Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to submit the Annual Report on the health of the ough for the year 1955, including the report of the Senior Sanitary bector.

Some interesting points emerge from the tables of vital distics. The year has seen a dramatic drop in our infant ality rate, from well over the national average to a figure below that average, although still above the average for South East part of the county. Similarly, the total death is not only lower than last year, but appreciably below national average. In a population such as ours, with a weighting etired people, this tends to suggest that Deal is indeed a healthy lity. Tuberculosis as a cause of death shows an increase, ecting a general increase in this part of the County - a matter some concern.

There was again a repetition of sewage flooding at South Junior School, an event which we have come to regard in the rtment as a hardy annual. Fortunately the drier weather this restricted the severity of the condition, but there is serious e for alarm. The Public Health Committee requested an independent ey of the situation at their November meeting.

I would like to put on record my lively appreciation of the f; my gratitude to the officers and members of other departments their co-operation; and the pleasure I have derived from contact the members of the Public Health Committee, who are always helpful heir deliberations.

STATISTICS AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS OF THE AREA.

AREA.

The area of the Borough is 2,917 acres, exclusive of the foreshore. No alteration in the area has been made since the Kent Review Order, 1935.

METEOROLOGY.

Details of meteorological observations are set out below: -

The hottest month was August giving a mean maximum reading of 70°F, while the coldest month was February with a mean of the minimum readings 32°F.

The total rainfall for the year was 25.95 inches, the heavies amount falling in October viz 5.95 inches while during April the amount registered was only 0.26 inches, this being the driest month of the year.

The total hours of sunshine recorded for the year was 1714.2 the sunniest month being August with 218.4 hours, while November with a recording of 52.3 hours had the least sunshine. RECORD OF METEOROLOGY, 1955.

PUBLIC HEALTH STAFF.

For the second year in succession there have been important staff changes, Dr. Aitchison acting as locum tenens to the late Dr. D.W. Kirk until August followed by my own appointment as Acting Medical Officer of Health. The second Additional Sanitary Inspector resigned in May, so that the department has laboured under some difficulties during the year. There is therefore all the more reason for me to express my satisfaction with the way in which the Staff have carried out their duties. It is, however, only fair to state that because of the shortage of one Additional Sanitary Inspector most of the work done has been in response to complaints from the burgesses and the vital routine work of the Department has had to suffer in consequence.

LABORATORY FACILITIES.

The County Laboratory at Maidstone under the general direction of Dr. A. Elliott, M.D., D.P.H., was re-organised as a Public Health Laboratory during the year under Dr. J.H.C. Walker. The service throughout the year remained exemplary, and I should like to record my gratitude.

LOCAL A MBULANCE FACILITIES.

Here again nothing but praise can be said of this service. The Ambulance Station situated at Mill Hill, Deal, and directed under the National Health Scheme, has always performed its duties most promptly.

The vehicles are fitted with radio communication sets, which give much to the added promptness required in this work.

I commend to you the staff and work of this service which I feel could not be bettered.

NURSING IN THE HOME.

This service is directed by the Kent County Council and we are served as before by three general nurses working in their own allocated areas in the Borough. All the nurses are on the telephon and I have not received one complaint but many words of praise for the work of these women.

MIDWIVES.

Three midwives are allocated to specific areas in the town and perform their duties admirably. The tendency to seek admission to the Maternity Unit at Buckland Hospital, Dover continues but the limitation of space and their consequent preference for first or complicated cases has curbed the expected drop in the number of con ments at home. The liaison between these Nurses, the Hospital, the Ambulance Service and the Doctors is first class so that the commun is well served by these arrangements.

It is largely thanks to these devoted people that the infant mortality rate has reached such a low figure.

CLINIC AND TREATMENT CENTRES.

Here again, these are directed by large authorities - i.e. the Kent County Council, the Victoria Hospital, and the Kent Education Authority. The Kent County Council direct the Mother and Child Wel:

RSONS IN NEED OF CARE.

Old people are a real problem, particularly as there seems to a trend on the part of children to avoid their responsibility towards eir ageing parents. As a consequence, the local Homes at St. Alban's d General's Meadow, are normally full, and the waiting list for the sick grossly overburdened. More beds are needed for this purpose, but affing presents a problem. The Kent County Council inaugurated an tension of their Domestic Help Service in December, to offer night or ening attendance to old people living in their own homes during mporary difficulties such as the sickness of one or both partners, d it will be interesting to watch the effect of this useful move.

SPITALS.

fectious Diseasés.

The admission of infecticus disease cases to hospital is catered r by our arrangements with the Dover Isolation Hospital, Tower Hamlets, d I have to thank Dr. Lynch and his staff for the helpful and prompt tention to our cases.

rgical and Medical.

The Victoria Hospital Deal continues to show the value of the neral Practitioner's Hospital with a good consultant staff. Overcrowdg due to bad arrangements in the Out Patient's Department remains a fficulty which is dependent on extension and re-organisation of the t Patients and Casualty block. The quality of the medical and nursing re is a tribute to the devotion of the staff.

ALTH VISITORS.

These nurses are under the direction of the Kent County Council d several are employed in the Borough attending clinics and general alth visiting duties.

DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION

This service is available at School Clinics, and childrens Clinics and from the local doctors. Many parents fail to take advantage of the inoculations available for their children, but in general in Kent the percentage of children protected, although below the ideal figure, is better that the national percentage. I suppose that the strides made in controlling this dreadful diseas have brought with them a feeling of apathy in many minds.

RIVERS AND STREAMS.

No action has been necessary in relation to pollution of water courses during the past year.

Anti-mosquito work in respect of dykes and ponds continued during the year.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

The Public Cleansing Service operates under the supervision of the Borough Surveyor.

(a) <u>Collection</u>.

Collection is undertaken by direct labour. Modern covered motor vehicles are used for this purpose. A charge is made for collection of trade refuse.

- (b) <u>Disposal</u>. The refuse is conveyed to the Council's refuse tips where some salvageable articles are removed, the residue being disposed of by controlled tipping.
- (c) <u>Gulley Cleansing</u>. A combined vacuum gulley emptier and flushing tank is owned and operated by the Corporation.

OFFENSIVE TRADES.

Three Mag and Bone Dealers establishments are approved by the Council within this area. Consents are renewed for periods of one year. No complaints have been received in respect of these businesses.
