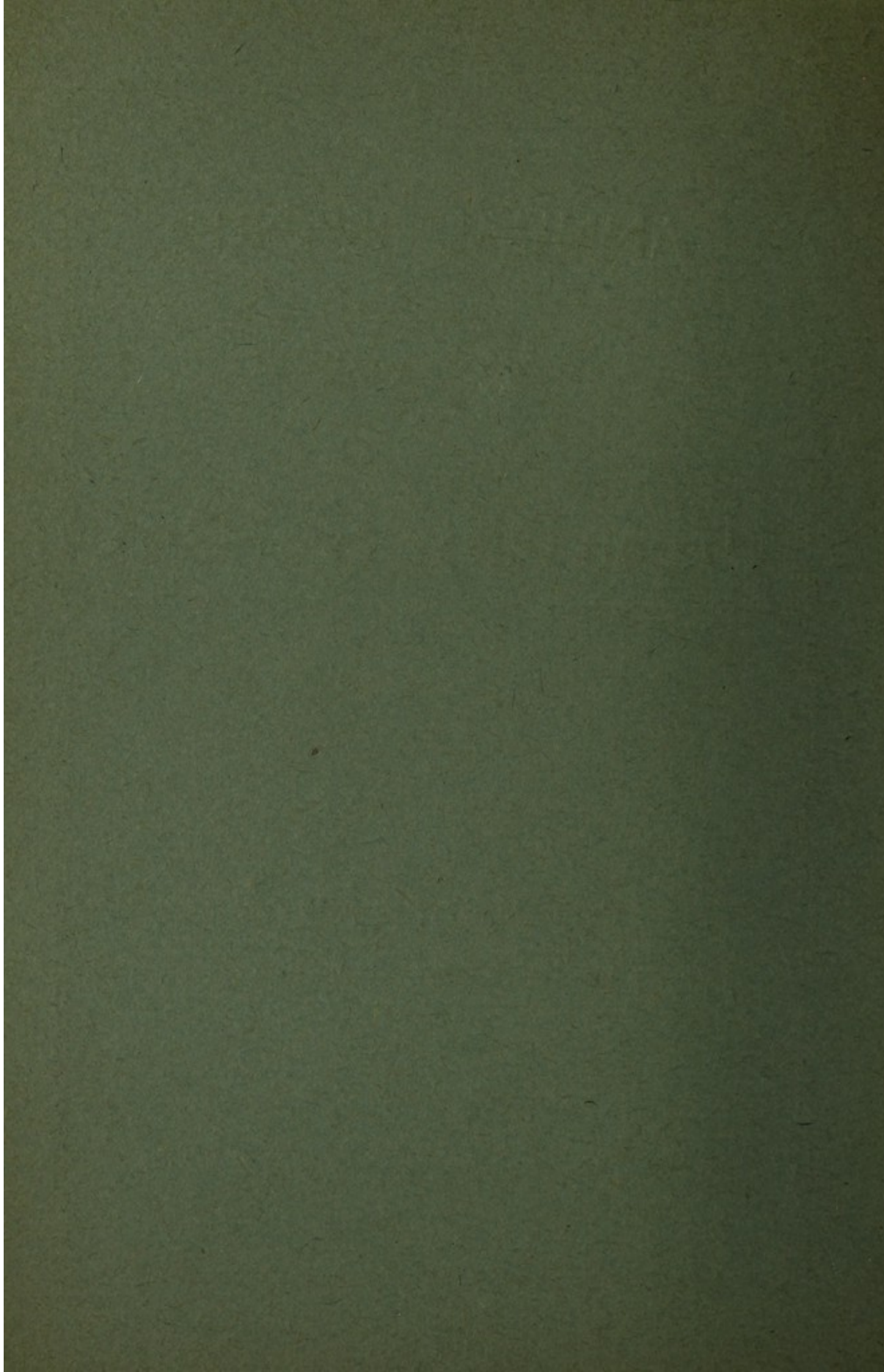

SOCIAL CONDITIONS.

Owing to the reconditioning of several houses the social conditions have been somewhat improved, and compare favourably with other towns in agricultural districts. For various reasons there has been an increase in unemployment of a seasonal nature. There are no industries.

HOSPITALS.

(a) Non-infectious cases. There is no local hospital. Accident and other cases are treated at the Norfolk and Norwich Hospital, Norwich.

(b) Infectious Cases. There is no local hospital. Arrangement is made by this Council for emergency cases requiring treatment to be admitted to the City of Norwich Isolation Hospital.

NURSING FACILITIES.

(a) Professional Nursing: General Nursing at the home is given by the District and Maternity Nurses.

(b) Maternity and Child Welfare: A weighing centre is held locally at the Church Hall once a month, when advice is given. The centre is in charge of the District and Maternity Nurses.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES.

A motor ambulance for non-infectious and accident cases is available locally. This ambulance is provided and maintained by Public and Voluntary subscriptions.

WATER SUPPLY.

Up to the end of the year the water supply was not controlled by bacteriological examination. With regard to water storage, attention is directed to the Pumping records which show that increased storage is urgently required.

SCHOOLS.

Sanitary Condition and water supply is satisfactory. One school was closed for a short period owing to the prevalence of influenza.

Infectious diseases have not been prevalent, and the cases that have occurred have been sporadic.

A scheme suggested for the artificial immunisation against diphtheria did not meet the approval of the local medical practitioners as the fees payable were not considered adequate.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

(a) DRAINAGE : 1. NEW DRAINAGE.

19 Houses and Premises have been provided with new drainage and connected to the main sewers. 3 Farm-premises have been provided with new drains, and these have been provided with tank and proper overflow disposal.

2. EXTENSION TO EXISTING DRAINAGE.

10 Extensions to drainage at present existing on premises have been made. These extensions have provided for the fixing of Baths, Sinks, and W.Cs., and for the improved drainage of the premises generally.

(b) SEWERAGE : 1. EXTENSIONS TO EXISTING SEWERS.

The sewer at Frenze Road has been extended a further distance of 124 Feet. This extension has enabled the drainage of a further 2 new houses to be connected. This sewer at Frenze Road will allow to be further extended as new property is erected in this area.

2. NEW TANK AND FILTER BED.

The work is now completed of the new receiving Tank with adjacent Filter Bed at Victoria Road on land purchased by the Council from the Diss Co-operative Society, Ltd. This will deal with the Storm-water Sewage Overflow at this point of the sewage system. This has now been functioning during the last 6 weeks and is working efficiently and is in every way satisfactory, and a great improvement.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

This work is done by contract, and the work includes the whole of the URBAN area of the district. The only parts of the district omitted is the RURAL area which includes The Heywood and Burston Road, the distance to be covered making this prohibitive, and the cost excessive.

Improvement has been effected during the year in the emptying and cleansing of Closets, etc., by the purchase of a new Sanitary Tumbler Cart, and the working of this has been quite satisfactory.

SCAVENGING.

The Scavenging work is done by Contract, the Contractor working under the direction and supervision of the Sanitary Inspector. The Contract provides for the weekly collection and disposal of the contents of Privy Pails and Sanitary Dustbins; the emptying and cleansing of Cesspools and Privy Vault Closets, and Dustbins (fixed receptacles) as and when required.

The Contract does not provide for the removal of trade refuse. This matter is for the persons concerned to make their own arrangements.

The Contract is for a term of three years, dated from 1st October, 1937 and expires 30th September, 1940.

During the year the whole of the equipment and the carts have been overhauled and repaired.

Valuable assistance has been given by various Owners of Cottages in co-operating with the Sanitary Inspector when Cottages owned by them have become void, in letting the tenancy to relieve cases of overcrowding.

There is a slight reduction in the number of overcrowded houses and these should be considerably reduced on completion of the Housing Scheme now in hand.
