Social Conditions.

Any improvement in housing conditions is at present in abeyance. Overcrowding is fairly prevalent, and the condition of many houses is very unsatisfactory.

Water Supply.

The water supply has been satisfactory during the year both in regard to quality and quantity; but it is again stressed that the storage capacity is quite inadequate.

Remarks. Each sample represents pure and whole some water of good organic bacteriological quality, and suitable for drinking purposes.

The original water is evidently slightly ferruginous. "B" still retainstraces of residual orin, and had been softened (if at all) to a less extent than "A".

The water is not liable to have a plumbo-solvent action.

Water is supplied from Public Mains to 885 houses out of a total of 1,049 in the U. D. Arma. 16 houses at Walcot obtain their water from a stand pipe, 148 houses apart from the 16 referred to above are not supplied by the town water supply.

Scavenging.

The work of scavenging is now done by direct labour by the Council. An Austin 5-ton lorry was purchased by the Council for refuse collecting and salvage work. This was brought into service on the 24th January, 1944. The other scavenging work of privy-vault and pail emptying is done by horse transport, the time being made up on refuse collecting. The contents of vaults and pails is disposed of at the sewage works. The refuse is disposed of by controlled tipping, a suitable tip being hired by the Council for this purpose. During the year the area of collection has been extended to include the whole of the 'alcot district.

Arrangements have also been made for some of the contents of vaults and pails to be tipped at a farm at Walcot Green, and treated with farm refuse, and used on the land for manufial purposes. On the whole, the work was proceeding satisfactorily during the year. The scavenging is controlled and supervised by the Sanitary Inspector.

Notes/

During the year maintenance work of the structure of the slaughterhouse has been carried out. The roof has been repaired where found to be necessary. The copper has been re-set and repaired; part of the yard to the slaughterhouse concreted and the other part re-surfaced.

The situation of the slaughterhouse in the centre of the town surrounded by dwelling houses, and having poor road access, is considered very unsatisfactory.
