

PHYSICAL FEATURES AND GENERAL CHARACTER OF THE DISTRICT.

The Borough of Dartford is situate in the lower portion of the Darent Valley, and the rising ground to the East and West of the river. The area of the district is 4,234 statute acres, land and water.

The district is chiefly an industrial one. The residential area at the west end of the town, in the neighbourhood of The Heath, however, continues to develop, and there is a growing number of residents whose business is outside the Borough.

There is, in addition to the ordinary population, a large institutional population as the following institutions are situate in the District:—

London County Council Hospitals, Joyce Green, Orchard and Long Reach. London County Mental Hospital. Kent County Council, The County Hospital. St. Vincent's Industrial School.

STAPLE INDUSTRIES.

The principal industries of the district are: -

Engineering. Manufacture of Drugs and Chemicals. Paper Making. Flour Milling.

There are no industries in the district which have a prejudicial effect on health.

NURSING ARRANGEMENTS, HOSPITALS AND OTHER INSTITUTIONS AVAILABLE FOR THE DISTRICT.

(A) HOME NURSING.

The Dartford District Nursing Association, supported by voluntary contributions, maintains three District Nurses.

The Corporation make a grant to this Association and in return the services of the Nurses are available for the home nursing of cases of Measles, Whooping Cough and cases referred by the Medical Officer of Health.

(B) HOME HELP SCHEME.

The Corporation have a scheme for the provision of home helps for maternity cases.

Two home helps were employed full time during the year for this purpose and a register is kept of women who are willing to assist when more than two are required.

(C) MIDWIVES.

Three County Midwives are appointed to attend cases in the Borough and in addition one other Midwife practises in the area.

(D) CLINICS AND TREATMENT CENTRES.

The following are the Clinics and treatment centres in the town: -

Maternity and Child Welfare Clinics, Market Street. Maintained by the Council.

School Clinic, King Edward Avenue Ma
Tuberculosis Clinic, Overy Street
Venereal Clinic, The County Hospital ...

Maintained by the Kent County Council.

In connection with the County Hospital there are Ophthalmic, Orthopædic, Neurological, X-Ray, Electrical, Urological, and Dental Clinics available for residents in the area of the Dartford Public Assistance Committee as out-patients.

Also at the Livingstone Hospital there are X-Ray and Electrical Clinics.

(E) HOSPITAL SERVICES.

The following hospitals are situated in the district and are available for the residents. In addition to these, the facilities offered by the London hospitals, which are within a reasonable distance, are used by the inhabitants.

- 1. The County Hospital, West Hill, for General Purposes and Maternity, under the management of Kent County Council, available for persons resident in the area.
- 2. Livingstone Hospital, East Hill, for General Purposes and Maternity, supported by Voluntary Contributions under the management of a voluntary committee, available for persons resident in the Dartford Borough and Dartford Rural Districts.
- 3. Bow Arrow Isolation Hospital, Bow Arrow Lane (for Infectious Diseases), under the management of the Joint Hospital Committee, available for persons resident in Dartford Borough, Dartford Rural District, Bexley Borough, Crayford Urban District, and Swanscombe Urban District.

Cases of Small Pox are admitted into the London County Council Small Pox Hospital, Joyce Green.

(F) AMBULANCE FACILITIES.

(i) INFECTIOUS CASES.—The Dartford Joint Hospital Committee maintain two ambulances for the removal of cases of infectious disease from their homes to the hospital.

(ii) GENERAL CASES.—The local division of the St. John Ambulance Brigade continues to do very useful work. They maintain a motor ambulance which is available for accidents day and night and the removal of sick persons to local or London hospitals.

The ambulances of the Kent County Council are also available for the removal of patients within and outside the District.

LABORATORY WORK.

BACTERIOLOGICAL EXAMINATIONS.

The work is carried out at the Kent County Council Laboratory, Sessions House, Maidstone.

BYE-LAWS.

The Corporation have Bye-laws relating to the following: -

Common Lodging Houses.

The Bye-laws relating to Offensive Trades and Fish Frying were, with the approval of the Minister of Health, revised and brought up to date during the year.

During the year the Council by resolution applied section 16 (2) of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938, to the sale of all articles of food within the Borough. This requires the name and address of the vendor to be legibly and conspicuously displayed on all stalls, vehicles, etc., from which food is sold.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE DISTRICT.

Water Supply.

The Borough is supplied with water by the Metropolitan Water Board. The supply is from deep chalk wells and is satisfactory in both quality and quantity. The water is chlorine treated, and has no plumbo-solvent action.

Frequent tests are carried out by the Board and in addition periodical samples are taken by the Sanitary Inspector and submitted to the County Laboratory for bacteriological examination. All samples taken during the year were satisfactory.

With the exception of nine houses, all houses in the Borough are supplied from the Board's mains. Of the nine houses not on the Board's mains eight are supplied from deep artesian wells.

Drainage and Sewerage.

The district is main sewered, and the water carriage system is general. The sewage is dealt with by the West Kent Main Sewerage Board (of which the Dartford Corporation is a constituent Authority) at their works at Long Reach, Dartford. Their system of treatment is very satisfactory, and no complaints have been received regarding the outfall works during the year.

There are only 102 houses, situated in the more rural areas, which are not connected to the sewers. Over 99% of the houses in the district are connected to the sewers.

Rivers and Streams.

No cases of river pollution were dealt with during the year.

Closet Accommodation.

The system is a water carriage one. In the portions of the area where main sewers are not available, there are the following houses with conveniences of the type mentioned:—

W.C.'s connected to cesspools 76 and 8 flats Pail Closets 18

The cleansing of cesspools and pail closets is not carried out by the Local Authority but by the owners or occupiers of the premises.

Scavenging.

House refuse is dealt with by controlled tipping at the Corporation's Heath Lane Tip.

Routine treatment of the tip with a proprietory dressing containing D.D.T. has been carried out during the year. Apart from occasional complaints regarding flies during the very warm weather there has been no nuisance.

PUBLIC CONVENIENCES AND BATHS.

The Corporation have provided and maintain the following: -

Public conveniences with wash and brush up facilities and slipper baths for both sexes at Spital Street.

Public Conveniences for both sexes at the Central and Hesketh Parks.

Public Conveniences for both sexes on The Brent.

Public Conveniences for men near the Cattle Market.

Open air Swimming Baths in Burnham Road.

The open-air Swimming Bath in Burnham Road has a continuous heating and chlorination plant. Samples of the water are taken from time to time and show that the water is maintained in a very satisfactory state.

ERADICATION OF VERMIN AND CLEANSING.

During the year disinfestation was carried out at 50 houses by spraying with suitable vermicides by the Corporation's disinfector. Where necessary the owners were requested to strip the rooms and loosen the skirting boards, etc.

The treatment of scabies is carried out at the Cleansing Station, King Edward Avenue.

During the year 62 males and 95 females were treated.

The cases were notified by the medical practitioners or referred to the department by the School Medical Service. As far as possible, the whole of the family are treated when a case is notified.

The Health Visitors and the staff of the Day Nursery keep observation with regard to head lice and general cleanliness and provision is made for treatment of cases found.

SANITARY INSPECTION OF THE DISTRICT.

This is dealt with in the Annual Report of the Sanitary Inspectors which is appended hereto.

HOUSING.

Good progress has been made during the year in the provision of houses in the Borough. The number of houses completed during the year is 276, made up as follows:—

HOUSING ACT, 1936.

Shortages of building materials and labour and limitations upon permissible expenditure upon repairs are still causing rapid deterioration of properties, and unless the position shows some improvement, houses which could at present be made fit, will become totally unfit for human habitation.

During 1947 official representation was made in accordance with Section 25 of the Housing Act, 1936, with respect to 125 houses in the Heath Street, South Street, West Street, Manor Place and Lowfield Street area.

SMALLPOX.

No cases of Small Pox were notified during the year.

DIPHTHERIA.

Three cases of Diphtheria were notified during the year, compared with nine in 1946.

On admittance to hospital 2 cases notified were found to be bacteriologically negative.

Contacts with cases notified, and also children referred to the Department by the school teachers, are swabbed with a view to the elimination of carriers.

Anti-toxin is supplied free to Medical Practitioners for use in cases of Diphtheria.

An Immunisation Clinic is held weekly at the M. & C. W. Clinic, and in addition there is a scheme for immunisation by the medical practitioners in the district.

During the year 545 children were immunised and 113 children given a secondary or reinforcing injection.

SCARLET FEVER.

The number of Scarlet Fever cases notified (exclusive of institutional cases) was 69 as compared with 36 in 1946.

Of these cases 44 were nursed at home and 25 removed to hospital.

There were no return cases during the year.

ENTERIC FEVER.

One case was notified during the year from residents in the Borough.

MEASLES.

There were 137 cases of Measles during the year.

Home visitation of cases of measles is carried out by the nurses of the District Nursing Association when thought desirable.

Arrangements are in force whereby if the conditions are unsuitable for home nursing, cases are admitted into the Bow Arrow Hospital.

INFLUENZA.

The incidence of influenza was again of a mild type and calls for no special mention.

FOOD POISONING.

No case of Food Poisoning was notified during the year.

Annual Report of Chief Sanitary Inspector.

SIR, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg to present my twenty-seventh annual report which, in view of my impending retirement, will be my last report.

In these twenty-seven years the department has expanded and its work and responsibilities have greatly increased, due to the growth of the town and its population, the additional legislation relating to Public Health and Housing and to the increased responsibilities with regard to the inspection of food and of the premises where food is stored and prepared. Also, in 1938 the Corporation were constituted a Food and Drug Authority and took over from the Kent County Council the duties of sampling, etc., under the Food and Drugs Act, 1938.

The following is a summary of the work carried out by the Sanitary Inspectors during the year 1947: —

HOUSING ACT, 1936.

Routine inspections under this Act are still held up owing to the lack of alternative accommodation in cases where the houses would be dealt with by closing and subsequent demolition, and in the case of repair, by the shortage of building materials and labour.

The Heath Street area has been reviewed during the year and after an interview between representatives of the Corporation and the Ministry of Health the idea of dealing with it as a "Re-Development Area" was abandoned and the Medical Officer of Health represented the area as a "Clearance Area" in December, 1947, and it is hoped that the area will now be dealt with without undue delay.

Until this year the extended powers given by the Food and Drugs Act, 1938, with regard to premises where food is prepared have, to some extent, been held in abeyance owing to the war.

During the year conditions at the whole of the restaurant kitchens and coffee shops,

etc., in the Borough were reviewed.

Excluding industrial and school canteens there are thirty five premises at which meals are served, including six licensed houses, twenty three restaurants and seven coffee stalls or snack bars.

A very high standard of hygiene is maintained at 14 of the premises. This number included the licensed houses and premises which were either built specifically for use as restaurants or which were structurally suitable for satisfactory conversions to be made.

Fourteen contraventions of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938, involving eight premises, have resulted from the building of unauthorised extensions at the rear of premises, some of which were never suitable for use as restaurant kitchens. These extensions have resulted in most inadequate ventilation, and the enclosure of sink waste gullies and W.C. compartments in rooms used for the preparation of food.

The defects found at these premises have been, or are being, dealt with.

ICE CREAM.

During the year particular attention has been given to the premises where ice cream is manufactured or sold and as a result the hygiene standard of these premises has been improved.

As a result of the requirements of the Ice Cream (Heat Treatment) Regulations, manufacturers of Ice Cream have had to decide whether they should manufacture by

the new "Cold Mix" method or whether their circumstances and volume of trade justified the provision of the increased accommodation and plant required to comply with the provisions of the Order for the "Hot Mix" method of manufacture.

BUILDING MATERIALS PRIORITY SCHEME.

Re-inspections and visits to work in progress

Under the Ministry of Health and Ministry of Works scheme, priority certificates have again been necessary to obtain materials for urgent sanitary work. During the year 601 of these certificates have been issued after inspection of the premises in question.

PROPAGANDA.

In conjunction with the Dartford Rural District Public Health Department a stand was arranged at the Dartford Civic Week Exhibition showing the various activities of the department and arrangements made for at least one Sanitary Inspector to be in attendance during the hours that the exhibition was open to the public.

Talks on various phases of Public Health work have been given during the year at the Secondary Schools and to other organisations in the town.

RATS AND MICE DESTRUCTION ACT.

During the year a further survey of the district with regard to rodent infestation was carried out, with good results.

Two maintenance treatments of the sewers in the Borough were undertaken and the results show that the number of rats in the sewers has been considerably reduced by these various treatments.

A small joint operation was carried out in conjunction with the Bexley Borough and the Dartford Rural District Councils in the Joydens Wood district.
