DIPHTHERIA.

The total number of cases notified was 15 (including 2 institutional cases), as compared with 60 in 1922, 221 in 1921, and 199 in 1920. The figure is the lowest since 1907, and is a further proof of the benefit of the extensive swabbing carried out and the elimination of carriers from the Schools.

SCARLET FEVER.

The number of cases notified was 27, as compared with 103 in 1922, and 206 in 1921, and 210 in 1920. The figure is the lowest since 1911.

SMALL POX.

There have been no cases of Small Pox during the year.

ENTERIC FEVER.

All the cases notified occurred at the London County Mental Hospital.

CANCER.

The number of deaths from Cancer during the year was 26. This is over $\frac{1}{4}$ th of the total deaths from all causes.

During the year consideration has been given by the Ministry of Health to the increase in the incidence of this disease in England and Wales.

In October, 1923, I prepared a Special Report on the subject, which has since been printed, and is being used for propaganda purposes.

12 of the 28 cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis notified during the year, and 4 cases notified previous to 1923, were removed to Sanatoria for treatment during the year.

The number of deaths from this disease during the year was 21 Pulmonary and 4 Non-Pulmonary. Of these, 3 Pulmonary and 2 Non-Pulmonary were not notified previous to death.

OPHTHALMIA NEONATORUM.

Two cases were notified during the year, one of which occurred and was treated in an institution in the district, with the unfortunate result of total blindness.

The remaining case was treated at home, and recovered without impairment of vision.

DISINFECTION.

Upon removal of cases of infectious disease to Hospital or upon recovery of cases nursed at home, the rooms are disinfected with formalin or sulphur di-oxide and the bedding removed for steam disinfection.

Diphtheria anti-toxin is supplied free to the Medical Practitioners for use in cases of Diphtheria.

The Council make a grant to this Association and in return the services of the Nurses are available for the home nursing of cases of Measles, Whooping Cough and cases referred by the Child Welfare Clinic.

There are six midwives practising in the town, each of whom act as workers at the Child Welfare Clinic. I am glad to report that their interest and attendance is very good.

CLINICS.

The Clinics are held on Thursday and Friday afternoons in each week. The Ante-Natal Clinic was detached from the Child Welfare Clinic on September 5th, and is held fortnightly on Wednesday afternoons.

Dr. Ethel Dukes continues as Medical Officer for these Clinics.

I am glad to be able to report that the attendance of mothers is still well maintained.

WATER SUPPLY.

The whole of the district is supplied by the Metropolitan Water Board.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

The sewage is conveyed by the water carriage system to Long Reach, and is disposed of by the West Kent Main Sewerage Board.

Extensive alterations are in progress at these works. The new sludge beds have been completed and are in use. New screening apparatus and tanks are in course of construction.

CLOSET ACCOMMODATION.

There are a few houses situated in the Rural portions of the district which are not connected to the main sewer.

HOUSING.

The work of dealing with the older and most insanitary property in the town is still largely held up by the lack of alternative housing accommodation for the re-housing of those tenants who would be displaced if this property were dealt with, as it should be, under the Housing Acts by Closing and Demolition Orders.
