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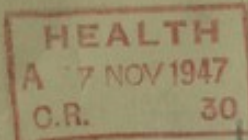

REPORT OF MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR 1946.

To the Mayor, Aldermen, and Councillors of the Borough of Deal.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to submit my 20th Annual Report which in this instance is for the year 1946 and I venture to suggest that it shows that Deal continues in its reputation as a health resort with a most satisfactory standard of general health and public health services.

The birth rate has risen well above the average for the country. This is a generally consistent feature of the town, although the death rate shows a slight percentage above the normal figure. This can be accounted for by reason of the high proportion of aged residents as this town is a popular place in which retired individuals of all classes settle.

There is no comment beyond this on the general birth and death rates.

Once again we can show a completely negative return in connection with Puerperal conditions and I must therefore commend those associated with Maternity work in this Borough for their excellent results.

Infectious Diseases have again been extremely small. Beyond a very mild outbreak of Whooping Cough there is nothing noteworthy to remark upon except that this figure is to be commended particularly in this area which is subject to much holiday traffic and the travelling to and from of strangers from other and more populated areas where infection is likely to be more prevalent.

One of the biggest obstacles the Department has had to contend with is that of inadequate staffing. The war with its havoc served to considerably disorganise routine duties and added many problems to the Department's obligations, such that the work has mounted considerably.

We have had changes in the staff during the year and this has not assisted in overcoming these difficulties, particularly as, in any case, the members of this Department have been so numerically small. I sincerely hope that in the next year a firm basis can be established for the adequate staffing of the Department so that some impression can be made on the considerable leeway of work yet to be recovered.

I would like here to commend members of my staff for the excellent service they have rendered to the Borough during 1946.

As in 1945 there has been a return of considerable numbers of old residents. To this one must add the return of young men from the war, who have now acquired wives and families. In addition also with the commencing of several new small industries the town has increased in size such that it is anticipated before long it will have reached its maximum population figures.

With this heavy return of people the housing situation has become acute. This is one of the major problems within the Department and it is gratifying to see the progress being made in various areas of the Borough in the erection of temporary and of permanent houses. In spite of this good progress this housing problem is likely to remain for some years.

Little headway has been possible in the development of our post-war plans and now many of these medical questions are bound up with the National Health Service Act. Again progress must, of necessity, be slow. One of the most important post-war problems is the accommodation for maternity cases which, during the war were catered for and indeed still are by the Kent County Council in the establishment of large Maternity Hospitals throughout the county. These Hospitals, however, are gradually being closed or reduced so that, in many instances, particularly with the difficult housing conditions, the placing of a maternity case is not easy. There tends also to be a more obvious desire in many of the young marrieds to have their child in an Institution or Hospital rather than to accept confinement at home.

The Ambulance facilities were markedly improved during the year by the extended service through the St. Johns Ambulance Brigade and this service has operated in an excellent manner such that I anticipate it will be acceptable under the new Health Service.

The School Medical Service continues in operation under the Kent County Council who acquired the First Aid Post in Victoria Park and there

formed a first-class School Clinic.

The operation of this service is in my opinion more complex than when run by the Local Authority and of course this must be so as it is a part, now, of a large highly organised system. I still feel that the personal contact which one hitherto enjoyed and which was for the benefit of the child, has in no small measure been reduced and much of the close attention to the welfare of individual cases has been obliterated by the management of appointments and talks, etc. from Maidstone rather than from the town in which the child lives. I do not, however, consider that the actual health of any individual child or section of children has suffered from this reason but it is possible in some individual cases the parent has had more trouble in contacting the service or the particular specialist required.

I should like to mention that we took considerable steps to thoroughly investigate the Ice Cream position in the town early in 1946 and had the matter well in hand before the outbreak of illness which was occasioned in another town through infected Ice Cream. This, I feel, was an excellent piece of work due to foresight particularly on the part of my Senior Sanitary Inspector and it was gratifying to feel that we had this important matter well under control long before there was any official outcry about the position.

I should like to express my thanks to the Chairman, Vice-Chairman and members of the Committee for their continued co-operation and courtesy and also once again commend all members of my staff for the excellent service they have rendered.

The co-operation and assistance given to me by the Town Clerk, Borough Surveyor and Borough Accountant and their staff is fully appreciated and I would like to express my thanks to all my colleagues for their continued assistance.

Area.

Physical Features.

The enlarged Borough of Deal, possessing a promenade Foreshore of nearly three and half miles, is renowned as a Health Resort. Its geographical position is unique in view of its situation on the English Channel and its pleasant climate gives added advantage to the Town. The whole area is level, rising only very gradually to the surrounding wooded country. The level nature of the ground is an added benefit to invalids. The Beach is comprised of flint pebbles which remains unpolluted by reason of the tides.

Meteorology.

Details of meteorological observations are set forth in Tables I and II.

The hottest month was August, giving a mean of the minimum reading of 54° while the coldest month was December with a mean of the minimum reading of 32°. There were no maximum readings taken during the year owing to the Thermometer being out of order.

The total rainfall for the year was 25.17 inches, the heaviest amount falling in August, viz. 4.79 inches, while during October the amount registered was only .99 inches, this being the driest month of the year.

There were 150 days of the year on which .01 of an inch or more rain fell.

The total hours of sunshine recorded for the year was 1,583 the sunniest month being July with 267.1 hours, while November with a recording of 41.3 hours, had the least sunshine.

Social Conditions.

Deal with its unique position and nearly five miles of sea frontage on the Channel coast is essentially a health resort.

Apart from the local trading the town is regarded as a residential area catering for all classes of the community. A large proportion of the population derive income and benefit from holiday traffic which has markedly increased in these post-war years. Much headway continues to be made in the restoration of hotel and boarding house facilities and in the local shopping centre.

There is a considerable amount of work to be done in repairing the destruction produced by the war. The return of old residents and the influx of new residents has exceeded the towns ability to produce adequate housing facilities for all and similarly to other towns and areas this is a problem of high degree which is exercising the Authority's ingenuity to the utmost. Housing estates have been commenced and are well in hand in the areas at the back of the town and a considerable number of Prefabricated houses have been erected to cope with the situation.

The nearby Betteshanger Colliery which has worked continuously throughout the war employs a large number of men, the vast majority of whose families are resident in this town. In addition to this large industry there are several smaller industries which have commenced throughout the Borough and it is anticipated that in 1947 the town will increase fairly rapidly which we trust will be all to the benefit of its prosperity.

The climatic conditions are exceedingly good and the broad aim is to retain as far as possible the pleasant old-world amenities for which the town is renowned and to foster local industries so that Deal will go ahead in both being a popular health resort and, at the same time, a busy town with productive value.

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES
FOR THE AREA

PUBLIC HEALTH STAFF.

1946 saw several changes in the constitution of the Departmental staff.

Mr. Byng, the Senior Sanitary Inspector, who had worked in this town for over 21 years, resigned in favour of work in the Colonial Service and his place was taken by Mr. W. Green who was appointed originally as Additional Sanitary Inspector on the 14th January, 1946.

Mr. Goram, a former Additional Sanitary Inspector, returned from H.M. Forces in July and resigned four months later just after the return of Mr. G.L. Almond our Pupil Sanitary Inspector, who had served with H.M. Forces throughout the war.

The regular Shorthand Typist, Miss Wilson, resigned in November and was replaced by Mrs. P. Burton on the 2nd December.

The staff, then, for the major part of the year, apart from myself has consisted of one Sanitary Inspector plus one Shorthand Typist.

The whole question of the staff has been a thorny problem which has had considerable thought and discussion spent upon it during the year.

I must here commend the members of my present staff whose work has been always of the highest order and this work has been done only under the greatest of difficulty in that they have attempted to do the duties of several people and have endeavoured to cope with the great increase of work which has arisen since the cessation of hostilities.

The eventual return to peace-time conditions with its manifold problems has been in itself a large responsibility and this has been complicated by the necessity for recovering lost ground caused by the war. Much of the routine and minor essential work had to be abandoned such that this, more or less, proved a continuous fight against time to recover the situation.

It has been agreed that in addition to a Senior Sanitary Inspector, two Additional Sanitary Inspectors, plus a Pupil Clerk and the clerical staff, are essential for the smooth running of this Department and the future welfare of the Borough. I sincerely hope that as soon as possible in 1947 this object will be achieved and that we will have at least one outside workman with motor transport to cope with the many emergencies which arise in this area.

Apart from the extensive damage caused to property by the war, many of the houses in the older parts of the Borough are antiquated and need constant and regular supervision. The low-lying part of the town, for some of it is below sea level, and the adjoining marsh land to the north, bring with them their own peculiar problems in relation to high water and excessive rainfall flooding and a certain danger from mosquito infection.

I shall continue to press for the adequate staffing of this Department which must in all fairness be considered as vitally important to the welfare of this town.

LABORATORY FACILITIES.

The principal centre for laboratory work is the Kent County Laboratory at Maidstone which is under the direction of Dr. A. Elliott, M.D., D.P.H., the Kent County Medical Officer of Health.

This Laboratory undertakes all forms of investigations and is freely used by Medical Practitioners in the Town. The service is of a high standard. We co-operate with the County by furnishing samples and specimens as requested for Public Health work generally.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES.

- (a) Accident and Non-Infectious Cases: The augmented Ambulance Scheme run by the St. Johns Ambulance Brigade from the Drill Hall, Grove Terrace, has been in operation most successfully throughout the year. They employ not less than three vehicles (two stretcher Ambulances and one Sitting Case car), two full-time drivers, day and night service and excellent voluntary assistance. This new Service has done well and appears to me to meet the requirements of the town satisfactorily. The Corporation contribute the sum of £250 per annum to the Brigade and, as previously reported, transferred to the Brigade a Saloon

car which is used as the Sitting Case Ambulance. No further comment has been heard from the Kent County Council who, through Colonel Campbell, investigated the local situation which, I anticipate, will be quite satisfactory in the light of the new National Health Service to come.

- (b) Infectious Diseases: During the year the arrangements we had with Eassey Authority for the reception of our Infectious Disease cases in their Hospital were concluded and replaced by a satisfactory arrangement with the Borough of Dover who now accept and transport our infectious patients. We retained our own Infectious Disease Ambulance in that we found it of immense service in transporting cases to Eassey whose Ambulance situation covering their very large area could not always give us prompt removal. With the new arrangements at Dover the use of our own Infectious Ambulance has become less and less such that I anticipate in 1947 it may be regarded as a redundant vehicle.

This Ambulance, however, has proved valuable in assisting Authorities who have, at times, had the Ambulance for use in the event of breakdown of their own vehicles.

No particular comment is to be made on the year's infection with the exception of the outbreak of Whooping Cough which occurred in the late Spring. 58 cases, with two deaths, were recorded. Apart from a few Scarlet Fever cases and an occasional Measles we have been fortunate in the absence of the more deadly diseases and I can report again that this Borough has a low percentage of infection.

NURSING IN THE HOME

These arrangements are made through the District Nursing Association and the general nursing in this Borough is of a high standard.

With the increased population it was found necessary to increase the staff and in 1946, apart from the four midwives under the Association, two general nurses were in active operation.

MIDWIVES.

The Kent County Council administer the Midwives Act and midwives employed in Deal are directed by the District Nursing Association on behalf of the Kent County Council.

HOSPITALS.

1. Infectious Diseases.

As previously mentioned we now send our Infectious cases to the Dover Isolation Hospital and this arrangement proves very satisfactory.

Our own Isolation Hospital was closed early in the war for security reasons and continues to be rented to the Education Authority who use it as a school. This building, as far as Hospital requirements are concerned, is out of date, and should it be desired that it be re-used as a Hospital the tendency would be to reconstruct rather than to completely rebuild. The financial aspect, and for other reasons, such as labour and difficulty of supply, etc., make this suggestion untenable.

Smallpox cases are catered for at the Poulton Hospital, Dover, with an arrangement through the Kent County Council for free admission should an outbreak of this unpleasant complaint be in any way extensive.

2. Surgical and Medical.

The Victoria Hospital, London Road, Deal, continues to admit and treat all medical and surgical cases and still operates under the Emergency Hospital Scheme under the Ministry of Health.

This Hospital continues its good work and has greatly extended its facilities during the year by an extension made on the Out-Patient Department. This has allowed for a more adequate Physio-Therapy Department and has eased the position in the already overcrowded Clinics within the Hospital building.

The X-Ray plant was completely replaced by one of the latest machines and here extensive work is done in diagnostic and emergency radiology.

During the year successful efforts were made to re-engage a resident doctor though the situation, by reason of lack of personnel in this respect, has not been easy. This Hospital is one of the few in Kent which has a good supply of radium.

HEALTH VISITORS.

The Health Visitors in this area are directed by the Kent County Council and formerly two in number they have now been increased to three.

Frequent temporary assistance, as all the Clinics are highly active and busy, is available.

I have always considered an adequate Health Visiting staff essential and have this matter listed for post-war consideration. With the service now given by the Kent County Council I feel that it will not be necessary for this Borough to attempt to undertake this responsibility. I should like to express my thanks to these nurses for their continued co-operation throughout 1946.

DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION.

This has continued quietly throughout the year and has not made quite as much headway as one would have desired. The statistics are difficult to calculate to any degree of high accuracy in that a high proportion of children were immunised during the period of war evacuation. I am satisfied, however, that the response of the young mother is a good one and that a reasonably satisfactory percentage of young babies are being immunised.

Facilities for this service are open to everybody free of charge through every practising doctor in the town. This means that with 10 doctors the community have a service of not less than 70 sessions for this work per week. The service is also available at each Mother and Child Welfare Clinic so that there can be little excuse for neglect on the part of the parent.

The propaganda work, through the means of posters, handbills and other notices, continues as does the regular Birthday Card system whereby every baby born in this town receives notice of their first birthday and an invitation to accept immunisation.

The financial responsibilities are run consistently with the instructions of the Ministry and during the year it will be noted we had three cases notified. There were no deaths.

Facilities for this service are open to everybody free of charge. Through every Protestant Church in the town. This means that with the exception of the community have a service of not less than 10 persons. This work is not new. The service is also available at each House and Child Welfare Clinic. That there can be little chance for neglect on the part of the parent. The programme work, through the House of Prayer, Homeless and other methods, continues as before the regular Sunday and weekday work. Every body has in this a new responsibility at their first meeting. The Council responsibilities are not consistently with the responsibilities of the Ministry and during the year it will be noted as the Church grows. There were no deaths.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

The drainage and sewerage of the area remains in principle the same as in previous years.

Walmer is drained by gravitation through a comparatively new set of sewers to a storage tank under the foreshore, the contents of which are discharged each day into the sea. Surface water is taken separately into the old sewer system and discharges through the original out-falls on the foreshore.

Deal is also drained by gravitation to the Pumping Station at the North end of the town where the sewage is raised to a covered storage tank and is discharged into the sea, well away from the foreshore.

A scheme for draining the outlying Mongeham area, necessarily postponed during the war years, is again under consideration. This scheme was the subject of a Ministry of Health enquiry in December 1938 as a result of which loan sanction was obtained.

No action has been necessary in relation to pollution of water courses during the past year.

Anti-Mosquito work in respect of dykes and ponds is undertaken each year and a suitable larvicide is sprayed on all known breeding grounds.

MOVEABLE DWELLINGS.

1. Camping Sites

One Licence is in force in the district in connection with the Hawkshill Seaside Camp for London Boys.

On the recommendation of the Public Health Committee, after negotiation

with the Planning Officer, Dover, the Council have resolved to restrict further Licensed Camping Sites to an area bounded roughly by Southwall Road, Western Road and Golf Road.

2. Tents, Vans and Sheds

One Licence is in force in respect of a trailer caravan situated in Crayfords Meadow, Mongeham.

Four caravans habited during the summer months in connection with the Fairground, Marina, have removed from the district.

SMOKE ABATEMENT

No smoke observations were necessary during the year.

SWIMMING BATHS AND POOLS

There are no public Swimming Baths or Pools within the area.

An indoor Swimming Bath is however owned by the Admiralty and certain members of the public are allowed use of same. The bath is equipped with a chlorinating plant.

One full time Rodent Operator is employed on this work.

ERADICATION OF BED BUGS.

During the year advantage was taken of the introduction of D.D.T. to liquid insecticide. The residual action was found to give a satisfactory treatment with the first application, and obviates the necessity for a 100% initial kill. It is, although more expensive to purchase, economical in use.

RAG FLOCK ACTS, 1911 and 1928.

There are at present no premises in the area where Rag Flock is manufactured or used in manufacture.

SCHOOLS.

The School Medical Service is now under the Kent County Council and I represent them as an Assistant School Medical Officer under that Authority. The work done under this section is very considerable and I have to report that the general health and standard of physique of the Deal school child can be considered as most satisfactory.

The Minor Ailments Clinic was transferred to the First Aid Post, Victoria Park, and this building offers ample and excellent facilities for the work. Within this building a section was allocated to the School Dental Clinic which now takes place there.

The more modern of the Schools are good examples of present-day educational health standards but the older schools, in some instances, require much renovation. Here again the war must be blamed for delay, but I hope to see, in the very near future, considerable improvements in all of these old schools, particularly with regard to lavatory accommodation, lighting, ventilation, furnishing and playgrounds. This is the intense and extensive problem now the property of the higher authority.

There are at present no schools in the area where the first is mentioned, and so no school.

THE FIVE YEAR, 1911 and 1912.

The School Medical Service is now under the name of the County Council and I represent them as an Assistant School Medical Officer under that Authority. The work done since this change is very considerable and I have to report that the general health and standard of hygiene of the local school child can be considered as most satisfactory.

The School Medical Service was transferred to the County Council in 1911, and this transfer has been effected in a most efficient manner for the work. With this transfer a section was allocated to the School Medical Officer and this section has been most efficient.

The work done in the School and the standard of hygiene of the educational health standard for the local schools, in some instances, has been much improved. There again the work must be done for some time in the very near future, considerable improvements in all of these schools, particularly with regard to hygiene, ventilation, lighting, ventilation, furnishing and equipment. This is the first and the most important problem now the priority of the local Authority.

HOUSING

Considerable difficulty has been experienced during the past year in securing the execution of even the simplest though urgent repairs. Priority on materials and labour is given to provision of extra housing accommodation. Repairs to existing inhabited properties receive a secondary priority which is not strong enough to obviate the long and drawn-out delay which has prevailed during 1946. This position results in the overlooking of many defects which in normal times would have been dealt with as routine - a policy which, though unavoidable today, is dangerous in that it will, indeed it is, resulting in a lowering of the general standards of housing accommodation within the district and necessarily increasing the effort which will be required to raise these standards to a normal level when the present crisis has been surmounted.

I append a Statistical table giving details of inspections during the year. I would point out that all visits have been "on request". It was not found possible to carry out any house-to-house inspections during the year.

MILK SUPPLY

There are within the district four cowsheds in connection with three milk producers. Two of these produce Tuberculin Tested Milk, one Accredited and the fourth Non-Designated milk. Retail sale is concentrated in the hands of four retailers.

Two plants are licensed for pasteurisation by the Holder process while a third plant is licensed by the Ministry of Food for Heat Treatment of Milk. This third plant is a batch pasteuriser.

All milk retailed within the Borough is either a designated milk or is heat treated in accordance with the Ministry of Food requirements.

Several samples of milk were found to be slightly deficient in fat. Enquiries showed that the deficiencies were due either to improper mixing or to irregular milking periods. Appropriate advice was given to the milk producers and the analyses of further samples have shown the quality of the milk to be satisfactory.

The analyses of two samples of Old Ale showed that considerable water had been added to the Old Ale after it had left the Brewery. Unfortunately, the bottles containing the samples burst before investigations were complete and, therefore, no action could be taken by the Department. The matter was passed on to the Customs and Excise Officers who decided, however, that no action should be taken. A number of samples have since been taken from the same seller and in each case have been genuine.

PREVALENCE OF AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES

During the year the Borough has been fortunate in the low incidence of Infectious Diseases.

Apart from a mild outbreak of Whooping Cough already recorded, there is nothing worthy of comment.

The arrangements for Isolation of the major infections are satisfactory while the Immunisation against Diphtheria proceeds with the usual routine methods.

SCABIES

The Scabies Treatment Clinic continues as before at the First Aid Post, Victoria Park, where three part-time attendants, one male and two female, hold daily sessions.

I am certain that this Clinic is the means of keeping this unpleasant infection very much in reduced numbers. The prevalence of this disease became more evident during the war and still persists by reason of poor and over-crowded conditions in poorer class homes.

We formerly catered for not only our own Borough but for cases within the adjoining parts of Eassey and Dover Rural areas. This arrangements appears to have lapsed as during this last year no cases have been sent to us from these areas.

During the year a start was made with the revision of the register of these premises which is very much out of date and it is hoped to complete it next year. Through pressure of slum clearance the work in the past has been sadly neglected.

A total of 103 inspections were made, 38 in respect of Factories with mechanical power, 61 in respect of factories without and 4 in respect of workplaces. One notice of defects was received from the Factory Inspector and the necessary action taken thereon. Defects found and remedial action was carried out in eleven instances.
