Above Table calls for no comment. The causes of death are such as to be expected in a rural area with ageing population. The numbers involved are far too small for yearly variations to be significant.

GENERAL PROVISION FOR HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

Medical Officer of Health: G. H. H. WAYLEN, M.B., D.P.H., (Cantab.)

Sanitary Inspector: Mr. N. J. Arney left the Council's service on the 30th April, 1945, and the Council were without a Sanitary Inspector until Mr. G. Price Lawrence returned from H.M. Forces on the 1st February, 1946, but Mr. Lawrence left again on the 28th February, 1946, and the Council were again without an officer. Ultimately the Council appointed Mr. J. H. M. Jolliffe, A.M.I.S.E., A.M.Inst.B.E., M.S.I.A., C.S.I.B., M.R.I.P.H.H., on the 15th September, 1946, he commencing his duties on the 1st November and was the Sanitary Inspector at the 31st December, 1946.

Ambulance Service.

Carried on by a Joint Ambulance Committee of Devizes Borough and Rural District.

Nursing in the Home.

The Devizes Nursing Society continued to provide a nurse whose work among the aged and infirm is most useful. Nearly 100 cases were treated annually and in 1946 the number of visits increased to well over 2,000.

Clinics and Treatment Centres.

Clinics for Orthopædic, Tuberculosis and Venereal (Female) cases held at Devizes and District Hospital as before. An Opthalmic and Infant Welfare Clinic held elsewhere. All under the auspices of the Wiltshire County Council Health Department.

Maternity Services

Of an average of 140 births during the last two years, less than half were attended in their homes by the County Midwifery Service and over one half confined in Hospitals and Nursing Homes. A private nursing home, "Ivy House", with seven beds and a maximum yearly intake of 150 is the only Institution available in your area. Should it suddenly close down, as may well happen,

the situation here would be very serious. Housing conditions today compel many expectant mothers to seek institutional care and still more would elect for a hospital "lying in" were they given the chance. The use of existing Rate-aided Maternity Centres at Corsham and Bradford-on-Avon entail lengthy and round about journeys for routine ante-natal examinations; tax the strength of the expectant mother, and her husband's wage: whilst any visits paid by the family after confinement have to be further paid for in time and money. The provision of further maternity beds in Devizes to serve the whole Devizes Area with a population of over 20,000 and 400 births annually is an urgent need.

Hospitals.

A. Voluntary: The Devizes and District Hospital. In 1946 lessened calls for E.M.S. cases reduced the number of beds from 80 to 60 and out-patients from 1200 to 1050, but in no way lessened the demands of the local civilian population. The new Physiotherapy Department started work in November, 1945 and has worked to capacity ever since. During 1946 out-patient attendances, including visits to the above and X-Ray Departments increased by 2000 to nearly 15000. New out-patient accommodation is the Hospital's priority need. By the addition to the rota of Honorary Consultants of a second Physician, Dr. L. C. Hill, F.R.C.P., an Ophthalmic Surgeon, Dr. A. Palin, F.R.C.S., and a Radiologist, Dr. A. D. Stevens, D.M.R., a full range of specialist advice is now available to the local medical staff.

B. Rate-aided: Devizes and Pewsey Joint Isolation Hospital. A wide variety of infections were dealt with during the two years under review and over 40 cases admitted from adjacent military centres. During 1945, 28 cases of tuberculosis were admitted until September 21st. 1946 was fortunately, a light year as shortage of nursing staff caused the closure of the Hospital between the 11th July and the 19th October, and again on the 20th December for the rest of the year. Unless the need for nurses is realised by the community and willing recruits forthcoming, institutions such as the above cannot keep going. SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water Supply.

During 1945 supplies were curtailed from May to September owing to drought. The additional source of supply developed on the site of the temporary boreholes at Bourton was completed and the new pumping station with a 30 in. bore opened in June. The total water pumped during the year (January to December) was over 200 million gallons, nearly a quarter of which came from Bourton

During 1946 mains were laid to the new Housing Estates at Forty Acres and Longcroft. The total supply pumped was (January to December) 171 million gallons of which over 60 millions of gallons of it came from Bourton: the decrease was due to lessened demand from the military.

The undertaking is now in a position to supply water freely to the adjoining Rural District over and above the quantity that authority already uses.

Drainage and Sewerage.

No major work undertaken in 1945.

In 1946 at the main works two disused contact beds were cleaned out and converted into humus tanks. The main works are appreciably overloaded and the subsidiary works at Breachfield grossly so. The effluent from the latter causes nuisance from time to time in the proximity of the Mental Hospital.

Housing.

New building has indeed been slow in getting under way. During 1945 advanced preparation of site at Forty Acres for nearly 200 houses begun by the local authority. Also Longcroft Estate being developed by private enterprise, and licenses for private building issued. No houses were completed during 1945.

Early in 1946, 12 three-bedroomed houses were commenced by the local authority but none were completed by the 31st December. 20 aluminium prefabricated houses were erected and occupied on the Hillworth Estate by the autumn.

During the two years under review no action has been possible to eliminate unfit houses, and little to lessen overcrowding. In December, 1946, the number of applicants to the local authority for new houses was close on 600, over 400 being residents in the Borough, the remainder from the Rural District where scores of workers in the Borough are now living. Of the total over 350 were from lodgers and sub-tenants which indicate the number still without a home of their own and thus having priority claims on new accommodation. Hence the start of slum clearance so badly needed is not yet possible.

Public Cleansing.

The tip at Nursteed is still in use. A motor refuse collection vehicle has replaced the horse drawn one.

Shops.

No official action taken during the year.

Eradication of Bed Bugs.

There was no cause for action.

Note by Medical Officer of Health.

Occasional abatement of nuisances and urgent repairs to houses were carried out by the Borough Surveyor when no Sanitary Inspector was available.
