At the end of 1940 there were 24 cases of tuberculosis on the Register, 11 pulmonary a nd13 non-pulmonary. During the year 1941, 7 cases were added to the Register, 5 pulmonary and two non-pulmonary. Eleven cases were removed from the Register during the year, 7 pulmonary and 4 non-pulmonary, and on the 31st. December, 1941, 20 cases remain on the Register, 10 pulmonary and 10 non-pulmonary.
