### Nursing in the Home.

No alteration during the year. The Town Nurse attended 61 patients, and paid a total of 1806 visits.

### Clinics and Treatment Centres.

Orthopædic Clinics.—During 1938 the following patients attended from the Borough, 24 children (77 attendances) and 6 adults (23 attendances).

Infantile Welfare Centre.—There is no Ante-Natal Clinic in the Borough. Examination of expectant Mothers left in the hands of certified midwives and local practitioners.

At "Ivy House," a private Maternity Home, arrangements have been made by the County Council for admission of emergency obstetric cases attended by the Medical Officers of Public Assistance Committees.

A State Registered Midwife, same subsidised by the Wiltshire County Council, undertook Maternity work of the Borough throughout the year.

Provision of milk for nursing mothers is obtained through Official (County) Health Visitors, acting on their own observations or after reports sent them by Voluntary District Visitors.

Three deaths occurred as follows:—1 from Broncho-pneumonia and Whooping Cough, aged 1 year; 1 from Influenzal Broncho-pneumonia complicating Pulmonary T.B.; a 3rd from General Peritonitis simulating Enteric Fever. None of these were from the Borough. The observation cases included a severe quinsey, a non-diphtheritic Laryngitis, contacts of scarlet fever cases with sore throats but no rash. The mumps cases were all nurses from the Devizes and District Hospital. As will be evident from the above table a number of cases, some for observation, others not statutorily notifiable, but infectious, were usefully admitted. Without the new Cubical Block this could not have been done.

**Public Cleansing.**

The receptacles for garbage in use all over the town vary widely, and some are unsuitable and inadequate. Your Council needs standard type sanitary bins for the tenants of their own houses.

**Shops.**

No official action taken during the year.

**Smoke Abatement.**

No official action taken during the year.

**Schools.**

In good order. No sanitary defects dealt with during year.

**Prevalence of Infectious Disease.**

The Scarlet Fever cases occurred in ones and twos, spread over the year, and were generally mild in type, and not confined to any particular area.

Notification of Pneumonia is somewhat more frequent but valueless for statistical purposes.

### Sanitary Circumstances of the Area.

#### Water.

Water pumped Year ending December 1938, 112,187,000 gallons.  
 Rainfall Year ending December 1938, 25·61 inches.  
 Total population supplied approximately, 9,000.  
 Consumption of water, per head, per day, 34·1 gallons.  
 Work carried out during year, extension of water mains only.  
 Two Bacteriological examinations were made during the year, both satisfactory.

#### Sewerage and Drainage.

No extensive additions were made during the year, and Plans for enlarging the Breachfield Works to take the sewerage from the developing Housing sites at the Nursteed Road area were under consideration. A small group of houses were drained out on the Nursteed Road, and water closets erected at Messrs. W. E. Chivers' old saw mills connected up with the new sewer.

#### Swimming Pool.

Public Baths in good order, and Chlorination carried out continuously during the season.

#### Housing.

By the end of December, 1938, the last of the 48 houses building by the Corporation had been completed and occupied.

These comprised 30 three bedroom houses built under third and final instalment of the Slum Clearance of 1934; and 18 houses to meet the needs of overcrowding as ascertained by the Survey of 1935-36.

20 houses were demolished during the year; 30 more were vacated and awaiting demolition; and twelve were still occupied though condemned.

The need for increased housing accommodation at economic rents for the general population was also considered during the year.

On April 11th, 1938, there were 228 bona-fide applications for new houses which would require 150 additional dwellings. It was estimated that 75 per cent. of applicants could pay a rent inclusive of rates of only 7/6 to 7/9 per week, their needs could only be met by the Local Authority.

On June 16th, the following recommendation of the Health and Housing Committee on May 23rd was endorsed and passed by the Council.

"That the Committee being of the opinion that further houses for letting at an economic rent are required, be authorised to explore available sites and submit a scheme."

On November 28th, a plan to provide 16 dwellings for aged persons on the site of condemned Borough Property in Sheep Street was submitted to the Health and Housing Committee who recommended as follows:—

"That the Council proceed to secure the evacuation of the buildings and the demolition thereof within 6 weeks of the date on which they were vacated, and that the plan for rebuilding as submitted be approved, and the Ministers sanction of the scheme be applied for; the estimated cost being £1920. This was approved by the Council on December 15th last.

Tentative enquiries and negotiations as to building sites were made in the latter half of the year without success.



By December 31st, there were 250 genuine applications for new houses, 20 per cent. of these from the occupants of dwellings known to be seriously defective and certain to be classified as unfit on any future inspection.

The above facts speak for themselves ; further the prospect must be faced of available housing accommodation being strained very severely, either by an influx of refugees in the event of war, or by the demands of imported labour employed on Government works in the vicinity. The above situation is most undesirable from the health angle, and has obvious potential dangers. Further housing accommodation for those now living in unhealthy dwellings, for aged persons, and for general needs is urgently required.

I trust your Council will soon be able to take appropriate action, despite adverse economic factors, such as possible labour shortage and rising costs in the building trade.

During the year inspections of the various farms, dairies and milkshops in the area were made. The rapidly improving hygienic and Public Health spirit in the milk trade is still being maintained and while this may be due in some measure to the application of legislation, credit must also be given to the educative business initiative and the Public Health spirit which is so pronounced in the dairy business today.

No bacteriological samples of milk were taken during the year.

The general standard of our milk is a very good one indeed, but when realising its quality I regret to find that we have comparatively so little graded milk for sale within the area. There are, of course, obvious reasons, some of these being slightly increased cost of production, due to licensing fees and veterinary tests, and public indifference to the value of a pure milk supply.

### Retail Milkshops and Dairies.

The number of persons that are licensed to sell Milk in the Borough is now 20. All milkshops and dairies have been inspected, and together with the utensils have found to be in a very clean condition.

### Meat Purveyor's Premises.

There are 14 Meat Purveyors premises in the area. The premises and the rooms where the meat is prepared for sausages, etc., are periodically inspected under the Public Health (Meat) Regulations 1924.

There is only one common lodging house in the Borough, which is well controlled and the bye-laws are being complied with. There has been no infectious disease at the premises during the year.

No application was received during the year, for a certificate under the above Act.

**Public Cleansing and Scavenging.**

The collection of the house refuse is under the direct control of the Surveyor, and is disposed of by means of an Incinerator, now rapidly becoming worn (obsolescent).

During the year numerous visits were made to food premises, empty shops, empty houses and canal banks and a considerable amount of poison was deposited in places infested by rats. It is, however, not generally appreciated that it is the duty of the occupier of any premises, to take, from time to time, such necessary and reasonable steps as will prevent infestation by rats.

I am satisfied that only by an active campaign of gassing, poisoning and other methods of destruction will we succeed in keeping these pests within reasonable numbers.

All tenants of houses which have been disinfested, have been instructed to keep their houses as clean as possible and to report to the Sanitary Authority immediately on the first signs of vermin.

Any Council house found to be in a verminous condition were disinfested by the Health Department. The method employed for the eradication of bugs consists of stripping (if the walls are papered) the removal of skirting and picture rails, followed by the application of heat over all parts likely to harbour bugs, by means of a painter's blow lamp. Finally each affected room is sprayed with Zaldecide.

I wish to call your attention to the fact that disinfestation of Council houses has become an increasing item in the expenditure on Public Health services, due to materials, workmen's fees, loss of rent, etc.
