This is dealt with in the Annual Report of the Sanitary Inspector which is appended hereto.

PUBLIC CONVENIENCES AND BATHS.

The Corporation have provided and maintain the following:-

Public conveniences with wash and brush up facilities and slipper baths for both sexes at the Tram Centre.

Public Conveniences for both sexes at the Central and Hesketh Parks.

Public Conveniences for men near the Cattle Market.

Three Urinals at various parts of the Town.

Open air Swimming Baths in Burnham Road.

The Baths and Public Lavatories at the Tram Centre, which were opened in November, 1931, have continued to prove very useful both to the inhabitants and visitors to the town.

No houses were built by the Corporation during the year, but the completion of the Heath Lane Housing Estate is being proceeded with in 1935.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

The taking of samples under the Sale of Food and Drugs Act is carried out by the Kent County Council, and the County Council being also the Authority under the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts carries out the work under the Tuberculosis Order, 1925.

Twelve samples of Graded milks were taken during the year.

The examination of Graded milks and other bacteriological work in connection with food is carried out by the Kent County Council at the County Bacteriological Laboratory.

No legal action has had to be taken under the Meat Regulations, 1924. There are two registered slaughterhouses in the district, and the notification of the times of slaughtering has been very satisfactory. 234 inspections have been made during the year.

The amount of food destroyed during the year was 14 cwt. 3 qrs. 18 lbs., particulars of which are given in the Sanitary Inspector's Report.

SMALLPOX.

No cases of Small Pox were notified during the year. The disease was prevalent in London and Greater London during the early part of the year, and frequent notifications of contacts have been received and traced and the usual precautions taken.

DIPHTHERIA.

Diphtheria was prevalent during the year. The number of cases (exclusive of cases notified from Institutions) was 59, which is the highest number since 1927. The cases were evenly distributed throughout the whole of the year. All the cases were removed to hospital and, in addition, three suspected cases were admitted for observation and were later discharged as negative.

Contacts with cases notified, and also suspected children referred to the Department by the school teachers are swabbed with a view to the elimination of carriers.

Anti-toxin is supplied free to Medical Practitioners for use in cases of Diphtheria.

SCARLET FEVER.

Scarlet Fever was prevalent both in Dartford and the surrounding districts during the greater part of the year.

The number of cases notified (excluding institutional cases), was 143 as compared with 61 for the previous year. 57 of the cases occurred during the first quarter of the year.

Of the cases notified, 57 were removed to hospital and 86 nursed at home.

There were 6 return cases during the year, one of which was associated with a case nursed in a London County Council Hospital.

ENTERIC FEVER.

No cases of Enteric Fever were notified during the year.

MEASLES.

Measles is not notifiable under the Infectious Diseases (Notification) Act, but the cases amongst children of school age are notified to the Department by the Head Teachers of Schools.

Home visitation of cases of measles is carried out by the nurses of the District Nursing Association when thought desirable.

Arrangements are in force whereby if the conditions are unsuitable for home nursing, cases can be admitted into the Bow Arrow Hospital.

The disease was prevalent during the last three months of the year.

CANCER.

INFLUENZA.

The incidence of influenza during the year was again of a mild type and calls for no special mention.

DISINFECTION.

Upon removal of cases of infectious diseases to Hospital or upon recovery of cases nursed at home, the rooms are disinfected with formalin and the bedding removed for steam disinfection.

Disinfection is also carried out after death from tuberculosis and if requested after death from cancer.

MATERNITY HOME.

Arrangements are made for the admission of cases into the British Home for Mothers and Babies, Woolwich, and financial assistance is given according to scale of income.

PUERPERAL FEVER and PUERPERAL PYREXIA REGULATIONS 1926.

Arrangements have been made under these regulations for :-

- (a) The admission of cases requiring hospital treatment into the North Western Hospital of the London County Council.
- (b) The services of an obstetric consultant when required.
- (c) The Dartford District Nursing Association to undertake home nursing where hospital treatment is not necessary.

One case of Puerperal Pyrexia was notified during the year.

The investigation of maternal deaths is undertaken by the County Medical Officer.

TREATMENT OF SQUINT.

Arrangements are in force for the treatment of squint in children under school age by the School Ophthalmic Surgeon. One case was referred for treatment during the year.

ORTHOPÆDIC TREATMENT.

During the year three children received treatment under the Kent County Council scheme for the orthopædic treatment of children under school age.

DENTAL TREATMENT TO MOTHERS AND CHILDREN.

Three children and two mothers were granted assistance in accordance with the Council's Scheme for dental treatment during the year.

OPHTHALMIA NEONATORUM.

No cases were notified during the year. Children requiring treatment for Ophthalmia Neonatorum can be received into St. Margaret's Hospital by arrangement with the London County Council.

PUBLIC HEALTH (PREVENTION OF TUBERCULOSIS) REGULATIONS 1925.

No action has had to be taken with regard to cases of Tuberculosis in persons connected with the milk trade.

SECTION 62 PUBLIC HEALTH ACT 1925.

No action has been taken during the year with regard to compulsory removal of cases of Tuberculosis under this section.

VENEREAL DISEASES.

The Kent County Council is the Authority dealing with this group of diseases. A local Clinic is held by them at the King Edward Avenue Hospital.
