Only two cases of Tuberculosis which have died had not previously been notified Giving a ratio of 1 in 5.

There is no evidence of excessive incidence of or mortality from tuberculosis in any particular occupation.

No cases of ophthalmia neonatorum were notified during the year.

There has been no cause of sickness during the year calling for special notice.

PROFESSIONAL NURSING IN THE HOME

(a) General. Two District Nurses are supplied for the district paid partly by voluntary subscription and partly by fees paid by the patients themselves, when able to afford it.

(b) For infectious diseases no special arrangements are made.

MIDWIVES

There are four midwives practising in the Borough. They are not employed by or subsidized by the Local Health Authority.

CLINICS & TREATMENT CENTRES

There is a baby welfare centre at Sondes Road under the County Council. It is open one day a week. I attach the Report of Nurse Smithson showing the work done.

A Tuberculosis Dispensary, situated at 10, Clanwilliam Road, which is open on Tuesday mornings.

There are no Day Nursery or Venereal Clinic.

There is a school clinic held at St. George's Hall, Park Street, for treatment of school children.

HOSPITALS

No hospital accommodation is provided by the Local Authority for the treatment of ~~xxxxxx~~ Maternity, Tuberculosis or Children.

An Isolation Hospital is provided by the Local Authority for the treatment of infectious diseases, excepting smallpox. The hospital is jointly managed by the Walmer District Council. It consists of two separate buildings with accommodation for 18 and 4 respectively, with the usual offices. It is situated off the Waterworks Road on the outskirts of the Borough.

Arrangements have been made with the Eastry District Council for the removal of smallpox cases to Hamel Hospital.

The Victoria Hospital, situated in the Wellington Road, consists of 18 beds and 2 cots, for general medical and surgical cases. It is not supported by the Council.

No institutional provision is made for unmarried mothers, illegitimate or homeless children in the district.

Ambulance facilities

A horse ambulance is provided by the Council for the removal of all infectious cases to hospital.

For accidents - Two two-wheeled hand ambulances are available.

LABORATORY WORK

Pathological and bacteriological work is carried out by the County Medical Office of Health at Maidstone.

Diphtheria antitoxin and other sera are not provided by the Local Authority.

SANITARY ADMINISTRATION

No closets have been converted from the Conservancy System during the year.

The Cowsheds, Bakehouses & Slaughter houses have been regularly inspected. There are 9 registered slaughter houses in the Borough. The milk shops and dairies were inspected, and in one case a defect was found and remedied.

All action is taken under the Sale of Food & Drugs Act by the County police.

I attach the Report received from the County police of samples of food taken in the Borough during the year.

No action has been taken with regard to Dairies, Cowsheds or Milk shops.

All disinfection is carried out by the Council, Buildings being subjected to Sulphur and Formaline fumigation, Clothing & Bedding by steam disinfection. All premises and clothing of people suffering from infectious diseases are dealt with as a routine, other cases as necessity arises.

PUBLIC HEALTH STAFF

Medical Officer of Health - part time office, Salary contributed to under Public Health Act.

Sanitary Inspector - part time office. Holds certificate of Royal Sanitary Institute.

There are no Health Visitors appointed by the Council.

HOUSING

14 new houses have been built during the year by private enterprise. None by the Local Authority.

A. Dwelling Houses

- (1) 139 inspected for defects under Public Health or Housing Act.
- (2) 65 houses were inspected and recorded under Housing Regulations 1910.
- (3) No houses were found unfit for human habitation.
- (4) No houses were found not to be in all respects fit for human habitation.

B. 12 Houses were rendered fit in consequence of informal action by the Local Authority.

C. Action under Statutory Powers

- (1) Under Sect. 28 of Housing Act 1919.
 - 6 Houses served with notices requiring repairs.
 - 6 Houses were rendered fit by the owners.

No closing orders became operative in pursuance of declaration by owners of intention to close.

(2) Proceedings under Public Health Act.

8 Dwelling houses required notices to be served requiring defects to be remedied. These were all remedied by the owners.

(3) No actions were taken under Section 17 & 18 of the Housing, Town Planning Act, 1909.

Attached will be found the detailed Report of the Borough Engineer and Sanitary Inspector. Also reports on 2 specimens of water collected during the year - both of which show the water to be of a high degree of chemical and bacteriological purity.

In concluding my report I wish to thank the Town Clerk and Borough Surveyor for their kind assistance.

Dear Sir,

As requested I have pleasure in giving you the following particulars with reference to the Sanitary Inspections, etc. for the year ending 31st December, 1923.

The number of inspections of dwelling houses, etc. during the year was 293, and not any of these were considered as unfit for human habitation.

The following particulars schedule the defects dealt with:-

In addition to the above many inspections were made and defects dealt with where found.

The Cowsheds on the Register number five, and these were found satisfactory.

There are 13 Milkshops & Dairies which were regularly inspected, and in one case a defect was found and remedied.

The ten Slaughter houses were regularly inspected, and these were found to be in a satisfactory condition.

There are 16 Factories, including Laundries, 11 Workshops, including Dressmakers' premises, and 14 Bakehouses, and in four cases defects were found and remedied.

The addresses of 69 Outworkers' premises were received, these were all found clean, and only one defect was found, this was remedied without any notice being served.

The two Common Lodging Houses were also regularly inspected and were found clean and satisfactory.
