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



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INFANT WELFARE REPORT, 1925.

Nurse Campbell reports as follows :--

Thirty-three new infants were visited during the year, 149 visits being paid to these infants, while 447 visits have been paid to children over one year and under school age.

The infants seem well cared for generally, and the mothers apparently appreciate the monthly visits and advice given.

Several mothers attend the Weighing Centre regularly.

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NOTE.—There are of the 188 existing privy-vault type closets, 152 which it is not possible to connect to the sewers, this number being scattered in the country area of the district, i.e., Farms and Cottages.

SCAVENGING.

The scavenging work is done by a Contractor, under the supervision of the Sanitary Inspector, and includes the weekly collection of the contents of Pail Closets and Galvanised Sanitary Dustbins. Trade refuse may be removed by private arrangement with the Contractor.

The Contract is for the term of three years dated from the 1st October, 1925, and expires 30th September, 1928.

 - On the 14th January, 1925, Application was made to the Court in 2 cases for an Order to quit Dwelling-houses in respect to which a Closing Order was made. The cases were twice adjourned, viz., 11th March and 10th June, the later date an Order being made for possession in each case. The Orders were eventually complied with.
 - (b) Statutory Proceedings under the Housing, Town Planning, &c., Act, 1919. Section 32.
 - On the 14th January, 1925, Proceedings at Court were taken against a person who occupied a house (void) in respect of which a Closing Order was in force, this case was adjourned by the Justices to the Court held 11th February, 1925. The case was further mentioned at the Court held 11th February, 1925, when, with the sanction of the Justices, the defendant having vacated the premises, the case was withdrawn, the costs being remitted by the Court.

- 347 visits have been made to Slaughterhouses during times of slaughter and after slaughter.
- 130 visits have been made to the public market held weekly in the open Market Place, particular attention being given to the Meat Stalls.
- (1) Meat Inspection.—The Sanitary Inspector, as far as possible, is present at all times of slaughter at the registered Slaughterhouses, there being fixed days for slaughtering throughout the year, and the Slaughterhouses being within easy distances, the work of inspection is thereby facilitated. This being a country market town a number of animals are sent in from farms situate in the adjoining district for slaughter, especially when animals show signs of not being in proper health and feed.

I herewith give particulars of the work in connection with Slaughterhouses and Meat Inspection under the Public Health (Meat) Regulations, 1924; disease in meat and arrangements for the disposal of meat seized as unfit for food.

Pursuant to the above Order a Notice of Intended Slaughter of an animal found to be tuberculosis from the Clerk to the County Council was received 14th December.

One Slaughterhouse was licensed May, 1925, for the slaughter of pigs only. The license is a yearly one.

The arrangements for the disposal of condemned meat is that the seized meat is conveyed to the Local Gas Works, where it is destroyed in the furnaces under the supervision of the Sanitary Inspector.

One Slaughterhouse has had walls, floor and roof repaired.

One Slaughterhouse has had new drains constructed, new floors constructed, and the roof repaired.

The Market held weekly.

Visits are made periodically to these premises.

All the Bakehouses in the district are frequently visited, and are kept in a clean and satisfactory condition.

There is one Underground Bakehouse in the district.

Six Bakehouses have been limewashed to the requirements of your Sanitary Inspector.

On the 17th July your Inspector examined a consignment of 14 boxes of Haddock consigned to a Fish Salesman in the Market; these were seized, being unfit for food, and surrendered by the Salesman and destroyed.

DISINFECTION AND CLEANSING.

1. PUBLIC HEALTH (MEAT), REGULATIONS, 1924.

SPECIAL REPORT. Recent Meat Regulations.— Sanitary Inspector's Report to Council, dated 23rd June, 1925. This Report was with reference to a Meeting held 19th June, 1925, at the Shirehouse, Norwich, convened by Dr. Nash, County M.O.H., at which your Sanitary Inspector was in attendance, and which Dr. Hancock, of the Ministry of Health attended and dealt with the Public Health (Meat), Regulations, 1925.

2. CONFERENCE OF LOCAL AUTHORITIES, BUILDERS, AND OPERATIVES, AT THE GUILDHALL, NORWICH.

SPECIAL REPORT.-Sanitary Inspector's Report to Council, dated 25th June, 1925.

This Report dealt with the proceedings of a Conference summoned by the Lord Mayor of Norwich at which an invitation was given to this Local Authority to nominate representatives. The Sanitary Inspector was the nominee of this Authority, and attended the Conference on the 24th June, 1925.

The Conference dealt with Circular 520A of the Ministry of Health.

The Lord Mayor stated that the Conference was called at the request of the Building Industry Committee.

I beg to thank my Sanitary Inspector, Mr. Handel Jones, for his valuable and tactful help throughout the past year; Mr. Cooper for his summary of the Water Supply; Nurse Campbell for her work in connection with the Infant Welfare Centre; and you, Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen, for your unvarying courtesy and help to me in my work.
