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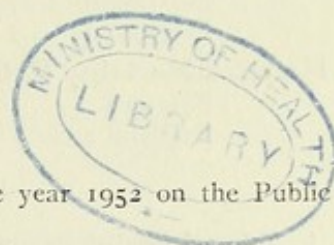

Again, the predominant causes of death are those of an ageing population, *e.g.*, deaths from Cardiovascular Disease (Nos. 17-21), total 65 (65% ; and from Malignant Neoplasms (Nos. 10-14, total 13 (13%).

There was a single death from Tuberculosis (Pulmonary), and four others from Respiratory Lesions (Nos. 23 and 24).

No deaths occurred in Child-Bed (No. 30). No deaths were caused by Infectious Diseases (Nos. 4-9 inclusive and No. 22).

The doubling of the Infantile Mortality Rate from last year has no real significance, the total yearly figures being too small.

(14.7 days). There was a full complement of nurses throughout the year. This hospital serves the Mid-Wilts Hospital Area, though, of course, the larger number of admissions are local ones, including those from the Devizes Hostel.

A new borehole pump was installed at Bourton during the year, and was brought into commission on the 1st July, 1952. New chlorinating plant was installed during the year. Certain areas in the Borough, *e.g.*, The Nursery and around Shanes Castle and Pans Lane area, including a light engineering factory, continue to suffer from low pressures at peak periods. This will continue until a new main through the Borough is constructed.

Drainage and Sewerage

The reconstruction of part of the Main Outfall Sewer and the part extension and alteration of the Main Sewage Disposal Works was under consideration during the year. At the end of the year negotiations had reached the stage where tenders for the work could be invited.

No analyses of sewage effluents were made during the year.

New applicants for housing during 1952 totalled 132. At the end of the year the number of applicants on the Borough list was 519. Of these, 407 were from persons already living in the Borough and 112 from outside, mainly from the Devizes Rural District.

Steady progress has been made. The number of houses completed and under construction at the year's end have increased by over 50% on the corresponding figures for 1951. Nevertheless, little repair work, let alone reconditioning, has been done on old properties, for obvious economic reasons; and the stage where slum areas can be cleared has not been reached, nor can be until the list of applicants, new and old, still over 500 at the year's end can be further reduced.

An occasional old house with a number of rooms is found to be let in lodgings to two or more families without the provision of adequate sanitary and cooking facilities. The adoption of a special Byelaw to enable the Borough Council to deal with such cases is needed.

Public Cleansing

Negotiations were in progress for the acquisition of land to be used as an extension of the refuse tip at Nursteed Road, but were not completely finalised at the end of the year. The tip was better kept, more material being used for covering, which was carried out more frequently with diminution of fly breeding.

Swimming Pool

The pool was not closed during the year. The number of attendances totalled 30,808.

The Sanitary Inspector's Report

MR. MAYOR, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have pleasure in submitting my Report upon the work carried out in the Sanitary Inspector's Department during 1952.

The tables and particulars in the Report are in conformity with Ministry of Health Regulations and requirements.

Clerical assistance is not provided, although the Borough Surveyor has kindly arranged for his typist to do typing for me upon request, and this has proved most helpful in times of need. Nevertheless, much of the writer's time is spent in filing, keeping of office records, correspondence and the issue of licences, etc.

156 complaints were made to this Department during the year, all of which received the necessary attention.

Housing

A general housing survey of the town was carried out at the request of and in conjunction with the County Planning Department to assist them in the drafting of the Devizes Town Map. It was estimated that some 468 houses are in need of demolition within the next 20 years on account of their bad arrangement and congestion on site, lack of amenities, age and disrepair. To replace these houses and the need for accommodating those who are already homeless or in overcrowded dwellings, it appears necessary for the erection of approximately 1,000 houses during the next two decades, i.e., 50 per annum. Further progress has been made after consultations with the Ministry of Housing and Local Government and the County Planning Officer for dealing with the congested area of Sheep Street, and it is hoped that plans will be concluded early in the new year for the area to be scheduled for re-development in accordance with the Housing Acts.

No houses were demolished during the year. The tenants of three unfit dwellings were allocated Council houses, and the owners gave an undertaking not to re-let for human habitation. Owing to their abutment with other poor dwellings, it was not considered wise to order demolition until the adjacent properties are dealt with or become vacant. The Council has re-housed one family from an unfit house, and the owner has been given notice to demolish within six months.

53 owners were informally required to carry out repairs to properties to abate nuisances; 46 were remedied.

Legal proceedings were instituted against an owner concerning serious dampness and general disrepair at two cottages. The Court issued Nuisance Orders for the work to be executed within two months, and imposed fines totalling £27, with costs of £7 7s.

Nine houses were provided with sinks and internal water supplies and two houses with an additional watercloset.

In order to offset demolition action under Section 11 of the Housing Act, 1936, an owner carried out repairs and improvements on an unfit dwelling house. The cottage was made habitable at an unreasonably high cost. In the writer's opinion, this case demonstrates that, old worn-out cottages are beyond repairing and are best demolished.

Re-housing

The Council have re-housed all seven families where a member was suffering from notifiable tuberculosis.

Of the 15 applicants who applied to this Department for a Council house, only seven were referred to the Housing Officer, and all were ultimately re-housed by the Council. The remaining eight cases were seeking better accommodation and are considered by the Letting Committee from time to time along with many other similar cases already on the Housing Officer's list. The Housing Department has re-housed 12 other deserving cases, including one caravan dweller, which were recommended through the Health Department during the previous year.

Verminous Premises.

D.D.T. treatment proved effective for the extermination of vermin at ten houses (Bed Bugs, 2; Fleas, 3; Beetles, 5).

At the request of the proprietors, an inspection was made of dirty bedding and miscellaneous articles in a store at a local furniture repository. The goods were found to be verminous, and arrangements were made for their destruction.

A wasps' nest was removed after gassing, in order to prevent annoyance to tenants of houses in the vicinity.

Dirty Houses

Improved conditions resulted in consequence of periodical visits made to six houses reported as being in a dirty state.

A reported death through senility of the occupier of a large house which was found to be in an extremely filthy state, together with a large accumulation of old and unsound tinned foods, was dealt with promptly. The Borough Surveyor's Department supplied a labourer and a lorry to remove unwanted rubbish to the refuse tip. It took almost a week to get the house wholesome again. All expenses incurred in this work were defrayed by the deceased's solicitor after negotiations with the Trustees and this Department.

Drainage

In consequence of complaints of unpleasant sewer gas smells, 29 drains were smoke-tested and found to be in a defective condition on private premises. Eight drains have been repaired or renewed. Six choked drains were cleared as a result of informal action. In addition, there were nine new lengths of drain supervised and water-tested. Complaints of choked or foul watercourse ditches received toward the end of the year were dealt with, one of which was cleansed and the others are receiving attention.

Water Supply

No samples of water were taken by this Department for the purpose of analysis.

Foods

Ice Cream (Heat Treatment, etc.) Regulations, 1947, 1948 and 1952

Surprise visits were made to Ice cream premises occasionally, to check heat treatment record charts and inspect premises and methods of manufacture. Ice-cream was being produced satisfactorily by all four dealers. A notice to repaint the walls and ceilings of an ice-cream preparation room was complied with.

An application for permission to utilise an outbuilding for the storage of ice-cream in bulk for distribution was withdrawn because of the cost of structural alterations and repairs required to be carried out to make the premises comply with the above Regulations.

Foods and Drugs Act, 1938, and Shops Act, 1950

In the course of routine visits made to food premises, the owners or proprietors responded to the following requirements:—

- Tiling of the walls, new terrazzo floor and wooden chopping block at a butcher's shop;
- Limewashing and painting of two bakehouses;
- Washing facilities for staff of both sexes at a grocer's shop;
- Repair of defective floor in kitchen and food store at a cafe;
- Refuse removed from the yard and dirty shop premises cleansed in four cases.

Beer cellars were found to be in an insanitary condition at a club and public house, which necessitated cleansing and limewashing of the walls and ceiling, new concrete floor, walls and ceiling.

Occasionally, the odd cracked drinking cup was found to be in service at cafes, but these were quickly removed upon request.

Two new registrations were granted on premises opened as fried fish shops. Approved appliances and fittings were provided and alterations done to comply with the Food and Drugs Acts. There are now four Fried Fish and Chip shops in the Borough and two mobile Fish and Chip vans.

Milk and Dairies Regulations, 1949

A new modern dairy was built and registered as an alternative to carrying out improvements to existing badly-sited premises, in order to conform with the above Regulations.

There are now five registered dairymen in the Borough.

Meat and Other Foods Inspection

The Central Wiltshire Bacon Co., Ltd., operate the only slaughterhouse in the Borough. Animals were inspected in accordance with recommendations laid down by the Ministry of Health Memo. 62/Foods and the Ministry of Food Memo. 3/Foods.

A few calls were received from butchers within the Borough asking for meat to be examined where it showed signs of unfitness at the time of delivery.

There has been no case of Food Poisoning reported to this Department during the year.

Public Health Act, 1936

Several visits were made to a couple of factories due to the receipt of complaints regarding the emission of black smoke and grit over long periods. The coal allocated by the Ministry of Fuel and Power was of low grade, which made it impossible to burn in boiler fires without emitting unreasonable quantities of smoke, no matter how carefully the fires were stoked. These firms have taken up the matter with the Ministry with a view to obtaining better coal. Both firms have been most co-operative, and have taken all steps practicable in an endeavour to mitigate the nuisance.

Poultry and pigs kept too near dwelling houses gave rise to complaints in three instances, and the keepers responded to a request for the fowl houses and pig sty to be removed well away from the premises.

One house was fumigated after recovery of a "home case" of infectious disease, and the bed was stoved.

An additional watercloset and wash basin was provided for the staff at an office—separate accommodation is now available for both sexes.

Rodent Control

The Rodent Operator's services on alternate week between the Borough and the Rural District continues to work satisfactorily. Mr. J. E. Hopkins, Borough Treasurer, deals with the accounts, and the records are kept by the writer.

The Rodent Operator's services are available upon application by occupiers of infested properties. Private dwellings receive free treatment, and business premises are charged upon a cost basis laid down by the Council. The Ministry and the Council share an equal proportion of the net cost of the services.

The procedure of pre-baiting and poisoning as laid down by the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries is carried out.

The Borough sewers had two treatments during the year, *i.e.*, June and November. The rat population in the sewers continues to decrease slightly from year to year. 337 search and surveys were undertaken in the year. Pre-baiting and poisoning on the Borough refuse tip was done in January, March and September; 65 rat bodies were picked up.

Petroleum Acts

Five flame-proof petrol pumps were fixed to replace obsolete types. One steel petrol tank was fixed underground in a concrete and brick chamber containing sand to cover the tank. The tank was pressure tested and a licence of approval issued by the Council.

One of the Petroleum Companies closed their Depot at Devizes Goods Station and the registration was deleted from the Register. The petroleum storage tanks were made safe under supervision and removed from the premises by British Railways.
