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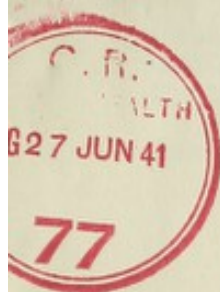

#### Hospitals :-

#### SECTION C. SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

##### Water :-

During the year 29 samples of water were sent to the Laboratory for chemical examination, 9 of these showed the water to be unfit for drinking purposes. In addition, 40 samples of water were submitted for bacteriological examination and 30 of these were found to be unsatisfactory.

The most important change in the water supplies of the District was the completion of the new water scheme for the Parish of Dorstone. This scheme utilises water from springs on high ground and supplies the Parish by gravitation. The water is of excellent quality and more than adequate for the demands of the Parish. The works were carried out under the supervision of the architect to the Council, Mr. C.E.T. Booth.

##### Drainage and Sewerage :-

There have been no important changes during the year. All reconstructed properties have been provided with proper drainage systems and septic tanks.

##### Closet Accommodation :-

During the period under review, 14 privies were converted to pail closets and 9 privies were replaced by chemical closets. In addition 14 privies were converted to water closets.

##### Eradication of Bed Bugs :-

Two houses were found to be infested with bed bugs, and were treated with Zaldecide by the Sanitary Inspector with apparent success.

## SECTION E. INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD :-

### Milk Supply :-

There are 377 premises in the District registered with the Local Authority under the Milk and Dairies Order, 1926.

The number of inspections of registered premises made during 1939 was 331. As a result of these inspections, 12 cow-sheds were found not to be properly cleansed, and this was remedied by the informal action of the Sanitary Inspector. Speaking generally, limewashing is carried out in a fairly satisfactory manner.

The Sanitary Inspector also makes inspections of food shops from time to time. During the year, 11cwt. 14lbs. of meat was surrendered for destruction in addition to 14 tins of fruit and 3lbs. of cooked meat.

## SECTION F. PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER, INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

Two important changes occurred during the year with regard to notification of disease. By becoming into operation on the 1st October, of Section 17 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938, cases of food poisoning became notifiable; and measles and whooping cough became notifiable on 23rd October under the Measles and Whooping Cough Regulations, 1939.
