Water Supply.

During the year the artesian borehole at the waterworks was re-bored and cleaned out, both pumps dismantled, overhauled and new parts fitted as required involving a cost of nearly £300.

The water supply is sufficient and of good quality but there is inadequate storage for present needs.

Notes.

During the year several improvements have been made at the slaughterhouse, including a new concrete floor, also cement rendering of the walls where found to be necessary. The town main water supply has been laid on.

SECTION F.

PREVALENCE OF AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

There was a small outbreak of Measles and cases of Scabies occurred sporadically. These latter cases can be attributed to the temporary influx of population.

Diphtheria Immunisation.

Diphtheria immunisation was undertaken by local medical practitioners privately and at the schools.
