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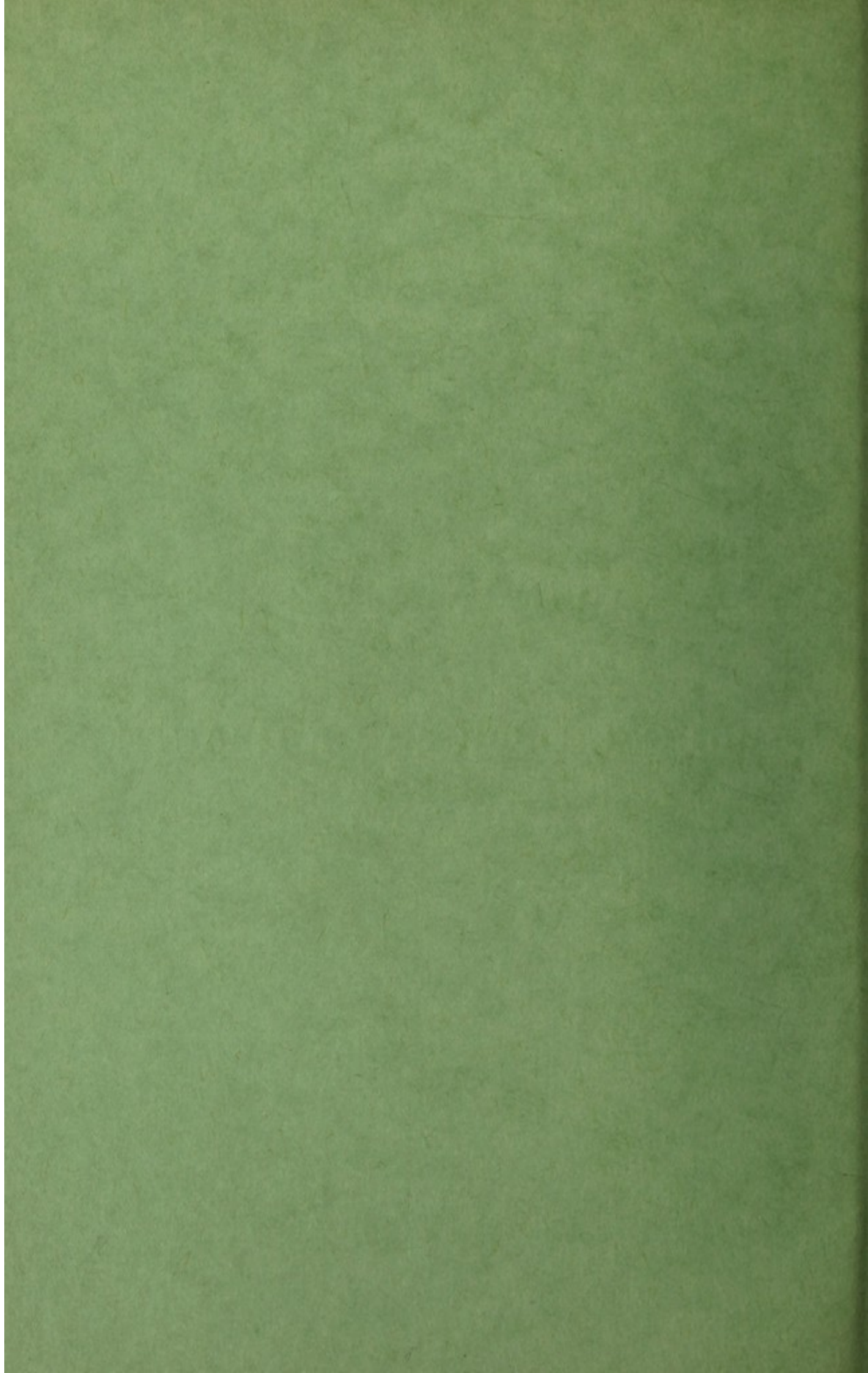

PHYSICAL FEATURES AND GENERAL CHARACTER OF THE DISTRICT.

The Borough of Dartford is situate in the lower portion of the Darent Valley, and the rising ground to the East and West of the river. The area of the district is 4,234 statute acres.

The centre and eastern parts of the district are mainly industrial, whilst the western portion near the Heath is residential and suburban in character with a large number of residents whose business is outside the Borough.

There is, in addition to the ordinary population, a large institutional population as the following institutions are situate in the District :—

NURSING ARRANGEMENTS, HOSPITALS AND OTHER INSTITUTIONS AVAILABLE FOR THE DISTRICT.

(A) HOME NURSING.

The Dartford District Nursing Association, supported by voluntary contributions, maintains three District Nurses.

The Corporation make a grant to this Association and in return the services of the Nurses are available for the home nursing of cases of Measles, Whooping Cough and cases referred by the Medical Officer of Health.

(B) MIDWIVES.

The Kent County Council is the controlling authority for Midwives in the Borough and also under the Midwives Act, 1936. They have three salaried midwives available for this district.

In addition there are two other midwives practising in the Borough.

There is close co-operation between the County Council and the Borough Maternity and Child Welfare Department.

(C) CLINICS AND TREATMENT CENTRES.

In connection with the County Hospital there are Ophthalmic, Orthopædic, Neurological, X-Ray, Electrical, Urological, and Dental Clinics available for residents in the area of the Dartford Public Assistance Committee as out-patients.

Also at the Livingstone Hospital there are X-Ray and Electrical Clinics.

(D) HOSPITAL SERVICES.

The following hospitals are situated in the district and are available for the residents. In addition to these, the facilities offered by the London hospitals, which are within a reasonable distance, are used by the inhabitants.

1. The County Hospital, West Hill, for General Purposes, under the management of Kent County Council (Public Assistance Committee), available for persons resident in the area under the control of the Public Assistance Committee and by private patients from the same area. Extensions of this Hospital were commenced in 1937 and are still in progress.

2. Livingstone Hospital, East Hill, for General Purposes, supported by Voluntary Contributions under the management of a voluntary committee, available for persons resident in the Dartford Borough and Dartford Rural Districts. During the year, the new block to accommodate Maternity cases was completed and opened.

3. Bow Arrow Isolation Hospital, Bow Arrow Lane (for Infectious Diseases) under the management of the Joint Hospital Committee, available for persons resident in Dartford Borough, Dartford Rural District, Bexley Urban District, Crayford Urban District, and Swanscombe Urban District.

The total accommodation for patients is 140 beds. During the year new gate lodges with controlled entrance gates were completed.

Cases of Small Pox are admitted into the London County Council Small Pox Hospital, Joyce Green, by agreement with the London County Council.

(E) AMBULANCE FACILITIES.

(i). INFECTIOUS CASES.—The Dartford Joint Hospital Committee maintain two ambulances for the removal of cases of infectious disease from their homes to the hospital.

(ii). GENERAL CASES.—The local division of the St. John Ambulance Brigade continues to do very useful work. They maintain two motor ambulances which are available for accidents day and night and the removal of sick persons to local or London hospitals.

The charges made for the use of the ambulances are as follows:—

To London hospitals and other removals outside the District 1/- per mile (both journeys) with special terms for distances over 100 miles.

There is also a scheme whereby subscribers of a minimum of 1/- per year are entitled to the free use of the ambulances for removals to local hospitals, etc., and at 6d. per mile for longer journeys. H.S.A. vouchers are also accepted in payment.

First aid duties are also carried out by members of the division at the local Cinemas, Football Grounds, etc., and road service during the summer months.

The ambulances of the Kent County Council Public Assistance Committee are also available, on payment of the scale of charges fixed by the Council, for the removal of patients within and outside the District.

The ambulance services in the area are quite adequate for both infectious and non-infectious cases.

The ambulance services for non-infectious cases are not under the direct control of the Corporation. There is no official co-ordination between the Corporation and the ambulance services of the St. John Ambulance Brigade and the Public Assistance Committee, but there is close co-operation which is found to work quite well in practice.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE DISTRICT.

WATER SUPPLY.

The District is supplied with water by the Metropolitan Water Board.

With the exception of isolated houses, the whole of the houses are connected to the Metropolitan Water Board's mains.

The supply is from chalk wells at Wilmington, Darenth, Southfleet and Green Street Green. These wells are sampled on every working day and give good bacteriological and chemical results. Southfleet and Green Street Green wells are protected by chloramination and standby chloramine equipment is held for immediate application at the other wells should any untoward condition become apparent. In addition, periodical samples are taken by the Sanitary Inspector. All samples taken during the year have been quite satisfactory.

RIVERS AND STREAMS.

No cases of pollution have been noticed or dealt with during the year.

SANITARY INSPECTION OF DISTRICT.

This is dealt with in the Annual Report of the Sanitary Inspector which is appended hereto.

PUBLIC CONVENIENCES AND BATHS.

The Corporation have provided and maintain the following :—

Public conveniences with wash and brush up facilities and slipper baths for both sexes at Spital Street.

Public Conveniences for both sexes at the Central and Hesketh Parks.

Public Conveniences for both sexes on The Brent.

Public Conveniences for men near the Cattle Market.

Urinal at East Hill.

Open air Swimming Baths in Burnham Road.

The Corporation are also considering the erection of Public Conveniences for both sexes in the vicinity of the Car Park in Market Street.

The open-air Swimming Bath in Burnham Road has a continuous heating and chlorination plant. Samples of the water are taken from time to time and show that the water is maintained in a very satisfactory state. The enlargement and re-construction of this Bath and the sanitary accommodation in connection therewith was completed during the year.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

The district is main sewered, and the water carriage system is general. The sewage is dealt with by the West Kent Main Sewerage Board (of which the Dartford Corporation is a constituent Authority) at their works at Long Reach, Dartford.

There are only 82 houses, situated in the more rural areas, which are not connected to the sewers. Over 99% of the houses in the district are connected to the sewers.

The only extensions of sewers that have been carried out during the year have been those in connection with the various building estates being developed in the Borough.

CLOSET ACCOMMODATION.

The system is a water carriage one. In the more rural portions of the area, where main sewers are not available, there are the following houses with conveniences of the type mentioned :—

The cleansing of cesspools and pail closets is not carried out by the Local Authority but by the owners or occupiers of the premises.

SCAVENGING.

House refuse is collected weekly except in the centre of the town, where the collection is twice weekly.

The collection is almost entirely by motor vehicles. The refuse is disposed of by controlled tipping at the Heath Lane tip. An incinerator is provided for the disposal of condemned meat, etc.

ERADICATION OF VERMIN.

During the year the following steps have been taken by the Health Department and the Housing Superintendent with regard to the eradication of bed bugs.

Slight infestations are sprayed with Zaldecide, bad infestations are fumigated either with "Cimex" or Lawes Chemical Blocks.

All prospective tenants' furniture and effects are inspected before they are allowed to move into a Council house. If vermin are discovered, the furniture is treated at the house being vacated; in the new Council house; or, in bad cases, the furniture is treated in both houses.

The disinestation is carried out by the Council's own men, and not by a contractor.

PUBLIC ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS.

There are two Central and nine Junior schools in the district. These are well lighted and ventilated, and the water supply and sanitary conditions are generally satisfactory. No alterations or extensions were carried out during the year.

PROPAGANDA.

The department co-operated in the National Health Campaign and posters were exhibited and leaflets distributed in connection therewith.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

The taking of samples under the Sale of Food and Drugs Act is carried out by the Kent County Council, and the County Council being also the Authority under the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts carries out the work under the Tuberculosis Order, 1925.

Fourteen samples of Graded milks were taken during the year.

The examination of Graded milks and other bacteriological work in connection with food is carried out by the Kent County Council at the County Bacteriological Laboratory.

No legal action has had to be taken under the Meat Regulations, 1924. There is one registered slaughterhouse in the district, and the notification of the times of slaughtering has been very satisfactory. 227 inspections have been made during the year.

The amount of unsound food destroyed during the year was 2 tons, 15 cwts., 26 lbs., particulars of which are given in the Sanitary Inspector's Report.

INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

SMALLPOX.

No cases of Small-pox were notified during the year.

DIPHTHERIA.

The number of cases of Diphtheria notified (exclusive of Institutional cases) was 46, a higher number than the three preceding years.

The incidence was spread over the whole year and the cases occurred in the following wards of the Borough:—

With the exception of one case, the whole of the patients were removed to hospital.

Facilities for immunisation have been provided at the Public Health Department since 1935. The prophylactic used in Toxoid-Antitoxin-Floccules (Suspension).

All new boys received into this school are immunised on admission.

Contacts with cases notified, and also children referred to the Department by the school teachers, are swabbed with a view to the elimination of carriers.

Anti-toxin is supplied free to Medical Practitioners for use in cases of Diphtheria.

SCARLET FEVER.

The number of cases of Scarlet Fever notified (exclusive of Institutional cases) was 71, which was higher than the two preceding years but below the average of the past five years.

The incidence of the disease was distributed evenly throughout the year and over the whole of the Borough as follows:—

MEASLES.

There was no particular incidence of the disease during the year.

Home visitation of cases of measles is carried out by the nurses of the District Nursing Association when thought desirable.

Arrangements are in force whereby if the conditions are unsuitable for home nursing, cases are admitted into the Bow Arrow Hospital.

BIRTH CONTROL CLINIC.

This Clinic was held monthly during the year. 36 new cases received advice and 110 attendances were made. Every care is taken to see that the objects of the Clinic are fulfilled.

MATERNITY HOME.

Negotiations took place during the year for the admission of cases into the County Hospital and the Livingstone Hospital and for the necessary financial assistance to be given in necessitous cases. The scheme will come into operation in 1939.

PUERPERAL PYREXIA.

Arrangements have been made for:—

- (a) The admission of cases requiring hospital treatment into the Isolation Hospital of the Joint Hospital Committee at Bow Arrow Lane and into the North Western Hospital of the London County Council.
- (b) The services of an obstetric consultant when required.
- (c) The Dartford District Nursing Association to undertake home nursing where hospital treatment is not necessary.

Seven cases of Puerperal Pyrexia and two cases of Puerperal Fever were notified during the year. The two cases of Puerperal Fever and two cases of Puerperal Pyrexia were notified from the County Hospital and one case of Puerperal Pyrexia from the Livingstone Hospital.

The investigation of maternal deaths is undertaken by the County Medical Officer.

TREATMENT OF SQUINT.

Arrangements are in force for the treatment of squint in children under school age by the School Ophthalmic Surgeon. Two cases were referred for treatment during the year.

ORTHOPÆDIC TREATMENT.

During the year nine children received treatment under the Kent County Council scheme for the orthopædic treatment of children under school age.

DENTAL TREATMENT TO MOTHERS AND CHILDREN.

One child and six mothers were granted assistance in accordance with the Council's Scheme for dental treatment during the year.

OPHTHALMIA NEONATORUM.

Two cases of Ophthalmia Neonatorum were notified during the year. One case was notified from the County Hospital and this child became totally blind.

Children requiring treatment for Ophthalmia Neonatorum can be received into St. Margaret's Hospital by arrangement with the London County Council.

PUBLIC HEALTH (PREVENTION OF TUBERCULOSIS) REGULATIONS 1925.

No action has had to be taken with regard to cases of Tuberculosis in persons connected with the milk trade.

SECTION 172, PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 1936.

No action has been taken during the year with regard to compulsory removal of cases of Tuberculosis under this section.

VENEREAL DISEASES.

The Kent County Council is the Authority dealing with this group of diseases. A local Clinic is held by them at The County Hospital.
