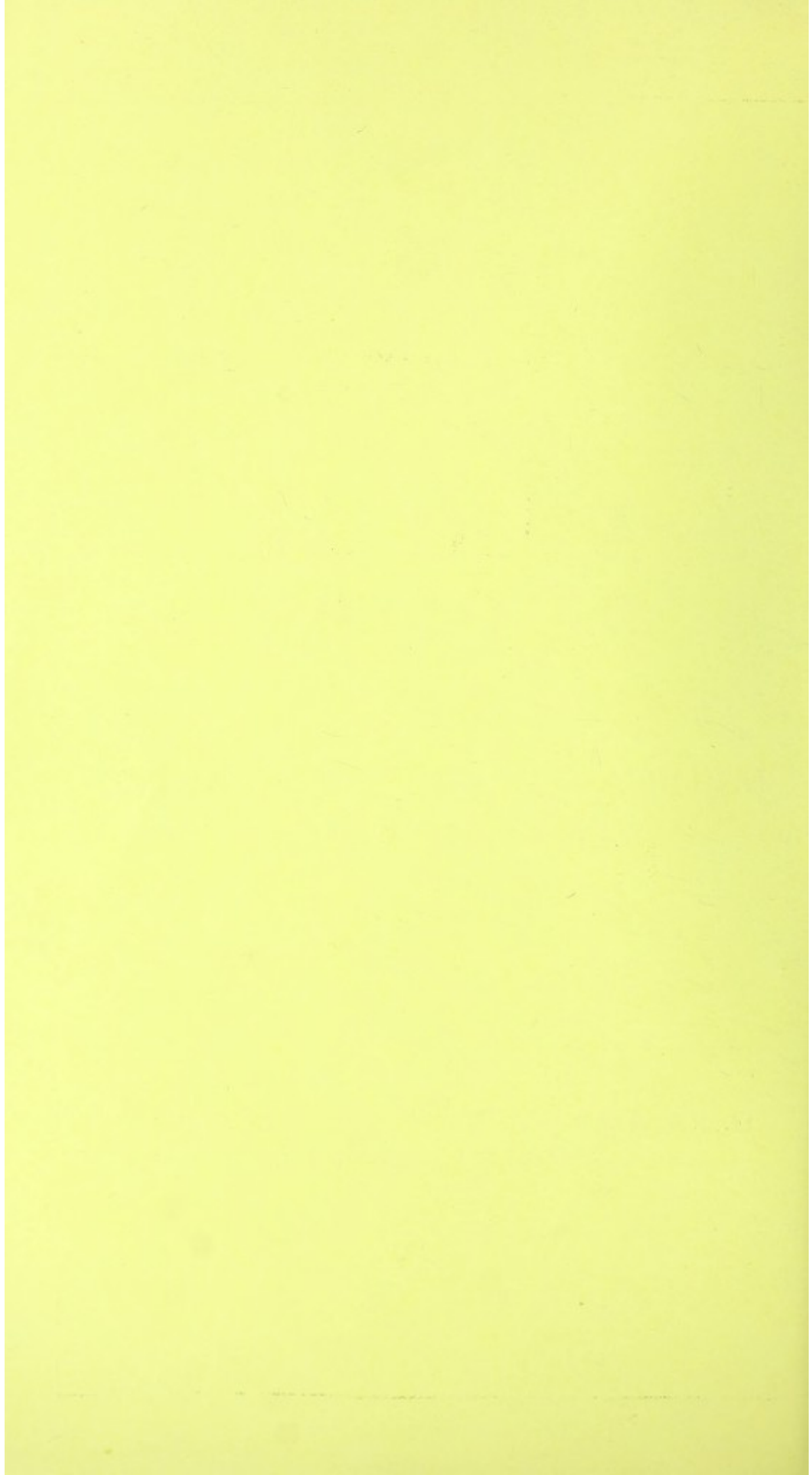

To the Council of the County Borough of Doncaster.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report for the year 1964.

During the year the County Borough Council made a special resolution that the Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health, instead of being printed, was in future to be stencilled. An opportunity was therefore taken to re-shape the layout of the Report. It was considered that the Report would be of more interest if the preface was more or less a commentary on the year's events and that the body of the Report should consist of Tables giving the statistical information.

Perhaps the most important event of 1964 was the coming into operation of a purpose-built central clinic housing most of the Authority's clinical services. This building is sited in Chequer Road, virtually the centre of Doncaster. It was officially opened by the Mayor of Doncaster who that year was also Chairman of the Health Committee. Such a fine building gave the staff an added incentive in their daily work. Shortly after being opened a count was taken on several days of the numbers who visited the clinic for one reason or another. Sometimes as many as 400 individuals would call for one or other of the services through the course of any one day. I think this reflects the public's interest in and appreciation of such a fine building.

During the year the Authority also constructed an Ambulance Station Wash Bay, equipped with the latest labour saving devices, washers and foam rinsers, in order that ambulance staff could clean their vehicles under shelter.

It has been customary for many years to comment on the vital statistics of the area. As these vary very little from year to year it seems pointless to draw attention to minor variations and it is such statistics which make reports dry and not very readable. Consequently I shall draw attention only to those where there is a difference of some significance or some magnitude.

One figure which continues to give cause for concern is the increase in the numbers of illegitimate babies born in the town where now virtually 10 per cent of total live births are illegitimate births.

During the year there was quite a sharp rise in the number of infants under one year of age who died, the principle cause of death being prematurity where 22 infants died within one week of birth. The Table on page 18 sets out other causes by age. The affect of these premature deaths is to adversely affect the neonatal mortality rate, the early neonatal mortality rate and the perinatal mortality rate.

In 1964 the return of congenital malformations to the Registrar General started in respect of cases born in January 1964. The notification of congenital malformations birth card was amended and two cards of the defects to look out for were prepared and issued to the staff concerned.

The only other cause of death to which I would draw attention is that from cancer of the lung and bronchus where a special Table on page 20

shows that in 1964 forty-two people died from this cause, that is .48 per 1,000 population, such a high figure having only once previously been recorded. The role which the cigarette plays in this is now undisputed.

Efforts continue to educate those concerned that smoking is a dangerous habit. To help in our anti-smoking campaign the exhibition van provided by the Central Council for Health Education was stationed in the Market Place on 15th and 16th May 1964. In spite of all our efforts little progress was made in this direction.

Doncaster has a very fine Dental Service. In addition to the Central Clinic Dental Officers, a peripheral clinic has been established at Cantley. There has been an increase in the establishment by one dental officer and by one dental surgery assistant during 1964. The Dental Service of course is provided primarily for children attending schools but it is also available to pre-school children and to expectant and nursing mothers. Relatively few pre-school children take advantage of this service. It is only to be hoped that parents see their children attend their own dentists regularly between the ages of 3 and 5. Our experience in the School Health Service where the number of decayed, missing and filled teeth is very high, leads us to believe that not sufficient advantage is taken of the General Dental Services.

During the year the Authority was fortunate in being able to appoint a Dental Hygienist to the staff and it is hoped that she will make a great impact on children as to the importance of dental hygiene generally. Caring for the teeth is a basic principle in caring for one's general health. Fluoridation, very desirable as it is, is not the only answer to perfect teeth and meticulous attention to the regular care and periodic visits to dentists is just as important.

During the year the authority agreed in principle to the appointment of a Health Education Officer and it is hoped that when this is eventually made significant strides in this field will be made.

The Infant Welfare Clinic has become very popular with mothers due to its now being accommodated in bright airy new premises compared with the dilapidated premises formerly used. So popular has the clinic become that now it is held both in the mornings and the afternoons.

I should also draw attention to the fact that the number of home confinements continues to decrease steadily but conversely the number of early discharges from hospital has increased.

Tecota inhalers, which were purchased to replace old and obsolete gas and air apparatus, are now being used by all the midwives. The Tecota inhaler is used to administer a 0.5% mixture of trichlorethylene (trilene) in air as an analgesic during childbirth. All the midwives are trained in the use of the apparatus which is safe and simple to operate.

I should also like to draw the attention of the public to the mothercraft classes which are conducted in Chequer Road Clinic. At no time must a woman have more queries about her own health and that of the coming child, and a good opportunity is now presented in the new clinic for all these queries to be dealt with by well qualified and sympathetic staff.

A Mothers' Club is also held on Thursday evenings at Chequer Road Clinic as a new venture.

The figures of work done by the other two branches of the Local Authority Nursing Service do not show any great variation but the opportunity should be taken at this point to once again draw attention to the invaluable role played in preventive medicine by the health visitor, and to the great amount of work which the district nurse does in looking after the sick in their own homes. Ever since the National Health Service Act came into operation the number of people treated in their own homes continues to increase, the vast majority of those being aged 65 and over.

Special attention is drawn to one nursing aid of great help when nursing incontinent patients, viz. incontinence pads. So far no problems on their disposal have arisen.

On page 28 the sorry story of the vaccination against smallpox is very clearly shown. The numbers protected continue to run at a very low level and it is only when a crisis arises, as it did in Bradford in 1962, that instead of getting under 1,000 cases protected more than 10,000 presented themselves at doctors' surgeries or the clinic for much needed protection. Vaccination in infancy is no longer compulsory but, as a preventive measure, it has stood the test of time and all parents are advised to consult their own doctors or the clinic doctors on the advisability of having their children protected against this deadly disease which, with rapid air travel, may arrive in this country at any time.

Now that polio vaccine may be given orally, the simplicity and safety of the procedure should induce all parents to accept this prophylactic measure without question.

Very much the same remarks may be applied to immunisation against diphtheria as are applicable to smallpox, but I am always happy to report that no case of diphtheria has appeared in Doncaster now for thirteen years.

The responsibilities of the Ambulance Service never grow less, but for long distance journeys the facilities provided by the British Railways were again used and our thanks are due to the personnel for their ready co-operation and assistance.

I must also express our thanks to the Transport Department for the maintenance and repairs to the ambulance vehicles throughout the year (as well as the refuse collection vehicles) which has resulted in the vehicles always being in first class condition and ready for the road at a moment's notice.

The Tables and figures on the Mental Health Service give no real indication of the great pressure of work in this field. With the advent of the 1959 Mental Health Act, the Authority have realised that this is a growing service and have appointed an additional Mental Welfare Officer and are planning to construct purpose-built centres for the day time care of the subnormal and severely subnormal, both adult and children.

It also gives satisfaction to report that the Authority has now established a Chiropody Service as from 11th May 1964, which gives every indication of being an expanding service in the years to come. Prior to this date the Chiropody Service in the town was conducted on behalf of the Council by the Council of Social Service. They made a charge of 2s.6d. per treatment and the treatments numbered 900 at surgeries and 301 at patients' homes. During the rest of the year the Authority's own chiropodists gave 1,644 treatments at the clinic and 437 treatments at patients' homes.

During the year one new nursing home was registered under the Public Health Act and the Nursing Homes Act and is now functioning satisfactorily. The proprietors are readily agreeing to abide by all the conditions which are contained in the Conduct of Nursing Homes Regulations 1963.

In February 1964 Gox Hill Nursing Home closed. This leaves a total of two nursing homes registered as at the end of the year.

Amongst the infectious diseases, the only condition from which large numbers of children suffer is measles but undoubtedly sooner or later the manufacture of a successful potent vaccine will enable us to irradicate this troublesome condition. The only other infectious disease which gives cause for concern is that of pulmonary tuberculosis and it is pleasing to note that with each succeeding year the number of cases notified declines. It is only hoped by vigorous action that eventually this disease will also be irradicated.

The sanitary circumstances of the area are well set out in the Tables in the latter part of the Report. For instance, the vast quantity of refuse which is collected and disposed of makes a very significant contribution to the health of the community.

Due to the possibility of works study being introduced in the Department a survey of the work was carried out and was completed by the end of January 1964. The survey resulted in the adjustment of work which reduced the driving staff by one.

During the latter part of the year the Trade Union representative raised the question of a bin bonus scheme. By the end of the year the Town Council decided to proceed with organisation and method and works study in the Health Department and this will commence early in 1965.

Welfare facilities in the Cleansing Section have also been under discussion and the Town Council has approved in principle the provision of welfare facilities, comprising of showers, toilets, locker and drying rooms and a canteen. Arrangements have been made with the Transport Committee for these facilities to be made available at the Cleansing Section garage at the Transport Depot.

Representatives from other Local Authorities have continued to visit Doncaster to observe the method of operating bulk containers on work at the central area flats, schools, business premises and the markets.

Disposal of Refuse

The disposal of refuse is supervised for the Health Committee by the Borough Engineer. Close co-operation is maintained at all levels.

The two Controlled Tips used throughout the year were the Airport and Cockings Tip, Balby.

Distribution of Dustbins

Under the Council's Municipal Dustbin Scheme this Section is responsible for the storage and distribution of new dustbins.

Defective dustbins are checked carefully before being replaced. In some cases where the dustbin handles had been pulled from the bin, either by defective rivetting during manufacture or by mishandling by the dustmen, the dustbins have been repaired and in consequence the repairs effected have prolonged their useful life.

The total number of dustbins and containers issued during 1964 was 2,331.

Slum Clearance - Disinfestation

Labour and vehicles have been provided by this Section to remove bedding from slum clearance houses to the disinfester unit at the Ambulance Station. Labour has also been provided to return the bedding to the new houses after disinfestation. One of this Section's vehicles is used to collect the "dirty" bedding from the old house and the Departmental van is used to return the "clean" bedding to the new house.

Close co-operation is maintained with the Public Health Inspectorate staff in this work.

The number of removals totalled 72 for the Housing Department.

The pollution of the atmosphere continues to be regularly monitored and the amounts of solids deposited per square mile per month are shown in the Table on page 41 and give an indication of the urgent need to press on with the programme for purifying the air we breathe.

The routine public health inspection of the area is set out in the many Tables which show the vast amount of work carried out by the Public Health Inspectors' Section which ranges from the purity of water supply, the purity of food and drugs, the remedying of nuisances, the standard of people's living accommodation, the inspection of carcasses at the slaughterhouse, to not least of all, the inspection under the Offices, Shops and Railway Premises Act of the conditions and facilities under which people work. This latter Act became operative on the 1st August 1964 and the first aid provisions on the 1st December 1964. The remainder of the Act will come into operation next year.

In this connection it is well worth recording that now there is no raw milk sold in Doncaster.

During the year there were no reports of plumbo-solvency in the district. The total population supplied from public water mains averaged 134,153, there now being only 25 dwellings with no internal water supply.

Main Drainage and Sewage Disposal

During 1964 extensions to the sludge drying beds at Balby Sewage Works were completed and the design of a scheme for the reconstruction of the works was commenced.

The Civic Welfare Officer, Mr. J.J. Ward, states that no cases of Epilepsy have been brought to his notice during the year. Those people who suffer from epilepsy look to his department for assistance, particularly residential, and people are accommodated in various homes throughout the country. Three men and three women are resident in the Western Hospital, one woman is resident in the Maghull Homes for Epileptics, Liverpool, one woman and three men are resident in Cookridge Hall, Leeds. At the end of the year the Local Education Authority was aware of 36 children, 16 boys and 20 girls, who were suffering from epilepsy, including petit mal. Six of these were pupils at the Open Air School, three were pupils at Rossington Hall Special School and one was a pupil at a residential special school. The remaining children were sufficiently well to enable them to attend ordinary schools.

Section 47 of the National Assistance Act 1948 gives authority for the compulsory removal to a suitable place of persons who are in need of proper care and attention. During the year two such people were removed under this Section. Due to the help and co-operation given by Mr. Ward, Civic Welfare Officer, the two ladies were accommodated at the Western Hospital.

Many people these days contribute to the health of the public and my thanks are due to all these people for the assistance they have given. We always have unfailing and courteous help from Mr. Martin Cawley, the Engineer and Manager of the Doncaster and District Joint Water Board. Our thanks are due too to Mr. H. Childs who undertook the work of Public Analyst for the Authority. No Public Health Department these days can do without the help and assistance so readily given from the Public Health Laboratory Service and to the Director and his staff at Sheffield may we express our most sincere thanks.
