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

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TO THE CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN OF THE

DISS URBAN COUNCIL.

I herewith have the honour to present my Seventeenth Annual Report as your Medical Officer of Health.

1. Population.

1921-3479.

I append a paragraph from the Registrar General's Report to me to explain the decrease in our population.

"The Census of 1921, originally planned for the 24th April, was unavoidably postponed until the 19th June; and it is now clear that, while the latter date avoided the recognised programme of industrial holidays, some holiday ment was, largely owing to the abnormally fine weather, already then in progress. This is reflected in the Census returns by the inclusion in the case of the more popular holiday areas of varying and sometimes substantial proportions of visitors. The use of local population figures which depart materially from the figures of normal resident populations would, of course, be unsuitable in connection with statistics of births and deaths classified according to area of residence; and it has been deemed necessary to make an adjustment for these purposes by measuring the extent of the non-resident population in certain areas and by effecting its redistribution throughout the country. Such an adjustment has accordingly been made by means of the best data available in the preparation of the estimated mid-yearly populations for 1921. Any substantial difference between the population quoted and the corresponding Census figure should be attributed to this process of adjustment, although its effect has been negligible in the majority of arears."

4.—Infantile Mortality.

The rate is 118.6, the highest I have recorded for some years past, due, in my opinion, to the abnormally long dry summer and a low Birth Rate. That for England and Wales is 83.

5.—Births.

6.—Deaths.

Total 50. Male 19, Female 31. Rate 14.3. Note, almost the same as the Birth Rate. That for England and Wales 12.1.

The County Medical Officer of Health was met upon one occasion at the Diss Council Schools during the year.

INSPECTION OF PLACES WHERE FOOD IS PREPARED.

MEAT.

The shops of the Meat Purveyors are frequently visited and are kept in a clean condition. The work of supervision has largely increased, owing to the number of Retail Meat Stalls at the local weekly Market; the meat sold at the stalls includes Imported Beef and Mutton, Home Killed Pork and Mutton. Imported Bacon and Ham are also sold.

FISH.

The four Fishmongers' premises are kept in a clean and satisfactory condition. Three premises where Fish and Chip-Potato frying is carried on are kept in a satisfactory condition. There are now a number of Stalls for the sale of wet and dried fish at the weekly Market. These are regularly visited. During the year 10 boxes of mackerel were examined and surrendered by the salesman, as they were unfit for sale as human food.

BAKEHOUSES.

During the year one Bakehouse has been closed and one Bakehouse built. There are 8 Bakehouses in the district, including one underground; all are kept in a satisfactory state.

MILK AND MILK SUPPLY.

There are ample supplies of milk retailed throughout the district. The Milk Stores are periodically visited and kept in a very clean condition. The quantity of Milk sold by Retail and distributed in the district weekly is approximately 1,022 gallons.

DAIRIES AND COWSHEDS.

The Dairies are regularly limewashed and cleaned and kept in a very sanitary condition. A new roof and floor is included in the improvements made to Cowsheds during the year.

One person has been registered during the year as a Purveyor of Milk.

SLAUGHTERHOUSES.

There are four Registered Slaughterhouses in the district, one licensed Slaughterhouse having been discontinued for the purposes of the trade during the year.

Three of the Slaughterhouses are in regular use and one only periodically.

All are kept in a clean and sanitary condition. Improvements carried out during the year include repairs to roofs and the repairing to floors.

DISINFECTION.

A "Thresh" emergency Disinfector is kept for the purposes of disinfection when such is necessary. During the year rooms have been disinfected by fumigation on four occasions.

One house has been thoroughly fumigated for the purposes of cleansing upon the removal of the occupier.
